Customers need to develop applications which access information from a variety of traditional and nontraditional sources. Such systems have a wide variety of uses, from linking together disparate applications, to disseminating real-time information, to integrating communications with external partners. This presentation will cover new support and new development tools that simplify building these complex applications. It will show how you can develop synchronous and asynchronous applications that mix traditional SQL and Stored Procedures with XML, Messaging and WebServices.

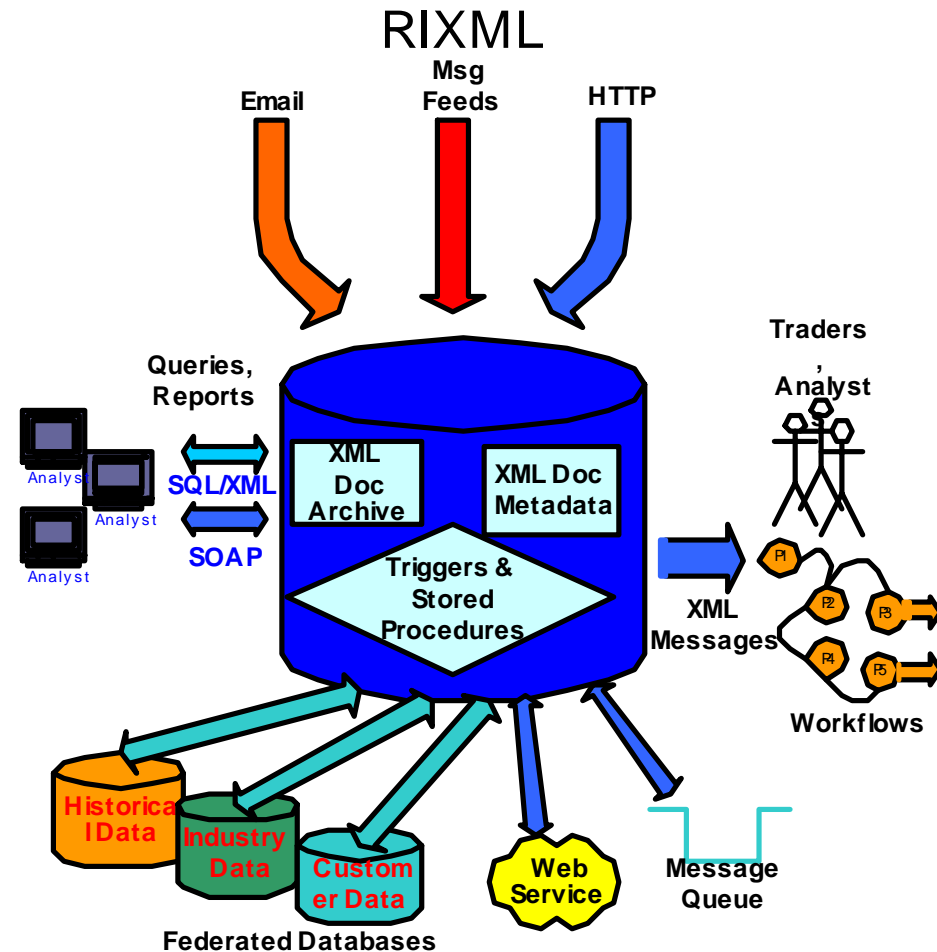

Today's Applications

- **Information Consolidation**
 - Gather raw research, transforming to RIXML if needed.
- **Information Federation**
 - Federate historical, current, customer data for Portals, Active Analysis
 - Federate information from news feeds, market and research sites
- **Deep Analysis**
 - Construct classification models, historical trends, research accuracies
 - Text mining and analysis
- **Active Analysis, Active Data**
 - If important market information (scoring), Email notifications to key customers
 - Notify traders, correlate to other core information and report
- **Portal**
 - Provide internal and external customers with a query interface to provide alerts and allow for search over federated metadata and structured/unstructured sources.



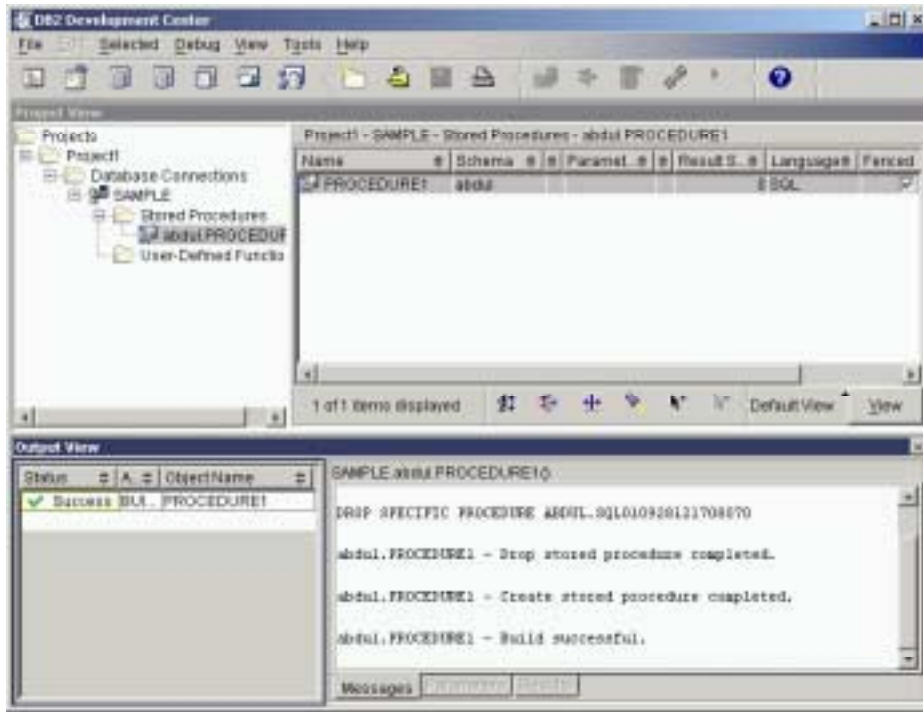

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Why XML & DB2?

