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# About this Guide

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# Introduction

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**Welcome** Welcome to Gentran:Server® for Windows®, the Sterling Commerce Electronic Commerce (EC) software for the Windows operating system.

Gentran:Server provides the easy-to-use tools you need to electronically exchange data with your trading partners, including:

- data translation
- process control
- communications system

We believe that you will find this software and the supporting materials easy to use and directly beneficial to your business.

---

**Installing Gentran:Server** Installing the Gentran:Server for Windows software also involves configuration of Windows and your database product. It is important to analyze the tasks you need to perform before undertaking the installation of Gentran:Server.

**Note**

The CD keys for installing the Gentran:Server Options Pack software are located on the packing list that was shipped with your Gentran:Server product.

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# What's in this Manual

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## Introduction

This manual provides pre-installation and installation instructions for Gentran:Server (Distributed System). It includes our recommendations on how to configure your system for the easiest installation and operation of Gentran:Server.

This manual uses a task-oriented approach that is intended to answer any questions you may have about Gentran:Server installation with step-by-step instructions.

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## Intended audience

This manual is intended for local administrators responsible for the following:

- installing and implementing EC
- installing and implementing your database product

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## Prerequisite knowledge

This manual assumes that you are familiar with using a PC, Microsoft® Windows Server functions, and database administration.

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## Description of contents

- *Appendix B, Oracle Setup*, outlines our recommendations for setting up Oracle for use with Gentran:Server.

### Note:

Support for Oracle databases does not include support for the Oracle Exadata platform.

- *Appendix C, Installation Troubleshooting*, describes background information on how to troubleshoot the installation of Gentran:Server, and explains the course of action

that you should follow to resolve some common installation failures. This chapter also includes InstallShield<sup>®</sup> error messages.

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## Key Terms Used in This Manual

- Introduction** This section defines the Gentran:Server proprietary terminology that is used in this manual. We recommend that you familiarize yourself with this terminology before proceeding further in this *Installation Guide*.
- 
- Client Access Components** The *Client Access Components* can be installed on any machine(s) in the Gentran:Server system. This provides the user interface to setup, maintain, and control the Gentran:Server system.
- 
- Clustering** A cluster is a set of loosely coupled, independent computer systems that behave as a single system. Client applications interact with a cluster as if it were a single high-performance, highly reliable server. System managers view a cluster as if it is a single server. In a clustered system, processing power can be increased in small incremental steps by adding another machine. To a client application, the cluster provides the illusion of a single server, or single-system image, even though it may be composed of many systems.
- Additional systems can be added to the cluster as needed to process more complex or an increasing number of requests from the clients. If one system in a cluster fails, its workload can be automatically dispersed among the remaining systems. This transfer is frequently transparent to the client.
- 
- Communication Controller** The *Communications Controller* regulates communication between Gentran:Server and the organizations (value-added networks (VANs) or trading partners) with whom data is exchanged. You can install the Communications Controller component on any machine in the Gentran:Server system that is capable of sending or receiving EC data via a modem or other communications device.
- Note**  
Installing the Communications Controller component on a machine other than the primary Gentran system controller makes that machine a communications controller (secondary controller) in the system.
- 
- Database** Gentran:Server uses a *relational database* to store system data. The system data may be stored on one or multiple machines that are accessible by all machines in the Gentran:Server system via your network. This database enables multiple users to access the same data. The database tables contain indicators that point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). Gentran:Server uses ODBC (Open Database Connectivity) to use databases from different vendors.
- Note**  
See the *Getting Support Card* to determine which database management systems have been certified for use with Gentran:Server.

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<b>Fail over</b>	<p>Fail over addresses error recovery, data back outs, transaction commits, and rollbacks that may be helpful in the event of a disaster such as a power failure. Normally redundant systems provide insurance against the loss of data and provide continuous “up-time,” but data commits, rollbacks, and proper error handling may be needed.</p>
<b>Gentran:Server Executive</b>	<p>The <i>Gentran:Server Executive</i> is the service that controls execution of the communication and translation functions on a defined server. Executing the Gentran:Server Executive as a service enables Gentran:Server to run on Windows servers, even when no users are logged on to the system.</p> <p>The Gentran:Server Executive is installed on the <i>primary Gentran system controller</i> in a Gentran:Server system. The Gentran:Server Executive also centrally regulates system-critical information.</p>
<b>Gentran Poller</b>	<p>The <i>Gentran Poller</i> is the Gentran:Server Executive component that polls at set intervals for the existence of specified files.</p>
<b>Gentran Scheduler</b>	<p>The <i>Gentran Scheduler</i> is the Gentran:Server Executive component that checks all timed events at set intervals for scheduled events.</p>
<b>Integration Components</b>	<p>The <i>Integration Components</i> are optional components that provide the user interface to the Gentran:Server Application Integration and Forms Integration subsystems.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Application Integration subsystem enables you to generate import, export, and document turnaround translation objects.</li><li>• Forms Integration subsystem enables you to generate screen entry and print translation objects.</li></ul> <p>The Integration Components also allow you to access Gentran Standards for creating new translation objects.</p>
<b>Notification</b>	<p>The <i>Notification</i> subsystem enables you to notify users (who are specified as Operators) when a predefined event occurs. You can specify notification parameters that prompt the system to generate any combination of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• a message box alert to user interface clients running the Notification program</li><li>• an e-mail message</li><li>• a message to a digital pager when a specified audit message is written to the Audit Log</li><li>• a process control task to be executed when a specified audit message occurs</li></ul> <p><b>Reference</b></p> <p>See Using the Audit Notification System in the <i>Administration Guide</i> for more information about using the Operators user interface.</p>

**Notes**

- Only process control events that are set up as “notification” type events in Process Control can be selected as tasks to execute if the predefined event occurs.
- If you specify a task that is suspended in Process Control, the task will not be executed when the predefined event occurs.

**ODBC**

*ODBC* (Open Database Connectivity) is used by Gentran:Server to use databases from different vendors.

**Primary Gentran System Controller**

The *primary Gentran system controller* maintains status information for the entire system, controls the management and dispatching of processing requests within the system, and controls all other system components.

**Note**

The primary Gentran system controller is not the same as a “primary domain controller”; primary domain controller is a Windows term.

**Process Controller**

The *Process Controller* component is the part of the Gentran:Server software that regulates the management and dispatching of processing requests within the system. The process controller allows the system translation load to be distributed for fast and efficient throughput.

**Note**

The process controller can be any machine in the Gentran:Server system on which the process controller component is installed.

**Secondary Controller**

The secondary controller may be a *process controller* or a *communications controller*, or both.

A process controller regulates the management and dispatching of processing requests within the system to allow the system translation load to be distributed for fast and efficient throughput.

A communications controller regulates communication between Gentran:Server and the organizations (value-added networks (VANs) or trading partners) with whom data is exchanged.

**System Configuration**

The *System Configuration* program enables you to modify system-wide configuration parameters, including the following:

- system data store folders
- security mode
- client notification parameters
- audit parameters

- controller settings
- interval for overdue acknowledgement checking
- interval for acknowledgement generation
- interval for acknowledgement reconciliation
- interval for automatic file concatenation
- ODBC data source used by the system
- import specifications
- splitter entries
- user parameters and logons
- stopping and starting the Gentran:Server Executive, Gentran Scheduler, and Gentran Poller services

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**System Data Store**

The *system data store* serves as the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data. The system data store may reside on any machine that is a file server to the machines in the Gentran:Server system.

**Note**

The machines where the system data store resides must be accessible by all machines in the Gentran:Server system. There is only one system data store in the Gentran:Server system, but the associated folders and files may be distributed across multiple machines, if necessary.

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**User Interface Client**

The *user interface client* is any machine in the Gentran:Server system other than the *primary Gentran system controller* or *secondary controller(s)*. The user interface clients provide the functions that are necessary to monitor and control the system.

**Introduction** The Sterling Commerce Gentran:Server software is supported by trained product support personnel who are available to help you with product questions or concerns.

**Note**

Gentran:Server Customer Support does not support non-Sterling Commerce products (such as SQL Server and Oracle), but they can assist you in configuring non-Sterling Commerce products to work with Gentran:Server.

**Phone number** For assistance, please refer to your *Getting Started Guide* to determine which support phone number you should use.

**Before calling support**

- Attempt to recreate any problem that you encounter and record the exact sequence of events.

Information	Description

System Configuration	The Gentran:Server version (and any service packs installed) and information about the primary Gentran system controller and all machines experiencing problems, including the Windows operating system version, amount of memory, available disk space, database version, Microsoft Data Access (MDAC) version, and Internet Explorer version.  Also, please describe any recent changes in your hardware, software, or the configuration of your system.
System Data Store	Which machines contain folders in the system data store?
Error Messages	Record the exact wording of any error messages received and the point in the software where the error occurred, as well as any log files.
Attempted Solutions	Record any steps that you took attempting to resolve the problem and note the outcomes, including the estimated number of times the problem occurred and whether it can be reproduced.

This manual is designed to help you understand the order of configuration and installation tasks, the resources you need, and the information that you need to obtain.

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# System Overview

## Installation Prerequisites

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**Introduction**

Installing the Gentran:Server for Windows software also involves configuration of Windows and your database product. It is important to analyze all of the tasks you need to perform before undertaking the installation of Gentran:Server.

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**Necessary personnel**

Prior to configuring your system and installing Gentran:Server, you need to make sure that the appropriate people are available. We strongly recommend that your system and database administrator take part in the installation for the following reasons:

- On each machine on which Gentran:Server controller components are installed, you need to log on with a login that has administrative rights on that machine.
- You must create folder shares to the file server on which the system data store is installed.
- You must create a new database and you may need to add users to the database.

