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Introduction

This document presents the results of performance tests done on the IBM @server x440 with VMware ESX Server 1.5.2 and Citrix Metaframe XPe Features Release 2 on Microsoft Windows 2000 Server.

On the server, eight VMware Virtual Machines were created, each hosting one instance of Microsoft Windows 2000 Server and Citrix Metaframe XPe.

The objectives of the tests were to evaluate the system performance and scalability.

To do so, injection servers were used to simulate user connections and workload, on each of the VMware Virtual Machines. The following elements have been measured:

- The time taken to run a reference script while the number of concurrent active users was increasing.
- The percentage of “*Processor Time*”.
- The maximum number of active users connected on the server.

For all the tests, Virtual machine have been affected to server processors as follow:

Testing tools and methodology overview

The tests have been designed to reflect the activity generated by typical users of Citrix Metaframe XPe in a production environment. The test procedures have been performed using Microsoft Office 2000 (Microsoft Excel, Microsoft Access, Microsoft PowerPoint) on a Microsoft Windows 2000 platform with Metaframe XPe Features Release 2 – SP2 installed in Virtual Machines created with VMware ESX Server 1.5.2.

In order to reproduce typical user activity, we used the *Citrix Server Test Kit* software (referenced in this document as CSTK) to generate sequential user connections on each Citrix server.

The CSTK automatically launches ICA connections. Once opened, this software starts a script coded in “win batch”. Then, this script starts software from the Microsoft Office 2000 product suite and simulates user interaction.

Four types of users are defined:

CPU Intensive User. This user scenario is used for simple data entry. The activity generated by this type of user is defined in the CSTK as a **normal user**. We can read the following definition in the CSTK guide: “*Normal user application scripts run one application at a time; for example, the script may write and save a letter using Microsoft Word.*” In this test, the “CPU Intensive User” scenario uses first Microsoft PowerPoint then Microsoft Word. It is based on the pre-defined scripts of the CSTK Version 2.1.

Ram/Disk Intensive User. This type of user scripts run two or more applications simultaneously and typically uses more system resources than normal users. As defined in the CSTK documentation: “*(...)for example, a power user script may open Microsoft Word and Microsoft Excel at the same time and merge an address book in Excel with a letter in Word.*” It is based on the pre-defined scripts of the *Citrix Server Test Kit* (CSTK) Version 2.1 using Microsoft Access 2000 and Microsoft Excel 2000.

Reference User. A “Reference User” was created to reflect other user activity. Depending on the test to run, it can be either a “CPU Intensive” or “Ram/Disk Intensive” user. The “Reference User” script time can be measured while the number of connections increases. The methodology used to measure the time spent to run the “Reference User” scripts is described later in this document.

Connected User. The “Connected User” scenario was intended to identify the maximum number of concurrent users on a server without any additional activity generated in the ICA session.

Results Summary

Maximum number of “Active” and “Connected” Users

Max. Number of “Active Users”

An “Active User” is defined as a user that has an opened ICA session on the Metaframe server and generates workload on it. The table below summarizes the maximum number of users who were connected to the Metaframe servers and the associated number of sessions with failed scripts. The number of “Active Users” is the result of the subtraction of those two values.

Important Note:

When the scripts launched by the Citrix Server Test Kit fail, the associated ICA sessions were still active. No error was reported at the server, hardware, operating system or software level.

All the Virtual Machines were running simultaneously during the test.

Max. Number of “Connected Users”

A “connected user” generates no user activity and has only an ICA session opened on the Citrix Metaframe Server. All the Virtual Machines were running simultaneously during the test.

