What is the System Information Messenger?

The System Information Messenger (SIM) is a software utility that automatically collects data from an Image Services system and sends it to FileNet via email. If enabled, it runs as a background task once a day to collect performance statistics, license usage data, system configuration data, and software registration information. SIM sends collected data to FileNet or customer designated recipients once a week via email. For security purposes, SIM only uses outgoing email. In addition, SIM is turned off by default and will execute only if it is intentionally configured.

What type of data does it collect?

The System Information Messenger collects the following data:

- Server Configuration Information comprised of the following:
 - Server Name
 - Server Machine ID Number
 - Operating System Name
 - Operating System Version Number
 - Server Manufacturer
 - Server Model
 - Server Model Type
 - Server Model ID
 - Total Number of CPUs
 - Number of Enabled CPUs
 - CPU Type
 - CPU Speed
 - Amount of Physical Memory
 - Amount of Paging/Swap Space

- Language/Locale Setting
 - Local Time Zone
 - Image Services Version Number
 - Oracle Version Number
 - Image Services System Serial Number
- Daily CSS Performance Reports which contain the following:
 - Percentage of time that the CPU was completely idle
 - Percentage of time that the CPU was running kernel code
 - Percentage of time that the CPU was running user code
 - Percentage of time that the CPU was spent waiting on I/O to complete
 - Number of disk operations per second
 - Current and Peak number of users logged in to Image Services
 - The current Configuration Database file which contains the configuration settings for Image Services.
 - Software Registration Information comprised of the following:
 - Image Services SystemID Number*
 - Company Name*
 - Phone Number of Server's Modem
 - System Administrator's:
 - Name
 - Title
 - Company Division Name & Department Name
 - Email Address
 - Phone Number
 - Fax Number
 - Mailing Address
 - Shipping Address
- * Items marked with an asterisk are required for security reasons. Although most items are optional, FileNet encourages customers to provide all applicable data to keep records current.

Who will have access to the data?

To protect customer data, only FileNet personnel will have access to the data sent to FileNet, and this data will be kept confidential and will only be used by FileNet. However, for those customers who want to send the SIM data reports to additional recipients, SIM provides an option for that.

What are the benefits?

- This software will keep FileNet updated with the latest configuration and statistical information from customer systems without relying on manual data entry.
- The data collected from a customer's system can be sent to additional email addresses defined by the customer so that local administrators, partners, or resellers can also keep track of system statistics.
- Having accurate version information for the operating system, Oracle, and Image Services software, for the entire customer base, allows FileNet to determine what direct upgrade paths must be provided for in future automated upgrade utilities.
- The **SvrInfo** command displays several key pieces of server and system information as shown in the following example:

- The **ISRegstr** command allows customers to define, display, and update software registration information whenever necessary. The software registration data is stored on the Image Services server which provides quick and easy access for customers. In addition, FileNet is automatically updated every week with any changes. Having accurate and current software registration data helps FileNet improve communications with customers.
- The **mailit** command makes it easier to send email with attachments (such as log files) directly from the server.
- All of the utilities work with the Image Services software but do not require the Image Services software to be either running or stopped.

How does it work and does it impact system performance?

The System Information Messenger runs as a background task once a day so it does not impact system performance. It works with Image Services performance **utilities** to collect information during each daily execution, and every Monday, the data collected from the previous week is emailed to FileNet. The UNIX sendmail utility is used to route the outgoing email from the customer's Image Services server to their network mail server for delivery to FileNet and/or any customer designated recipients.

Customer Security Concerns

Making a connection from the Image Services server to Internet mail services may raise security concerns for some customers, and that is why the System Information Messenger was designed to use only *out-*

going email. In most Enterprise environments, the network mail server controls the flow of incoming email. By default, most mail servers will allow other computers on the customer's network to send email to the Image Services server, but will block all incoming Internet email. This can be tested by simply sending an email from an external email address to a mailbox on the Image Services server and checking if it is received. To be certain that the email address is correct, it is usually easier to simply *reply to* an email sent *from* the Image Services server.

What if External Email Service is not available from the server?

If external email is not available on the Image Services server, other methods exist for sending the data to FileNet. These methods are explained in the next chapter under Data Send Mode options.

