



### z/OS Elements and Features

z/OS consists of base elements and optional features:

- The **base elements** (or simply elements) deliver essential operating system functions. When you order z/OS, you receive all of the base elements.
- The **optional features** (or simply *features*) are orderable with z/OS and provide additional operating system functions. Optional features are unpriced or priced:

□ Unpriced features are shipped to you **only if** you order them. If you plan to use any unpriced features, IBM recommends that you order them when you order your base elements. You must not wait until the next release becomes available. Once a release's base elements are no longer orderable, usually neither are its unpriced features.

□ Priced features are always shipped to you. When IBM packages your order, we enable the priced features that you ordered. These features are ready to use after you install z/OS (and customize them as needed). We disable the priced features that you did not order. Although they are installed on your system, you cannot use them. Later on, if you decide to use them, you notify IBM and you enable them dynamically (which is known as dynamic enablement). You dynamically enable by updating parmlib member IFAPRDxx and you notify IBM by contacting your IBM representative.

Elements and features may be exclusive or nonexclusive:

- An element or feature is called *exclusive* to z/OS if it exists only within z/OS (not also as a separately orderable, or stand-alone, product) and if future functional enhancements will occur only within z/OS.
- An element or feature is called *nonexclusive* if it exists both (1) within z/OS and (2) as a stand-alone product.

Listed in the foil above is the changing elements within z/OS R10 since z/OS R8. For a complete list of all the z/OS R10 base elements and optional features, see Appendix A in this presentation.

### Withdrawn in z/OS R9 (last delivered in z/OS R8)

This section lists items that were withdrawn in z/OS R9. You should take this into account as you plan your migration to z/OS R10. The removal of these functions may have migration actions which you can perform now, in preparation for z/OS R10.

- In z/OS V1R8 and prior releases, host communication between HCM and HCD is performed using either TCP/IP or Advanced Program to Program Communication (APPC). Starting with z/OS V1R9, host communication using APPC is discontinued. Host communication is now done exclusively using TCP/IP.
- Before z/OS V1R9, the TN3270E Telnet server could run as part of the TCP/IP stack or in its own separate address space. Starting in z/OS V1R9, the TN3270E Telnet server is no longer available to run as part of the TCP/IP stack. You must run the TN3270E Telnet server in its own separate address space. The TN3270E Telnet server has been able to run in its own address space since z/OS V1R6. This enhancement provides visibility and control over the TN3270E function separate from the TCP/IP stack. For example, users can run the TN3270E Telnet server at a different priority than the TCP/IP stack. This enhancement also provides the ability to stop and restart the TN3270E Telnet server without stopping the TCP/IP stack. This makes it easier to reset the server or install maintenance. Overall, problem diagnosis is easier and better when the TN3270E Telnet server and the TCP/IP stack are separate.
- The APPC Application Suite is a set of common applications originally designed to enhance the value of SNA networks for end users. Because more full-featured alternative applications exist in modern integrated SNA/IP networks, z/OS V1R8 is the last release that includes the APPC Application Suite. As of z/OS V1R9, the APPC Application Suite is no longer shipped with the product and is not supported. But note that APPC itself remains an integral part of z/OS. Consider the following alternatives to the APPC Application Suite:
  - For A3270, consider migrating to TN3270. TN3270 provides a much richer capability assuming IP connectivity exists between the client and server.
  - For APING, use the DISPLAY APING command that has been provided as a native VTAM command for many years.
  - A number of other IBM and vendor products provide SNA file transfer capability (such as NetView FTP) and can be used to replace AFTP. TCP/IP's FTP capability is also a good alternative if an IP infrastructure is in place between the client and server.

 In z/OS V1R5, development support for the C/C++ IBM Open Class® Library, specifically, the Application Support Class and Collection Class libraries, was removed. From z/OS V1R5 to z/OS V1R8, only run-time support was provided for the C/C++ IBM Open Class Library. Now, as of z/OS V1R9, the run-time support is also removed. If you have applications that depend on the C/C++ IBM Open Class Library run-time support, they will not run on z/OS V1R9 or higher.

### Withdrawn in z/OS R10 (last delivered in z/OS R9)

This section lists items that were withdrawn in z/OS R10. You should take this into account as you plan your migration to z/OS R10. The removal of these functions may have migration actions which you can perform now, in preparation for z/OS R10.

- IBM has removed support for CPU affinity. CPU affinity originally provided support for assigning work to the same CP. However, this predates Processor Resource/Systems Manager (PR/SM), which introduced logical processors. CPU affinity has long been obsolete for z/OS partitions operating under PR/SM, which makes the CP on which a piece of work executes unpredictable. z/OS V1R9 is the last release to provide support for the assignment of CPU affinity to a logical processor. Beginning with z/OS V1R10, any attempt to assign CPU affinity is ignored. For example, specifications for assigning a program to a specific logical processor or processors using the program properties table (PPT) or a SCHEDxx member of parmlib are ignored.
- The DFSORT ISPF panels are used to generate and execute DFSORT jobs, and are available in both English and Japanese. z/OS V1R10 is the last release that supports these panels. No replacement is planned for this limited-function interactive facility. All other previously supported methods for invoking DFSORT are still supported.
- Before z/OS V1R10, the RMF LDAP backend, ERB6LBCK, allowed access to RMF performance data from application programs. Effective with z/OS V1R10, this interface has been removed from z/OS. In its place you can use the Common Information Model (CIM) monitoring interface, which has been provided since z/OS V1R7. CIM allows system programmers to write applications (CIM monitoring clients) that retrieve system resource measurements. If a CIM client asks the CIM server to obtain z/OS metrics, the CIM server invokes the appropriate z/OS RMF monitoring provider to retrieve these metrics. The z/OS RMF monitoring providers use RMF Monitor III performance data.

### Planned for Withdrawal after z/OS R10 (planned for last delivery in z/OS R10)

This section lists items that are planned to be withdrawn in the release after z/OS R10. You should take this into account as you plan your migration past z/OS R10. The removal of these functions may have migration actions which you can perform now, in preparation for the release following z/OS R10. These statements represent IBM's current intentions. IBM development plans are subject to change or withdrawal without further notice.

- Network Database (NDB) function: z/OS V1.10 is planned to be the last release in which z/OS Communications Server will support the Network Database (NDB) function. After z/OS V1.10, the function will be removed from the product. Customers who currently use or plan to use the NDB function should investigate the distributed data facility (DDF) provided by z/OS DB2, and the DB2 Run-Time Client. DDF allows client applications running in an environment that supports DRDA(R) to access data at DB2(R) servers.
- BIND DNS 4.9.3: z/OS V1.10 is planned to be the last release in which z/OS Communications Server will support BIND DNS 4.9.3. After z/OS V1.10, the function will be removed from the product. BIND DNS 9.2.0 has been available since z/OS V1.4, and customers should implement this version as a replacement for BIND DNS 4.9.3. Customers that use the load balancing Connection Optimization (DNS/Workload Manager) feature of BIND DNS 4.9.3 should investigate Sysplex Distributor, the Load Balancing Advisor, Automated Domain Name Registration (ADNR), or other solutions.
- Boot Information Negotiation Layer (BINL): z/OS V1.10 is planned to be the last release in which z/OS Communications Server will support the Boot Information Negotiation Layer (BINL). After z/OS V1.10, the function will be removed from the product. Customers using this function should investigate the use of IBM Tivoli Provisioning Manager for OS Deployment for network based operating system installation services.
- DHCP server: z/OS V1.10 is planned to be the last release in which z/OS Communications Server will support the DHCP server function. After z/OS V1.10, the function will be removed. Customers who currently use or plan to use the z/OS DHCP server should investigate using a DHCP server on Linux for System z.
- Integrated Security Services LDAP Server: z/OS V1.10 is planned to be the last release of z/OS which will support the Integrated Security Services LDAP Server. A new optimized LDAP server, called IBM Tivoli Directory Server for z/OS (ITDS) as delivered for z/OS 1.8. Customers who are currently using the Integrated Security Services LDAP Server, should investigate migrating to ITDS, which was designed to allow greater consolidation of LDAP directories on z/OS to help simplify enterprise management and disaster recovery.

- z/OS V1.10 is planned to be the last release to allow attaching zSeries File System (zFS) multi-file system
  aggregates that are to be shared across systems in a sysplex. IBM has previously recommended that these
  multi-file system aggregates not be shared in a sysplex environment. Once this support has been removed,
  attempts to attach zFS aggregates will fail in a z/OS UNIX shared file system environment. Attaching zFS
  compatibility mode aggregates, which have a single file system per data set, will continue to be supported in all
  environments.
- z/OS V1.10 is planned to be the last release that includes IPCS Problem Management Subcommands. If you
  currently use the IPCS problem management subcommands to report and track problems, consider using IBM
  Tivoli Information Management for z/OS V7 (5698-A08) or other similar products. IBM plans to continue to
  enhance the dump and trace analysis and display facilities of IPCS.


#### Planned for removal in a future z/OS release

This section lists items that IBM has announced it intends to remove in a future z/OS release. You are encouraged to consider these removals when making your plans for system upgrades. These statements represent IBM's current intentions. IBM development plans are subject to change or withdrawal without further notice.