User Response Time

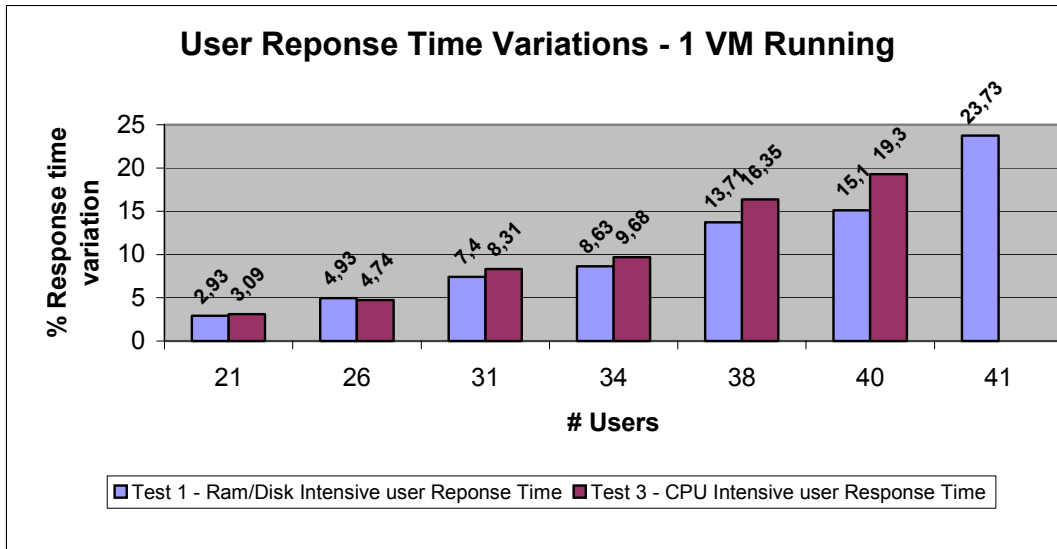
User Response Time Variations – One VM running

The following chart shows the response time variation (percentage) when the number of active users is increasing in **one** Virtual Machine.

Because VMware uses CPU 0 extensively, the test has been done on CPU 7. The other Virtual Machines were not started.

The test was stopped when:

- Restarting failed scripts systematically causes failures in other ICA sessions.

User Average Response Time Variations – Eight VMs running

The following chart shows the response time variation (percentage) when the number of active users is increasing in all the Virtual Machines.