Your administrators are typically the only people that have the authority to complete the above.

**Warning**

It is very important that your local administrator be involved in the configuration and installation of Gentran:Server.

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# Gentran:Server Overview

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**Introduction**

Gentran:Server for Windows is a combined data translation, process control, and communications system that operates in the Microsoft Windows environment. This product is primarily designed for the translation and communication of EDI and other similar types of data.

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**Process control**

Through the process control system, you can integrate Gentran:Server with a variety of business applications in a manner that makes it a complementary extension of the application.

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**Communication system**

Gentran:Server links internal business systems to each other and to the business systems used by customers and suppliers around the world. Gentran:Server routes application-to-application messages over direct lines and value-added networks (VANs) to completely automate the transactions you exchange with customers and suppliers. Translation occurs automatically, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, according to predefined schedules or events. This enables you to streamline your business operations.

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**Unattended mode**

Gentran:Server also operates in an unattended mode. When errors occur, or when human intervention is necessary, designated people are notified via pagers or system messages. Audit trails and message tracking enable you to know precisely where a message is in the process, at any time.

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**Gentran:Server Executive Service**

Gentran:Server uses the Gentran:Server Executive Service, which controls the execution of communication and translation functions. The Gentran:Server Executive enables Gentran:Server to run on Windows servers even when no users are logged on to the system.

**Gentran Poller**

The *Gentran Poller* is the Gentran:Server Executive component that polls at set intervals for the existence of specified files.

**Gentran Scheduler**

The *Gentran Scheduler* is the Gentran:Server Executive component that checks all timed events at set intervals for scheduled events.

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**Clustering**

A cluster is a set of loosely coupled, independent computer systems that behave as a single system. Client applications interact with a cluster as if it were a single high-performance, highly reliable server. System managers view a cluster as if it is a single server. In a clustered system, processing power can be increased in small incremental steps by adding another machine. To a client application, the cluster provides the illusion of a single server, or single-system image, even though it may be composed of many systems.

Additional systems can be added to the cluster as needed to process more complex or an increasing number of requests from clients. If one system in a cluster fails, its workload can be automatically dispersed among the remaining systems. This transfer is frequently transparent to the client.

---

**Fail over**

Fail over addresses error recovery, data back outs, transaction commits, and roll backs that may be helpful in the event of a disaster such as a power failure. Normally redundant systems provide insurance against the loss of data and provide continuous “up-time,” but data commits, rollbacks, and proper error handling may be needed.

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**Windows environment**

Gentran:Server was specifically designed to take full advantage of the Windows environment. Gentran:Server is deployed in this environment through a combination of a *database*, *system data store*, and *primary Gentran system controller*.

**Note**

The above are required system components of a Gentran:Server system. Optionally, depending on the type of licensing you purchase, each system may also have *secondary controllers* and/or *user interface clients*, or in a clustered environment, the Gentran:Server software can reside on one to four nodes. The Gentran:Server system components can be distributed in many ways. This chapter further defines the system components of the Gentran:Server system.

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# Installation Components

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## Introduction

Installation components are functional components of Gentran:Server that you can select when you install Gentran:Server. The following are the installation components of the system:

- Client Access Components
  - Process Controller
  - Integration Components
- 

## Client Access Components

The Client Access Components provide the user interface to setup, maintain, and control the Gentran:Server system, including the following:

- The Electronic Commerce (EC) Manager (data management component) serves as a high-level navigation tool, as well as a document management tool. It contains windows, browsers, and dialog boxes to view and maintain document, interchange, audit, reporting, process control, communications, and translation object information.
- Partner Editor allows you to define, edit, and delete all partner information for your company and for all of your trading partners.
- Document Editor is a data entry tool that allows you to create, modify, and view documents.
- The *Notification* subsystem enables you to notify users (who are specified as Operators) when a predefined event occurs. You can specify notification parameters that prompt the system to generate any combination of the following:
  - a message box alert to user interface clients running the Notification program
  - an e-mail message
  - a message to a digital pager when a specified audit message is written to the Audit Log
  - a process control task to be executed when a specified audit message occurs

### Reference

See the “Using the Audit Notification System” chapter in the *Administration Guide* for more information on using the Operators user interface.

- System Configuration enables you to modify system-wide configuration parameters after Gentran:Server is installed. You can modify system data store folders; define or redefine the security mode; add, change, or delete system import specifications; change splitter options; define client notification parameters; add, change, or delete users; stop and start Gentran: Server services on the controllers in your system and change controller settings for every controller in your system; and change the system ODBC data source and audit settings.
  - Mailbox Server Manager allows you to manage your Gentran:Server mailbox system.
-

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**Process Controller**

A Gentran:Server Process Controller is always installed, by default, on the Primary System Controller. The Process Controller functions are run by the Gentran:Server Executive Service (RPCSRV.EXE), which must be started to execute most of the functions available from the EC Manager as well as any unattended session events that you have configured.

The Process Controller component is automatically installed on the following system components:

- primary Gentran system controller
- communications controller

Optionally, in a non-clustered environment, you can install the Process Controller component on any machines in the Gentran:Server system. Installing the Process Controller component on a machine makes that machine a process controller (secondary controller) in the system.

The Process Controller component installs the Gentran:Server Executive Service on each process controller. This service must be started on the process controller for the system to successfully execute unattended processing.

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**Integration Components**

The Integration Components are optional components that provide the user interface to the Gentran:Server Application Integration and Forms Integration subsystems.

- Application Integration subsystem enables you to generate import, export, and document turnaround translation objects.
- Forms Integration subsystem enables you to generate screen entry and print translation objects. When these translation objects are registered with Gentran:Server and selected as part of a trading relationship, they allow you to facilitate the keying and printing of documents that you receive inbound or send outbound.

The Integration Components also allow you to access Gentran Standards for creating new translation objects. The Gentran Standard files can be accessed from CD-ROM or transferred to a hard drive.

**Note**

The Integration Components can be installed on any machine in the Gentran:Server system.

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# System Components

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## Introduction

The Gentran:Server system consists of several logical components. Each system must have the following:

- ▶ primary Gentran system controller
- ▶ system data store
- ▶ database

Optionally, in a non-clustered environment, each system may also have *secondary controllers* and/or *user interface clients*.

### Note

The Gentran:Server system components can be distributed in many ways.

---

## Primary System Controller

There is only *one* primary Gentran system controller in each Gentran:Server system. The primary Gentran system controller maintains status information for the entire system, controls the management and dispatching of server processing requests within the system, and controls all other system components.

The process controller components of the system, the Gentran:Server Executive Service, and the Gentran:Server Mailbox service are automatically installed on the primary Gentran system controller. Additionally, the following installation components may be optionally installed on the primary Gentran system controller:

- ▶ Client Access Components
  - ▶ Integration Components
  - ▶ Option Pack Add-ons
  - ▶ RosettaNet Server
  - ▶ Extensions
  - ▶ Standards
- 

## Secondary Controller

The secondary controller is a *process controller* or a *communications controller*, or both.

A process controller regulates the management and dispatching of server processing requests within the system to allow the system translation load and other processing functions to be distributed for fast and efficient throughput.

A communications controller regulates communication between Gentran:Server and the organizations (value-added networks (VANs) or trading partners) with whom data is exchanged.

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**Process Controller**

A process controller is one or more machines in the Gentran:Server system (other than the primary Gentran system controller) that have the process controller components installed. Additionally, the following installation components may be optionally installed on the process controllers:

- Client Access Components
- Integration Components
- Option Pack Add-ons
- RosettaNet Server
- Extensions
- Standards

**Note**

The Gentran:Server Executive Service is installed on the process controller and must be started prior to starting the Gentran Scheduler and Gentran Poller components. The Gentran:Server Executive Service must be started for users to access the process controller system component.

---

**User Interface  
Client**

The user interface client is part of a non-clustered environment and is one or more Windows 2000 Professional or Windows XP Professional machines in the Gentran:Server system other than the *primary Gentran system controller* or *secondary controllers*.

The user interface clients provide the functions that are necessary to monitor and control the system in a non-clustered environment.

The following installation components may be optionally installed on the user interface clients:

- Integration Components
  - RosettaNet Server
  - Any extensions added to the server
- 

**System Data Store**

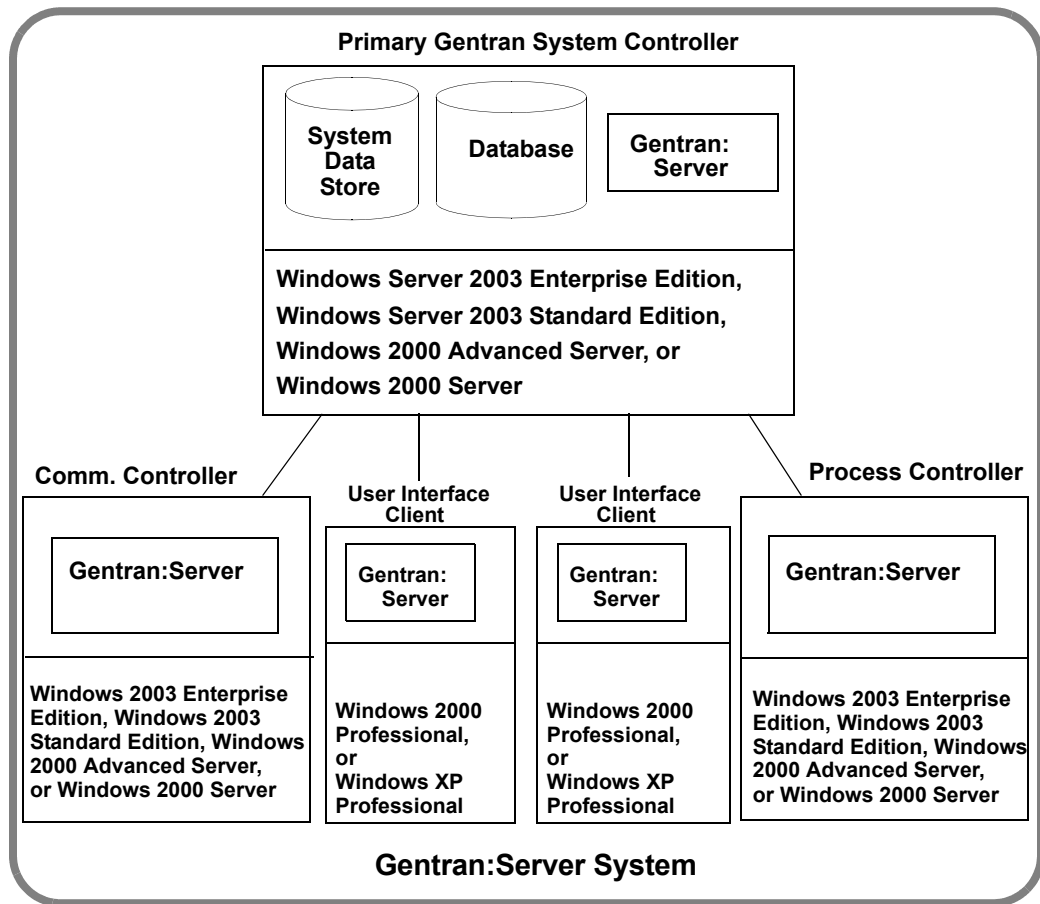
There is only *one* system data store in each Gentran:Server system. The system data store serves as the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data.

In a clustered system, the data store resides on the disk vault. In a non-clustered system, the system data store may reside on one machine or be distributed across several machines. The machines where the system data store resides must be accessible by all machines in the Gentran:Server system, because all machines in the system share data from the system data store. The associated folders and files in the system data store (such as all registered translation objects or all translation report files) may be distributed across multiple machines, if necessary.

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**Database** Gentran:Server uses a relational database to store tracking, audit, process control, translation object, and partner information in tables. The database tables contain indicators that point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). This relational database enables multiple users to access the same data. Gentran:Server uses ODBC to use databases from different vendors.

**Diagram** The following diagram illustrates one method of distributing the Gentran:Server system components (this example represents an installation site with a distributed license in a non-clustered environment). This diagram includes communications controllers, which are installed via the communications gateway.



# Sample System Configurations

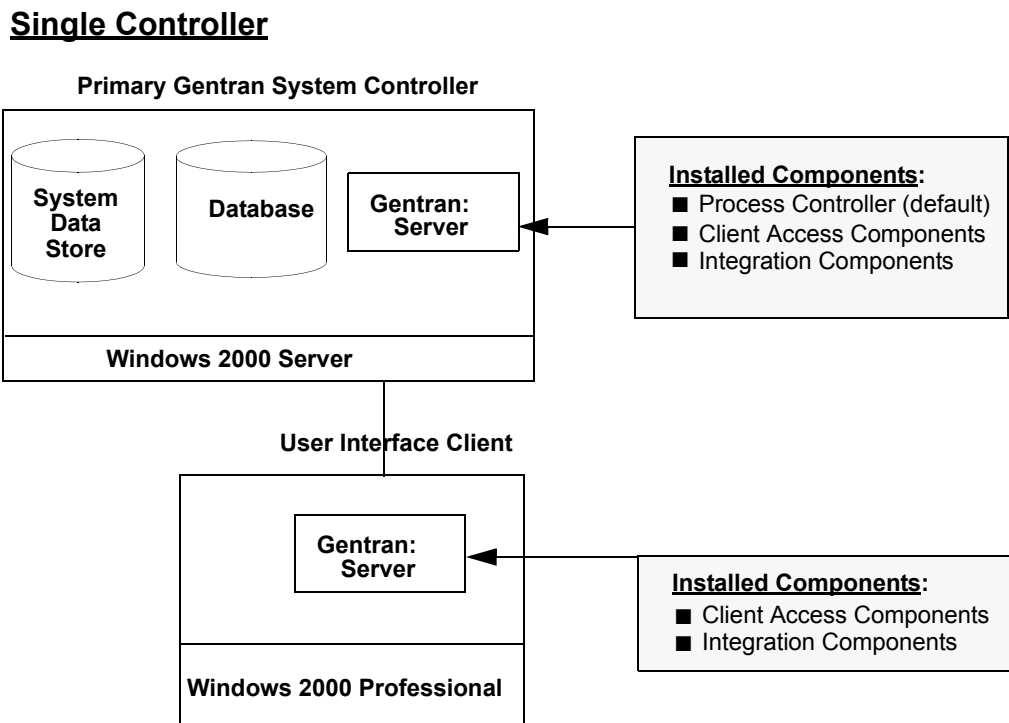
## Introduction

This section illustrates sample distributed Gentran:Server systems: a Single Controller system in a non-clustered environment, a Multiple Controller system in a non-clustered environment, and a clustered system. Each of these three systems has a different number of system components and different distribution of installation components.

These illustrations are intended to demonstrate the flexibility of Gentran:Server for systems from the simple to the complex. In all of these examples, you still have the flexibility to further expand the system by adding additional machines to the system and distributing Gentran:Server installation components.

## Sample Single Controller system

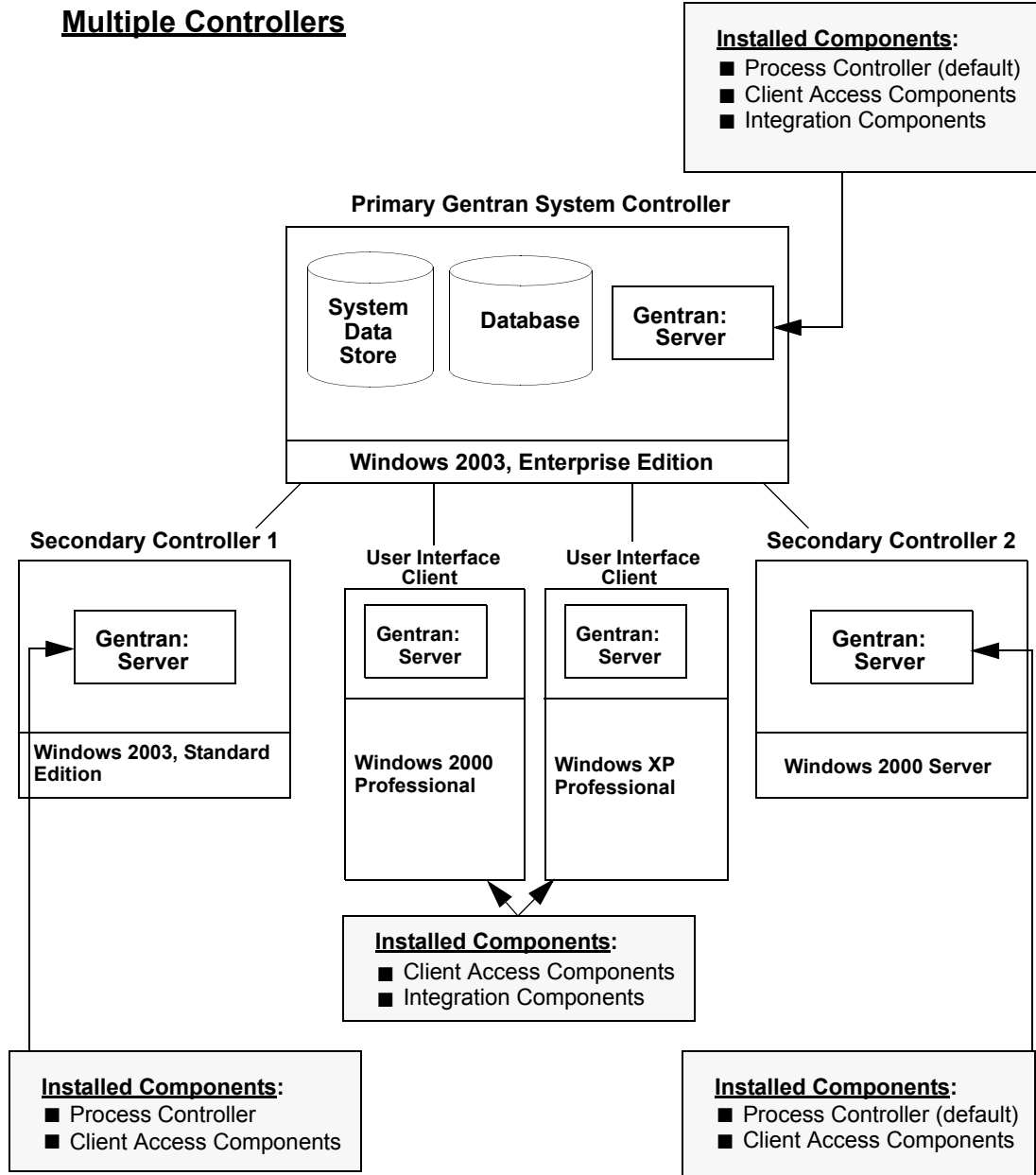
The following diagram illustrates a sample Single Controller system in a non-clustered environment. This distributed system consists of one primary Gentran system controller and one or more user interface clients.



**Sample Multiple Controller system**

The following diagram illustrates a sample Multiple Controller system in a non-clustered environment. This distributed system consists of one primary Gentran system controller with multiple secondary controllers and user interface clients.

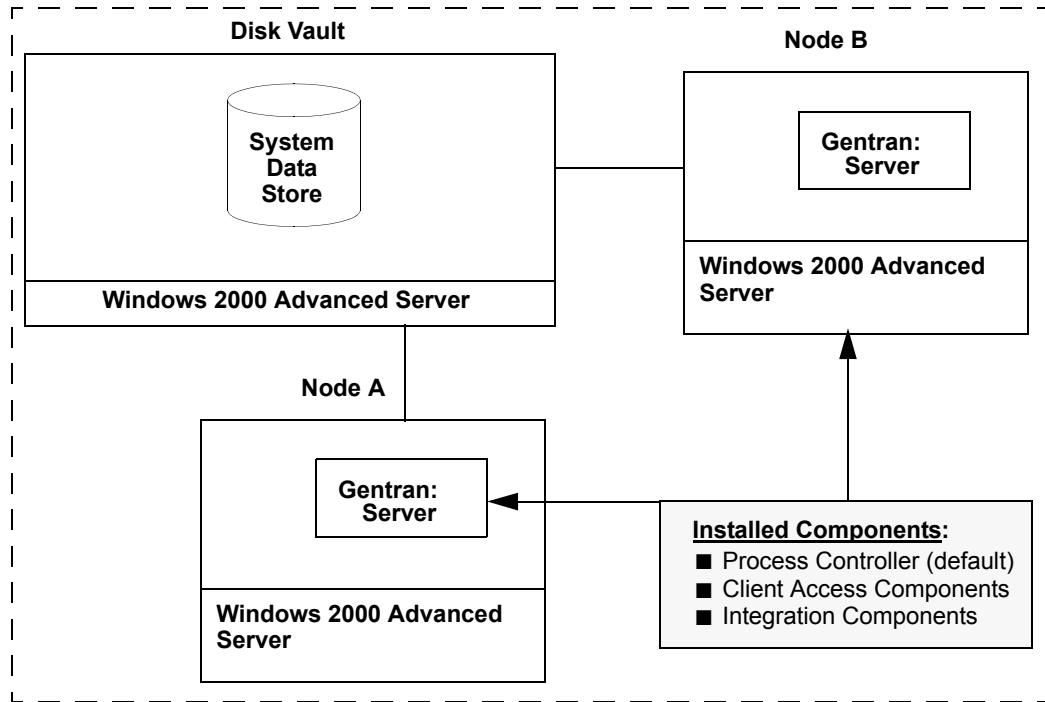
**Multiple Controllers**

The following diagram illustrates a sample clustered system. This clustered system consists of one primary Gentran system controller (the disk vault) and two nodes (the database is not included in this sample because it can be located anywhere accessible via the network).

# Post-installation Security Recommendations

---

**Introduction** Gentran:Server security enables you to protect your data from unauthorized access, yet still allow easy access to authorized users. Gentran:Server security enables you to use the integrated features of the Windows operating system and your database product.

This section contains our recommendations for the configuration of Gentran:Server security. You do not configure security until after you install Gentran:Server. (See *Modifying Security Parameters* in the *Administration Guide* for more information about setting up security in Gentran:Server). However, if you use our recommendations to determine how you are configuring security, you can ensure that your users are able to easily access Gentran:Server.

---

**Security modes** The three security modes that are supported by Gentran:Server are Integrated, Mixed, and Standard.

**Recommendation**

Set the security modes for Gentran:Server and your database to be the same. We recommend that you use Integrated security mode unless you are using an Oracle database. For Oracle databases, you must use Standard security mode.

---

**Integrated** *Integrated* security mode (recommended) allows you to take advantage of the Windows operating system security, including encrypted passwords, password aging, and domain-wide user accounts. This mode does not prompt users to sign on to Gentran:Server if the user's ID is the same for Gentran:Server and for Windows. In this mode, when you have configured only one system, you do not have the opportunity to log in to Gentran:Server as another user unless the login fail, or the user logs out of Windows and another user is logged in. If a login failure occurs, the system displays the Login dialog box to ensure access to the system.

When you have configured more than one system and are using the Integrated security mode, the Login dialog box is displayed so the user has the opportunity to select the appropriate Gentran:Server system (the User ID and Password are disabled on the Login dialog box).

---

**Mixed** *Mixed* security mode always prompts the user with the Gentran:Server Login dialog box. The Windows user name is defaulted. If the user's Gentran:Server user ID is the same as it is for Windows, the user can click **OK** on the Login dialog box. In this case, the password is not validated and the user is logged in to Gentran:Server. If you change the default user name, the system prompts the user for a password that is validated before logging in to Gentran:Server. This enables you to easily log in with your own user ID, as well as it allows you the capability to log in as another user.

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**Standard** *Standard* security mode always requires the user to log in to Gentran:Server. The Windows user name is defaulted on the Login dialog box.

---

---

**Recommended  
security**

The following are our security configuration recommendations:

- Set the security modes (Integrated, Mixed, or Standard) for Gentran:Server and your database to be the same so your database does not require you to log on separately.
  - For SQL Server, use *Integrated* security mode, which allows you to take advantage of the Windows operating system security, including encrypted passwords, password aging, and domain-wide user accounts.
  - For Oracle, you must use *Standard* security mode.
  - If you are running Gentran:Server in *Integrated* security mode, you should set up the Gentran:Server User ID for each user to be the same as the Windows User ID for that user. If this is the case, the users are not required to log on to Gentran:Server.

## Network Configuration Requirements

---

### Network/domain requirements

The Gentran:Server for Windows product is supported in the following network configurations:

- Controllers and user interface clients in one domain
- Controllers and user interface clients in two domains that have a two-way trust established
- Primary Gentran system controller in a domain and user interface clients in a Windows workgroup in which the user interface client machines have a valid domain logon and rights to the controller
- Primary Gentran system controller and user interface clients in a Windows workgroup model in which all user interface client machines have a valid logon to the controller (a user ID and password that are in the local account database on the controller)

If you are using a Windows 2000 domain model, the Gentran:Server system and all necessary network resources must reside in the same domain model.

---

## User Interface Client Permission Requirements

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### **Gentran:Server and user interface client permission requirement**

The following is a list of additional permissions requirements for user interface client machines.

- If you are using Gentran:Server Integrated security with SQL Server (as we recommend), the network logon for each user interface client must be granted access to SQL Server. Additionally, you must grant the client network logon the following permissions to the GentranDatabase: insert, update, select, and delete.

#### **Reference**

See your SQL Server™ documentation for questions about your SQL database.

- If you are using Gentran:Server Integrated security with SQL Server, the Gentran:Server logon for each user interface client must be granted access to the GentranDatabase.

#### **Reference**

See your SQL Server documentation for questions about your SQL database.

- For Gentran:Server systems using an Oracle database, you must use the Oracle Security Manager to grant the client network logon the following permissions to the GentranDatabase: insert, update, select, and delete.

#### **Reference**

See your Oracle® documentation for questions about your Oracle database.

- All Gentran:Server services that execute on the primary Gentran system controller must log on to the network with a valid user name and password, and they must be granted the following rights:
  - Log on as a batch job
  - Log on as a service
  - Take ownership of files and other objects
  - Log on locally
  - Access this computer from the network

#### **Reference**

See *Configuring Windows* on page 2 - 16 for more information on setting up Windows rights.

#### **Warning**

Gentran:Server services may *not* use the “System account” to log on to the network.

- For Notification to execute properly, the Gentran:Server Executive Service on the primary Gentran system controller must log on to the network with a user name and password that has the right to connect to all Gentran:Server user interface client machines on the network. When using MAPI to send e-mail, the ID must be able to authenticate to MS Exchange without user intervention.

#### **Note**

This right is granted on each user interface client machine through the Windows User Manager.

**Recommendation**

Complete the pre-installation tasks prior to using the Setup program to install Gentran:Server.

---

**Prerequisites**

To complete the installation of a primary Gentran system controller (or secondary controller in a multiple controller system), you must be logged on to Windows as a local administrator.

This chapter assumes that you have already installed the appropriate Windows operating system on each machine, and that you have installed either SQL or Oracle on the machine that will house the Gentran database.

**Note:**

Support for Oracle databases does not include support for the Oracle Exadata platform.

**Reference**

See the *Getting Started Guide* for more information about which operating system and database management system versions are supported with Gentran:Server.

This installation also assumes that you have a basic understanding of Windows and SQL Server/Oracle terminology and functionality, and that you have access to a database administrator (DBA).

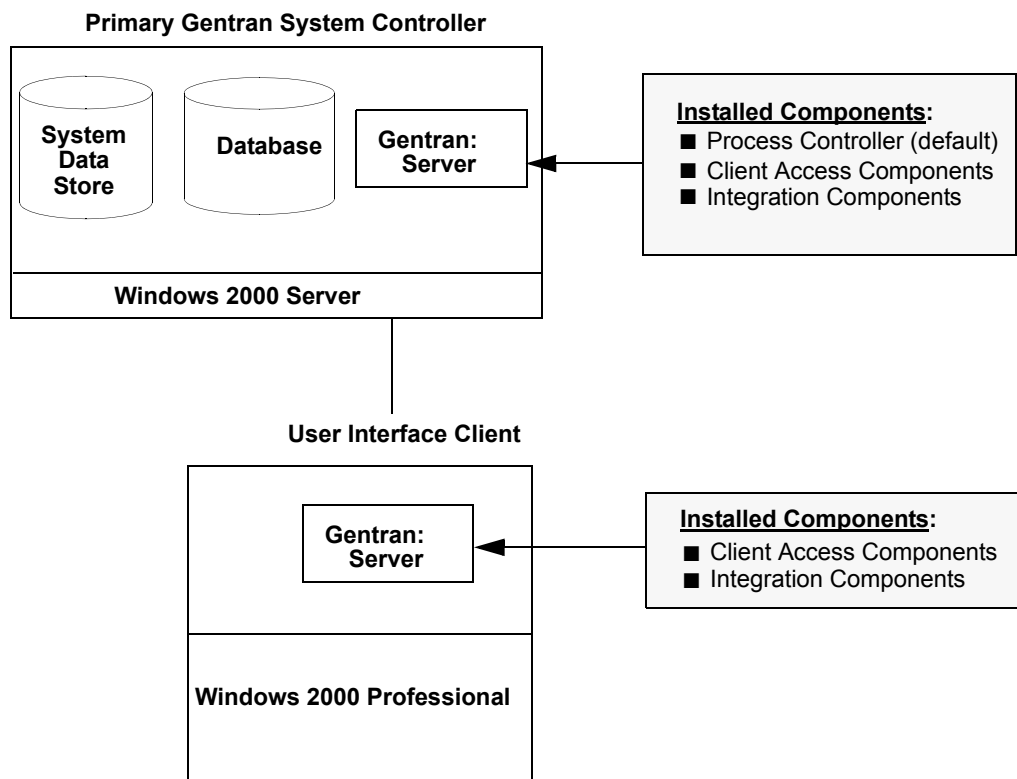

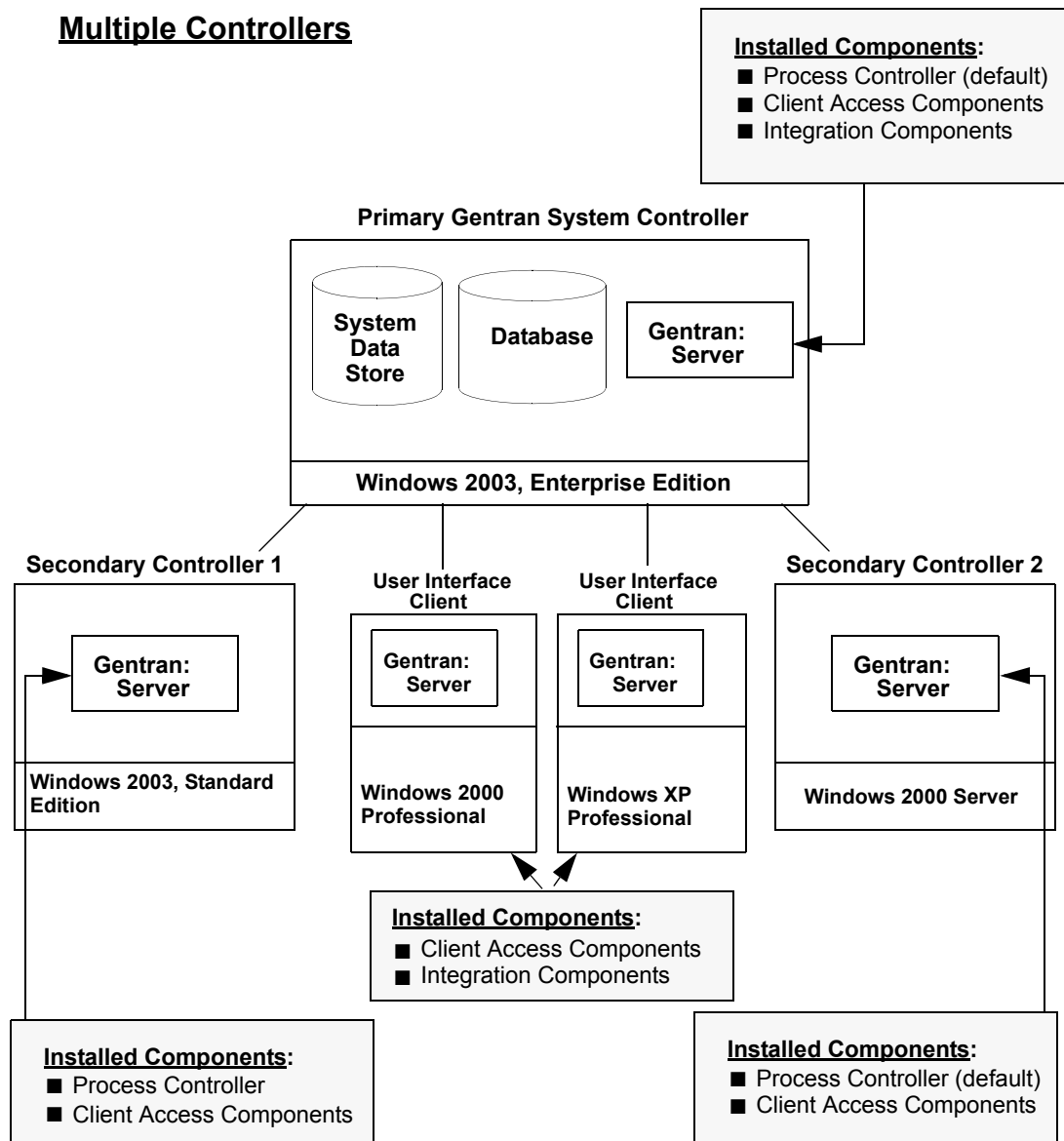

# Preinstallation Checklist

Then, use the Setup program **Join an existing system** option on every additional controller and user interface client.

To perform an upgrade of your existing Gentran:Server, use the Setup program **Upgrade your existing system** option.

5	<b>Create/Share Folder for System Data Store:</b> Create the system data store folder and share it for the group of users you created.
6	<b>Install, Create, and Configure your Database:</b> For specific instructions, please refer to the appropriate appendix for the type of database management system you are using.

## How to Create and Share the System Data Store Folder

### Creating the system data store folder

You need to create the folder where the system data store resides on your machine and share it for the GENTRANUSERS group. You need to complete these tasks now because otherwise you would need to interrupt the Gentran:Server installation process to share the Gentran:Server folder after the installation program creates it. You determined the UNC pathname for the system data store in the checklist, **item** on page 2 - 16.

#### Note

We recommend that you use the default GENSRVNT folder for the location where the system data store resides.

### Sharing the system data store folder

You also need to share the folder where the system data store resides (GENSRVNT) for the GENTRANUSERS group. You need to give the group “Full Control” permission to access the drive/folder. This gives the users in the GENTRANUSERS group permission to fully manipulate files (read, write, create, delete) and allows them to set permissions above the file level (for example, folders).

#### Note

For security reasons, you may not want users to have access to the entire drive of the machine on which the system data store resides. In this case, just share the folder.

### Creating the system data store folder

Use this procedure to create the folder for the system data store.

Step	Action
1	Navigate to and select the drive on which the system data store will reside.
2	Create a new folder named <b>GENSRVNT</b> .

### Sharing the system data store folder

Use this procedure to share the system data store folder.

Step	Action
1	Right-click <b>GENSRVNT</b> .
2	Select <b>Properties</b> .
3	Click the <b>Sharing</b> tab.

# How to Install Secondary Controllers

## Introduction

### Requirements

- ▶ To complete the installation of a primary Gentran system controller or secondary controller, you must be logged on to Windows as a local administrator.
- ▶ You must run the Setup program on the machine on which you want to install Gentran:Server.

Use the **Join an existing Gentran:Server system** option on every secondary controller in a distributed system when you are either installing Gentran:Server for the first time or joining another system (such as test and production systems).

### Recommendation

Exit all other Windows programs before running the Setup program.

# Upgrading Gentran:Server

## How to Upgrade your Gentran:Server Installation

### Introduction

Use the **Upgrade your existing installation** option on every machine in your Gentran:Server system when you receive upgrades to the Gentran:Server software. In a distributed environment, you *must* upgrade the primary Gentran system controller *first*.

### Notes

- To complete the installation of a Distributed System, you must be logged on to Windows as a local administrator.
- If you ever need to uninstall Gentran:Server, see the *Administration Guide* for information about using the Gentran:Server Installation Setup program “Leave a system” option.

### Gentran:Server for RosettaNet prerequisite

#### Warning

The Gentran:Server for RosettaNet depends on the Microsoft Internet Information Service (IIS) for HTTP-related communications. Since the use of IIS requires the Gentran:Server for Windows dynamic libraries to be open, the installation of Gentran:Server will fail if IIS is running at installation time. Therefore, we recommend that you stop the IIS service *prior to* installing Gentran:Server.

You can stop IIS by stopping the **World Wide Web Publishing Service** and the **IIS Admin Service** from the Services dialog box (select each service from the list and click **Stop**). If you are running a Windows 2000 or Windows 2003 operating system, you can access the Internet Services dialog box from your **Start** menu by selecting **Settings > Control Panel > Administrative Tools**, and then selecting **Internet Services Manager**.

#### Note

Be aware that if you use Gentran:Server for RosettaNet and are upgrading from Gentran:Server for Windows 3.x to 5.1, there are tasks you will need to perform after installing Gentran:Server for Windows 5.1 and Gentran:Server for RosettaNet 5.1, and you should allot time to complete these post-installation tasks.

#### Reference

See How to Upgrade Gentran:Server for RosettaNet in the *Gentran:Server for RosettaNet Installation Card* for more information about these post-installation tasks.

### Troubleshooting a failed installation

Setup maintains a log of every scripted command that it executed. Automatic recovery determines the point at which the install process failed and attempts to resume installation from that point. It does not reverse the previously executed commands. The following are examples of the type of errors that this automatic process recovers from:

- the database server crashing or being accidentally unplugged
- the network failing
- a power outage

### Backing up your database prior to upgrade

Prior to upgrading Gentran:Server, we recommend that you perform a synchronous backup of your entire Gentran:Server system, including the database, data store, and your Windows registry. After performing the backup, you should verify its integrity.

### Upgrading a test machine

Prior to upgrading Gentran:Server in your production environment, we recommend that you upgrade the system on a test machine first, then migrate to your production system.

### Procedure

#### Recommendation

Exit all other Windows programs before running the Setup program.

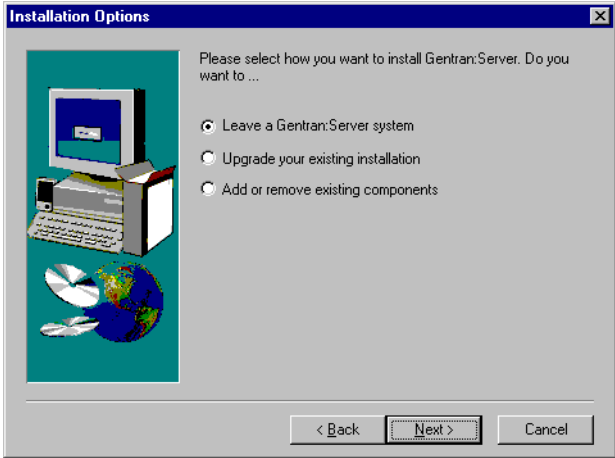

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# Overview

## Introduction

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**In this chapter**

This chapter contains the information you need to install Gentran:Server on a clustered system.

**Notes**

- After installing Gentran:Server for the first time, you need to complete other implementation tasks, including starting the system, adding users, creating communication ports, and validating the installation. This information is provided in chapter 4, Post-installation Tasks.
- If you are installing Gentran:Server in a non-clustered environment, you must use *Installing a Single or Multiple Controller System* on page 2 - 1 instead.
- If you are installing Gentran:Server for the first time, you will use *Installing Gentran:Server* on page 3 - 9. If you are upgrading from a previous version of Gentran:Server, you will use *Upgrading Gentran:Server* on page 3 - 36.

**Recommendation**

Complete the pre-installation tasks prior to using the Setup program to install Gentran:Server.

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**Prerequisites**

The following are prerequisites if you are installing Gentran:Server in a clustered environment:

- You must be logged on to Windows as a local administrator.
- Install Gentran:Server only on a node that currently owns the Cluster resources (necessary at installation time only).
- Ensure that failback is allowed and the node on which you are installing Gentran:Server is set to “Preferred Owner” in Cluster Administrator.

See your Microsoft documentation for more information about using Cluster Administrator.

This section assumes that you have already installed the appropriate operating system on each node and that you have installed either SQL or Oracle as a resident or non-resident database on a machine or machines that are accessible via the network.

**Reference**

See the *Getting Started Guide* for more information about which operating system and database management system versions are supported as resident or non-resident with Gentran:Server.

This installation also assumes that you have a basic understanding of Windows, clustering, and SQL Server/Oracle terminology and functionality, and that you have access to a database administrator (DBA).

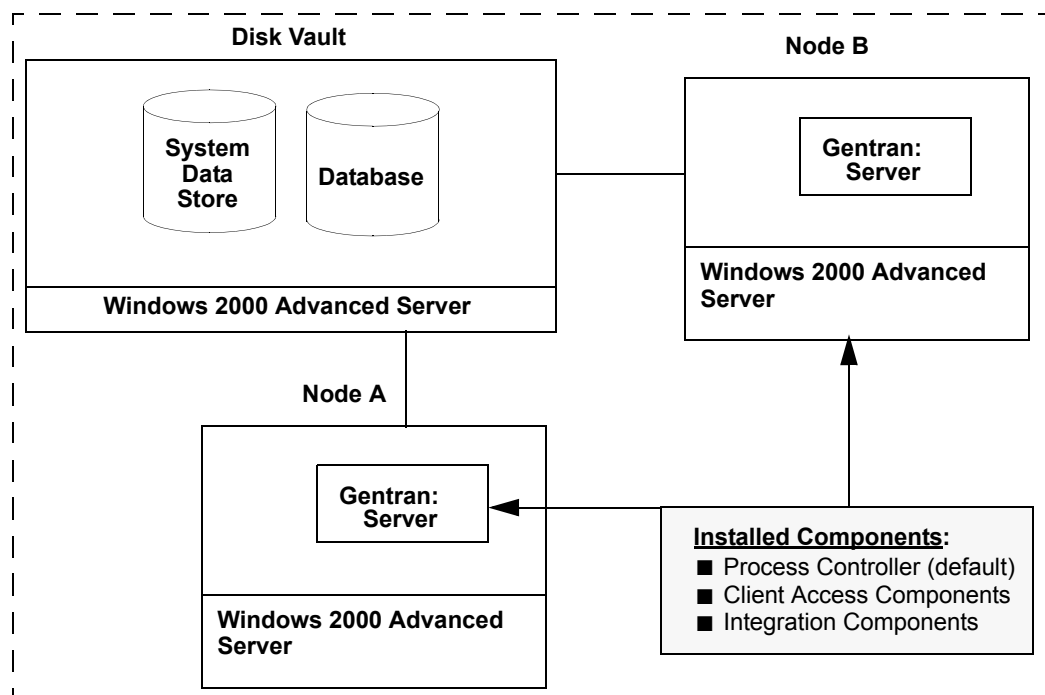
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# Clustered System Overview

**Introduction** In a Clustered system, the Gentran:Server data store resides on the disk vault. The database is resident or non-resident (in one of the configurations documented on the *Getting Started Guide*), and Gentran:Server is installed on one or more nodes.

**Sample clustered system** The following diagram illustrates a sample clustered system. This clustered system consists of one primary Gentran system controller (the disk vault) and two nodes.

The following contains additional information about running Gentran:Server for Windows in a clustered environment:

- Gentran:Server for Windows is not a cluster-aware application, which means that Gentran:Server depends on the Cluster service functionality to maintain the failover capability.
  - Only IP-based communications can be run from the Gentran:Server for Windows Communications controllers, which includes FTP and sockets. You cannot use Gentran asynchronous or bisynchronous communications on a clustered system.
  - Gentran:Server for Windows running under the clustered service only supports Failover; it does not support load-balancing. The only load-balancing that is possible is static load balancing outside the cluster. The primary benefit of a cluster is the ability to ensure application support in the event of a server failure.
  - Data that is processed on the Primary Node may need to be reprocessed if the cluster fails over to a Secondary Node.
  - Gentran:Server only uses the failover process if one or more of the Gentran cluster resources (file systems or services) fail to respond, stop, or end abnormally. High use of other Gentran:Server components that are not set up as resources is not monitored by the cluster.

# Installation Overview

## Introduction

The following sections contain the prerequisite information and preliminary tasks that you need to complete prior to installing Gentran:Server on a clustered system. You should complete these pre-installation tasks prior to using the Setup program to install Gentran:Server.

To perform a new installation of Gentran:Server on the primary Gentran system controller, use the Setup program **Create a new Gentran:Server system** option to make that machine the primary Gentran system controller. To perform an upgrade of your existing Gentran:Server, use the Setup program **Upgrade your existing system** option.

## Process

The following table lists the tasks you need to complete to install Gentran:Server on a distributed system. This table is included as a high-level overview of the installation sequence.

Task	Description
1	<b>Create/Verify Users:</b> On your clustered system, add any new users and verify existing Windows logons for Gentran:Server users.
2	<b>Create the Windows Global Group and Add Users:</b> Create a global group that contains all Gentran:Server users by adding the Windows logons for Gentran:Server users to the group.
3	<b>Create the Windows Local Group and Grant Access to the Global Group:</b> On every node in the cluster, create a local group that contains the global group you created. This group is accessible by all nodes in the cluster.
4	<b>Add Windows User Rights to the Local Group:</b> On every node in the cluster, assign the local group the user rights that Gentran:Server requires.
5	<b>Create Folder for System Data Store:</b> Create the system data store folder (GENSRVNT) on a shared drive that is part of the disk vault.

6	<p><b>Set Up a Clustered Resource for the GENSRVNT Share:</b> Using Cluster Administrator, create a clustered resource for the GENSRVNT share (Resource Type = File Share) so it will maintain the properties of a typical shared folder. Verify that the share has a dependency on the resource that represents the physical disk drive on which you created the GENSRVNT folder. Once the resource is created, bring the File Share resource online.</p> <p><b>Notes</b> Configuration of the File Share, including permissions, should be done through Cluster Administrator—do not configure the file share via Windows Explorer. # Upgrading Gentran:Server

## How to Upgrade your Gentran:Server Clustered Installation

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### Introduction

Use the **Upgrade your existing installation** option on every machine in your Gentran:Server system when you receive upgrades to the Gentran:Server software. In a clustered environment, you *must* upgrade the primary Gentran system controller *first*.

### Notes

- To complete the installation of a clustered system, you must be logged on to Windows as a local administrator.
- If you ever need to uninstall Gentran:Server, see the *Administration Guide* for information about using the Gentran:Server Installation Setup program “Leave a system” option.

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### Gentran:Server for RosettaNet prerequisite

#### Warning

The Gentran:Server for RosettaNet depends on the Microsoft Internet Information Service (IIS) for HTTP-related communications. Since the use of IIS requires the Gentran:Server for Windows dynamic libraries to be open, the installation of Gentran:Server will fail if IIS is running at installation time. Therefore, we recommend that you stop the IIS service *prior to* installing Gentran:Server.

You can stop IIS by stopping the **World Wide Web Publishing Service** and the **IIS Admin Service** from the Services dialog box (select each service from the list and click **Stop**). If you are running a Windows 2000 or Windows 2003 operating system, you can access the Internet Services dialog box from your **Start** menu by selecting **Settings > Control Panel > Administrative Tools**, and then selecting **Internet Services Manager**.

#### Note

Be aware that if you use Gentran:Server for RosettaNet and are upgrading from Gentran:Server for Windows 3.x to 5.1, there are tasks you will need to perform after installing Gentran:Server for Windows 5.1 and Gentran:Server for RosettaNet 5.1, and you should allot time to complete these post-installation tasks.

#### Reference

See How to Upgrade Gentran:Server for RosettaNet in the *Gentran:Server for RosettaNet Installation Card* for more information about these post-installation tasks.

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### Troubleshooting a failed installation

Setup maintains a log of every scripted command that it executed. Automatic recovery determines the point at which the install process failed and attempts to resume installation from that point. It does not reverse the previously executed commands. The following are examples of the type of errors that this automatic process recovers from:

- the database server crashing or being accidentally unplugged
  - the network failing
  - a power outage
-

### Backing up your database prior to upgrade

Prior to upgrading Gentran:Server, we recommend that you perform a synchronous backup of your entire Gentran:Server system, including the database, data store, and your Windows registry. After performing the backup, you should verify its integrity.

### Upgrading a test machine

Prior to upgrading Gentran:Server in your production environment, we recommend that you upgrade the system on a test machine first, then migrate to your production system.

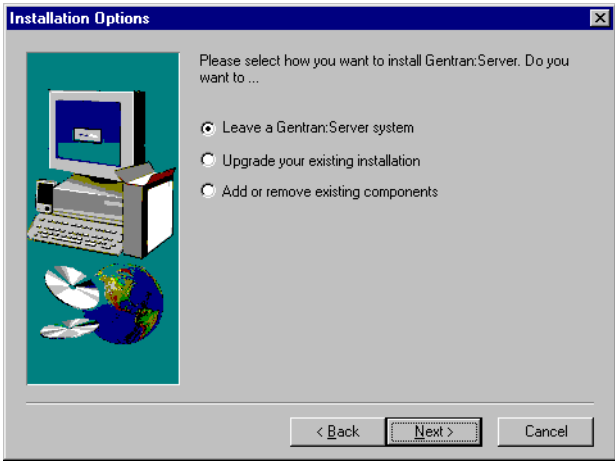

System security is an important ongoing step in controlling who can log on to your system and which functions they can access. Security ensures the integrity of your data by limiting who can make changes to specific areas of the system. Gentran:Server supports three security modes: Integrated, Mixed, and Standard.

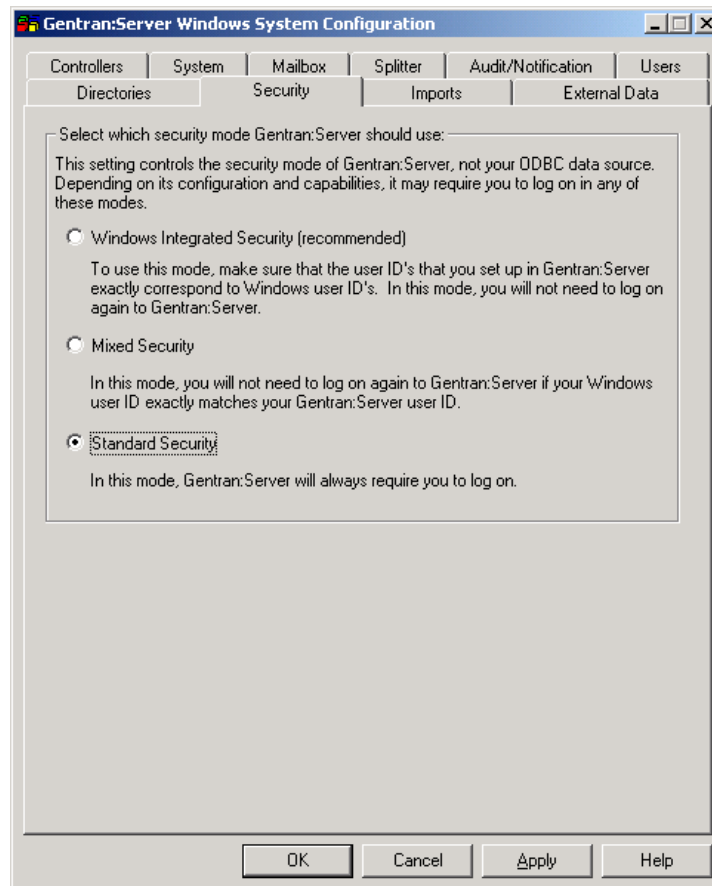
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## Use Standard Security Mode with Gentran

**Introduction** For Oracle users, we recommend that you accept the default Gentran:Server security mode, which is *Standard*. Standard security mode always requires the user to log on to Gentran:Server. The Windows user name is defaulted on the Logon dialog box.

**Diagram** The Security tab of the Gentran:Server System Configuration dialog box is configured (by default) as follows:



**Procedure** In *Post-installation Tasks*, chapter 4 of this guide, we recommend that you set the Gentran:Server security mode to *Integrated* (security options are set on the Security tab of the System Configuration subsystem). Disregard the recommendation of using Integrated security and the *How to Implement Security* section in that chapter.

### Warning

We strongly recommend that you do *not* use Integrated (or Mixed) security with Oracle, because Oracle security does not interface by default with Windows security.

<p>You run the Setup program in a non-clustered environment and are prompted with the question “Do you want to make this machine a secondary node in a clustered Gentran:Server system?” with the choice of clicking <b>Yes</b> or <b>No</b>.</p>	<p>When Setup checked the registry on this machine, it found registry keys for Gentran:Server but no Gentran:Server services (which would be the case if you were installing the system on a secondary node in a clustered environment). In a non-clustered environment, click <b>No</b> and the Gentran:Server install will proceed.</p> <p><b>Note</b> If you click <b>No</b> and Setup encounters a problem with your system, the installation routine will exit. While running the Setup program, if you receive an error containing a return code, the error is an InstallShield error.

This section describes common InstallShield error messages. If you still have questions about an InstallShield error message, please contact Gentran:Server Customer Support.

## Return code value table

The following table contains the InstallShield return codes, listed by return code value. This table describes the corresponding error message and, when possible, a suggested reason the error occurred.

These messages were obtained from InstallShield. They may not be the most current version.

-7	Header information of compressed file is incorrect. <b>Suggested resolution</b> Make sure file is compressed and not corrupted.

Gentran:Server uses a relational database to store tracking, audit, process control, translation object, and partner information in tables.

The database tables contain indicators that point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). This relational database enables multiple users to access the same data.

Gentran:Server uses ODBC (Open Database Connectivity) to use databases from different vendors, including SQL Server.

#### Note

ODBC and Microsoft Data Access Components (MDAC) are installed when you install SQL Server.

This appendix outlines the tasks necessary to configure an SQL Server installation *only* when installing SQL Server for the first time.

Prior to installing Gentran:Server, you must complete the following tasks:

- Create the database that contains the Gentran:Server tables. (These database tables are built during the Gentran:Server installation.)

- Configure the ODBC data source name (DSN) for use with your database.

## Pre-installation Requirements

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**Reference** See the *Getting Started Guide* for more information about the required software that is certified for use with Gentran:Server.

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**SQL Server space requirement** SQL Server 2000 requires more available hard disk space than the previous versions. The SQL Server Setup installation program allows you specify where to install the SQL Server program and data files. However, the Setup program also installs files in the system directory, and you cannot change the system file location.

**Reference** See the SQL installation documentation for more information about hard disk space requirements.

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## How to Back up your Database

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**Overview** We recommend that you back up your SQL Server database periodically. We also recommend that you perform the database maintenance endorsed by Microsoft.

Any issues relating to backing up or restoring your SQL database, and any questions on the use of any Microsoft maintenance utility, should be referred to Microsoft. Microsoft product information, support, and additional resources are available at the following website:

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### Backup considerations

You should consider the following questions before creating your backup strategy:

- How often should backups be performed?
  - Which data should be backed up (for example, full database or transaction log)?
  - To what medium will the backup be written (for example, tape or disk)?
  - Will the backups be performed online (while users are working) or would it be prudent to schedule them after hours?
  - Will the backups be performed manually or using an automatic scheduling facility?
  - If the backups are performed on an automatically scheduled basis, how can you verify that a backup occurred without errors?
  - How long will you save a backup before you reuse the storage medium?
  - If necessary, how long will it take you to restore the system using the last backup?
  - Do you have a procedure by which you can ensure that previous system backups are still intact and can be reapplied if necessary?
  - Where will you store backups?
  - Do the necessary people have access to the storage facility?
  - Who is responsible for overseeing the backup process and ensuring that it is performed correctly?
  - If the local administrator is unavailable, does anyone else have the requisite knowledge and access to the proper passwords to perform the backup and restore procedures?

- The SQL Server configuration is flexible and provides numerous options. We recommend that you research the configuration capabilities of SQL to determine which settings are optimal for your installation, based on the volume of data you expect.