- In a future release, IBM plans to withdraw support for zFS multi-file system aggregates. When this support is withdrawn, only zFS compatibility mode aggregates will be supported. (A zFS compatibility mode aggregate has a single file system per data set.)
- Support for the VSAM KEYRANGE attribute will not be withdrawn as stated in announcement IBM z/OS 1.6: Integrating new applications and Preview: z/OS V1.7, 204-180, dated August 10, 2004. No supported release of z/OS allows you to define new VSAM data sets with the KEYRANGE attribute. On modern storage devices, KEYRANGE is generally detrimental to performance. For this reason, IBM recommends that you minimize or eliminate your use of KEYRANGE. Striped data sets are expected to provide better performance than KEYRANGE, and can be viewed as a good replacement for KEYRANGE data sets. To detect the KEYRANGE attribute on existing data sets, refer to INFO APAR II13894 or use the DFSMShsm ARCTOOLS (FINDKRDS) to detect this attribute for data sets migrated with DFSMShsm. Details on how to use this tool is in the DFSMShsm Implementation and Customization Guide (SC35-0418).

In a future release of z/OS, when DFSMShsm or DFSMSdss recalls or restores a VSAM data set with either IMBED or REPLICATE attribute or both, the attributes will be removed. No supported release of z/OS allows you to define new VSAM data sets or catalogs with the IMBED or REPLICATE attributes, and using them for existing data sets can waste DASD space and can often degrade performance. IBM recommends that you stop using these attributes. For information about how to detect IMBED and REPLICATE attributes on existing data sets and catalogs, refer to INFO APAR II13894.

In a future release of z/OS, IBM intends to make RFC4301 compliance mandatory when using z/OS IPSec policies. RFC4301 "Security Architecture for the Internet Protocol" specifies the base architecture for IPSec-compliant systems, including restrictions on the routing of fragmented packets, which may require changes to existing z/OS IP filtering policy. RFC4301 compliance enforcement is currently an optional setting in z/OS IPSec policy.



### z/OS Ordering and Deliverable Key Dates

Key Dates for z/OS R9 and z/OS R10 ordering:

- September 12, 2008: First date for ordering z/OS V1.10 ServerPac, SystemPac, CBPDO using CFSW configuration support, or ShopzSeries, the Internet ordering tool. Note that most z/OS media (executable code) is shipped only through Customized Offerings (ServerPac, SystemPac, and CBPDO).
- September 26, 2008: z/OS V1.10 general availability via ServerPac, CBPDO and SystemPac.
- October 14, 2008: Recommended last date for submitting z/OS V1.9 orders via the entitled Customized Offerings (ServerPac and CBPDO).
- October 27, 2008: Last date for ordering z/OS V1.9 via ServerPac and CBPDO.
- November 21, 2008: General availability of Cryptographic Support for z/OS V1R8-R10 & z/OS.e V1R8 Web deliverable (FMID HCR7751). This Web deliverable will support z/OS V1.8 through z/OS V1.10 and z/OS.e V1.8.
- June 29, 2009: Recommended last date for submitting z/OS V1.9 orders via the fee Customized Offering SystemPac. This date will allow for adequate order processing time.
- July 27, 2009: Last date for ordering z/OS V1.9 via SystemPac.
- October 2009: Planned last date for ordering z/OS V1.10 via ServerPac and CBPDO.

#### Web deliverables

Sometimes enhancements are provided as Web deliverables, *and not integrated in your ServerPac, CBPDO, or SystemPac deliverable*. For example, some of the ICSF enhancements are available this way. z/OS Web deliverables are available from <u>http://www.ibm.com/eserver/zseries/zos/downloads/</u>. They are packaged as two files that you download:

• A **readme** file, which contains a sample job to uncompress the second file, transform it into a format that SMP/E can process, and invoke SMP/E to RECEIVE the file. This file must be downloaded as text.

• A **pax.z** file, which contains an archive (compressed copy) of the FMIDs to be installed. This file needs to be downloaded to a workstation and then uploaded to a host as a binary file.

For Web downloads, you must perform the following tasks:

- 1. Allocate a R/W HFS of zFS directory on the z/OS driving system where the package will be staged (optional).
- Download both parts of the package from the download zone: http://www.ibm.com/eserver/zseries/zos/downloads/
- 3. Run the sample job provided in the README.TXT file. The job will invoke the GIMUNZIP service routine to extract the original data from the packages.
- 4. Obtain and install service for the target system. Service is not included in Web deliverables. You can obtain service for Web deliverables through your regular preventive service deliverables that you use for z/OS.
- 5. Install (SMP/E APPLY) the downloaded FMIDs.

**Cryptographic Support for z/OS V1.8 through z/OS V1.10 and z/OS.e V1.8 Web deliverable** (ICSF FMID HCR7751) is planned to become available on November 21, 2008. This Web deliverable supports z/OS V1.8 through z/OS V1.10 and z/OS.e V1.8. This Web deliverable contains support for:

Secure Key AES

The Advanced Encryption Standard (AES) is a National Institute of Standards and Technology specification for the symmetric encryption of electronic data. It is expected to become the accepted means of encrypting digital information, including financial, telecommunications, and government data. System z supports the AES encryption algorithm using clear AES keys. The AES encryption algorithm is extended to accept keys of 128, 192, and 256 bits. In addition, the AES keys may be encrypted (i.e. made secure) so that they never appear in the clear. The secure key approach, similar to what is supported today for DES and Triple-DES, provides the ability to keep the encryption keys protected at all times including the ability to import and export AES keys, encrypted using RSA public key cryptography.

#### • Support for 13-Digit through 19-Digit PAN data

Credit card companies sometimes perform card security code computations based on Personal Account Number (PAN) data. Currently, ICSF callable services CSNBCSV (VISA CVV Service Verify) and CSNBCSG (VISA CVV Service Generate) are used to verify and to generate a VISA Card Verification Value (CVV) or a MasterCard Card Verification Code (CVC). The ICSF callable services currently support 13, 16, and 19-digit PAN data. To provide additional flexibility, new keywords PAN-14, PAN-15, PAN-17, and PAN-18 are implemented in the rule array for both CSNBCSG and CSNBCSV to indicate that the PAN data is comprised of 14, 15, 17, or 18 PAN digits, respectively.

#### New Crypto Query Service

The ICSF Web deliverable includes a new callable service, ICSF Query Algorithms, which retrieves information about the cryptographic and hash algorithms that are available based on hardware options and software installed on System z.

#### Enhanced IPv6 Support

The U.S. government has defined a new protection profile for IPv6 that takes advantage of the strongest symmetric encryption algorithm, AES. In conjunction with Communications Server exploitation, you can create more secure VPN networks based on AES message authentication code technology.

#### • Enhanced SAF Checking

The ICSF Web deliverable introduces Key Token Policies to augment the existing security controls of symmetric and asymmetric keys stored in the CKDS and PKDS. The Key Token Policy provides a set control points for the management of keys stored in an ICSF key data set. The policy control points provide the ability to: enable Key Token Checking, enable Default Key Label Checking, identify and prevent duplicate keys tokens from being stored in the ICSF key data sets. As part of the Key Token Policy support, ICSF is replacing the PKDS cache with an in-storage copy of the PKDS, similar to the in-storage copies of the CKDS and the TKDS. In addition, the in-storage copies will be kept current in a sysplex environment where the PKDS is shared through the use of sysplex messaging.



### z/OS V1R10 Ordering


The program number for z/OS Version 1 Release 10 is **5694-A01**. When ordering this program number, remember to order all the optional features that you were licensed for in previous releases of z/OS.

In z/OS V1R10 there are only two export controlled unpriced features: **z/OS Security Level 3**, and **Communications Server Security Level 3**. z/OS Security Level 3 contains the sub-elements: IBM Tivoli Directory Server for z/OS Security Level 3, Network Authentication Service Level 3, OCSF Security Level 3, and System Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) Security Level 3,

Typically, when one new z/OS release becomes orderable in ServerPac and CBPDO, the previous release is orderable for only a month. Due to this short overlap, it is very important that you order the z/OS release you need for migration and coexistence while it's still available for ordering. Typically, a z/OS release remains orderable in the fee'd deliverable SystemPac longer than in ServerPac.

### Important Future Ordering Consideration!

IBM intends to discontinue delivery of software on 3480, 3480 Compressed (3480C), and 3490E tape media. IBM recommends using Internet delivery when ordering your z/OS products or service which eliminates tape handling. If you must use physical delivery, you may continue to choose 3590 or 3592 tape media. Internet delivery is IBM's strategic delivery method, therefore future software delivery enhancements will be focused on Internet delivery.




### Ordering and Installing z/OS R10 Electronically!

Internet delivery is the newer medium and, like tape, can be used for all products, that is, z/OS and products that run on z/OS. You must place the order using ShopzSeries (<u>http://www.ibm.com/software/shopzseries</u>). You can install the order using ServerPac, CBPDO, or SystemPac. ShopzSeries generates a customized download page for each order; the page includes order content and instructions. Support to install Internet orders has been added to the CustomPac Installation Dialog and CBPDO installation process.

A typical z/OS-only ServerPac or SystemPac order is approximately 6 GB (compressed) in size. A typical SystemPac order with multiple SRELs is approximately 8 GB (compressed) in size. A typical subsystem ServerPac or SystemPac order is approximately 500 MB (compressed) in size. You will know the size of your order when it is ready to download (the size can be found in the *CustomPac Dialog Information* document). As a general rule, you should have file system space equal to twice the order size, to allow it to be processed.

If you are downloading your order, the entire download might take considerable time. However, the download is done in two phases, and the first phase will usually not take very long (just a couple of minutes). Once it has finished, you can begin to use the dialog to configure your new order while the second phase is occurring. The RECEIVE job will send you a message to tell you when the dialog is ready to be used if you are logged on and have INTERCOM set in your TSO/E Profile. To see whether you have INTERCOM set, issue the PROFILE command from the TSO/E Ready prompt or ISPF Option 6. To set INTERCOM, issue PROFILE INTERCOM.