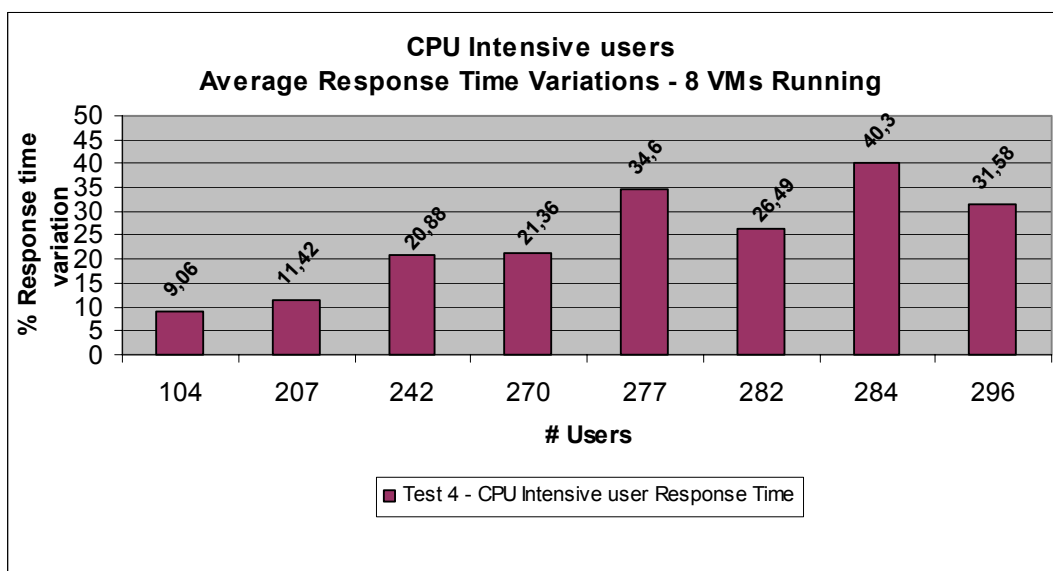
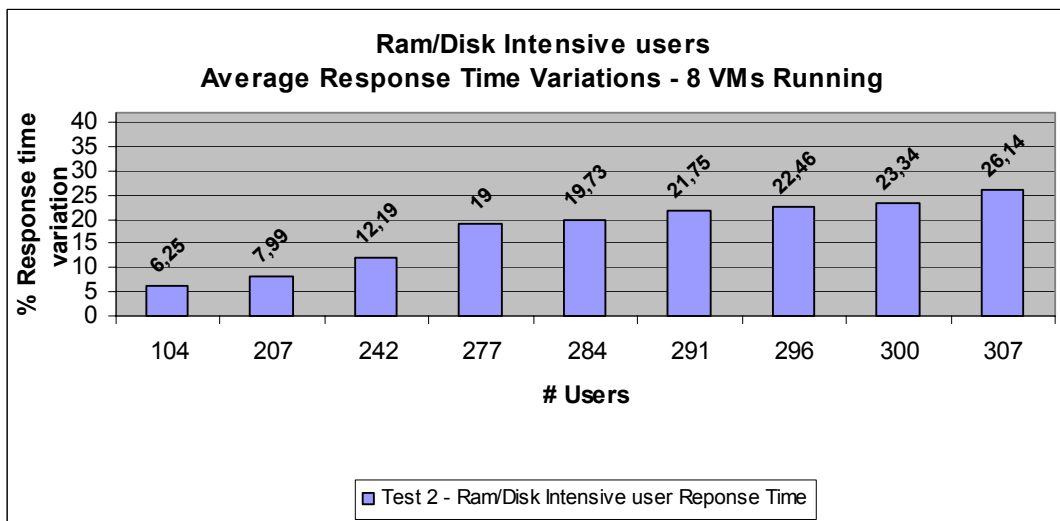
The test was stopped when one of the conditions below occurred:

- The %Processor Time was near 90% for CPU0 (VM1).
- Restarting failed scripts systematically causes failures in other ICA sessions.

Important Note

When the scripts launched by the Citrix Server Test Kit end with error, the associated ICA sessions had no error message and were still active without any error message.

No error was noted at the server, hardware, operating system and software level.