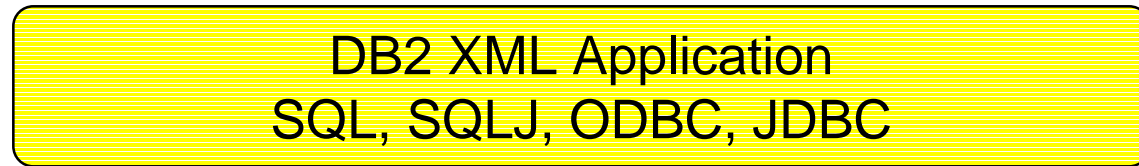
- XML is a key 'data interchange' format
 - B2B, B2C, Intra enterprise, Inter enterprise
 - Business critical information
- DBMS provides
 - Large scale storage / Management
 - Transformation / Aggregation
 - Interrogation / Analysis of data
- Combine strengths of both worlds



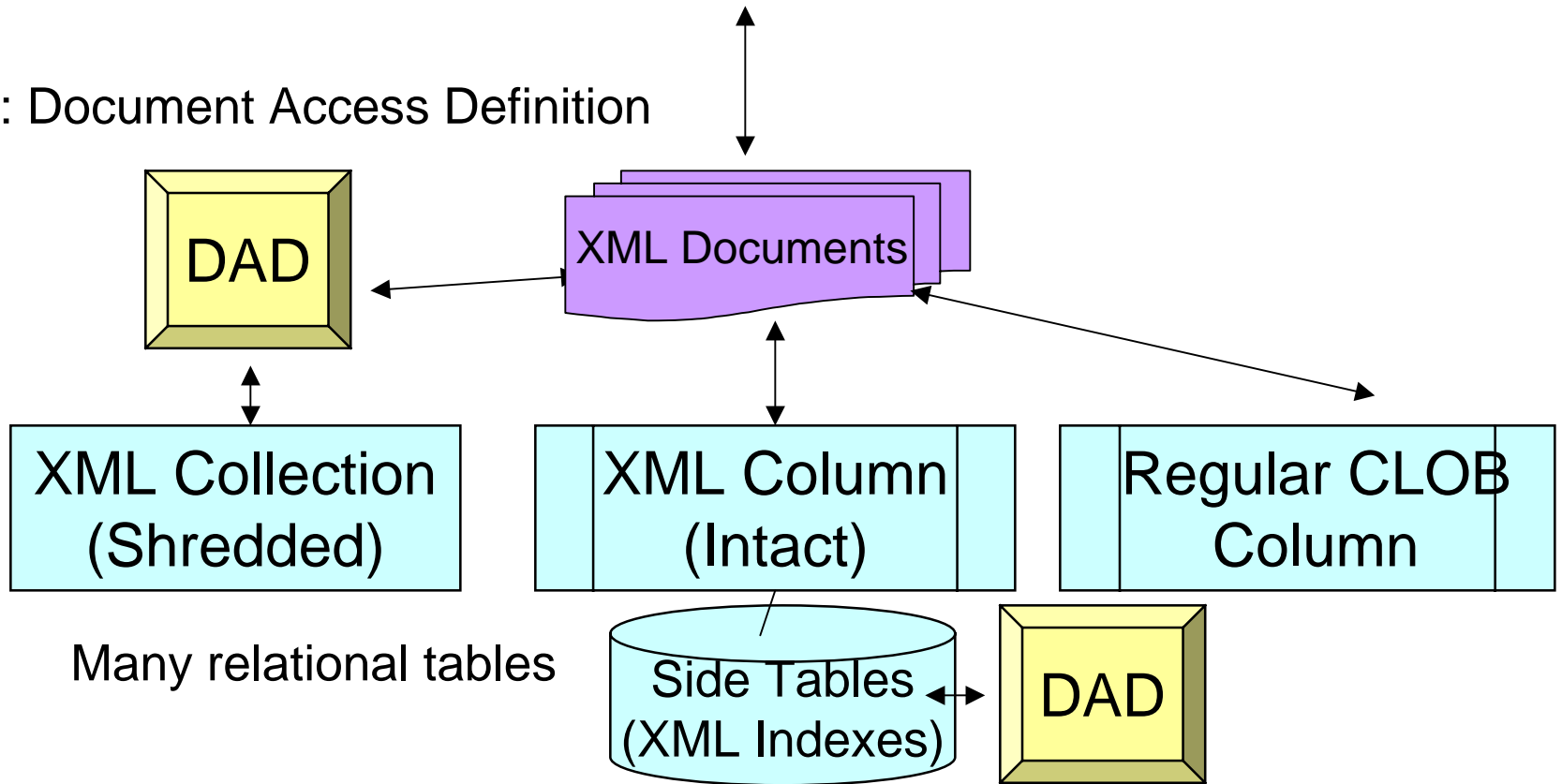
XML Storage in DB2 Today

- Store/retrieve whole XML documents
 - As XML column (entire document) or collection of fields
 - As externally managed files using DB2 UDB Data Links Manager
- Compose or decompose and store/retrieve portions
 - stored procedures dxxGenXML/dxxShredXML for collection of fields
- Document Access Definition (DAD)
 - Shape
 - Scope
- XML data types
 - XMLVARCHAR, XMLCLOB, XMLFILE (file name)
- Search: fast and powerful search/indexing on XML

XML Storage in DB2

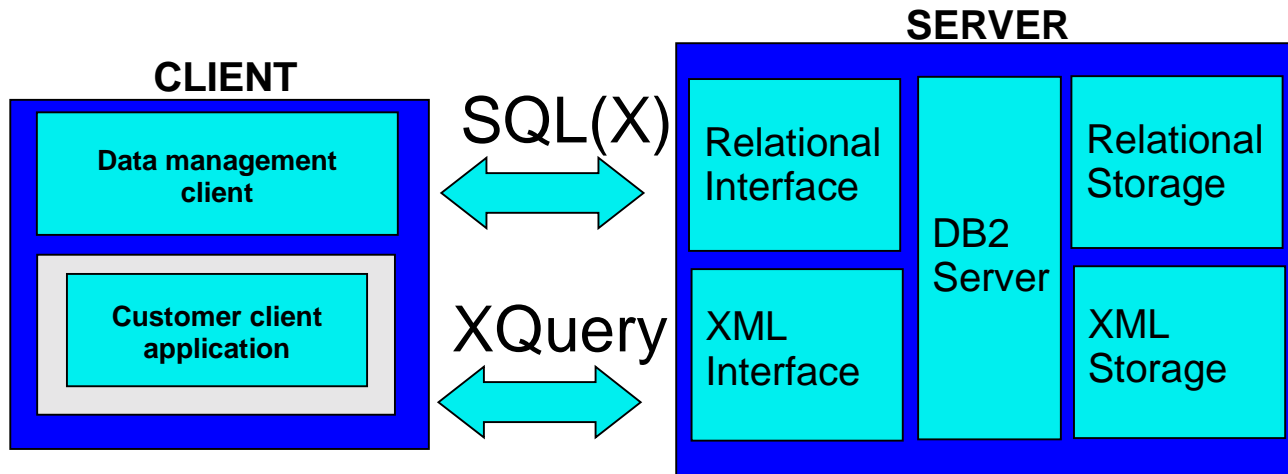


DAD: Document Access Definition



XML in DB2 Future

- XML capabilities "inside" the engine
- Performance, performance, performance
- "Feels" relational and/or XML
- Both SQL flavor and fully XML flavor
- XML **is** DB2 internals
- XML Extender becomes one with the data engine