Before downloading your order, you must understand your network security environment. For example, does a z/OS image have access to the Internet? Are there security concerns for downloading to a workstation or transferring files to the host? If you are planning to download directly to z/OS, you must be familiar with the security and networking information required to navigate your enterprise's firewall from z/OS.



#### z/OS.e Product and zNALC

z/OS.e V1.8 (5655-G52) is the last release of z/OS.e. Marketing, ordering, support, and service for z/OS (5694-A01) remain unaffected. In accordance with the z/OS (5694-A01) and z/OS.e service policy (to provide service support for each release for three years following its general availability date), IBM intends to withdraw service for z/OS.e V1.8 in September 2009. IBM provides a new pricing alternative for z/OS, System z New Application License Charges (zNALC). zNALC replaces New Application License Charges (NALC) and z/OS.e, and is intended to be IBM's strategic z/OS offering for new workloads. zNALC was available March 16, 2007.

System z New Application License Charges (zNALC) offers a reduced price for the z/OS operating system on LPARs where you are running a qualified 'new workload' application (Qualified Application) such as Java language business applications running under WebSphere Application Server, Domino, SAP, PeopleSoft, and Siebel.

The zNALC offering extends the IBM commitment to sub-capacity pricing, allowing customers with a Qualified Application to obtain a reduced price for z/OS where charges are based on the size of the LPAR(s) executing a Qualified Application, assuming all applicable terms and conditions are met.

z/OS with zNALC provides many benefits over previous 'new workload' pricing offers. It provides a strategic pricing model available on the full range of System z servers for simplified application planning and deployment. zNALC provides similar pricing benefits to both z/OS.e pricing and z/OS with NALC pricing. zNALC allows for aggregation across a qualified Parallel Sysplex, which can provide a lower cost for incremental growth across 'new workloads' that span a Parallel Sysplex.

#### **Qualified Applications**

zNALC is available only on LPARs where a Qualified Application is present, among other requirements. In general, Qualified Applications are those that IBM considers 'new workload,' such as Java language business applications running under WebSphere Application Server, Domino, SAP, PeopleSoft, or Siebel.

IBM has established the following criteria to determine which applications are Qualified Applications:

1. An "Application" is a computer program that is used to accomplish specific business tasks (such as, Customer Relationship Management (CRM), Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP), Supply Chain Management (SCM), business information warehouse, accounting, and inventory control programs), including the database server used for that task. In this definition, an Application is not a stand-alone database management system or systems management tool (i.e., related to the management or operation of the computer itself or of other computer programs). Examples of software that are not considered applications are operating system software, database products (except those qualifying as described in section (b) below), transaction managers, tools, utilities, and games.

An application may be considered a Qualified Application if:

- a) It is currently generally commercially available, supported by its manufacturer, and enabled to run under z/OS, and that same Application (with substantially the same functionality) is simultaneously generally commercially available, supported by its manufacturer on, and enabled to run under a UNIX operating system (for example, AIX, HP-UX, Linux, or Solaris), or Microsoft Windows (collectively "Distributed Platforms");
- b) It is a database server running under z/OS and it is operating solely in support of a software program that is currently generally commercially available, supported by its manufacturer, and running in a client/server environment where the business logic (e.g., application server) is running on a Distributed Platform. or
- **C)** It is a Java language business application running under WebSphere Application Server (or equivalent). These do not include systems management tools.
- z/OS is eligible for zNALC pricing when running in an LPAR where the Qualified Application is executing. The only other products that may execute in this LPAR are those products that support the Qualified Application. The LPAR must be used exclusively for the Qualified Application and for programs that support the Qualified Application and for no other purpose.
- 3. IBM will determine whether a particular program is a qualified application.

In the event you want to check if another application can qualify, contact your IBM sales representative or IBM business partner.

#### Prerequisites, Restrictions, and Certification

zNALC is available only on IBM z/Architecture servers (z900, z990, z9 EC, z800, z890, z9 BC, z10 EC or later) running the z/OS (5694-A01) operating system. z/OS middleware running on the IBM z/Architecture server which qualifies for Workload License Charges (WLC) or Entry Workload License Charges (EWLC) must be priced WLC/EWLC in order for z/OS to be eligible for zNALC charges.


Any Logical Partition (LPAR) that is designated as a zNALC LPAR must follow the naming convention "ZNALxxxx" where xxxx may be any letters or numbers. Alternatively, customers who prefer not to change LPAR names to qualify for zNALC (and are running z/OS Version 1 Release 6, or later) may set the LICENSE = "ZNALC" IPL parameter to indicate a zNALC LPAR. The zNALC IPL parameter is available via APAR OA20314.

zNALC is not available on any server where OS/390 or z/OS.e is licensed or running, or on any server where the pricing metric for z/OS is NALC. Sub-Capacity zNALC is not available on any LPARs where z/OS is running as a guest of z/VM.

IBM has established a certification process whereby customers must complete a form when they establish zNALC charges and which must be renewed each year to maintain zNALC charges. This form requires customers to certify that they meet all the requirements to be eligible for z/OS with zNALC charges. IBM may cancel zNALC charging if a customer fails to submit an annual certification. IBM has the right to audit servers with z/OS with zNALC charges to ensure compliance with all zNALC terms and conditions.

### SMP/E for z/OS and OS/390 Version 3 Release 5 (5655-G44)

SMP/E for z/OS V3.5 provides the following enhancements:

### Simplifying PSP buckets

SMP/E has been extended to help simplify the task of verifying that required software fixes identified in the Preventive Service Planning (PSP) buckets have been installed. PSP buckets identify required software fixes for new hardware devices, toleration and coexistence of new software releases, and enabling new functions. IBM will consolidate the lists of required fixes from the PSP buckets and produce new Fix Category (FIXCAT) HOLDDATA to identify those fixes. Some example fix categories are IBM.Device.z10-EC-2097 and IBM.Coexistence.z/OS.V1R10. The new type of ++HOLD statement will be used to identify APARs, their fix categories, and the PTFs that resolve the APARs.

Just like Error HOLDDATA, the new FIXCAT HOLDDATA will be delivered by IBM as part of all corrective service, preventative service, and product orders such as SMP/E Internet Service Retrieval (the SMP/E RECEIVE ORDER command), ShopzSeries, ServiceLink, TechSupport, and the Customized Offerings such as CBPDO, ServerPac, and SystemPac. It will also be available independently on an IBM Internet server (http://service.software.ibm.com/holdata/390holddata.html )

#### Important toleration action:

SMP/E releases prior to SMP/E V3.5 cannot process the new FIXCAT HOLDDATA. If you use a prior SMP/E release, you must install toleration APAR IO07480 (PTF Uo00700 for SMP/E V3.3 or UO00701 for SMP/E V3.4) to allow those releases to silently ignore the FIXCAT HOLDDATA.

When FIXCAT HOLDDATA statements are received into a global zone, SMP/E will assign the fix category values as sourceids to the PTFs that resolve the APARs. These sourceids will then simplify selecting and installing the required fixes. During APPLY and ACCEPT command processing you can specify the assigned sourceids on the SOURCEID and EXSRCID operands to select the SYSMODs associated with a particular fix category.

In addition, for the APPLY and ACCEPT commands you can specify which fix categories are of interest using the FIXCAT operand. This tells SMP/E to process only FIXCAT HOLDDATA for the categories you specify, and all others are ignored.

Finally, SMP/E will use the new FIXCAT HOLDDATA to identify what required fixes are missing. A new REPORT MISSINGFIX command will analyze the new FIXCAT HOLDDATA and determine which fixes (APARs) identified by the HOLDDATA are not yet installed. Only the fixes associated with the fix categories of interest to you, specified by you, are analyzed and identified. For example, you can identify only the missing fixes associated with a particular hardware device or coexistence for a specific new software release.

#### **Fix Category Explorer**

To complement the new FIXCAT HOLDDATA, SMP/E has added a new Fix Category Explorer dialog. This dialog provides a hierarchical view of all fix categories from all FIXCAT HOLDDATA in the global zone and provides an easy method to manage the list of fix categories that are interesting to you. The Explorer dialog even identifies new Fix Categories that have been defined since the last time you used the dialog. The Fix Category Explorer is integrated into the existing SMP/Edialog options, and can be used, for example, in the Administration dialog to manage a permanent list of interesting fix categories stored in an OPTIONS entry, or to select fix categories of interest to be specified on an APPLY, ACCEPT, or REPORT MISSINGFIX command in the Command Generation dialog.

#### Long sourceids

SMP/E has increased the maximum length allowed for a sourceid value from 8 to 64 characters to support more meaningful and easily recognized values. For example, sourceid values such as IBM.Device.z10-EC-2097 and IBM.Coexistence.z/OS.V1R10 will be possible. In addition, the wildcard characters "\*" and "%" can be used to implicitly select a list of sourceids for SMP/E commands that support their use. Sourceids may be defined on ++ASSIGN statements, defined on the SOURCEID operand of the RECEIVE command, and derived from fix categories specified on FIXCAT HOLDDATA statements.

#### **ZONEEDIT** command enhancements

The ZONEEDIT command has been extended to allow wildcard specification in the conditional CHANGE subcommand, and to allow the UNIT, VOLUME, and WAITFORDSN subentries for DDDEF entries to be added if they do not already exist. Formerly the ZONEEDIT command only allowed existing subentries to be changed, but did not allow subentries to be added. If you prefer to keep your target or distribution library data sets uncataloged, then this change makes it easier for you, for example, to add the necessary UNIT and VOLUME subentries for DDDEF entries defined by a ServerPac.