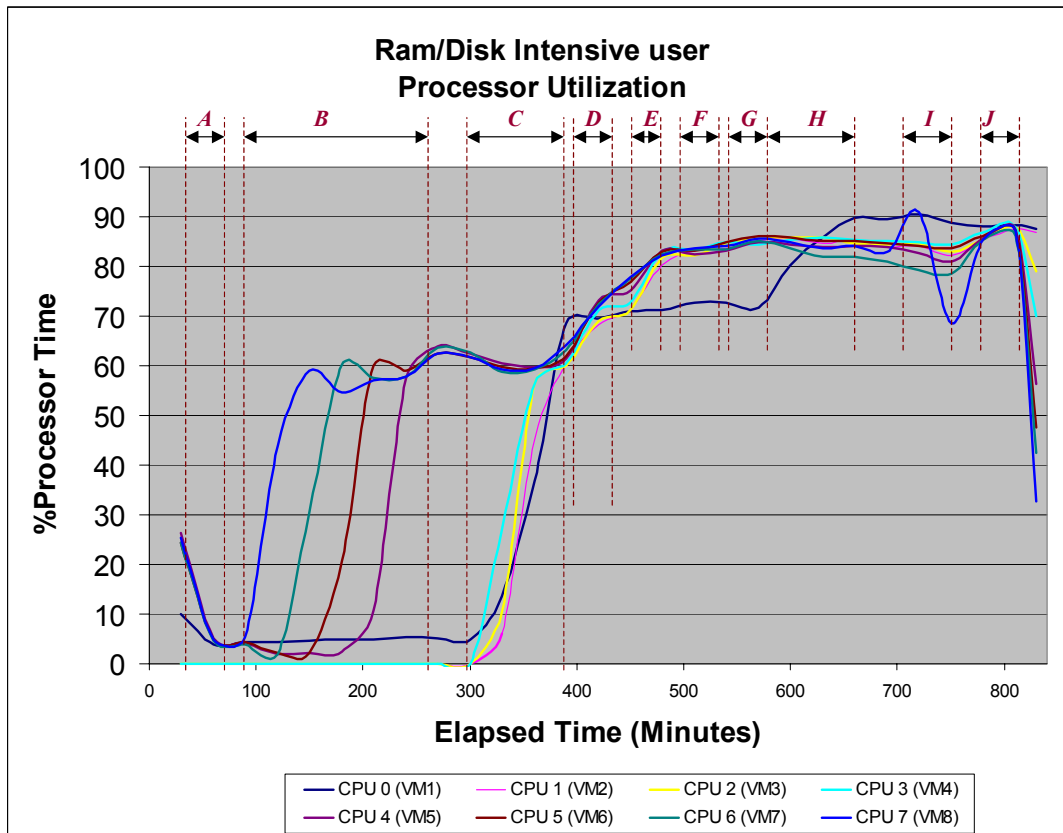

Processor Utilization

While the number of users increased and the “Reference User” response time was regularly measured on all the VMs, the percentage of Processor Time was recorded every minute. The resulting table was composed by more than 800 values per processor. In order to better understand the effect of active users on each processor, the recording values were aggregated by range of 30 minutes. The “Test 2” and “Test 4” charts are based on the aggregated values.

Test 2 - “Ram/Disk Intensive user” Server Processor Utilization



This chart has to be analyzed in association with the complete Test 2 table (“*Test 2 – RAM/DISK Intensive Users - Sequential users connections*”- chapter “*Detailed Results*”).

The table includes letters used as an indicator in the graph above so that the benchmark activity done at that time on the server can easily be located.

Comments

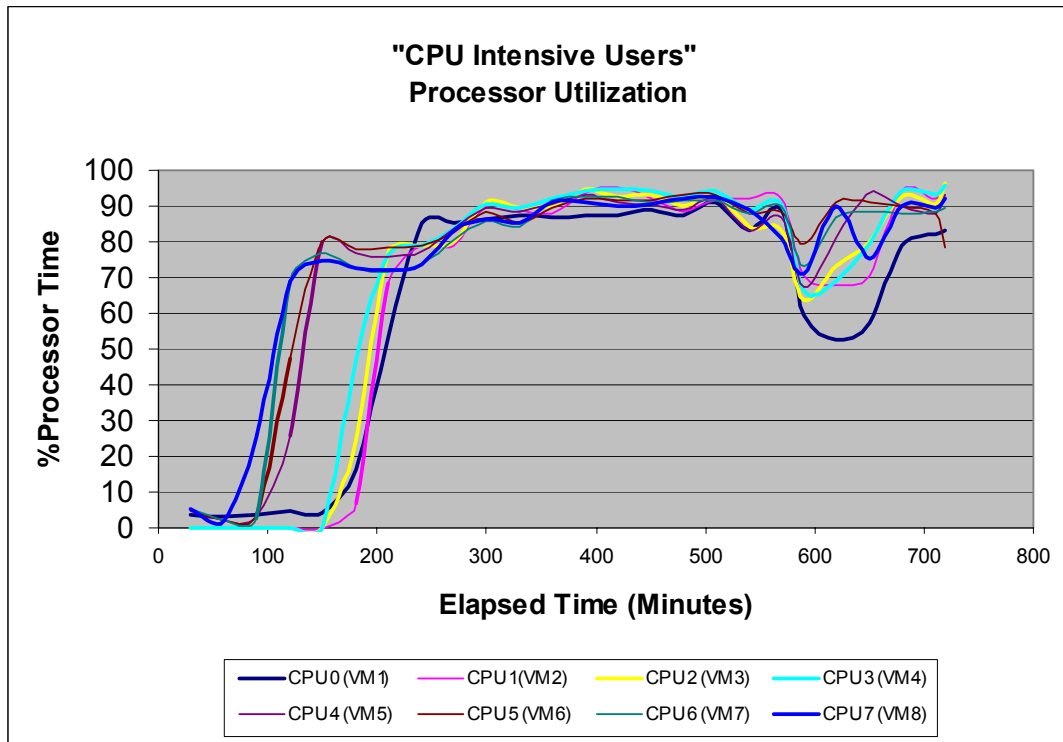
Three plateaus were noted:

- **[B & C]:** The first one is at around **60% of Processor Time** for a total of **207 users** (26 users per Virtual Machine numbered 2 to 8 and 25 users on VM1).
- **[D]:** The second one is between **70-75% of Processor Time** and represents an average of **242 users**.
- **[F & G]:** The last one is located between **80 and 90 % of Processor Time** and represents an average of **284 to 291 users**. The processor resources utilization is well balanced and the whole instances of processors grow smoothly until 125 users. At this stage, there is 25 users in VM1 (using CPU 0) and is 36/37 on each of the other VMs.

During **[H & I]:** The number of users on VM1 (CPU 0) was increased. This has generated 90 % of Processor Time for CPU 0 which is the level at which the other Virtual Machines have a failing scripts.

It was noticed that an overload of CPU 0 impacts all the Virtual Machines behavior. An overload of another CPU impacts only the associated Virtual Machine.

Test 4 - "CPU Intensive user" - Server Processor Utilization



The table "Detailed Results" / "Test 4 - CPU Intensive Users - Sequential users connections" shows the benchmark activity done at that time.

Comments

This graph reflects a quite similar Processor Utilization to the previous one with only two plateaus. There is an earlier jump to a Percentage of Processor Time at around **90%**.

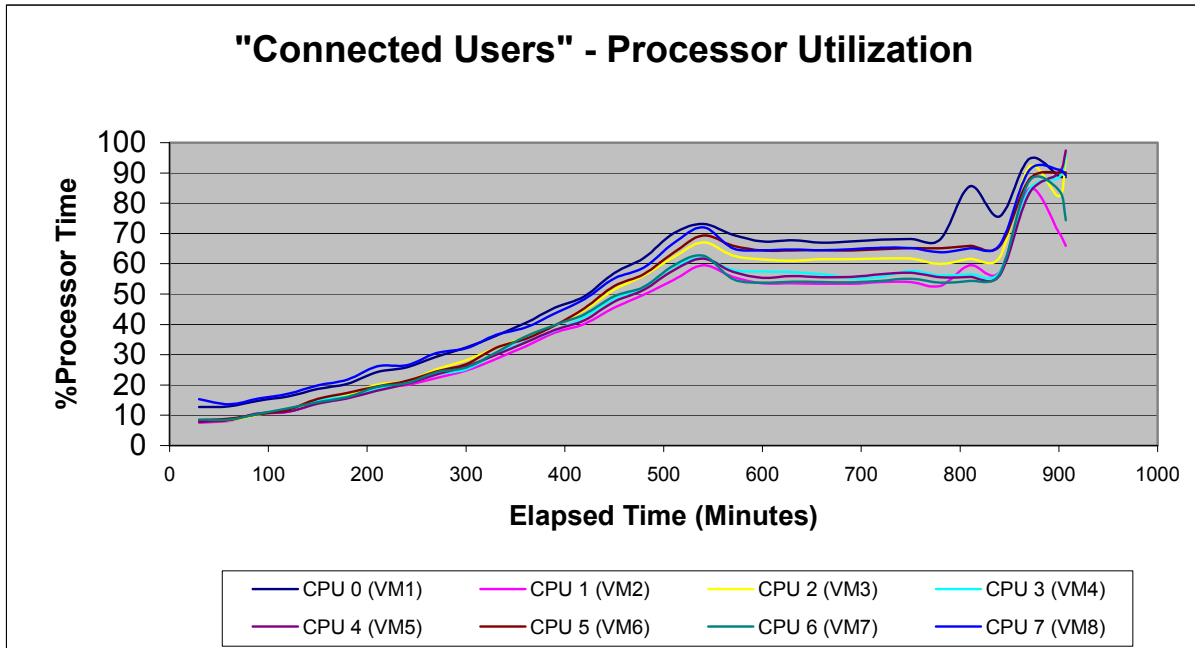
The first plateau is located between **78%-80 % of Processor Time** and represents a total of **207 users** (26 on VM 2 to VM 8 and 25 on VM1).