Documentation Conventions

The following conventions have been used throughout this document:

- `System Input/Output in screen shot examples is displayed in this font type.`
- In screen shot examples, **User input** is highlighted in yellow to distinguish input from output.
- **Points of special interest** are highlighted in blue.

Please read the entire document before beginning software configuration. An understanding of the process and knowledge of required input will help insure that the process runs smoothly.

Preparing for Software Configuration

Prerequisites

- This release applies only to Image Services running on UNIX platforms.
- Note that SIM should be configured to run on all IS servers, not just the root server.

Preparation

Prior to starting the software configuration, you will need to:

- Get the **System ID** of the FileNet Image Services system.
 - The System ID is typically a 6 digit number and is unique to each FileNet system. The System ID can be found on all packing slips and software license documentation. The System ID is also referred to as the CID or SysID. However, it is not the SSN, although some SSNs contain the System ID. It is very important to find and use the correct value for each FileNet system.
- Identify the formal Company Name of the customer. The following criteria should be used for the Company Name:

- It should be the name that the company uses to formally identify itself in official correspondence.
- It should be the name of the company actually using the Image Services software (not the reseller or partner's name).
- It should be verbose in order to facilitate searching by Company Name in FileNet's database.
- It can be a maximum of 65 characters.
- Note, the System ID and Company Name settings for non-Root servers must match the corresponding values defined for the Root server. However, other configuration and contact settings can be unique to each server, and for widely distributed systems it can be very useful to define site specific contacts.
- Discuss the features and options of the System Information Messenger with the customer and determine if outgoing email needs to be configured on the IS server. If it does, the following information will be needed for sendmail configuration:
 - The fully qualified Server Name and IP address of the customer's mail server that routes their company's email.
 - In many network environments, the name "mailhost" is defined as an alias for the primary mail server. Try pinging mailhost from any system using DNS. A positive reply should yield the IP address of the network mail server. Then use nslookup on the returned IP address to determine the fully qualified network name of the mail server.
 - Otherwise, the company's IT department should be able to provide this information. However, it may take a few days to get a response so it should be requested well in advance.

- For AIX platforms also determine:
 - The Host Name of the IS server
 - The hostname command will return this information
 - The Domain Name for the IS server
 - If the server uses DNS, then the domain name can be found in `/etc/resolv.conf`. Otherwise, ask the system or network administrator.

- Determine the **Data Send Mode** to be used for this system. The Data Send Mode defines how collected data will be sent to FileNet. The data communication process needs to be explained to the customer so they can select whichever Data Send Mode is appropriate for their company. It is important to point out that SIM only sends data from the Image Services server and never receives any data via email. The reason there are different options for sending the data to FileNet is to accommodate different security environments. There are 3 Data Send Modes defined as follows:
 - **Normal Mode:**
 - Data is automatically emailed once a week to FileNet at `PSE@FileNet.com`. The data is also emailed to any optional addresses entered into the Email Address List so the customer can receive the data as well.
 - This is the preferred mode since it is completely automated.
 - **Forwarded Mode:**
 - Data is not sent directly to FileNet. It is emailed on a weekly basis to the addresses in the Email Address List, and the email contains instructions for the System Administrator to forward the email to `PSE@FileNet.com`.

- Customers who need to review outgoing data before it is sent to FileNet will want to use this mode.
- **Manual Mode:**
 - Automatic email is disabled, and the data is archived to a local directory.
 - The Image Services System Administrator will need to periodically:
 - collect the data from the Archive subdirectory (/fnswh/local/logs/SIM/Archive/...),
 - transfer the data to a system where it can be emailed,
 - email it to FileNet at PSE@FileNet.com, and
 - remove the subdirectory containing the data just sent.
 - Detailed instructions for manually sending data to FileNet are provided in Chapter 4.
 - Customers will need to use this mode if they do not want email services configured on their IS servers, or have network configurations where the IS server cannot communicate with the mail server used for routing company email.
- Determine the time of day that the System Information Messenger should be scheduled to run.
 - SIM does not require the Image Services software to be either running or stopped. It only requires that the server be in a multi-user state for it to run. However, as a precaution, it should not be scheduled to start between 23:45 and 24:00 to avoid execution during a date change.
 - SIM can normally be scheduled to run during off-peak hours. However, on SUN SPARC 10000 Series servers using Dynamic

System Domains and dynamic processor allocation, it should be scheduled to run during typical peak usage periods in order to get an accurate count of the number of processors being used.