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Web Services

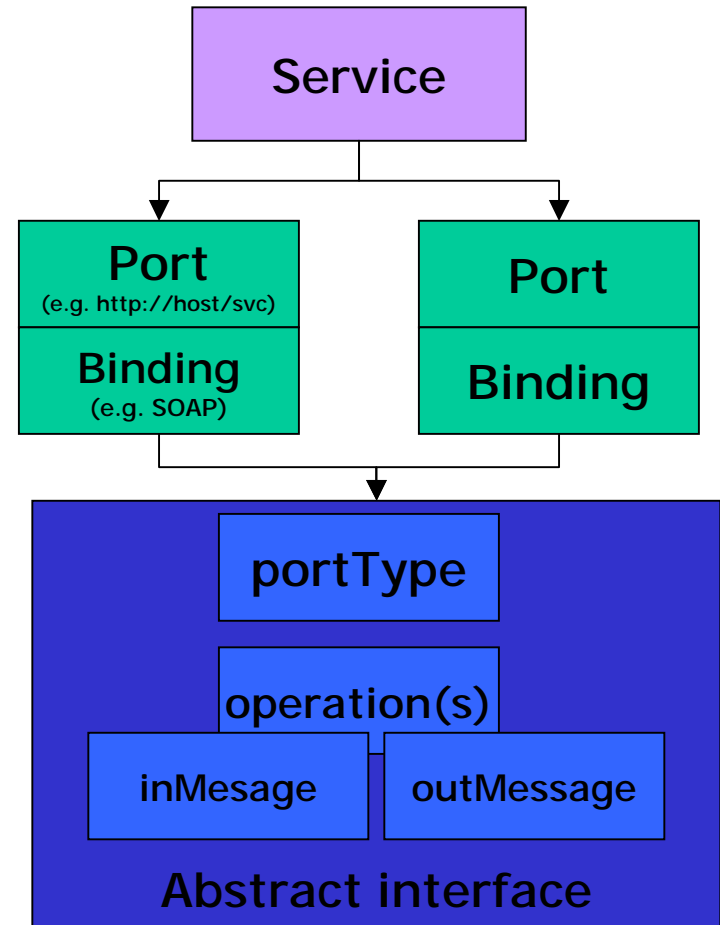
- New distributed computing platform
 - Built on existing network infrastructure including XML, HTTP and more
- Self-contained, self describing, modular service that can be published, located and invoked across the Web
 - E.g. airline schedules, currency conversion, supplier quotes
- Enable component-oriented, distributed applications

Web Services

- **SOAP** – Simple Object Access Protocol
 - Messaging/communication protocol for Web services
- **WSDL** – Web Services Description Language
 - Language used to describe Web services, as well as how to connect to and use them
 - Describes interface including method name, parameters, and binding information
 - Describes meta information about the Web service, such as network location, protocol,
- **UDDI** – Universal Description, Discovery, and Integration
 - Registering and discovering Web services

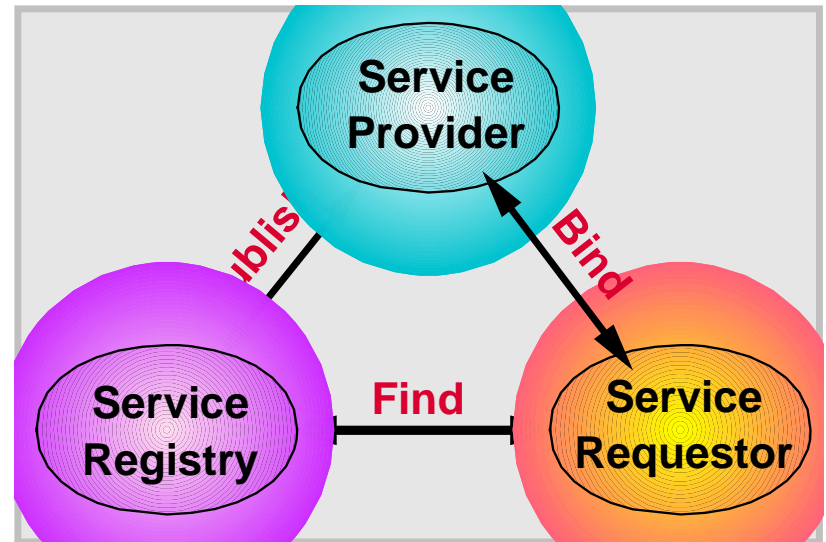
WSDL Model

- A WSDL description has three basic parts:
 - **Abstract interface:**
 - Abstract definition of a service (set of operations)
 - **Protocol bindings**
 - Define how to access it.
 - Multiple per portType:
 - SOAP, JMS, direct call.
 - **Deployed service access ports**
 - Where to access it.



Web Services Concepts

- **Service Requestor**
 - FINDS required services via the Service Broker
 - BINDS to services via Service Provider
- **Service Provider**
 - provides e-business services
 - PUBLISHES availability of these services through a registry
- **Service Registry**
 - provides support for publishing and locating services
 - like telephone yellow pages

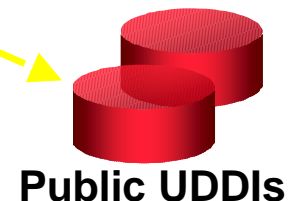
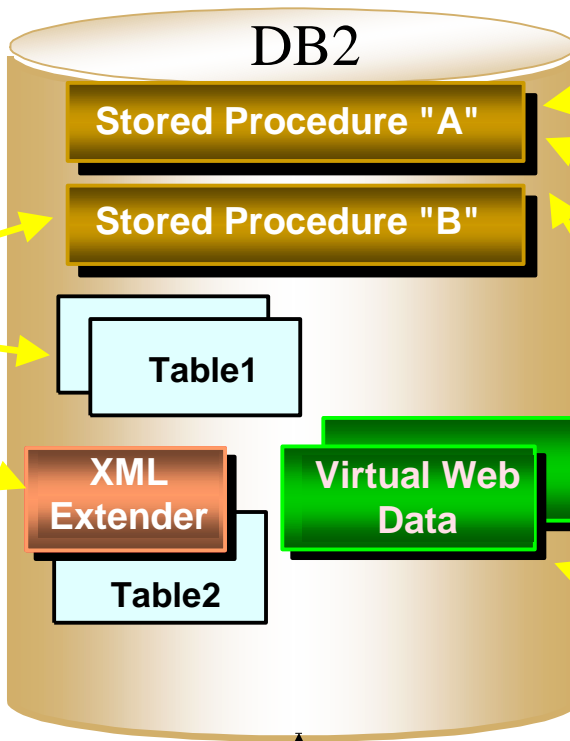
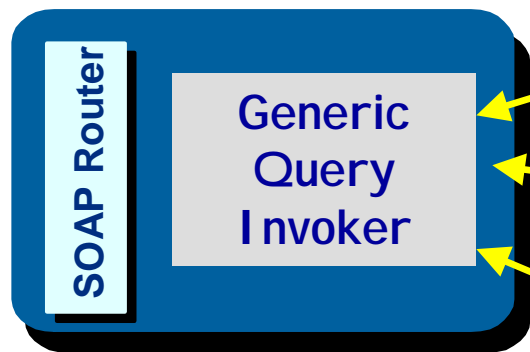