The average **% Response Time** of the "Reference Users" scripts processed in VM 2 to VM 8 is **11,42%**.

After this stage, the **% Processor Time** increases up to **88-92%**. The average response time of all the "Reference Users" increased up to **20,88%** for a total number of **242 users** (31 users on VMs 2 to 8 and 25 users on VM1).

Test 5 - "Connected Users" Server Processor Utilization

The following graph shows how ICA connections use the processor. No scripts were run. Using the Citrix Server Test Kit, ICA connections were started regularly from the injection servers (each ICA connection opens a Microsoft desktop windows on the server).



The test has been stopped when one of the conditions below occurred:

- The %Processor Time was near 90% for CPU0 (VM1).
- The Login Time was greater than one minute.

Important Note

No error was reported at the server, hardware, operating system and software level.

Test environment

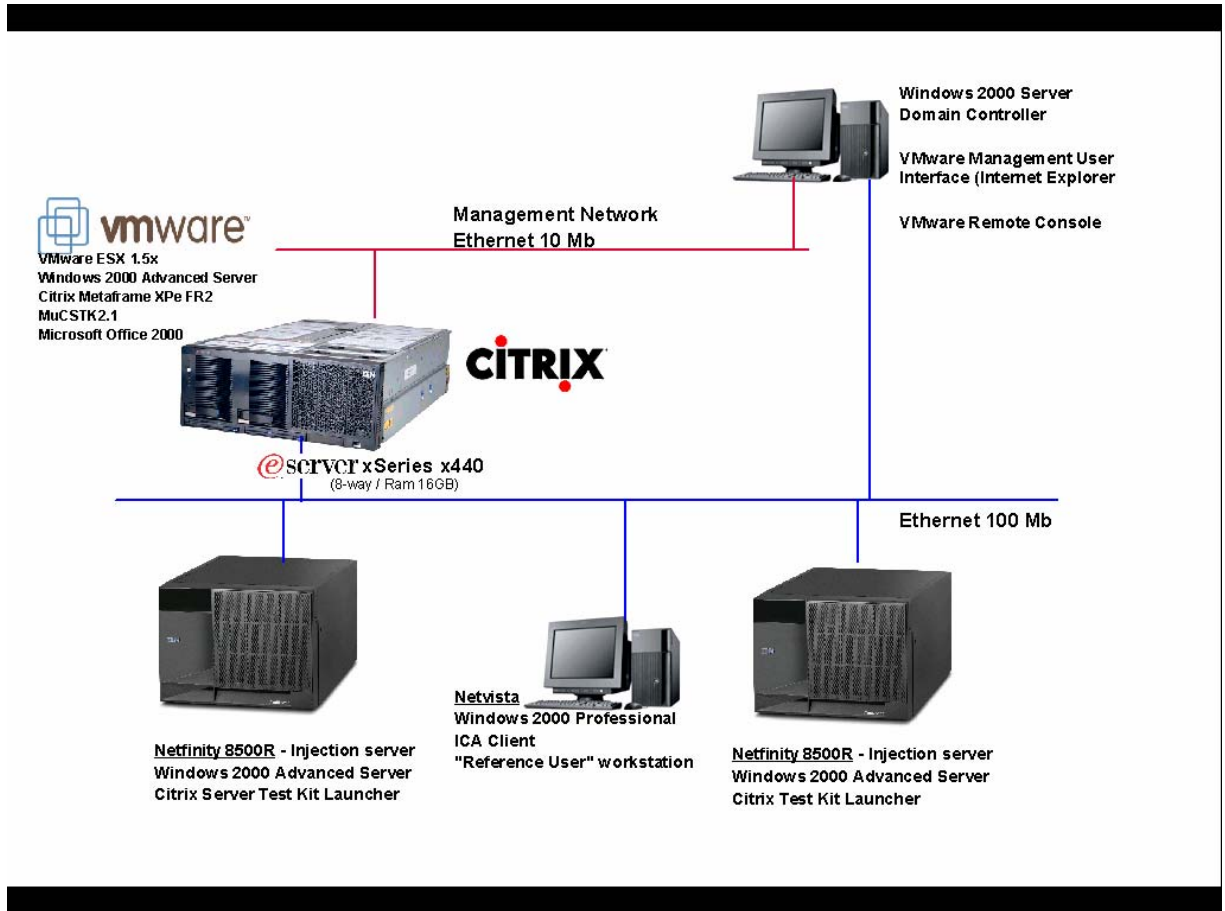
Two networks were used. The 10Mbps Network was used for management purpose and the Ethernet 100Mbps one for the injection.