#### HTTPS and FTP reconnect and retry support

SMP/E has added reconnect and retry capabilities for HTTPS and FTP operations that fail due to apparent network outages and anomalies. This will help prevent SMP/E RECEIVE command and GIMGTPKG service routine failures because of short-lived network outages.

#### Support for FTP client parameters

SMP/E will now allow user-specified parameters to be passed to the FTP client program for SMP/E FTP operations during the RECEIVE command and the GIMGTPKG service routine. A new FTPOPTIONS tag may be specified in the CLIENT or SMPCLNT data set to identify any parameters that SMP/E should pass to the FTP client program. This is most useful when you need to override the FTP.DATA configuration file used by the FTP client program.

#### **RECEIVE ORDER command enhancements**

The RECEIVE ORDER command has been extended to resubmit orders when the request cannot be completely satisfied. This helps to ensure you obtain as much of your desired PTFs and HOLDDATA as possible, and eliminates the need to submit follow-on orders. Specifically, if an order request for CRITICAL, RECOMMENDED, or ALL PTFs results in no applicable PTFs, SMP/E will resubmit the order to obtain the latest HOLDDATA. When PTFs specified by name, or PTFs to fix specified APARS are requested, but not all requested PTFs are found or available, SMP/E will resubmit the order to only obtain those requested PTFs that can be found by the server. In addition, when a requested order cannot be fulfilled within the WAIT time specified (or defaulted), SMP/E will now end the RECEIVE command with a return code of 12 rather than 4. This helps differentiate a failing operation from a successful one.

#### **HOLDDATA** report changes

SMP/E has defined a new report destination, SMPHRPT, for HOLDDATA reports. If the SMPHRPT DD name is allocated (either by DD statement or DDDEF entry), the HOLDDATA reports produced by the RECEIVE, APPLY, and ACCEPT commands will be written to this DD name while other reports are written to the SMPRPT DD name. If the SMPHRPT DD name is not allocated, all reports are written to SMPRPT. If you do not want to review the APPLY, ACCEPT, or RECEIVE command HOLDDATA reports, you can define SMPHRPT as a DUMMY data set. In addition, the Bypassed HOLD Reason Report for the APPLY and ACCEPT commands will now include only bypassed HOLDDATA for SYSMODs that are successfully applied or accepted. No longer will bypassed HOLDDATA for SYSMODS that fail command processing appear in the report. This eliminates clutter and limits the report to only the HOLDDATA that must be reviewed or acted upon.

Finally, suppressed reasonids will be consolidated and reported only once per FMID in the APPLY and ACCEPT command HOLDDATA reports. Formerly reasonids were reported once per SYSMOD and that contributed to the

clutter and the large output. Reasonids to be suppressed are defined in the SUPPHOLD subentry of the active OPTIONS entry.

#### BYPASS (HOLDSYS) message severity changes

During APPLY and ACCEPT command processing SMP/E writes messages to identify SYSTEM HOLD conditions that have been bypassed. In prior SMP/E releases these messages had a severity of Warning and resulted in a minimum overall return code for the command of 4. With SMP/E V3.5, Informational messages will be written for bypassed SYSTEM HOLD conditions instead of Warning messages. This change to use Informational messages will result in a minimum overall return code for the command of 0 rather than 4 when SYSMOD HOLDs are bypassed, and helps make it easier for you to determine if the APPLY or ACCEPT operation was successful or not by simply inspecting the overall return code. To change APPLY and ACCEPT command processing to write Warning messages for bypassed SYSTEM HOLD conditions, use the new COMPAT(WARNBYPASS) execution parameter for program GIMSMP.

#### SMP/E dialog enhancements

The SYSMOD Management dialog will now allow all SYSTEM HOLDs to be bypassed easily with one action. To accomplish the same result, formerly you were required to select each unique reasonid. In addition, the REDO operand may now be specified for the APPLY and ACCEPT commands. In the Order Management dialog, when an ORDER entry is deleted from the global zone, the associated package directory within the SMPNTS will now also be deleted.

#### UNIX file Utility Input for LMODs

SMP/E has been extended to allow definition side deck files stored in the z/OS UNIX System Services file system to be included easily during link-edit operations. Specifically, in addition to members of partitioned data sets, relative file names can now be used as utility input on INCLUDE statements in JCLIN link-edit steps. This change is designed to make it easier for product packagers to use definition side deck files that reside in the z/OS UNIX file system.

#### IBM Debug Tool for z/OS Version 8 Release 1 (5655-S17)

IBM Debug Tool for z/OS V8.1 helps examine, monitor, and control the execution of application programs by letting you:

- Interactively debug an application as it runs
- · Perform seamless debugging of mixed-language applications
- Make adjustments to your application while debugging
- Display, monitor, and alter program variables

Debug Tool also supports many programming languages and numerous execution environments.

#### Some Enhancements in V8R1

In earlier releases, with Debug Tool you could assume that all floating point data items and registers were in hexadecimal floating point format. Now, for disassembly programs, Debug Tool also supports floating point registers in binary (IEEE) and decimal floating point format.

You can now display the 64-bit General Purpose Registers when your programs run on hardware that supports this feature. New symbols (%GPRGn and RGn) are added so you can reference the 64-bit General Purpose Registers in disassembly expressions. However, no support is provided for 64-bit addressing.

In earlier releases, if Debug Tool could not display a COBOL character in character format, it would display the entire string in hexadecimal format. Now, Debug Tool displays all COBOL characters in character format, even if the character symbol can not be displayed on the screen. You can also modify the COBOL characters while they are displayed in character format.

A new window, the Memory window, is added to display sections of memory. Navigate through this window with scrolling commands or by specifying a specific address. Update memory by typing over existing data with new data. The Memory window keeps track of certain addresses so you can quickly navigate back to those addresses.

As of z/OS V1R5, optional feature C/C++ with Debug Tool is no longer in z/OS. The functional replacement that you will need to order for that feature is the C/C++ without Debug Tool feature in z/OS and also the independent standalone program product - IBM Debug Tool for z/OS V7.1 (5655-R44) or IBM Debug Tool for z/OS V8.1 (5655-S17).

### Print Services Facility Version 4 Release 2 (5655-M32)

In 2006, IBM, along with a consortium of over thirty vendors in the printing and publishing industry, voted to accept and make public the Advanced Function Presentation (AFP) Color Management Architecture (ACMA) as an open, industry standard for printing and presentation. This was the result of over two years of working jointly on a color management architecture based on AFP that would provide a standard for color applications and color management industry-wide.

This new architecture includes support for industry-standard ICC profiles, which are carried in AFP files, as Color Management Resources (CMRs). The CMR format is defined by a new AFP object content architecture called the Color Management Object Content Architecture (CMOCA).

This architecture provides consistent and device-independent color rendering across multiple color technologies and printer vendors. Architected color management enables customers to develop a single color application and workflow that can be printed in color on the full process InfoPrint 5000 Color Printer from IBM's joint venture partner, InfoPrint Solutions Company, or in high-quality grayscale on models of InfoPrint 4100 black-and-white printers. Print Services Facility V4.2 for z/OS provides z/OS-based print server support for the ACMA and support for AFP CMRs. IBM can now provide an end-to-end, managed workflow that makes high-quality color and black-and-white printing a reality, with consistent results across a variety of devices that support the architecture.

### IBM Ported Tools for z/OS Version 1 Release 1 (5655-M23)

IBM Ported Tools for z/OS is designed to provide the select features of secure shell known as OpenSSH enabling for:

- Authentication for both the client and server
- Privacy through encryption
- Data integrity
- Authorization
- Forwarding or tunneling
- An optional feature of compression
- Communication using SSH1 and SSH2 protocols.

Ordering information: It is an unpriced program product, that can be ordered with z/OS. It can run on z/OS R4 and higher. It has been generally available since May 28, 2004. The program numbers are IBM Ported Tools for z/OS (5655-M23) and IBM Ported Tools for z/OS Software and Subscription (5655-M29).

### IBM Ported Tools for z/OS: Perl for z/OS Feature (5655-M23)

IBM Ported Tools for z/OS: Perl for z/OS Feature provides a port of the Perl (version 5.8.7) scripting language to the z/OS UNIX platform. Perl (Practical Extraction and Report Language) is a very popular general-purpose programming language that is widely used on UNIX and other computing platforms.

Support for z/OS UNIX has been available for several years in the open-source version of Perl. Building this version of Perl is often difficult even for experienced users, and requires access to several GNU utilities.

Perl for z/OS is preconfigured and precompiled, and is designed to eliminate the need for those complicated tasks. EBCDIC-related factors in the Perl application have been addressed; therefore, it is anticipated that Perl applications can run with data generated entirely in the z/OS UNIX environment. As with any z/OS related programming language, Perl programs that process data originating from non-EBCDIC (typically ASCII) systems must still convert this data from ASCII to EBCDIC, and vice versa. Tips for conversion can be found in IBM Ported Tools for z/OS: Perl for z/OS User's Guide (SA23-1347) at http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/bkserv/ or http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/unix/port\_tools.html .

Ordering information: Perl for z/OS is an unpriced feature of the IBM Ported Tools for z/OS, an unpriced licensed program. It has been generally available since June 16, 2006. The program numbers are IBM Ported Tools for z/OS (5655-M23) and IBM Ported Tools for z/OS Software and Subscription (5655-M29).

### IBM Ported Tools for z/OS: PHP for z/OS Feature (5655-M23)

IBM Ported Tools for z/OS: PHP for z/OS Feature (PHP for z/OS) provides a port of the PHP (version 5.1.2) scripting language to the z/OS UNIX System Services platform. PHP (PHP: Hypertext Preprocessor) is a general purpose scripting language that is well-suited for Web development. PHP's syntax is similar to that of C and Perl, making it easy for anyone with basic programming skills to learn. It allows one to embed program statements directly within an HTML page. PHP is both powerful and flexible: it has a rich set of APIs and it contains a Perl-compatible regular expression library. PHP is popular in the computing industry and is available on a wide variety of platforms. PHP for z/OS includes an extension to access DB2 for z/OS via ODBC. This allows PHP applications to access DB2 data on z/OS.

- cURL 7.16.1 (APAR: OA22944). cURL is an open source tool that can transfer data from or to a server or servers, using one of the supported protocols (HTTP, HTTPS, FTP, FTPS, TFTP, DICT, TELNET, LDAP or FILE). The command is designed to work without user interaction. cURL offers a variety of useful functions like proxy support, user authentication, FTP upload, HTTP post, SSL connections, cookies, file transfer, resume, and more. It is a command-line UNIX application, and runs in the z/OS UNIX System Services environment.




#### **Release Frequency**

In response to customer feedback that the 6-month release cycle was too short and complicated customer migration plans, IBM announced in August 2002 that the release schedule for z/OS has changed to a 12-month cycle. The vast majority of z/OS customers migrate to new releases every 12 to 18 months. Less frequent releases in the future will allow IBM to provide even more integration testing for z/OS and related IBM middleware. It will also enable IBM to align the coexistence, migration, and fallback policy with the service policy, with the annual releases.

**Starting with z/OS R6, IBM intends to deliver releases annually, with general availability in September.** This predictable release cycle will enable you to better plan your migration, freeing you to increase the value of your computing environment to your business and deliver better service to your end users. New z/OS functions will continue to be delivered between releases through the normal maintenance stream or as Web deliverables. In addition, significant new functions may be delivered between releases as features of the product. z/OS V1R10 is the fifth release to be delivered on this annual release cycle.

These statements regarding the new release strategy represent current intentions of IBM. Any reliance on these statements is at the relying party's sole risk and will not create any liability or obligation for IBM. All statements regarding IBM's plans, directions, and intent are subject to change or withdrawal without notice.



#### **Service Policy**

IBM's current policy is to provide maintenance (service) for each release of z/OS for three years following its general availability (GA) date. However, service on the last release of a version might be extended beyond the intended three-year period. Prior to withdrawing service for any version or release of z/OS, IBM intends to provide at least 12 months notice. The service policy for z/OS also applies to any enhancements (including but not limited to web deliverables), such as the zIIP support enhancements that were provided for z/OS R6 and R7 via web deliverables.


The IBM Lifecycle Extension for z/OS V1.7 provides corrective service, which is a work around or fix to a problem. If you are licensed for the IBM LifeCycle Extension for z/OS V1.7 problem reporting remains unchanged. The IBM Support Center can be contacted to report problems that may be associated with z/OS V1.7. The IBM Support Center will provide a fix or circumvention for new problems that are defects in z/OS V1.7. Any PTF for z/OS V1.7 that was available prior to the end of z/OS V1.7 warranty period (September 30, 2007) will continue to be available through the existing service acquisition portals such as SMP/E RECEIVE ORDER and ShopzSeries.

The IBM LifeCycle Extension for z/OS V1.7 does not provide preventive service or new function, nor does it provide any extension or changes to IBM's coexistence or migration policy for z/OS.

Customers with SoftwareXcel or SupportLine support should contact their IBM representative, an IBM Business Partner, or the IBM Call Center for additional information.

- Starting October 1, 2008, IBM will offer a fee-based, corrective service extension for up to a 2 year period following the z/OS V1.7 discontinuance of the warranty service (September 30, 2008). This support enables users who have not completed their migration to z/OS V1.8 or z/OS V1.9 to continue to receive corrective service for z/OS V1.7 in the 2 year period of October 1, 2008 through September 30, 2010

### **Understanding Coexistence**

*Coexistence* occurs when two or more systems at different software levels share resources. The resources could be shared at the same time by different systems in a multisystem configuration, or they could be shared over a period of time by the same system in a single-system configuration. Examples of coexistence are two different JES releases sharing a spool, two different service levels of DFSMSdfp sharing catalogs, multiple levels of SMP/E processing SYSMODs packaged to exploit the latest enhancements, or an older level of the system using the updated system control files of a newer level (even if new function has been exploited in the newer level).

The sharing of resources is inherent in multisystem configurations that involve Parallel Sysplex implementations. But other types of configurations can have resource sharing too. Examples of configurations where resource sharing can occur are:

- A single processor that is time-sliced to run different levels of the system, such as during different times of the day
- A single processor running multiple images by means of logical partitions (LPARs)
- Multiple images running on several different processors
- Parallel Sysplex or non-Parallel Sysplex configurations

**Note:** The term coexistence does not refer to z/OS residing on a single system along with VSE/ESA, VM/ESA, or z/VM in an LPAR or as a VM guest.

z/OS systems can coexist with specific prior releases. This is important because it gives you flexibility to migrate systems in a multisystem configuration using rolling IPLs rather than requiring a systems-wide IPL. The way in which you make it possible for earlier-level systems to coexist with z/OS is to install coexistence service (PTFs) on the earlier-level systems.

You should complete the migration of all earlier-level coexisting systems as soon as you can. Keep in mind that the objective of coexistence PTFs is to allow existing functions to continue to be used on the earlier-level systems when run in a mixed environment that contains later-level systems. Coexistence PTFs are not aimed at allowing new functions provided in later releases to work on earlier-level systems.

### Rolling z/OS across a multisystem configuration

A *rolling IPL* is the IPL of one system at a time in a multisystem configuration. You might stage the IPLs over a few hours or a few weeks. The use of rolling IPLs allows you to migrate each z/OS system to a later release, one at a time, while allowing for continuous application availability. For example, data sharing applications offer continuous availability in a Parallel Sysplex configuration by treating each z/OS system as a resource for processing the workload. The use of rolling IPLs allows z/OS systems running these applications to be IPLed one at a time, to migrate to a new release of z/OS, while the applications continue to be processed by the other z/OS systems that support the workload. By using LPAR technology, you can use rolling IPLs to upgrade your systems without losing either availability or capacity.

You can use rolling IPLs when both of the following are true:

- The release to which you're migrating falls is supported for coexistence, fallback, and migration with the releases running on the other systems.
- The appropriate coexistence PTFs have been installed on the other systems in the multisystem configuration.

Even when you're using applications that do not support data sharing, rolling IPLs often make it easier to schedule z/OS software upgrades. It can be very difficult to schedule a time when all applications running on all the systems in a multisystem configuration can be taken down to allow for a complex-wide or Parallel Sysplex-wide IPL. The use of rolling IPLs not only enables continuous availability from an end-user application point of view, but it also eliminates the work associated with migrating all z/OS systems in a multisystem configuration at the same time.

#### Understanding fallback

Fallback (backout) is a return to the prior level of a system. Fallback can be appropriate if you migrate to z/OS R10 and, during testing, encounter severe problems that can be resolved by backing out the new release. By applying fallback PTFs to the "old" system before you migrate, the old system can tolerate changes that were made by the new system during testing.

Fallback is relevant in all types of configurations, that is, single-system or multisystem, with or without resource sharing. As an example of fallback, consider a single system that shares data or data structures, such as user catalogs, as you shift the system image from production (on the "old" release) to test (on the new release) and back again (to the old release). The later-level test release might make changes that are incompatible with the earlier-level production release. Fallback PTFs on the earlier-level release can allow it to tolerate changes made by the later-level release.

As a general reminder, always plan to have a backout path when installing new software by identifying and installing any service required to support backout.

Fallback is at a system level, rather than an element or feature level, except for z/OS JES2 and z/OS JES3. That is, except for z/OS JES2 and z/OS JES3, you can't back out an element or feature; you can only back out the entire z/OS product. z/OS JES2 and z/OS JES3 fallback can be done separately as long as the level of JES is supported with the release of z/OS and any necessary fallback PTFs are installed.

Fallback and coexistence are alike in that the PTFs that ensure coexistence are the same ones that ensure fallback.

**Note:** Keep in mind that new functions can require that all systems be at z/OS V1R10 level before the new functions can be used. Therefore, be careful not to exploit new functions until you are fairly confident that you will not need to back out your z/OS V1R10 systems, as fallback maintenance is not available in these cases. You should consult the appropriate element or feature documentation to determine the requirements for using a particular new function.

#### Which releases are supported for coexistence, fallback, and migration?

**Starting with z/OS R6, IBM has aligned the coexistence, fallback, and migration policy with the service policy.** IBM intends to continue with the practice of providing service support for each release of z/OS for three years following its general availability (GA) date. IBM, at its sole discretion, may choose to leave a release supported for more than three years. This change to the coexistence, fallback, and migration policy is effective starting with z/OS R6 (that is, the first release of the new annual release cycle). **As a general rule, this means that three releases will be supported for coexistence, fallback, and migration over a period of three years.** This represents an increase of one year over the two-year period provided by the current coexistence, fallback, and migration policy of four releases under a six-month release cycle. The intention of this policy change is to simplify and provide greater predictability to aid in release migrations. Exceptions are:

- In some cases, more than three releases may be coexistence, fallback, and migration supported if IBM at its sole discretion chooses to provide service support for greater than three years for a release.
- Any z/OS release having three or fewer months of service remaining at general availability of a new release will not be coexistence, fallback, or migration supported with the new release.