Why DB2 and Web Services?

- Allowing Web service access to DB2
 - Helps businesses more easily integrate their current business processes and data
- Allowing Web service access from DB2
 - Allow new classes of real-time data sources to be integrated into SQL processing

SOAP Requests/Replies

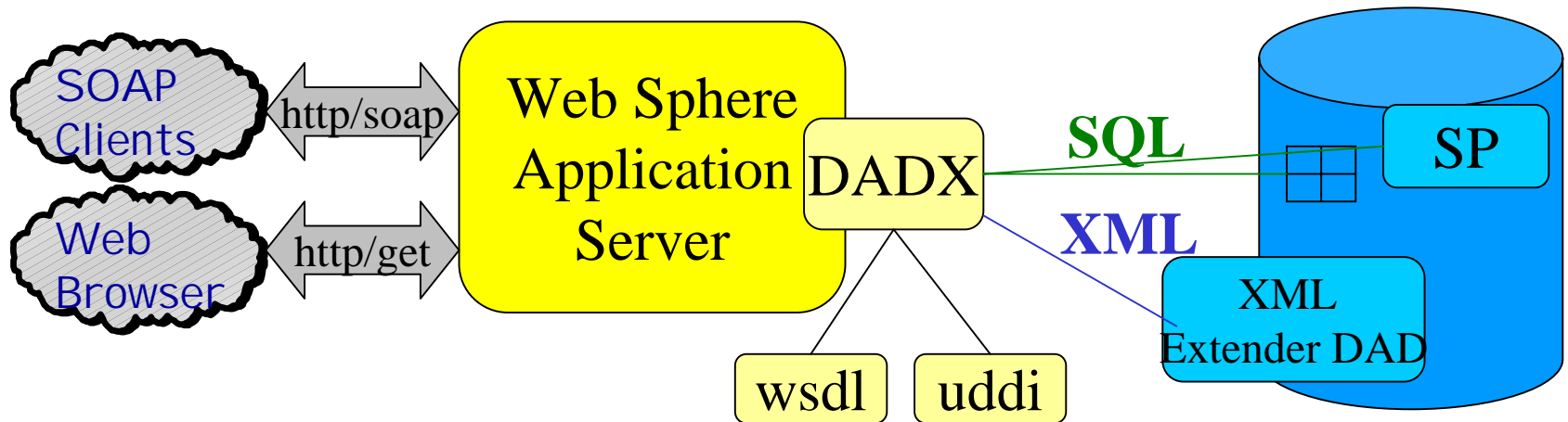


DB2 / Web Service Integration

- Development integrated into Web Sphere Studio
- Web service access to DB2:
 - Available on Windows NT, Windows 2000, AIX, Sun Solaris, OS/390
 - Coming on Linux
- Web service access from DB2:
 - Coming soon



Accessing DB2 from Web Services

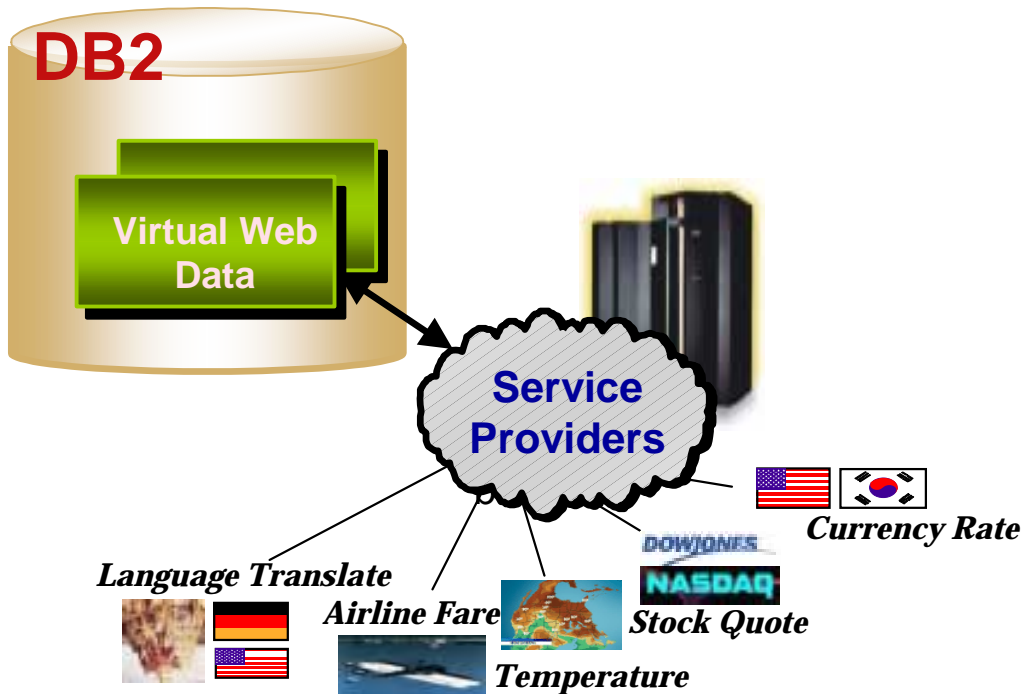


- Two types of web services operations supported:
 - XML-based query or storage
 - XML document stored in DB2 table or composed on retrieval
 - Requires XML extender
 - SQL-based operations
 - Query, Insert, Update, Delete or Call

Accessing Web Services from DB2



- Integrate SQL statements and Web Service invocations
- Support for generating SQL scalar and table UDFs based on wsd1 web service description
 - Command line version
 - Tooling integrated into Web Sphere Studio

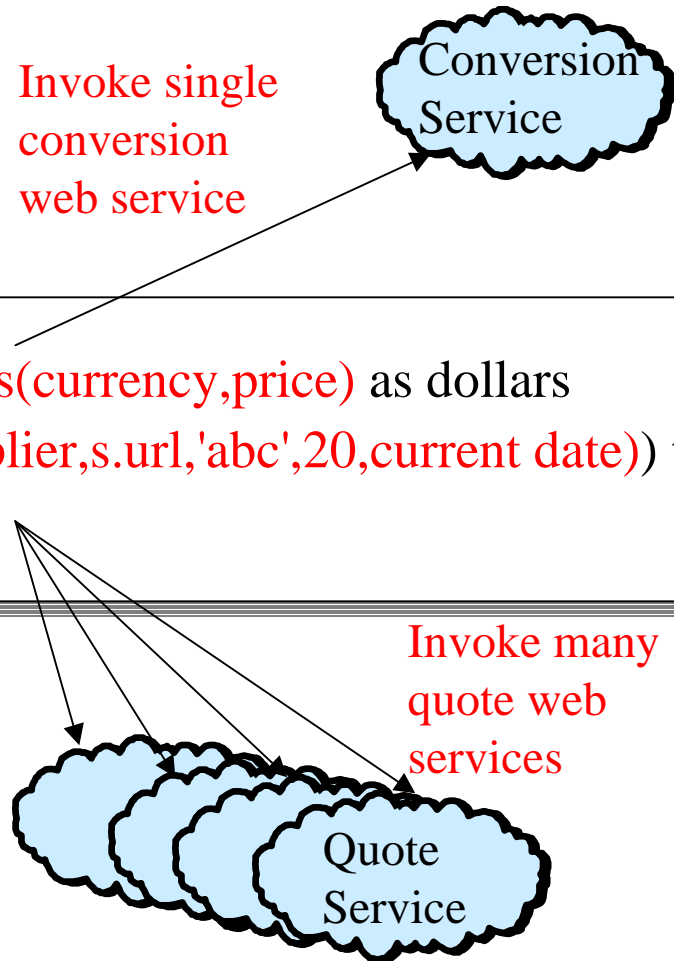
Accessing Web Services from DB2

- Early Binding UDF
 - Generate UDF bound to a specific provider
 - Example: UDF invokes “ACME” getQuote service
 - Values `getQuote()`
- Late Binding UDF
 - Generate UDF bound with provider as parm
 - Example: UDF invokes getQuote service from any provider that has one
 - `select a.busname, t.partNum, t.qty, t.dueDate, t.price, t.date`
 - `from`
 - `webservice_summary a,`
 - `table(getQuote(a.accesspoint,'M123', 5, '10/10/01')) t`
 - `where`
 - `a.servicename='Quotation_Service'`

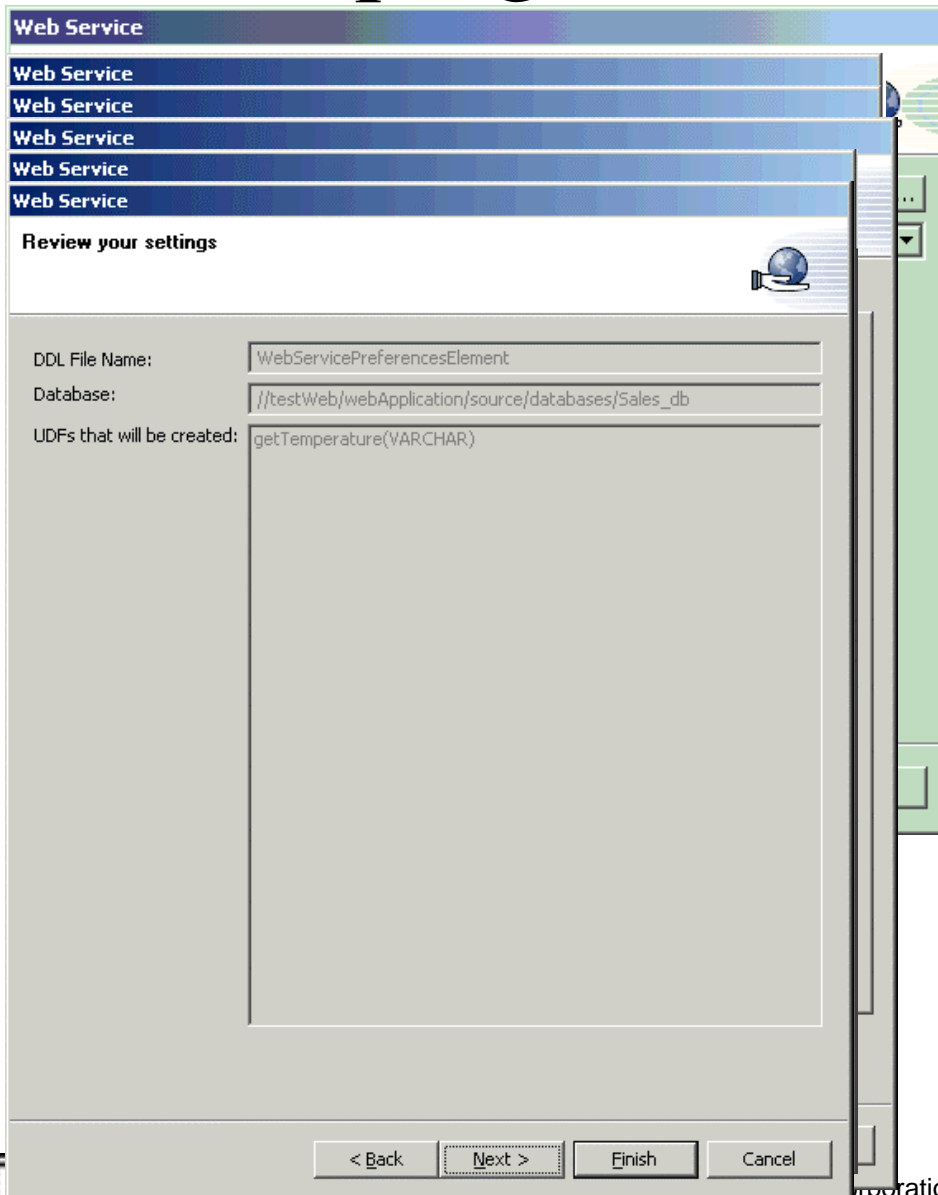

- 3) Map WSDL ops to UDFs
- 4) Specify options
- 5) Map parameters
- 6) Finish

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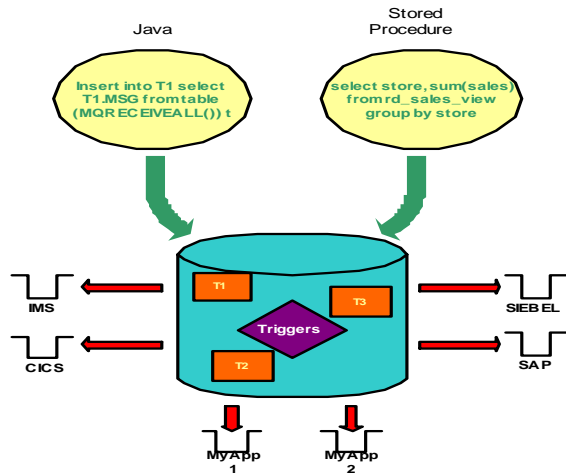
Why DB2 and WebSphere MQSeries