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## How Gentran:Server uses databases

Gentran:Server uses a relational database to store tracking, audit, process control, transaction object, and partner information in tables.

The database tables contain indicators that point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). This relational database enables multiple users to access the same data.

Gentran:Server uses ODBC (Open Database Connectivity) to use databases from different vendors, including Oracle.

### Notes

- The default Oracle ODBC drivers are installed when you install Oracle. If you need to use drivers other than the default drivers, you must install them separately.
- Support for Oracle databases does not include support for the Oracle Exadata platform.

---

## Summary of tasks

Prior to installing Gentran:Server, you must be familiar with Oracle and must set up Oracle for use with Gentran:Server.

Additionally, your Oracle database administrator (DBA) must either create a new instance (database) for Gentran:Server or set up new table space for Gentran:Server in an existing instance.

The steps that you need to perform to complete these tasks are specific to the database management system you are using.

## Install SQL \*Net on Every Machine

---

### **Introduction**

Prior to installing Gentran:Server on any machine, SQL \*Net must be installed and configured on that machine. This software enables the machine to interface with Oracle.

The name of the alias (SQL \*Net Connect String) is determined by your Oracle DBA. There are no naming restrictions.

### **Note**

The alias name is referenced in the ODBC Setup. You should record this name for later use. Other versions of Oracle also refer to SQL \*Net as a “Net Service.”

---

## Define New Tablespace for Database Tables

---

### Introduction

We suggest that you define a new tablespace in Oracle where the Gentran:Server database tables can be created. This ensures that the database tables are not created in the system tablespace.

---

## Create New DB Administrator Account

---

### **Introduction**

Prior to installing Gentran:Server, we recommend that you set up a new database administrator (DBA) account to be used to create the database tables when installing Gentran:Server.

### **Recommendation**

We recommend that you use the same Windows administrative account that the Gentran:Server Executive service uses to log on to Windows.

When creating the new DBA logon, assign the new tablespace you created for the Gentran:Server database tables to be the default for this account.

### **Note**

The Gentran:Server database tables are created under the schema of this account.

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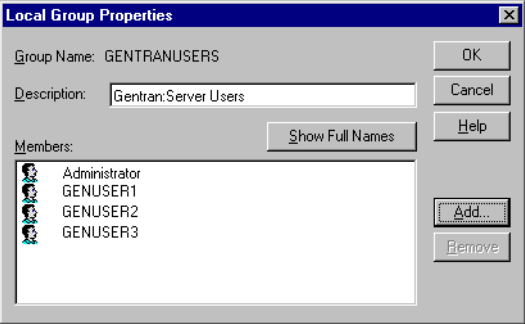
## Add Gentran Users to ORACLE

**Introduction** You must add each Gentran:Server user to Oracle. Oracle does not interface with Window security, so if you set up a Windows group containing all Gentran:Server users, Oracle does not recognize the group.

The roles (rights) that you must grant to these users are the following:

- Select
- Insert
- Delete
- Update

**Procedure** Use this procedure to verify the Gentran:Server users that you need to add to Oracle.

## Add Gentran:Server Executive Log On Account to Oracle

**Introduction** You must grant DBA rights (roles) to one user so the Gentran:Server Executive service can log on. You must add this account to Oracle.

**Recommendation**

We recommend that you use the same Windows administrative account that the Gentran:Server Executive service uses to log on to Windows. We also recommend that this account is the same as your database administrator account.

After Gentran:Server is installed, this is the account that is displayed when you select the Gentran:Server Executive service on the Services dialog box and click Startup (to display the Services dialog box, select Programs > Control Panel > Services from the Start menu).

**Diagram** The following is an example of the Service dialog box, which displays the account that the Gentran:Server Executive service uses to log on to Windows.



## Change the Default Number of Open Cursors

**Introduction** The default number of open cursors allowed in Oracle is 50 (this number may vary depending on which version of Oracle you are using). To run production electronic commerce (EC), an average company may need this number set to 5000 or greater.

You need to change the number of open cursors in the Oracle Startup file, which is typically located in ORACLE\ORADATA. The name of the Startup file is "init\*\*\*\*.ora", where "\*\*\*\*" is the name of the instance.

**Note**

Oracle 9i uses a PFILE and SPFILE for configuration purposes.

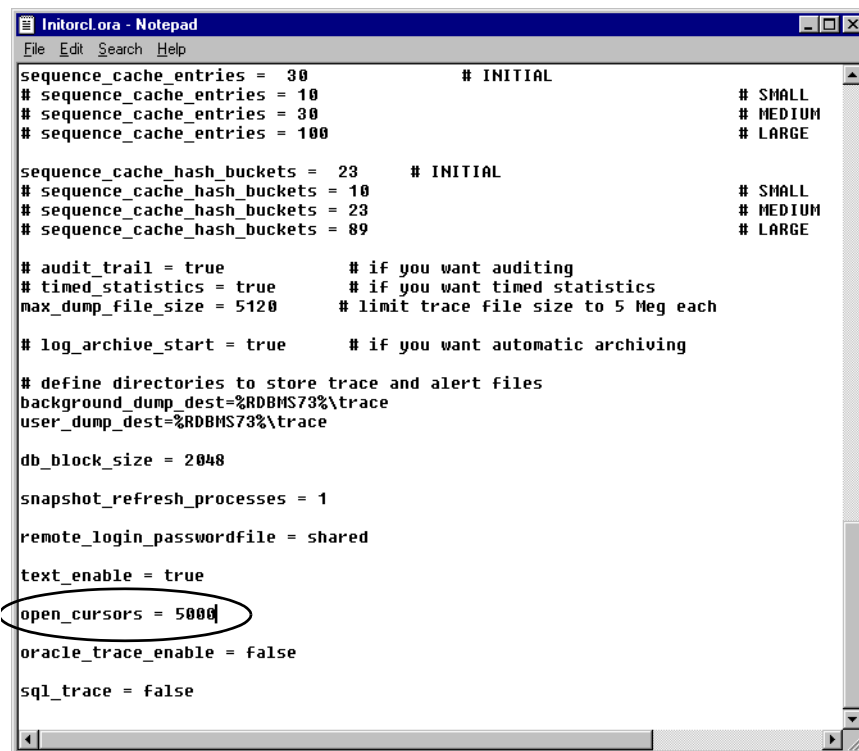
**Procedure** To change the number of open cursors, add the following line anywhere in the Startup file:

```
open_cursors = 5000
```

**Note**

For Oracle 9i, you must add this line into the PFILE.

**Example** The following illustrates how to change the default number of open cursors.

## Use Oracle Database ODBC drivers with Gentran:Server

---

### Introduction

There is an issue with the Oracle ODBC drivers that prevents Gentran:Server for Windows from working properly with the ODBC drivers supplied by Oracle for use with Oracle databases. Sterling Commerce has contacted Oracle and it is a known issue in their ODBC drivers that causes the ADO RecordCount property to always return a value of -1. The Oracle BUG number for checking on the status of fixes for this issue is 11962102.600.

---

### Effect in Gentran:Server

The Oracle ODBC issue only affects the Gentran:Server Audit Notification service because this service uses this function of ODBC in its programming. No other Gentran:Server services use this function, and thus they are not affected by this issue.

### Warning

If the ODBC driver is not installed and configured before Gentran:Server is installed or upgraded, the Gentran:Server Audit Notification Service will fail to start. This prevents any other Gentran:Server services from starting. Additionally, failure to install or upgrade the ODBC driver may result in database corruption.

---

### Resolution

Until Oracle resolves this issue, you must use two ODBC Data Sources as a “work-around” resolution. After following the directions listed in *Procedure to use before installing a new Gentran:Server 5.1 system* on page 7 - 10, your system will use two Data Source Names (DSNs)—one DSN using the Microsoft ODBC for Oracle driver and the other using the ODBC driver supplied by Oracle. The Microsoft DSN is associated with the Gentran Audit Notification Service and the Oracle DSN is associated with Gentran:Server Mailbox, Gentran:Server Executive, and Gentran:Server Communications services.

### Note

See the *Getting Started Guide* for the supported version information for both the Microsoft Data Access Components (MDAC) and the Oracle ODBC driver. The Microsoft ODBC for Oracle driver is installed when you install MDAC.

3	<p>Begin your Gentran:Server installation.</p> <p><b>Reference</b> See <i>How to Install a Primary Gentran System Controller</i> on page 2 - 18 or <i>How to Install Gentran:Server on the Primary Node</i> on page 3 - 14 for more information.</p>
4	<p>When the install prompts for the name of the DSN you want to use with Gentran:Server, type the DSN you created with the Microsoft ODBC for Oracle driver.</p>
5	<p>Finish the installation of the primary Gentran system controller and apply any necessary options from the Option Pack CD.</p> <p>If you want to verify your installation, continue with Steps 6 through 15. 8	<p>Select the <b>Audit/Notification</b> tab and click <b>Server</b>.</p> <p><b>System response</b> The system displays the Gentran Audit/Notification Server Properties dialog box, which enables you to configure database and notification server options.</p>
9	<p>Verify that ODBC Data Source setting for Audit/Notification (in the ODBC Data Source list) indicates the DSN that uses the Microsoft ODBC driver. Change the setting if necessary.</p>
10	<p>Click <b>OK</b> to exit the System Configuration utility.</p>
11	<p>Run the Gentran Mailbox Server Manager by selecting (from the <b>Start</b> menu) <b>Programs &gt; Gentran Server &gt; Gentran Server Mailbox</b>.</p> <p><b>System response</b> The system displays the Mailbox Server Manager.</p>