Thus, except for JES2 and JES3, <u>z/OS V1R10 is coexistence, fallback, and migration supported with the</u> <u>following two z/OS releases: V1R9 and V1R8</u>. This means that:

- Coexistence of a V1R10 system with a V1R9 or V1R8 system is supported.
- Fallback from V1R10 to V1R9 or V1R8 is supported.
- Migration to V1R10 from V1R9 or V1R8 is supported.

For JES2 and JES3, the way in which three consecutive releases is determined is different than for the rest of the operating system. If a JES2 or JES3 release is functionally equivalent to its predecessor (that is, its FMID is the same), then the release is considered to be the same JES release. Thus, **z/OS V1R10 JES2 and JES3 are coexistence, fallback, and migration supported with the following JES releases: V1R10, V1R9, and V1R8.** 

As of z/OS V1R2, compliance to the coexistence, fallback, and migration policy for JES2 and JES3 is enforced. A migration to a JES2 or JES3 release level that is not supported by the policy results in the following:

- For JES2: If the JES2 release level for a system that is initializing is not compatible with the other active systems in the JES2 MAS, message HASP710 is issued and the JES2 address space for the initializing system is terminated.
- For JES3: If the JES3 release level for a local is not compatible with the global in a JES3 multisystem complex, message IAT2640 is issued and the JES3 local is not allowed to connect to the global.

The JES2 and SDSF releases allowed with z/OS V1R10 BCP are shown below. Note that the SDSF release level must be the same as the JES2 release level. Before z/OS V1R9, the SDSF release level had to be the same as the BCP release level.



To install z/OS, review Preventive Service Planning (PSP) Buckets for:

- ServerPac (if using ServerPac to install)
- z/OS and individual elements (including ZOSGEN, which is handy for coexistence service as mentioned later in this presentation)
- Hardware, if you will using specific HW functions or upgrading your server
- In addition, to install z/OS using ServerPac, review:
- ServerPac: Using the Installation Dialog (SC28-1244)
- The custom-built installation guide, ServerPac: Installing Your Order
- To install z/OS using CBPDO, review the z/OS Program Directory.

#### PSP Buckets

z/OS, and most products that run on it, provide files containing information that became available after the product documents were printed. Kept on IBM's RETAIN system and also available using IBMLink, these files are called preventive service planning (PSP) "buckets", or just "PSPs". PSP buckets are identified by an *upgrade* identifier, and specific parts of them are called *subsets*. Each upgrade contains information about a product. Subsets contain information about specific parts of a product. For example, the z/OS PSP bucket has subsets for the BCP, JES2, ServerPac, and others.

For software upgrades for ServerPac and CBPDO installations, refer to *z/OS Program Directory*. For software upgrades for SystemPac installations, the upgrade is CUSTOMPAC and the subsets are SYSPAC/FVD (for full volume dump format) and SYSPAC/DBD (for dump-by-data-set format).

At the beginning of each PSP bucket is a change index. For each subset, the change index identifies the date of the latest entries in each section. You can quickly determine whether there are new entries you need to read by checking the change index. Since z/OS V1R7, the contents of PSP buckets are no longer shipped with CBPDO and ServerPac orders. Instead of the actual PSP information, you now receive the names of relevant upgrades and

subsets, and you're directed to the PSP Web site (<u>https://techsupport.services.ibm.com/server/390.psp390</u>) for the contents of the buckets. This ensures that you see the latest PSP information, as the PSP information that was provided with an order was current only on the day the order was created.

The upgrade for the z/OS R10 PSP bucket is ZOSV1R10. Recognizing that there are many PSP buckets to review, z/OS uses descriptive element names, instead of FMIDs for the subsets. This reduces the number of PSP buckets that must be reviewed, since most elements are composed of multiple FMIDs. There are subsets in the ZOSV1R10 upgrade for general topics (ZOSGEN), and for the ServerPac deliverable (SERVERPAC) that should be reviewed also. DFSMS is consolidated into one subset. All PSP upgrades and subset IDs are listed in the z/OS Program Directory. However, the non-exclusive elements' stand-alone product upgrade and subsets are used.

#### Hardware PSP upgrade identifiers

Hardware PSP bucket upgrade IDs are in the form xxxxDEVICE and contain the latest software dependencies for the hardware, and recommended PTFs and APARs required for specific processor models. The PSP hardware upgrade identifiers are:

- 2097DEVICE for the z10 EC server
- 2094DEVICE for the z9 EC server
- 2096DEVICE for the z9 BC server
- 2084DEVICE for the z990 server
- 2086DEVICE for the z890 server
- 2064DEVICE for the z900 server
- 2066DEVICE for the z800 server

#### Verifying the PTFs in the PSP buckets are installed

To simplify finding the appropriate PSP bucket and identifying which PTFs listed in the PSP bucket need to be installed on your system, you can use one of the following methods:

- Preferred automated method: Use the SMP/E V3R5 REPORT MISSINGFIX command in conjunction with the FIXCAT type of HOLDDATA. For complete information about the REPORT MISSINGFIX command, see SMP/E Commands.
- Alternative automated method: Use the Enhanced PSP Tool (EPSPT), and the extract files found at (<u>http://www14.software.ibm.com/webapp/set2/psp/srchBroker</u>). The Web site provides a search capability as well as pull down lists for types of PSP buckets. The types supported include Processors, z/OS, and Functions. So you can simply select the processor you are preparing for and click Go.


#### DASD Storage Requirements

If you are migrating to z/OS R10 from z/OS R8 or you will have a different product set than your previous release, you will see increased need for DASD. How much more depends on what levels of products you are running. Keep in mind the DASD required for your z/OS system includes (per the z/OS Policy). That is, it includes ALL elements, ALL features that support dynamic enablement, regardless of your order, and ALL unpriced features that you ordered. This storage is in addition to the storage required by other products you might have installed. All sizes include 15% freespace to accommodate the installation of maintenance.

The total storage required for z/OS data sets is listed in the space table in the z/OS Program Directory.

#### For z/OS R10:

- The total storage required for all the target data sets is 6,700 cylinders on a 3390 device. (SCEERUN2 is significantly increased as of z/OS R9.) It is strong recommended that review the size of your existing target volumes and plan for the required target volume storage for z/OS R10.
- The total storage required for all the distribution data sets listed in the space table is 9,200 cylinders on a 3390 device.
- The total file system (HFS or zFS) storage is 3,100 cylinders on a 3390 device for the ROOT and 50 cylinders for the /etc file system. For the CIM element, the space required for the /var VARWBEM file system is 50 cylinders. It is strong recommended that you put your file system ROOT data set on multiple 3390-3 volumes (a multi-volume data set) or on a volume larger than a 3390-3.



# z/OS Driving System Requirements

The *driving system* is the system image (hardware and software) that you use to install the target system. The *target system* is the system software libraries and other data sets that you are installing. You log on to the driving system and run jobs there to create or update the target system. Once the target system is built, it can be IPLed on the same hardware (same LPAR or same processor) or different hardware than that used for the driving system.

If your driving system will share resources with your target system after the target system has been IPLed, *be sure to install applicable coexistence service* on the driving system before you IPL the target system. If you don't install the coexistence service, you will probably experience problems due to incompatible data structures (such as incompatible data sets, VTOCs, catalog records, GRS tokens, or APPC bind mappings).

# Customized Offerings Driver (5665-M12)

The Customized Offerings Driver V2.4.1 or later (5665-M12) is an entitled driving system you can use if:

- you don't have an existing system to use as a driving system, or
- your existing system does not meet driving system requirements and you don't want to upgrade it to meet those requirements.

At z/OS R10 GA, this driver is a subset of a z/OS R8 system, with the level of SMP/E at V3R4.

The Customized Offerings Driver is in DFSMSdss dump/restore format and supports 3380 and 3390 triple-density or higher DASD devices. The Customized Offerings Driver requires a locally attached non-SNA terminal and a system console from the IBM (or equivalent) family of supported terminal types: 317x, 327x, 319x, or 348x. An IBM (or equivalent) supported tape drive is also required to restore the driver.

The Customized Offerings Driver is intended to run in single-system image and monoplex modes only. Its use in multisystem configurations is not supported. The Customized Offerings Driver is intended to be used only to install new levels of z/OS using ServerPac or CBPDO, and to install service on the new software until a copy (clone) of the new system can be made. The use of the Customized Offerings Driver for other purposes is not supported.

The Customized Offerings Driver includes an HFS and the necessary function to use Communications Server (IP Services), Security Server, and the system-managed storage (SMS) facility of DFSMSdfp, but these items are not customized. However, existing environments can be connected to, and used from, the Customized Offerings Driver system.

### Identifying Driving System Software Requirements for ServerPac for z/OS R10

Driving system requirements for installing z/OS R10 by way of ServerPac or dump-by-data-set SystemPac are:

- An operating system: Use either of the following:
  - z/OS V1R8 or later, or z/OS.e V1R8. If V1R8, DFSMSdfp PTF UA34953 (for APAR OA20599) is also required, or
  - The Customized Offerings Driver (5665-M12).
- A terminal: A locally-attached or network-attached terminal that can be used to establish a TSO/E session on the IPLed system is required.
- *Proper authority:* Use the RACFDRV installation job as a sample of the security system definitions required so that you can perform the installation tasks.
- Proper security:
  - In order for you to install into the zFS, the user ID you use must have read access to the SUPERUSER.FILESYS.PFSCTL resource in the RACF FACILITY class.
    - In order for you to install the z/OS UNIX files, the following is required:
      - The user ID you use must be a superuser (UID=0) or have read access to the BPX.SUPERUSER resource in the RACF facility class.
      - The user ID you use must have read access to facility class resources BPX.FILEATTR.APF, BPX.FILEATTR.PROGCTL, and BPX.FILEATTR.SHARELIB (or BPX.FILEATTR.\* if you choose to use a generic name for these resources). The commands to define these facility class resources are in SYS1.SAMPLIB member BPXISEC1.