- Provide a simple way to access MQSeries from database applications
 - Leverage the set-oriented nature of SQL with messaging
 - Simplify the creation of operational data stores and data warehouses for business intelligence
 - Publish database changes
- Provide an introduction to the MQSeries Family to database programmers and administrators
 - Integration with MQSeries, MQSeries Pub/Sub, WMQI

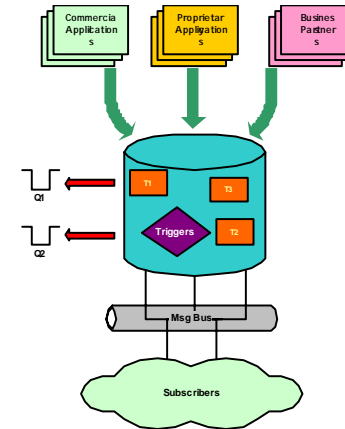

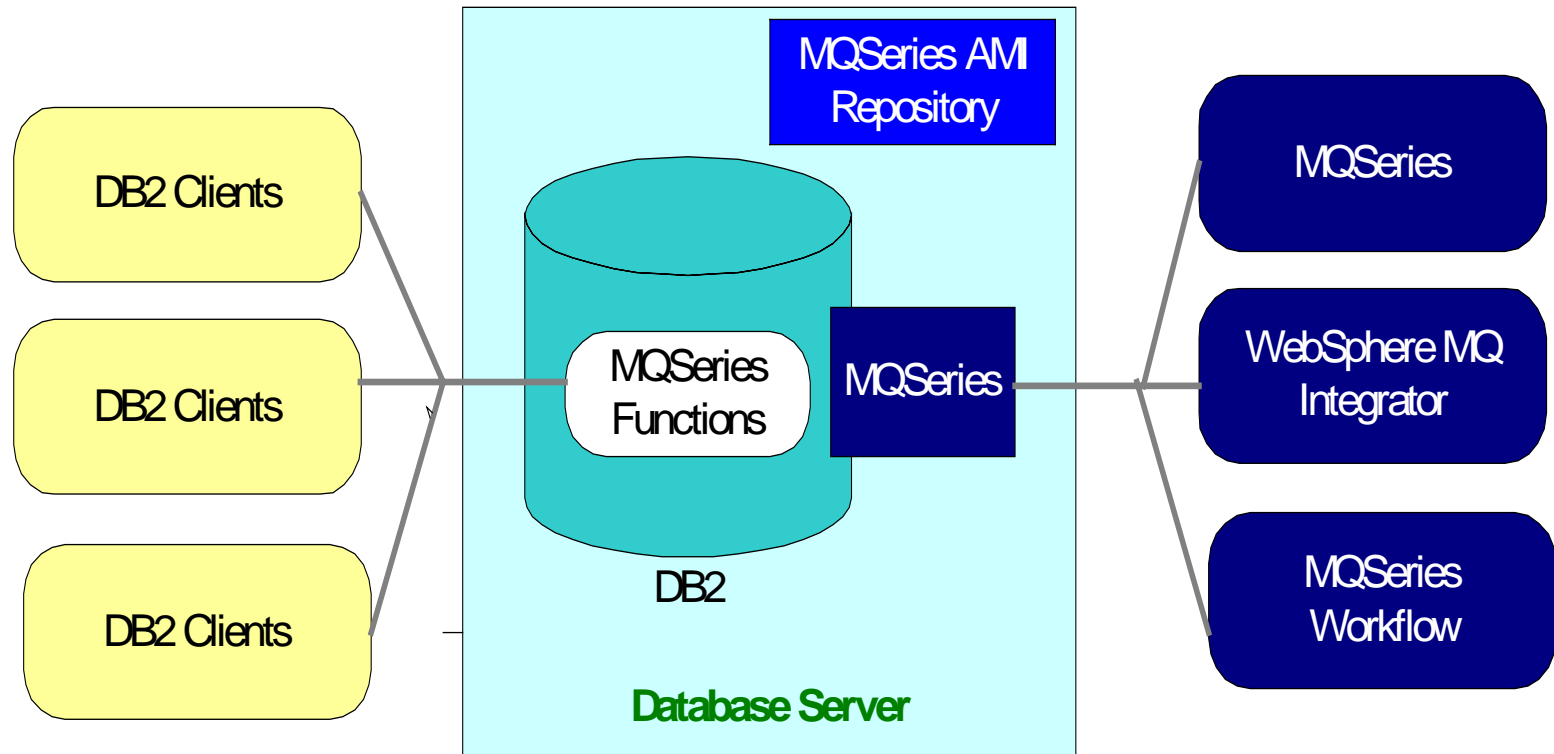
- MQAssist Wizard to facilitate construction of table functions and views
- Allows MQSeries as a source of information for a DB2 Data Warehouse
- Available on Windows NT, Windows 2000, AIX, Sun Solaris, HP-UX, OS/390, Linux
- DB2 ships limited use MQSeries (Win/Unix)



DB2 / MQ Series Integration

- The basic functions are implemented as User Defined Functions (UDFs)
 - Written in C / Optimized for performance
 - Win/Unix:
 - Schema: DB2MQ (full names of functions DB2MQ.*)
 - Must be installed using the ENABLE_MQFUNCTIONS
 - 390
 - Schema DB2MQ1C and DB2 MQ2C
 - Must install APAR: PQ59549
- The XML related UDFs depend on the XML Extender
 - Must be installed with the ENABLE_MQXML
 - XML Extender is a separate, optional installation that must precede this command
- Default queues, service points and policies are provided

DB2 / MQSeries Integration – Basic Configuration

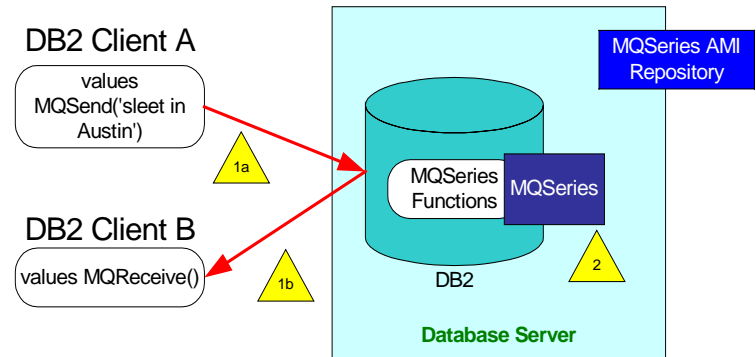


Basic Messaging Functions

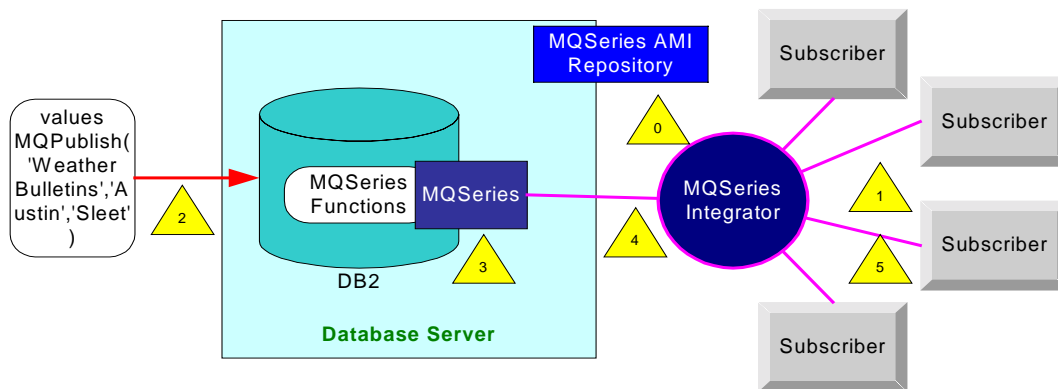
- DB2MQ.MQSend - send a message
- DB2MQ.MQRead, DB2MQ.MQReadAll - non-destructive read
- DB2MQ.MQReceive, DB2MQ.MQReceiveAll - destructive read
- DB2MQ.MQPublish - publish a message of a particular topic
- DB2MQ.MQSubscribe – register interest in a give topic

MQSeries Integration

- MQSeries server executes on the same machine as the DB2 Server
- DB2 clients may be local or remote.
 - ⇒ standalone applications, WebSphere servlets or EJBs
 - ⇒ local stored procedures



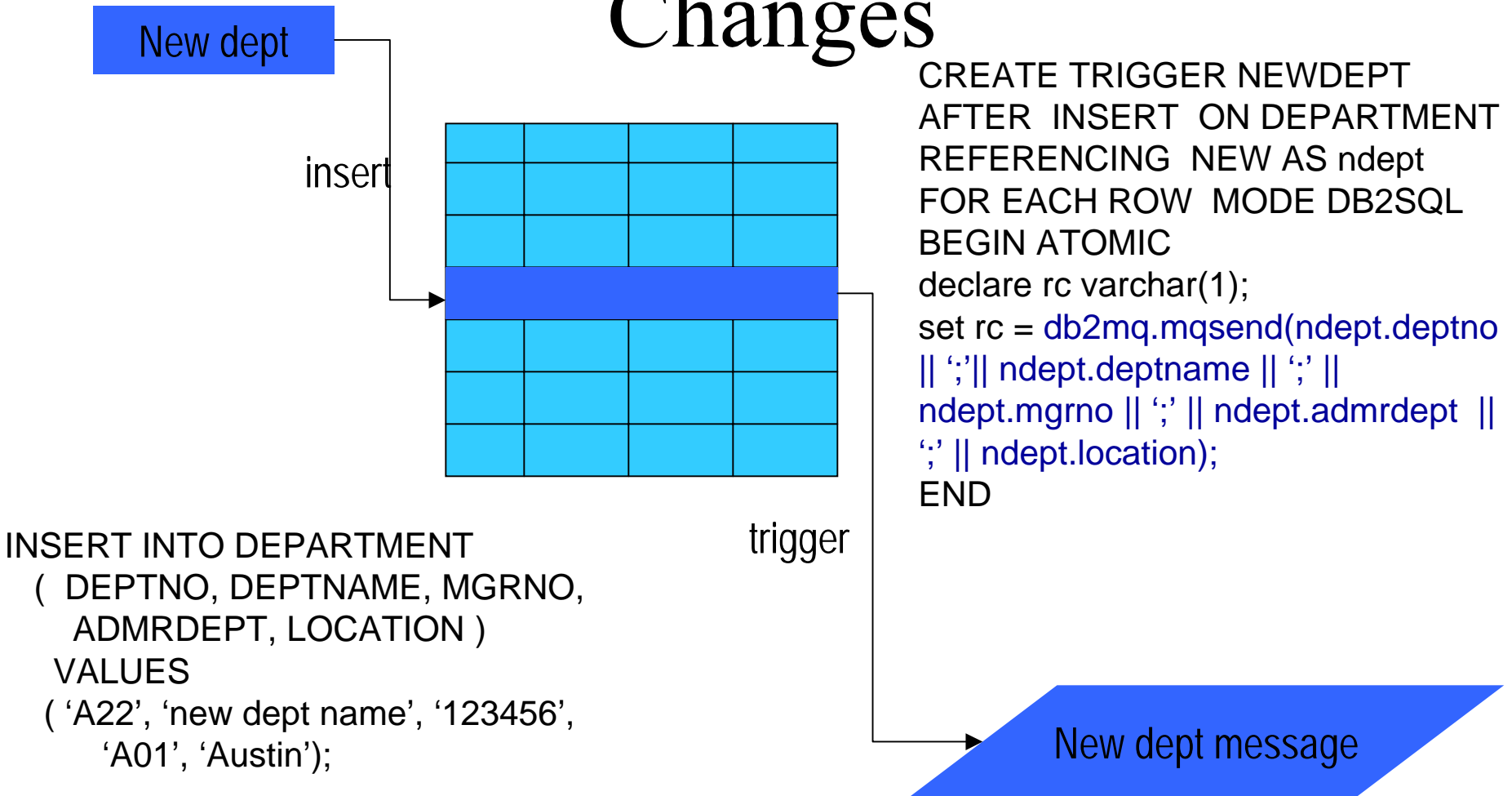
Basic Local Messaging



Simple Data Publication

- Supports both MQSeries publish/subscribe and MQSI V2
- Publication may be on-demand or automated through triggers
- Subscribers can register one or more topics