- The default time that SIM is scheduled to start is 19:30, and this can be customized for each site noting the above conditions.
- Determine if there are any additional email addresses to which data reports should be sent.
 - If the Data Send Mode is Normal then the FileNet email address is automatically included in the Email Address List. Additional entries to the Email Address List are optional. However, the customer may want to add some of their own email addresses to the list so they can review the data being sent back to FileNet.
 - If the Data Send Mode is Forwarded, then the FileNet email address is removed from the Email Address List. In this mode, the purpose of the Email Address List is to define customer email addresses that will receive the data. It is intended that the Image Services System Administrator will be on this list and will be responsible for forwarding the email to FileNet at PSE@FileNet.com.
 - If the Data Send Mode is Manual, then the Email Address List is ignored.
- Get contact information for the System Administrator. See the sample data below for details.

To help identify all of the information needed for a complete installation, a form and sample data are provided on the following pages.

Setup and Configuration for UNIX Platforms

Perform the following steps to configure the System Information Messenger.

1. IDENTIFY REQUIRED CONFIGURATION INFORMATION AS DEFINED IN THE PREVIOUS CHAPTER.
2. LOGIN AS ROOT TO THE IMAGE SERVICES SERVER.
3. CHECK OPERATING SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS.
 - Follow the instructions in [Appendix A: Operating System Software Requirements](#) to verify requirements for the appropriate OS.
4. CONFIGURE & TEST THE EMAIL SYSTEM.

This only needs to be performed if the System Information Messenger or other utilities will be sending mail to other systems. Skip to [Step 5](#) if outgoing mail will not be utilized or follow the instructions below to configure and test outgoing mail.

 - A. Check If Sendmail Is Already Configured.

To determine if sendmail is already configured, ask the local system administrator or try sending a test mail message with the mailit command as documented in [Step 4C](#).

B. Configure Sendmail

If sendmail needs to be configured, follow the instructions for the appropriate operating system in [Appendix B: Configuring Sendmail](#).

C. Send A Test Mail Message:

- mailit -SIMtest
 - Follow the on-screen prompts to enter a destination email address.

Note: It is a good idea to use an external email address for testing if actual usage will send email to addresses external to the company. This is because the mail system may allow message delivery within the company's domain but require additional configuration for external routing.
 - This usage of mailit will send a predefined message and attachment to the recipient.
 - For a sample execution of this command, see [Appendix D: Mail Test Example](#).
- Determine if the test mail message was received.
 - Note that it may take a few minutes to deliver the message depending on system load and network traffic.
 - If the mail message was received **and** it contained a readable attachment, then the mail system is properly configured, and you can proceed to [Step 5](#).
 - If the mail message was not received, and sendmail has not yet been configured, return to [Step 4B](#) to configure sendmail.
 - Otherwise, proceed to [Step 4D](#) to resolve the problem.

D. Resolve Mail System Problems

- If the mail message was received, but the attachment was missing or was included as encoded text in the message body, install the latest mailx patch for your operating system.
 - If the mail message was not received, it may have been returned to your local mailbox as undeliverable.
 - To check if the mail was returned, run the mailx command and look for a message with a subject of "Returned mail...". If it was returned, read the returned message for an explanation of the problem.
 - If the mail message was not received and not returned, use the techniques discussed in [Appendix C: Troubleshooting Sendmail](#) to resolve the problem.
 - Return to [Step 4C](#) and send another test message to re-test outgoing mail.
5. ENTER SOFTWARE REGISTRATION INFORMATION FOR IMAGE SERVICES.
- From the command line, run:
 - ISRegstr
 - Follow the on-screen prompts to:
 - enter the SystemID & Company name (MAKE SURE THESE ARE CORRECT).
 - enter optional user information such as the System Administrator's name, phone number, email address, mailing address, and shipping address.
 - For a sample execution, see [Appendix E: Registration Example](#).
 - Encourage the customer to provide all applicable information so that communications can be improved and kept up to date.