The injectors used were two IBM Netfinity 8500R – 8-Way with 4 GB of Ram each.

To perform the “Connected Users” test (Test 5) and due to bottlenecks that appeared on the existing injectors, two additional injectors have been added to the injection network.

The Windows 2000 Domain Controller was used to manage VMware Virtual Machines through the *VMware Remote Console* and the *VMware Management User Interface*.

The CPU processor time has been monitored from this server through a telnet session.



Test Procedures

Three types of tests were performed:

- “Reference User response time test procedure”.
- “Connected Users” test procedure.
- “Server Performance test procedure” focusing on the CPU utilization.

During those tests, the number of users injected in each Virtual Machine was regularly increased. For each increment, **two values** were measured (excepting for the “Connected Users” tests described below):

1. The time spent by the “Reference User” to perform its script.
2. The number of ICA session with failed scripts (this value is used to determine the total number of active users).

Before each additional set of user injections, the sessions that failed were counted and the tables were filled in with the values. A script failure implies that no additional workload has been generated on the server (except the workload from the connection itself).

Before the injection of the next set of users, the failed scripts have been restarted in order to guarantee a server workload corresponding to the number of connected users. At this time, the processor utilization was monitored and summarized respectively in “Test 2 and Test 4 detailed results” graphs.

The complete results (but processors time) are included in the section “Detailed Results”.

Reference User response time test procedure

This procedure consists in the measure of the time taken by a “Reference User” to execute a script while the number of users doing similar work (CPU Intensive - Ram/Disk Intensive) increased.

For this test **three different steps** have been defined:

1. No user was injected on the Metaframe servers excepting the ”Reference User” scripts. The time spent to run the scripts was registered as the “Reference Time”.
2. Start of the injection of a defined number of users running the same scripts.
3. Restart the “Reference User” scripts when all the users are active.

The results table is filled in with the time spent to run the script. The “% Response time variation” is computed.

Using this procedure, **four tests** were run:

1. Test 1 - Ram/Disk Intensive users - One VM running using CPU 7.
2. Test 2 - Ram/Disk Intensive users - Sequential user connections.
3. Test 3 - CPU Intensive Users - One VM running using CPU 7.
4. Test 4 - CPU Intensive Users - Sequential user connections.

Test 1 and Test 3 description

During these two tests, only one Virtual machine was running. The number of users was increased and the time spent by the “Reference User” to run the script was measured.

Test 2 and Test 4 description

During these two tests, the injection started with VM5, VM6, VM7 and VM8 running. 25 user connections were injected on VM8. The next 25 user connections were then started respectively on VM7, VM6, and VM5. The remaining four Virtual Machines were then started with the injection of the same number of users.

The “Maximum Number of Active Users” is an abstract of Test 2 and Test 4 table results.

Connected Users test procedure

Test 5 description

This test measured the maximum number of opened ICA sessions accepted by a VMware server. The ICA connections were started using the Citrix Server Test Kit. The “Startup” folder was empty so no scripts were launched.

The users were connected sequentially on each of the Citrix Metaframe server. This test was done with four injectors.

Two injectors were added because of an injection bottleneck during a previous run.

The first injector launched the connection of one hundred and forty users on VM8 and VM7. The second injector launched the connection of one hundred and forty users on VM6 and VM5. The third one on VM4 and VM3, the fourth one on VM2 and VM1.

Once all the sessions were opened, ten additional users connections were added on each Metaframe Server in each Virtual Machine, then five and finally one by one.

The test was stopped when one of the conditions below occurred:

- The %Processor Time was near 90% for CPU0 (VM1).
- The Login Time was greater than one minute.

Server Performance test procedure

While running the Test 2 and Test 4, the percentage of Processor Time was measured.

The tool used to measure the server performance on the VMware server is based on a Perl Script that checks CPU utilization each minute.

It was not possible to use the Microsoft Windows “System Monitor” (Perfmon.exe) to measure the system performance. It was noticed that running “Perfmon” in a Virtual Machine consumes up to 10 % of additional Processor Time.

Moreover, the impact of the “Virtualization” layer cannot be measured.

Appendix C. Windows 2000 Server tuning

Based on Microsoft and Citrix recommendations, some configuration parameters have been modified. Here is the list.

❑ Registry Size

The “Maximum Registry Size” value is set to 120 MB.

❑ Application Performance

In “System Properties”, “Advanced” tab, select: “Optimize Performance for”: Background Services.

❑ Terminal Services License

The following registry key is modified as follow:

HKLMSYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\Services\TermService\Parameter

Value: DefaultLicenseServer

Type: REG_SZ

Data: *enter the Netbios Name of the Terminal Server Licensing*

❑ Disable “Paging Of Windows NT Executive”

Disable paging of exec by setting the following registry key:

[HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\Control\Session Manager\Memory Management] iaDisablePagingExecutiveIn=dword:00000001

❑ Increase Idle Connections To handle peak Logon Periods set to 5

The default of 2 idle connections minimizes memory used, but may not be sufficient to handle peak logon traffic. Increasing the count helps ensure availability during peak logon periods.

[HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SYSTEM\Current ControlSet\Control\Terminal Server] idleWinStationPoolCountIn=dword:00000005

❑ Last Access Update

The NTFS file system stores the last time a file is accessed, whether it is viewed in a directory listing, searched, or opened. In a multi-user environment, this updating can cause a small performance decrease. Modifying the following registry setting disables this feature:

**HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\Control\FileSystem
NtfsDisableLastAccessUpdate (REG_DWORD): 1**

❑ I/O Locks

The registry setting *IoPageLockLimit* specifies the limit of the number of bytes that can be locked for I/O operations. Because RAM is being sacrificed for increased disk performance, determine the optimal setting for this value through pilot tests.

Changing this setting from the default can speed up file system activity. Use the table below as a guide for changing the registry setting.

The following registry key is modified as follow:

HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\Control\SessionManager\Memory Management

Value: IoPageLockLimit (REG_DWORD): 10000 Hex

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