Easy Notification of Database Changes



DB2 and XML Messages

- MQSendXML
 - Send a message
- MQReadXML / MQReadXMLAll,
MQReadXMLCLOB / MQReadAllXMLCLOB
 - Non-destructive read
- MQReceiveXML / MQReceiveAllXML,
MQReceiveXMLCLOB / MQReadAllXMLCLOB
 - Destructive read

XML Messages

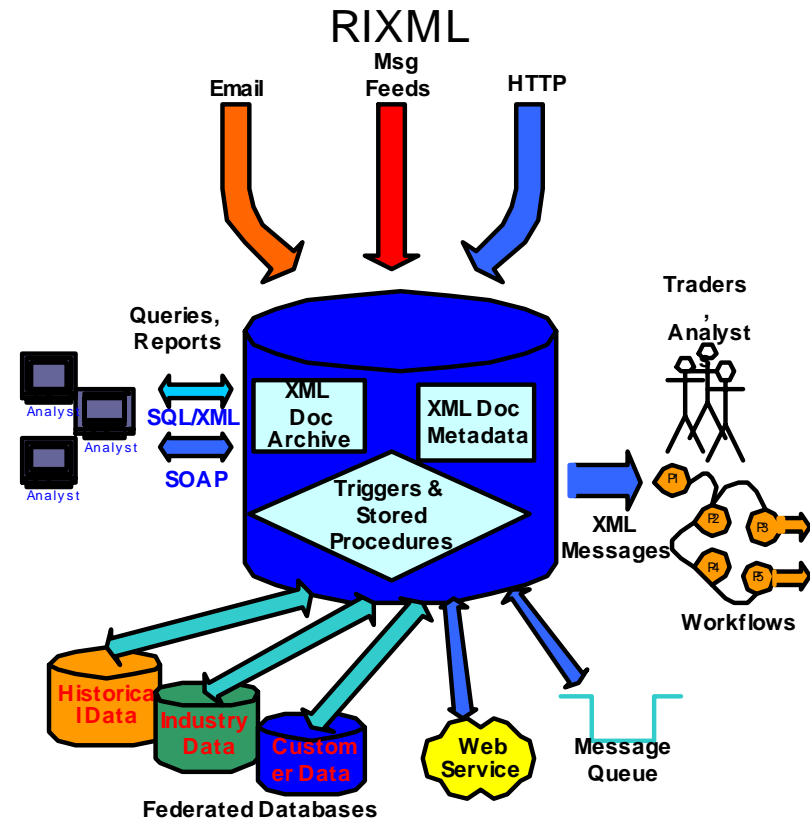
- Example
 - Reads an XML message from the queue
 - Decomposes the message using the DAD file
 - Store the untagged data fields into database tables that are specified in the DAD
- CALL
db2xml.DXXMQSHRED(serviceName,
:policyName,
:dadFileName,
:status)

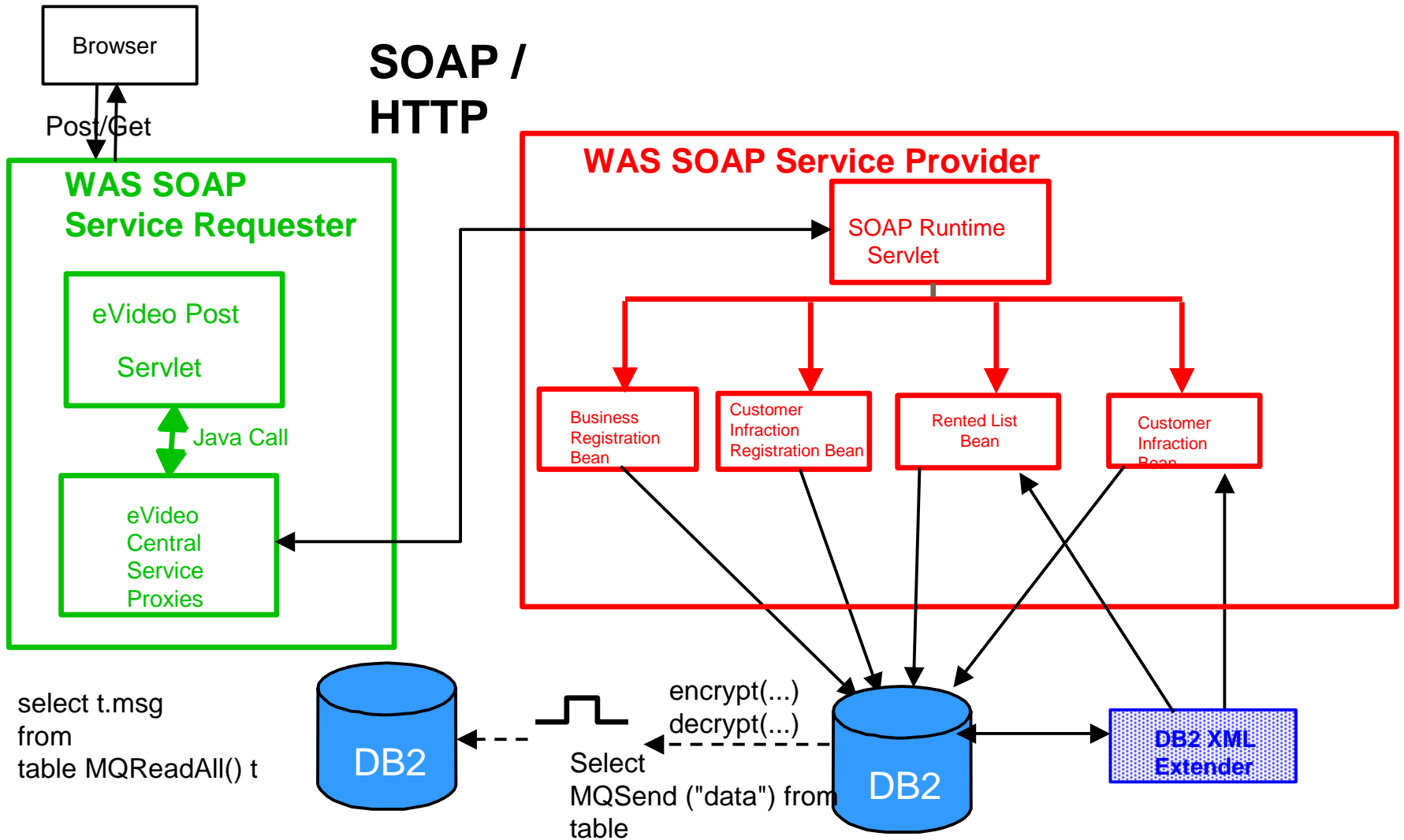