- Make sure the customer is aware that they can update this information whenever necessary by running ISRegstr.
6. CONFIGURE THE SIM DATA DELIVERY OPTIONS.
- From the command line, run:
 - ISSIMcfg
 - Follow the on-screen prompts to:
 - select the appropriate Data Send Mode, and
 - enter any desired customer email addresses.
 - In addition to defining delivery options, this command will add a default entry in the root crontab for the System Information Messenger.
 - For a sample execution, see [Appendix F: Configuration Example](#).
7. ACTIVATE THE NEW CRONTAB ENTRY.
- From the command line, run:
 - crontab -e
 - This command runs vi to edit the crontab, and it notifies cron that table entries have changed.
 - If desired, change the time of day that the System Information Messenger is scheduled to run.
 - If the execution time does not need to be changed, the crontab must still be modified in some manner so that cron will process the new entry for SIM.
 - For example, simply overwrite a space with another space.
 - Save and exit vi with: <ESC>:x or <ESC>ZZ

8. RUN SvrInfo TO DISPLAY SERVER CONFIGURATION INFORMATION.
 - From the command line, run:
 - SvrInfo
 - This command will display configuration information for the server.
 - Please review this data and report any errors or anomalies since this data will be collected by the System Information Messenger.
 - Note that SvrInfo can be installed and used as a stand-alone utility to display configuration data of new servers *prior* to the installation of Image Services software.

9. LOGOFF OF THE SERVER.

10. PROVIDE FEEDBACK IF DESIRED.
 - Email comments and suggestions to PSE@FileNet.com and use the phrase "**SIM: Comments and Suggestions**" in the Subject Line.

 - If you find any errors or anomalies, please email a detailed description to PSE@FileNet.com and use the phrase "**SIM: Problem Report**" in the Subject Line.

Manual Data Delivery

If the SIM Data Send Mode is set to "Manual Mode" then collected data is saved each week to a local directory instead of being sent via email. The Image Services System Administrator should send the data to FileNet every Tuesday, and this chapter provides instructions to accomplish this task.

Archive Directory

The directory, /fnsw/local/logs/SIM/Archive, contains subdirectories which store the SIM data for each week. The names of those subdirectories correspond to the date the reports were "submitted" to the Archive. Each Archive subdirectory should contain the following files:

- CSS_Perf.txt
- SIM_Log.txt
- UserData.txt
- MsgBody.txt
- Status.txt
- IS_CDB.txt *
- SIM_Cfg.txt
- SvrInfo.txt

* IS_CDB.txt will only exist on root servers

The file named MsgBody.txt contains basic instructions for emailing the data to FileNet. This file also contains the text for the message body of the email. The other files in the directory are the SIM data files and should be attached to the bottom of the email message.

Collecting and Sending the Data

Every Monday, the SIM data for the previous week is submitted to the Archive directory. The precise time the data is submitted depends on SIM's scheduled execution time, but by Tuesday morning, the previous week's data will be ready to send to FileNet. Ideally, the data should be

sent to FileNet once a week. However, if more than one week's data is being sent at a time, please send a separate email for each week. In other words, each subdirectory under the Archive directory goes in one email. The steps below summarize how to collect and send one week's data to FileNet:

1. Transfer the Archive subdirectory and its contents to a system that has email capabilities. The data files are all ASCII text files so it is not necessary to use a binary transfer.
2. Start a new mail message and insert (as text) the contents of MsgBody.txt into the body of the new mail message. The message body now contains basic instructions including the target email address and text for the subject line.
3. Copy and paste the email address (PSE@FileNet.com) from the message body into the "TO:" field of the email.
4. Copy and paste the subject (FileNet IS System Information Reports from SystemID:) from the message body into the "SUBJECT:" field of the email.
5. Attach all of the other files from the Archive subdirectory to the bottom of the email.
6. Note, it is not necessary to delete the instructions from the message body.
7. Send the email.
8. Remove the Archive subdirectory (which contains the data just emailed) from both the local system and the Image Services system. Note, delete only the appropriate subdirectory (not the Archive directory itself).

AIX Requirements

1. No additional software packages or patches are needed since the OS requirements for this version of Image Services include minimum required versions of sendmail and mailx.
2. Verify the existence of `/usr/sbin/sendmail` and `/usr/bin/mailx` to be certain that required OS utilities were not accidentally omitted or removed.

HP-UX Requirements

1. No additional software packages or patches are needed since the OS requirements for this version of Image Services include minimum required versions of sendmail and mailx.
2. Verify the existence of `/usr/sbin/sendmail` and `/usr/bin/mailx` to be certain that required OS utilities were not accidentally omitted or removed.