- Group IDs uucpg and TTY, and user ID uucp, must be defined in your security database. These
  IDs must contain OMVS segments with a GID value for each group and a UID value for the user
  ID. (For ease of use and manageability, define the names in uppercase.)
  - The group ID and user ID values assigned to these IDs cannot be used by any other IDs. They must be unique.
  - You must duplicate the required user ID and group names in each security database, including the same user ID and group ID values in the OMVS segment. This makes it easier to transport the HFS data sets from test systems to production systems. For example, the group name TTY on System 1 must have the same group ID value on System 2 and System 3. If it is not possible to synchronize your databases you will need to continue running the FOMISCHO job against each system after z/OS UNIX is installed.

If names such as uucp, uucpg, and TTY are not allowed on your system, or if they conflict with existing names, you can create and activate a user ID alias table. For information about defining these group and user IDs to RACF and about creating a user ID alias table (USERIDALIASTABLE), see *z/OS UNIX System Services Planning*. Other sources of information are SYS1.SAMPLIB member BPXISEC1. (**Note:** You can use the RACFDRV installation job as a sample of the security system definitions required to perform the installation tasks.)

• Language Environment run-time options: As of z/OS R7, ServerPac requires that the following Language Environment run-time options are **not** specified as nonoverrideable (NONOVR) in the CEEDOPT CSECT: ALL31, ANYHEAP, BELOWHEAP, DEPTHCONDLIMIT, ERRCOUNT, HEAP, HEAPCHK, HEAPPOOLS, INTERRUPT, LIBSTACK, PLITASKCOUNT, STACK, STORAGE, THREADHEAP, and THREADSTACK.

 Language Environment: The CustomPac Installation Dialog uses the Language Environment run-time library SCEERUN. If SCEERUN is not in the link list on the driving system, you must edit the ServerPac installation jobs to add it to the JOBLIB or STEPLIB DD statements.

• *OMVS address space active:* For ServerPac only (not SystemPac), an activated OMVS address space with z/OS UNIX kernel services operating in full function mode is required.

• *SMS active:* The Storage Management Subsystem (SMS) must be active to allocate HFS and PDSE data sets, whether they are SMS-managed or non-SMS-managed. Also, the use of HFS data sets is supported only when SMS is active in at least a null configuration, even when the data sets are not SMS-managed. Do either of the following:


To allocate non-SMS-managed HFS and PDSE data sets, you must activate SMS on the driving system in at least a null configuration. You must also activate SMS on the target system.

To allocate SMS-managed HFS and PDSE data sets, you must activate SMS on the driving system in at least a minimal configuration. Then you must define a storage group, create SMS-managed volumes, and write, translate, and activate a storage class ACS routine that allows the allocation of PDSE and HFS data sets with the names in the ALLOCDS job. You must also activate SMS on the target system.

- SMP/E ++JARUPD Support: If your ServerPac order contains any product that uses the ++JARUPD support introduced in SMP/E V3R2, then your driving system will require IBM SDK for OS/390, Java 2 Technology Edition. z/OS V1R10 itself does not use the ++JARUPD support.
- *zFS configuration requirements (optional):* If you will specify that you will use a zFS for ServerPac installation, then you must be sure that the zFS has been installed and configured, as described in *z/OS Distributed File Service zSeries File System Administration*.
- *Electronic delivery requirements (optional:* If you intend to receive your ServerPac order by way of the Internet, you need the following:
  - ICSF configured and active so that it can calculate SHA-1 hash values in order to verify the integrity of data being transmitted. If ICSF is not configured and active, SMP/E calculates the SHA-1 hash values using an SMP/E Java application class, provided that IBM SDK for z/OS, Java 2 Technology Edition, V1 (5655-I56) or later is installed. IBM recommends the ICSF method because it is likely to perform better than the SMP/E method. (To find out how to configure and activate ICSF, see z/OS Cryptographic Services ICSF System Programmer's Guide. For the required SMP/E setup, see SMP/E User's Guide.)
  - A download file system. Your order is provided in a compressed format and is saved in a download file system. The size of this file system should be approximately twice the compressed size of your order to accommodate the order and workspace to process it.
  - Firewall configuration. If your enterprise requires specific commands to allow the download of your order using FTP through a local firewall, you must identify these commands for later use in the CustomPac Installation Dialog, which manages the download of your order.
  - Proper dialog level. If you are using a CustomPac Installation Dialog whose Package Version is less than 17.00.00, you must migrate the dialog to this level or later. You can determine if you have the correct dialog level by looking for the text "This dialog supports electronic delivery." at the bottom of panel CPPPPOLI. If

your dialog is not at the minimum level, follow the migration scenarios and steps described in *ServerPac: Using the Installation Dialog.* 

Proper level for service: In order for you to install service on the target system that you're building, your driving system must minimally meet the driving system requirements for CBPDO Wave 1 and must have the current (latest) levels of the program management binder, SMP/E, and HLASM. The service jobs generated by the CustomPac Installation Dialog use the target system's (and therefore current) level of the binder, SMP/E, and HLASM. If you choose to use your own jobs, model them after the jobs provided by ServerPac or dump-by-data-set SystemPac by adding STEPLIB DD statements to access MIGLIB (for the binder and SMP/E) and SASMMOD1 (for HLASM). Be sure that the SASMMOD1 and SYS1.MIGLIB data sets are APF authorized. Another way to install service is from a copy of your target system.



# Identifying Driving System Software Requirements for Servicing z/OS R10 (and Installing CBPDO)

After installing via ServerPac, you will eventually want to install service on your z/OS R10 system. The driving system to install service on your z/OS R10 ServerPac system are the same as to install with the CBPDO method. For servicing your ServerPac system, you must meet the driving system requirements for "Wave 1" below.

When you use the CBPDO method of installing z/OS you install in three stages called *waves*. (Wave 1, in order to be more manageable, is divided into several tasks called *ripples*.) This section describes the driving system requirements for each wave.

### z/OS R10 CBPDO: Driving System Wave 0

In Wave 0 you install the program management binder (part of the BCP), the HLASM base element, and the SMP/E base element. These items must be installed on (available from) the driving system for subsequent wave installations.

You can use either of the following as the driving system for installing z/OS R10 Wave 0:

- z/OS R8 or later.
- The Customized Offerings Driver (5665-M12).

### z/OS R10 CBPDO: Driving System Wave 1 (and to service a ServerPac system)


In Wave 1 you install most of the elements and features. The driving system requirements for installing Wave 1 are:

- An operating system: Use any of the following:
  - z/OS R8, except that the program binder, HLASM, and SMP/E must be at the current (latest) levels. To satisfy the binder and SMP/E requirements, you can use a STEPLIB DD statement to access the z/OS V1R10 program binder and z/OS V1R10 SMP/E (V3R5) in the Wave 0 target system's SYS1.MIGLIB data set, and to access the z/OS V1R10 HLASM's (V1R6) ASM.SASMMOD1 data set. Ensure that the target system's SYS1.MIGLIB and ASM.SASMMOD1 data sets are APF authorized on the driving system.
  - The Customized Offerings Driver (5665-M12).
- Proper security: In order for you to install into the file system, the security definitions described previously for ServerPac are required.

- Binder entry in SMP/E UTILITY: The SMP/E UTILITY must have an entry for the binder. You can specify any of
  these program names in the UTILITY entry: IEWBLINK, HEWL, IEWL, LINKEDIT, or HEWLH096. (The linkage
  editor, which uses the names HEWLKED, HEWLF064, IEWLF440, IEWLF880, and IEWLF128, cannot be
  used.)
- Language Environment: You must add SCEERUN (the run-time library provided by Language Environment) to
  your program search order because many elements and features require it. If you wish, add SCEERUN to your
  LNKLST concatenation. If you don't add SCEERUN to your LNKLST, you must access SCEERUN by using
  STEPLIB DD statements in the individual element and feature procedures that require them. The BCP's
  Program Management Binder is one function that requires access to SCEERUN; it has been required since
  OS/390 R10. This means that you must make available SCEERUN (via the LNKLST or STEPLIB, for instance)
  to any JCL and procedures (such as SMP/E procedures) that invoke the binder. This ensures that processing,
  such as conversion of long names to short names, is successful.
- OMVS address space active: Before you install the elements and features in Wave 1, you must activate the OMVS address space in full function mode on the driving system. To activate OMVS, complete the required customization (for example, SMS and RACF setup) as described in *z/OS UNIX System Services Planning*.
- Target system's file system mounted: The target system's file system must be mounted.

# z/OS R10 CBPDO: Driving System Wave 2

In Wave 2 you install the z/OS V1R10 level of JES2 or JES3. Wave 2 is optional and can be combined with Wave 1. The driving system requirements for Wave 2 are the same as for Wave 1.



# Choosing IBM Products That You Want to Run with z/OS

The functional and minimal requirements are found in the z/OS *Planning for Installation* which is available on the Internet from <u>http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/bkserv</u>/.

For a list of products available for ordering with z/OS, you can use the self-service Internet application ShopzSeries: <u>http://www.ibm.com/software/shopzseries</u>.

The IBM software products that run with z/OS, and which are documented in z/OS V1R10 Planning for Installation Appendix, are documented slightly different for this release. Only the IBM software products levels **above the minimum service-supported level**, or which need specific APARs or PTFs are documented. Other IBM software products not documented in this Appendix, if they are still service-supported, are supported with z/OS R10.

Many of these products can be ordered as part of your z/OS ServerPac order, z/OS SystemPac order, separate CBPDO order, or separate ProductPac order.

If you're migrating to z/OS V1R10, you can find out which products have new levels by using ShopzSeries or by using the SMP/E base element's Planning and Migration Assistant. Both tools use data found on your system as well as the latest IBM software product catalog.

### LPAR Name Considerations

Depending on the license type (z/OS or ZNALC), you may want to review your LPAR names. Since z/OS.e is not available on z/OS R10, you may want to consider renaming any LPARs that were previously called ZOSExxxx,. To identify the z/OS LPAR as "zNALC", you may do it in either of the following ways:

- 1. Specify system parameter LICENSE=ZNALC (with any LPAR name).
- 2. Specify ZNALxxxx as the LPAR name, along with one of the following:

- No system parameter specified for LICENSE (which will allow the default of Z/OS)
- System parameter LICENSE=Z/OS
- System parameter LICENSE=ZNALC (which is available on z/OS V1R6 and later with APAR OA20314)

Note that to identify the z/OS LPAR as "z/OS", you cannot IPL it under any LPAR named ZNALxxx.

# **Target System Hardware Requirements**

The minimal hardware requirements for z/OS, as well as additional hardware needed by specific z/OS elements and features is documented in *z/OS Planning for Installation*. Remember, z/OS V1R10 runs only in z/Architecture mode, and only on z10 EC, z9 EC, z9 BC, z990, z890, z900 or z800 servers.

z/OS V1R10 runs on the following IBM System z or their equivalents:

- IBM System z10 Enterprise Class (z10 EC)
- IBM System z9 Enterprise Class (z9 EC), formerly the IBM System z9 109 (z9-109)

- IBM eServer zSeries 990 (z990)
- IBM eServer zSeries 890 (z890)
- IBM eServer zSeries 900 (z900)
- IBM eServer zSeries 800 (z800)





### Programmatic Help with Coexistence PTFs for z/OS Release 10


SMP/E has been extended to help simplify the task of verifying required software fixes identified in Preventive Service Planning (PSP) buckets are installed. PSP buckets identify required software fixes for new hardware devices, toleration and coexistence of new software releases, and for enabling new functions. IBM consolidates the lists of required fixes from PSP buckets and produces new Fix Category (FIXCAT) HOLDDATA to identify those fixes. For helping with coexistence verification for z/OS R10, the fix category of interest is **IBM.Coexistence.z/OS.V1R10**. You can use the new type of ++HOLD statement to identify APARs, their fix categories, and the PTF that resolves the APAR.

When FIXCAT HOLDDATA statements are received into a global zone, SMP/E assigns the fix category values as sourceids to the PTFs that resolve the APARs. These sourceids then simplify selecting and installing required fixes. During APPLY and ACCEPT command processing you can specify the assigned sourceids on the SOURCEID and EXSRCID operands to select the SYSMODs associated with a particular fix category.

In addition, for the APPLY and ACCEPT commands you can specify which Fix Categories are of interest using the new FIXCAT operand. This tells SMP/E to process only FIXCAT HOLDDATA for the categories you specify, and all others are ignored.

Finally, SMP/E uses the new FIXCAT HOLDDATA to identify what required fixes are missing. A new REPORT MISSINGFIX command analyzes the new FIXCAT HOLDDATA and determine which fixes (APARs) identified by the HOLDDATA are not yet installed. Only the fixes associated with the fix categories of interest to you, specified by you, are analyzed and identified. For example, you can identify only the missing fixes associated with a particular hardware device or coexistence for a specific new software release.

It is very important that all z/OS V3R4 users install UO00701 (APAR IO07480). This PTF allows SMP/E V3R4 (which is in z/OS V1R7, V1R8, and V1R9) to quietly ignore new FIXCAT HOLD statements that will be present in IBM product and service offerings. In addition, the PTF provides support for SMP/E users who share SMPCSI data sets between pre-z/OS V1R10 systems and z/OS V1R10 systems.



# EPSPT Programmatic Help with Coexistence PTFs for z/OS Release 10

You may use the Enhanced PSP Tool (EPSPT) to assist in programmatically determining which coexistence PTFs you must install on your current system in preparation for migration to a later z/OS release. When you retrieve the extract file from the ZOSGEN PSP bucket subset that is used as input to EPSPT, the file will contain the current list of coexistence PTFs for migrating to a later z/OS release. Coexistence PTFs are identified in the "Cross Product Dependencies" section of the ZOSGEN PSP bucket subset.

The steps to take to programmatically determine whether your current system has the complete list of required Coexistence PTFs for migration are:

- Download and install the latest EPSPT level, available from <u>http://www14.software.ibm.com/webapp/set2/sas/f/psp/download.html</u>. Latest tool is: Report Level:1.04.11 Last Update:2007/06/28
- 2. Download the extract file from your current release's ZOSGEN PSP bucket subset. The list of "to" release coexistence PTFs is found in the "from" release ZOSGEN PSP bucket subset!
- 3. Using the extract file from your current release's ZOSGEN PSP bucket subset, run the EPSPT. Sample JCL to do this can be found at <u>http://www14.software.ibm.com/webapp/set2/sas/f/psp/use.html</u>
- 4. Resolve any outstanding discrepancies that the EPSPT has identified.

From time to time, you may want to download the extract file from your current release's ZOSGEN PSP bucket subset, and rerun EPSPT to ensure that any newly added coexistence PTFs are verified.

An example of the beginning of the ZOSGEN PSP extract file (from the ZOSV1R8 upgrade) is:





# Prepare for your migration to z/OS R10!

In this presentation you've seen many things can you can do right now, on your current z/OS release to help make your z/OS R10 migration smooth. Listed above are the things that were shown in this presentation, but make sure you attend Part 2 so that you know a more complete migration picture.



# **IBM Migration Checker for z/OS**

The IBM Migration Checker for z/OS is a tool that checks the applicability of certain migration actions on the currently running system. It was introduced for z/OS R8, and has been enhanced for z/OS R9 – some programs are still appropriate for z/OS R10. It does not **perform** migration actions on your system. Instead, the tool **reports** which migration actions you have to perform. The tool is best used to assist you in creating your migration plan in conjunction with the z/OS Migration book.

A selection of migration actions for this tool can assist you in your migration from **z/OS V1R7 to z/OS V1R8 and to z/OS V1R9**. However, if you're not on the z/OS V1R7 to z/OS V1R8 or V1R9 migration path, most of the programs in the tool can also provide value on other migration paths such as z/OS V1R6 to z/OS V1R8, and even z/OS V1R4 to z/OS V1R7, or somewhat even z/OS V1R8 to z/OS V1R10. The output reports produced from running the tool will tell you whether the tool was able to do any analysis on the currently running system, so running it outside the intended migration path does no harm, and in many cases is helpful.

The IBM Migration Checker for z/OS is an "as is" download tool available from the z/OS download Web page at http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/downloads/. It's composed of several batch programs that can be run either independently or serially in one job to check the applicability of certain migration actions on the currently running system. The user who runs the programs must have the authority to issue the **TSO/E CONSOLE** command and have an OMVS segment defined. Note that with our direction in z/OS R10 of using IBM Health Checker for migration verification, the IBM Migration Checker is not planned to be enhanced.

You can run the tool as often as you like. Before you've even ordered z/OS, after installing z/OS, and after each z/OS image is deployed on your enterprise. Because the tool does not make any changes to your system and is aware of the level of the system on which it is running, it can:

- Alert you to migration actions that you should plan for in the future
- Detect migration actions that you can do now to clear the way to z/OS V1R9 or later.
- Verify that you've done the migration actions correctly when you're running z/OS V1R9 or later.

As configurations change, rerun the tool. For example, if your enterprise has multiple TCP/IP stacks, and activates and deactivates those stacks at different times, it is beneficial to run the tool multiple times to analyze each active TCP/IP stack.

You can dynamically change many of the items that the tool checks for on your currently running system. You can set up your automation to submit IBM Migration Checker for z/OS jobs on a regular schedule that fits your needs or

you can manually submit the jobs. The frequencies is your choice, but keep in mind that only the latest report will be in the output data set. If you see a need to save the output from previous runs, you can include that in your automation steps too.







("Change" means that one or more of the element's or feature's FMIDs [function modification identifiers] was changed, or that the element or feature was added to the system. New function added in program temporary fixes [PTFs] is not considered change.) Also, for nonexclusive elements and features, the equivalent level of the separate product is listed in parentheses.

Note: The function level is expressed as a z/OS function level.

Do not confuse the function level with the product level. All elements and features are at the V1R10 product level but they are at various function levels. For example, the product level of z/OS BookManager READ is z/OS V1R10 but its function level is OS/390 V1R1 because OS/390 V1R1 was the last release in which it changed.

#### Type and description

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- "Type" means the following:
  - Whether it's a base element or optional feature
  - Whether the base element or optional feature is exclusive (existing only within z/OS) or nonexclusive (also available as a separate product)
    - If an optional feature, whether it's priced or unpriced
  - If an optional feature, whether it supports dynamic enablement (note that all the priced features support dynamic enablement)
- "Description" is a brief description of the element or feature, and miscellaneous facts about it.