Solaris Requirements

1. No additional software packages or patches are needed since the OS requirements for this version of Image Services include minimum required versions of sendmail and mailx.
2. Verify the existence of `/usr/lib/sendmail` and `/usr/bin/mailx` to be certain that required OS utilities were not accidentally omitted or removed.

Appendix B – Configuring SENDMAIL

Configuring sendmail on AIX

1. Backup the current Sendmail Configuration file
cp /etc/mail/sendmail.cf /etc/mail/sendmail.orig
2. Create a new Sendmail Configuration file for this server
 - Copy the sample sendmail.cf file to use as a baseline:
cp /usr/lpp/bos.net/inst_root/etc/mail/sendmail.cf /etc/mail/sendmail.cf
 - Define entries in the sendmail.cf file for the HostName, DomainName, and the fully qualified MailHost name.
 - Note, these entries are very simple, but they are case sensitive. The entries are defined by prefixing the actual name with a particular string:
 - The HostName entry is defined by prefixing the string "Dw" to the actual host name of the system. (The quotes should not be included in the actual entry).
 - The DomainName entry is defined by prefixing the string "Dm" to the actual domain name for the system.
 - The MailHost entry is defined by prefixing the string "DSsmtp:" to the fully qualified name of the mail server. (The fully qualified name is server name with the domain name.)
 - Note, the current sendmail.cf file has sample entries in it. The plan is to edit sendmail.cf, search for each sample entry, and redefine the sample entry using actual names. The table below defines the literal strings to search for:

<u>Entry Name</u>	<u>Literal string to search for</u>
HostName (Dw)	#DwYourHostName
DomainName (Dm)	#DmYourDomainName
MailHost (DS)	#DSmailer:relayhostname

- Using your favorite editor make the following changes to `/etc/sendmail.cf`:
 - Find: `#DwYourHostName`
 - Uncomment the sample entry by removing the `#` sign.
 - Replace the string "YourHostName" with the actual host name of the server.
 - Find: `#DwYourDomainName`
 - Uncomment the sample entry by removing the `#` sign.
 - Replace the string "YourDomainName" with the actual domain name for the server.
 - Find: `#DSmailer:relayhostname`
 - Uncomment the sample entry by removing the `#` sign.
 - Replace the string "mailer:relayhostname" with the string "smtp:" followed by the fully qualified name of the mail server.
 - If there is a blank DS entry (DS on a line by itself) below the DS entry you just created, delete the blank DS entry by removing the line.
 - Save the file and exit the editor

Solution:

This server uses a hosts file instead of DNS. The mail server is properly defined in the hosts file and the mail server can be pinged. DEFINITIONS:

address: Email address to send mail message to.

filename: Pathname of file to attach. All attachments will be encoded with uuencode.

OPTIONS:

-f filename: Attach binary or ASCII file with no data conversion.

-fc filename: Convert ASCII UNIX file to Microsoft ASCII file format and then attach. This option should only be specified for ASCII files. It is very useful when sending files with .txt extensions to Outlook users, since it allows the file to be displayed with the default viewer.

- Note that the local (source) file is not altered. Only the attachment is modified.
- fct filename: Same as -fc option but adds a '.txt' extension to the name used for the attachment. This option is very useful when sending ASCII files that don't have '.txt' extensions to Outlook users, since it allows the file to be displayed by simply clicking on the attachment.
- Neither the name nor contents of the local (source) file is altered. Only the attachment is modified.
- SIMtest: Send a pre-defined message with a CSS performance report attachment similar to a SIM message for test purposes. This will exercise the functions needed by the System Information Messenger to identify potential problems and verify that the mail system is fully functional and will properly send attachments.
- ?: Displays this usage summary.

PROMPTS:

The user will be interactively prompted to enter the Subject Line and text for the Message Body (except when using the -SIMtest option). Plus, the user will be given the opportunity to edit the Message Body text with vi after initial text input.

If email addresses are not entered on the command line, the user will be prompted to enter at least one. This is useful on systems where the '@' sign has been defined as the kill character (which inhibits entry of fully qualified addresses).

If no attachments are specified on the command line, the user will be prompted for them. However, attachments are not required.

EXAMPLE:

To send an email to Pat@FileNet.com containing all of the FileNet error logs for the month of February 2006 and convert the logs to Microsoft Text files:
