Do not use this Program Directory if you are installing WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 with a SystemPac or ServerPac. When using one of these offerings, use the jobs and documentation that is supplied with the offering. This documentation may point you to specific sections of the Program Directory as required.

1.1 WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 Description

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 is a comprehensive, sophisticated Java 2 Enterprise Edition (Java EE), and Web Services technology-based application platform specifically designed to leverage the qualities of service inherent in the z/OS operating system.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 is designed for full Java EE 5 compatibility and support for Java Platform, Standard Edition (Java SE) 6. WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 delivers flexibility and power across the broadest range of customer IT environments. For customers who need to rapidly develop and deploy secure, portable applications that run on a multitude of server and desktop systems, WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 is the premier platform.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 is the foundation of the WebSphere software platform, and a key building block for a Service Oriented Architecture (SOA). As the leading Java EE and Web Services application platform, WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 delivers a high performance transaction engine that can help to build, run, integrate and manage dynamic, and on demand business applications.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 is designed to be equivalent, from a programming model perspective, with WebSphere Application Server and WebSphere Application Server Network Deployment for multiplatforms.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 provides a Java EE 5 compatible application server optimized to leverage the Qualities of Service inherent to the System z hardware and the z/OS operating system. With this release, WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 continues to deliver on the goal of common code with the WebSphere Application Server portfolio of products. V7.0.0 helps to leverage the transactional capabilities, scalability, availability, and reliability for which System z products are known and also provides ease-of-use enhancements.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 offers robust improvements, whether you are new to the product, or making the transition from a prior release.

WebSphere Application Server is a proven, high-performance transaction engine that can help you build, run, integrate, and manage dynamic business applications. It excels as the foundation for a service-oriented architecture with the following main benefits:

 - Industry-leading, open standards programming models

- Business-level applications, which are administration models that capture the entire definition of applications

1.1.1 WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 Functional Specifics

Security

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 contains many new and changed features for those who are responsible for securing applications and the application serving environment.

· Auditing the security infrastructure

The security auditing subsystem has been introduced as part of the security infrastructure. The primary responsibility of the security infrastructure is to prevent unauthorized access and usage of resources. Utilizing security auditing has two primary goals:

- Confirming the effectiveness and integrity of the existing security configuration.
- Identifying areas where improvement to the security configuration might be needed.

Security auditing achieves these goals by providing the infrastructure that allows you to implement your code to capture and store supported auditable security events. During runtime, all code other than the Java EE application code is considered to be trusted. Each time a Java EE application accesses a secured resource, any internal application server process with an audit point included can be recorded as an auditable event.

The new auditing infrastructure offers the ability to record auditing events to a tamper proof file and through the z/OS System Management Facility (SMF) using the Type 83 subtype 5 record.

Authorization providers

In WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0, Java Authorization Contract for Containers (JACC) specification 1.4 is being applied. In JACC specification 1.4, we support Java EE5 that includes Servlet 2.5 and EJB 3. The biggest functional change with the introduction of JACC specification 1.4 is the inclusion of annotations for propagating security policy information.

General default bindings for Web services security

The configuration of the default cell level and default server level bindings has changed in WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0. Previously, you could configure only one set of default bindings for the cell, and optionally configure one set of default bindings for each server. In Version 7.0, you can configure one or more general provider bindings and one or more general client bindings. However, only one general provider binding and one general client binding can be designated as the default.

Kerberos (KRB5) authentication mechanism support for security

Security support for Kerberos as the authentication mechanism has been added for this release of WebSphere Application Server. Kerberos is a mature, flexible, open, and very secure network authentication protocol. Kerberos includes authentication, mutual authentication, message integrity and confidentiality and delegation features.

Multiple security domains

Multiple security domain support is new in this release of WebSphere Application Server. You can create different security configurations and assign them to different applications in WebSphere Application Server processes. By creating multiple security domains, you can configure different security attributes for both administrative and user applications within a cell environment. You can configure different applications to use different security configurations by assigning the servers or clusters or SIBuses that host these applications to the security domains. Only users assigned to the administrator role can configure multiple security domains.

RSA token authentication mechanism

The RSA token authentication mechanism is new to this release of WebSphere Application Server. It aids the flexible management objective to preserve the base profiles configurations and isolate them from a security perspective. This mechanism permits the base profiles managed by an administrative agent to have different Lightweight Third-Party Authentication (LTPA) keys, different user registries, and different administrative users.

Securing communications

WebSphere Application Server provides several methods for securing communication between a server and a client. New in this release are functions that ensure secure communication between a server and a client. These functions focus on certificate management, authentication, and ensuring trust among the application server, administrative agent, and job manager. The new functions include:

- Creating and using a certificate authority (CA) client to enable a CA to request, query, and revoke certificates.
- Creating and using chained personal certificates to allow a certificate to be signed with a longer life span.
- Creating and revoking certificate authority (CA) certificates to ensure secure communication between the CA client and the CA server.
- Specifying default certificate expiration and keystore password during profile creation.
- Using a simplified certificate renewal process.
- Optionally administering SAF keyrings using the WebSphere Application Server administrative console.
- Single sign-on for HTTP requests using SPNEGO Web authentication

In Version 6 Release 1 Modification 0, a trust association interceptor (TAI) that uses the Simple and Protected GSS-API Negotiation Mechanism (SPNEGO) to securely negotiate and authenticate HTTP requests for secured resources was introduced. In WebSphere Application Server 7.0, this function is now deprecated. SPNEGO Web authentication has taken its place to provide the following enhancements:

- You can configure and enable SPNEGO Web authentication and filters on WebSphere Application Server by using the administrative console.
- Dynamic reload of SPNEGO is provided without the need to stop and restart WebSphere Application Server.
- Fallback to an application login method is provided if the SPNEGO Web authentication fails.
- SPNEGO can be customized at the WebSphere security domain level. Read about Multiple security domains for more information.

Administration

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 offers functionality for users who are going to customize, administer, monitor, and tune production server environments as well as those who are going to deploy and operate applications.

 Adding assured delivery to Web services through WS-ReliableMessaging Support for the WS-ReliableMessaging standard was first introduced as part of the IBM WebSphere Application Server Server Version 6.1 Feature Pack for Web Services. At that time, the Reliable Asynchronous Messaging Profile (RAMP) Version 1.0 specification used WS-ReliableMessaging to ensure the reliable delivery of messages, and the Feature Pack for Web Services in Version 6 Release 1 Modification 0 included default policy sets that support this specification. You can migrate WebSphere Application Server Version 6.1 WS-ReliableMessaging configurations that use RAMP-based policy sets to the current version of the product.

Following on from the RAMP Version 1.0 specification, the Web Services Interoperability organization (WS-I) Reliable Secure Profile working group has developed Version 1.0 of an interoperability profile dealing with secure, reliable messaging capabilities for Web services. This profile is similar to RAMP Version 1.0, except that it is updated to use WS-ReliableMessaging Version 1.1 with the OASIS WS-SecureConversation Version 1.3 specification. The WS-I RSP default policy sets provided in this version of WebSphere Application Server are an implementation of the Reliable Secure Profile Version 1.0 specification.

If you create JAX-WS based WS-Notification services, you can apply WS-ReliableMessaging policies to them to make your WS-Notification services reliable. For more information, see Configuring WS-Notification for reliable notification.

· Administering nodes using the administrative agent

The administrative agent provides a single interface to administer multiple unfederated application server nodes in, for example, development, unit test, or server farm environments. By using a single interface to administer your application servers, you reduce the overhead of running administrative services in every application server.

Administering nodes using the job manager in a flexible management environment

The job manager allows you to asynchronously submit and administer jobs for large numbers of unfederated application servers and deployment managers over a geographically dispersed area. Many of the management tasks that you can perform with the job manager are tasks that you can already perform with the product, such as application management, server management, and node management. However, with the job manager, you can aggregate the tasks and perform the tasks across multiple application servers or deployment managers.

Advanced core group bridge configurations

You can use a tunnel proxy peer access point when the core groups cannot directly communicate with each other because of a firewall. Typically, when a firewall exists between two core groups, the core groups cannot communicate with each other. However if a DMZ Secure Proxy Server for IBM, WebSphere Application Server resides in the demilitarized zone (DMZ) outside of the firewall, you can create a tunnel access point group that enables you to establish a core group bridge tunnel between the core groups that are running on servers inside of the firewall, and the core groups that are running on the DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server.

Application server custom properties for z/OS

The server_region_request_cputimeused_limit custom property helps you to prevent a single application request from monopolizing the available CPU time because it allows you to limit the amount of CPU time that a single request can use. A CPU monitor is invoked when a request is dispatched. If the request exceeds the specified amount of CPU time, the controller considers the request unresponsive. The controller then issues message BBOO0327, to let the requesting application know that the request was unresponsive. For this condition, an attempt is made to restrict the amount of CPU processing the request can acquire once it has exceeded the configured limit.

Authentication generator or consumer token settings

The LTPA Token V2.0 token type is available only for bindings using the new namespace in IBM, WebSphere Application Server, Version 7.0 or later. When you select LTPA Token V2.0 as the token type for the token consumer, both LTPA tokens and LTPA V2.0 tokens can be consumed. To restrict the token consumer to LTPA V2.0 tokens only, select the Enforce token version check box.

If you select LTPA Token as the token type for the token generator, single sign-on interoperability mode must be enabled. This is a setting in global security from Web and SIP security. If the interoperability flag is not set to enabled (true), an error occurs when the application that is attached to these bindings is started. If you want to use the LTPA token without checking the state of the interoperability flag, you can set the custom property,

com.ibm.wsspi.wssecurity.tokenGenerator.ltpav1.pre.v7, on the token generator.

Configuring a data source using the administrative console

If you have defined security domains in the application server, you can click Browse... to select an authentication alias for the resource that you are configuring. Security domains allow you to isolate authentication aliases between servers. The tree view is useful in determining the security domain to which an alias belongs, and the tree view can help you determine the servers that will be able to access each authentication alias. The tree view is tailored for each resource, so domains and aliases are hidden when you cannot use them.

Configuring client reroute for applications that use DB2 databases

Client reroute for DB2 allows you to provide an alternate server location, in case the connection to the database server fails. If you decide to use client reroute with the persistence option, the alternate server information will persist across Java Virtual Machines (JVMs). In the event of an application server crash, the alternate server information will not be lost when the application server is restored and attempts to connect to the database.

· Configuring mail providers and sessions

You can isolate a mail provider to allow different versions of the same provider to be loaded in the same Java Virtual Machine (JVM). For example, you might want to deploy multiple applications on a single server, but each application requires different versions or implementations of the mail provider. You can now isolate each version or implementation of the provider, and the provider will be loaded in its own class loader and will not interfere with other implementations. There are some general considerations for isolating any type of resource provider; refer to the topic on considerations for isolated resource providers for more information.

· Configuring Oracle Real Application Cluster (RAC) with the application server

Using the Oracle JDBC driver, you can configure failover support, load balancing, or both, in an Oracle RAC environment.

· Configuring the callers for general and default bindings

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 provides support for multiple callers. The caller token used for authentication is the one with highest priority, based on decreasing order of preference. You can modify the order of the callers, as described in the topic "Changing the order of the callers for a token or message part."

· Configuring transaction properties for an application server

In this release, both the WS-Transaction 1.1 and the WS-Transaction 1.0 specifications are supported. You can set the default WS-Transaction specification level for a server to use for outbound requests that include a Web Services Atomic Transaction (WS-AT) or Web Services Business Activity (WS-BA) coordination context.

· Core group discovery and failure detection protocols

You can use an alternate protocol provider instead of the default Discovery Protocol and Failure Detection Protocol to monitor and manage communication between core group members. In general, alternate protocol providers, such as the z/OS Cross-system Coupling Facility (XCF)-based provider, use less system resources than the default Discovery Protocol and Failure Detection Protocol, especially during times when the core group members are idle. An alternate protocol provider generally use less system resources because it does not perform the member-to-member TCP/IP pinging that the default protocol providers use to determine if a core group member is still active.

· Deploying and administering business-level applications

A business-level application is an administration model that provides the entire definition of an application as it makes sense to the business. It is a WebSphere configuration artifact, similar to a server or cluster, that is stored in the product configuration repository. A business-level application can contain artifacts such as Java Platform, Enterprise Edition (Java EE) applications or modules, shared libraries, data files, documents, and other business-level applications.

Enabling or Disabling the reusable ASID function

In z/OS releases prior to Version 1.9, a process (address space) which defined cross process services, such as the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Controller Region, could result in its address space identifier (ASID) being marked as non-reusable. In z/OS Version 1.9, it became possible to request these processes to be managed so that the ASID can be reused.

Enabling trusted context for DB2 databases

With trusted connections you can:

- Access the DB2 database with the caller identity, obviating the need to create a new connection for every user.
- Preserve the identity of the end-user when the application server is interacting with the database.
- Strengthen database security by avoiding granting all of the privileges to a single user.
- Improve performance, as compared to the existing model of using the resetConnection() method to take advantage of identity propagation.
- Introduction: Application servers and component startup

You can improve system performance if you configure some of your application servers, such that each of their components are dynamically started as they are needed, instead of letting all of these components automatically start when the server starts. Selecting this option can improve server startup time, and reduce the memory footprint. Starting components as they are needed is most effective if all of the applications that are deployed on the application server are of the same type. For example, using this option works better if all of your applications are Web applications that use servlets, and JavaServer Pages (JSP). This option works less effectively if your applications use servlets, JSPs and Enterprise JavaBeans (EJB).

Introduction: Clusters and component startup

Normal runtime processing automatically starts all server components during the server startup process. This processing applies to all servers, including servers that are part of a cluster. However, you can configure servers, including servers that are cluster members, such that not all of the server components start during the server startup process. This capability enables the server to consume resources as needed, thereby providing a smaller and more manageable footprint, and normally results in a performance improvement.

You can improve system performance if you configure each cluster member, such that each of their components are dynamically started as they are needed instead of letting all of these components automatically start when the cluster member starts. Selecting this option can improve cluster startup time, and reduce the memory footprint of the cluster members. Starting components as they are needed is most effective if all of the applications that are deployed on the cluster are of the same type. For example, using this option works better if all of your applications are Web applications that use servlets, and JavaServer Pages (JSP). This option works less effectively if your applications use servlets, JSPs and Enterprise JavaBeans (EJB).

WS-Transaction policies

In this release, when you work with policy sets, you can configure the WS-Transaction policy type for the WS-AtomicTransaction (WS-AT) and the WS-BusinessActivity (WS-BA) protocols. You can configure the way in which a Java API for XML Web Services (JAX-WS) client handles WS-AT or WS-BA context. You can specify that the client must send context, can send context if it is available, or must not send context.

Shared library settings

An isolated shared library enables one instance of the library classes to be shared only among associated applications and Web modules. An isolated shared library enables multiple applications or Web modules to share a common set of classes across a subset of the applications. Further, an isolated shared library supports versioning and loads the minimum number of library copies. The class loader created for an isolated shared library does not reload and, like a server class loader, exists for the lifetime of a server. For shared native libraries, you can use an isolated shared library to avoid errors resulting from reloading of native libraries.

Using the script library to automate the application serving environment

The Jython script library provides a set of procedures to automate the most common application server administration functions. For example, you can use the script library to easily configure servers, applications, mail settings, resources, nodes, business-level applications, clusters, authorization

groups, and more. You can run each script procedure individually, or combine several procedures to quickly develop new scripts.

Web Services-Interoperability Basic Profile

Building on the support for WS-I Basic Profile Version 1.0, WS-I Basic Profile V1.1, Attachment Profile V1.0, and Basic Security Profile (BSP) V1.0, you can implement Web services with WebSphere Application Server Version 7 using the following current emerging standard WS-I profiles:

- WS-I Basic Profile V1.2 builds on WS-I Basic Profile V1.0 and WS-I Basic Profile V1.1 and adds support for WS-Addressing (WS-A) and SOAP Message Transmission Optimization Mechanism (MTOM). The WS-Addressing specification enables the asynchronous message exchange pattern so that you can decouple the service request from the service response. The SOAP header of the sender's request contains the wsa:ReplyTo value that defines the endpoint reference to which the provider's response is sent. Decoupling the request from the response enables long running Web services interactions. Leveraging the asynchronous programming model support in JAX-WS Version 2.1 in combination with WS-Addressing, you can now take advantage of the ability to create Web services invocations where the client can continue to process work without waiting for a response to return. This provides for a more dynamic and efficient model to invoke Web services. Using MTOM, you can send and receive binary data optimally within a SOAP message.
- WS-I Basic Profile V2.0 builds on top of Basic Profile V1.2 with the addition of support for SOAP 1.2.
- WS-I Basic Security Profile V1.1 extends the WS-I Basic Security Profile V1.0 standard by profiling the latest WS-Security V1.1 specification.
- WS-I Reliable Secure Profile 1.0 builds on WS-I Basic Profile V1.2, WS-I Basic Profile V2.0, WS-I Basic Security Profile V1.0, and WS-I Basic Security Profile V1.1 and adds support for WS-Reliable Messaging 1.1, WS-Make Connection 1.0, and WS-Secure Conversation 1.3. WS-Reliable Messaging 1.1 is a session-based protocol that provides message level reliability for Web services interactions. WS-Make Connection 1.0 was developed by the WS-Reliable Messaging workgroup to address scenarios where a Web services endpoint is behind a firewall or the endpoint has no visible endpoint reference. If a Web services endpoint loses connectivity during a reliable session, WS-Make Connection provides an efficient method to re-establish the reliable session. Additionally, WS-Secure Conversation V1.3 is a session-based security protocol that uses an efficient symmetric key based encryption algorithm for message level security. WS-I Reliable Secure Profile V1.0 provides secure reliable session-oriented Web services interactions.
- DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server

The DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server installation allows you to install your proxy server in the DMZ, while reducing the security risk that would be presented if you choose to install an application server in the DMZ to host a proxy server. The risk is reduced by the DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server removing of all the functionality and the features that the application server possess that are not required to host the proxy servers, but could possibly be used for malicious purposes. Installing the DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server in the DMZ rather than the secured zone presents new security challenges. The DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server has been equipped with various capabilities to provide protection from these challenges.

· When to use a high availability manager

In a high availability environment, you can configure your resource adapters for high availability. After a resource adapter is configured for high availability, the high availability manager assigns the resource adapter to a high availability group, the name for which is derived from the resource adapter key. The resource adapter key is the cell-scoped configuration ID of the resource adapter, and must be identical for all of the servers in a cluster that use the same resource adapter. The high availability manager then controls when each resource adapter is started.

· WS-ReliableMessaging: supported specifications and standards

In this release, there are two types of WS-Notification service

- Version 7.0: You configure a Version 7.0 WS-Notification service and service points if you want to compose a JAX-WS WS-Notification service with WS-ReliableMessaging, or if you want to apply JAX-WS handlers to your WS-Notification service. This is the recommended type of service for new deployments.
- Version 6.1: You configure a Version 6.1 WS-Notification service and service points if you want to expose a JAX-RPC WS-Notification service using the same technology provided in WebSphere Application Server Version 6.1, including the ability to apply JAX-RPC handlers to the service.

Troubleshooting/Capacity Planning/Servicing

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 provides many new features for troubleshooting and servicing the product, with a focus on the ability to automatically detect and recover from problems as well as capturing important. data about the system's capacity for doing work.

• Subtype 9: Request Activity record

When you do capacity planning, you need to look at the costs that are involved in running requests and how many requests you process over a set period of time. You can use the SMF Subtype 9 record to monitor which requests are associated with which applications, how many requests you get, and how much resource each request uses. You can also use this record to identify the application involved, the CPU time that the request consumes. Because a new record is created for each request, you can determine the number of requests that you get over a specific length of time.

Using IBM Support Assistant

IBM Support Assistant V4.0.2 is released with a host of new features and enhancements, making this version the most comprehensive and flexible yet. Our one-stop-shop solution to research, analyze and resolve software issues is now better than ever before, and you can still download it at no charge.

IBM Support Assistant version 4.0 enhancements include:

- Remote System Troubleshooting: Explore file systems, run automated data collectors and troubleshooting tools, and view the system inventory on remote systems.
- Activity-based Workflow: Choose from support-related activities, or use the Guided Troubleshooter for step-by-step help with analysis and resolution.
- Case Management: Organize your troubleshooting data in "cases"; then export and share these cases with other problem analysts or with IBM Support.

 Improved Flexibility: Add your own search locations, control updates by hosting your own update site, get the latest product news and updates.

Developer

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 contains many new and changed features for application developers.

Commit priority for transactional resources

This release introduces resource commit ordering, where you control the order in which transactional resources are processed during two-phase commit processing. Resource commit ordering can increase the occurrence of one-phase commits and therefore improve performance, and reduce problems caused by transaction isolation.

· Configuring a data source using the administrative console

If you have defined security domains in the application server, you can click Browse... to select an authentication alias for the resource that you are configuring. Security domains allow you to isolate authentication aliases between servers. The tree view is useful in determining the security domain to which an alias belongs, and the tree view can help you determine the servers that will be able to access each authentication alias. The tree view is tailored for each resource, so domains and aliases are hidden when you cannot use them.

Configuring client reroute for applications that use DB2 databases

Client reroute for DB2 allows you to provide an alternate server location, in case the connection to the database server fails. If you decide to use client reroute with the persistence option, the alternate server information will persist across Java Virtual Machines (JVMs). In the event of an application server crash, the alternate server information will not be lost when the application server is restored and attempts to connect to the database.

Configuring Oracle Real Application Cluster (RAC) with the application serve

Using the Oracle JDBC driver, you can configure failover support, load balancing, or both, in an Oracle RAC environment.

• Configuring resource adapters

You can isolate a resource adapter to allow different versions of the same resource provider to be loaded in the same Java Virtual Machine (JVM). For example, you might want to deploy multiple applications on a single server, and each application requires different versions or implementations of the same resource adapter. You can now isolate each version or implementation of the resource adapter so that the classes of each adapter will be loaded by its own class loader, and the class loader will not inadvertently link with classes of the other versions or implementations of the adapter.

Registering the resource adapter with the high availability manager specifies that the high availability (HA) manager will manage the lifecycle of a JCA 1.5 resource adapter in a cluster, ensuring that applications using resource adapters for inbound communication remain highly available. To that end, appropriate use of the HA capability options enable you to set up an environment that will be able to implement failover for inbound activity when a server goes down.

Customizing and binding SQLJ profiles with the db2sqljcustomize tool

The application server supports customizing and binding the SQLJ profiles in the administrative console or with scripting:

- For administrative console support, read the topic on customizing and binding profiles for Structured Query Language in Java (SQLJ) applications.
- For scripting support, see the topic on the application management command group for the AdminTask object.
- · Deploying SQLJ applications that use bean-managed persistence, servlets, or sessions beans

The application server includes these new features for SQLJ support for applications that use bean-managed persistence:

- Customizing and binding SQLJ profiles with the administrative console or scripting.
- Customizing and binding SQLJ applications again without needing to reinstall the application.
- Deploying Structured Query Language in Java (SQLJ) applications

The application server includes enhanced SQLJ support for applications that use container-managed persistence (CMP). The new features include:

- Deploying CMP beans during the application installation in the application server.
- Customizing and binding SQLJ profiles with the administrative console or scripting.
- Customizing and binding SQLJ applications again without needing to reinstall the application.

These enhancements reduce the complexity of installing, deploying, and customizing SQLJ applications for both container-managed and bean-managed persistence.

Enabling Web Services Addressing support for JAX-WS applications

This release introduces a new way to enable WS-Addressing. You can now use JAX-WS 2.1 annotations and feature classes to enable WS-Addressing from either the server or the client. You also have more control over the behavior of WS-Addressing when using policy sets; you can specify whether WS-Addressing is enabled and whether to use synchronous, asynchronous, or both messaging patterns.

JAXB

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 supports the JAXB 2.1 specification. JAX-WS 2.1 requires JAXB 2.1 for data binding. JAXB 2.1 provides enhancements such as improved compilation support and support for the @XMLSeeAlso annotation. With JAXB 2.1, you can configure the xjc schema compiler so that it does not automatically generate new classes for a particular schema. Similarly, you can configure the schemagen schema generator to not automatically generate a new schema. This enhancement is useful when you are using a common schema and you do not want a new schema generated. JAXB 2.1 also introduces the @XMLSeeAlso annotation that enables JAXB to bind additional Java classes that it might not otherwise know about when binding a Java class with this annotation. This annotation enables JAXB to know about all classes that are potentially involved in marshalling or unmarshalling as it is not always possible or practical to list all of the subclasses of a given Java class. JAX-WS 2.1 also supports the use of the @XMLSeeAlso annotation on a service

endpoint interface (SEI) or on a service implementation bean to ensure all of the classes referenced by the annotation are passed to JAXB for processing.

JAX-WS

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 supports the JAX-WS 2.1 specification. JAX-WS 2.1 extends the functionality of JAX-WS 2.0 to provide support for the WS-Addressing in a standardized API. Using this function, you can create, transmit and use endpoint references to target a Web service endpoint. You can use this API to specify the action uniform resource identifiers (URIs) that are associated with the Web Services Description Language (WSDL) operations of your Web service. JAX-WS 2.1 introduces the concept of features as a way to programmatically control specific functions and behaviors. There are three standard features: the AddressingFeature for WS-Addressing, the MTOMFeature when optimizing the transmission of binary attachments, and the RespectBindingFeature for wsdl:binding extensions. JAX-WS 2.1 requires Java Architecture for XML Binding (JAXB) Version 2.1 for data binding.

JPA Access Intent

For a JPA persistence provider on the application server, the application can specify isolation and ReadLockMode based on a TaskName. The TaskName provides a better control over applying these characteristics. The application defines a set of entity types and their corresponding access intent for each TaskName defined in a persistence unit.

JTA support

This release features additional Java Transaction API (JTA) support. JTA 1.1 is supported through the introduction of the TransactionSynchronizationRegistry interface. System-level application components, such as persistence managers, resource adapters, enterprise beans, and Web application components, can use the TransactionSynchronizationRegistry interface to register with a JTA transaction Also, the UOWSynchronizationRegistry interface and the UOWManager interface are introduced so that all types of units of work (UOWs) that the product supports can register with a JTA transaction and can be manipulated.

Local transaction containment (LTC)

In this release, a local transaction containment (LTC) is shareable, that is, a single LTC can span multiple application components, including Web application components and enterprise beans that use container-managed transactions, so that those components can share connections without using a global transaction. Sharing a single resource manager between application components improves performance, increases scalability, and reduces lock contention for resources.

Task overview: Data Studio pureQuery

JPA in the Java EE and Java SE environments provides optional support for the DB2 pureQuery runtime environment. PureQuery is a high performance Java data access platform that helps manage applications that access data. PureQuery provides an alternate set of APIs that can be used instead of Java Database Connectivity (JDBC) to access the DB2 database.

Using SOAP over Java Message Service to transport Web services

WebSphere Application Server Version 7 introduces support for an emerging industry standard SOAP over JMS protocol. The SOAP over JMS specification provides a standard set of interoperability

guidelines for using a JMS-compliant transport with SOAP messages to enable interoperability between the implementations of different vendors. Using this standard, a mixture of client and server components from different vendors can interoperate when exchanging SOAP request and response messages over the JMS transport for both Java API for XML Web Services (JAX-WS) and Java API for XML-based RPC (JAX-RPC) Web services. By using the JMS transport, your enterprise beans based Web service clients and servers can communicate through JMS queues and topics instead of through HTTP connections.

Web Services Addressing annotations

This release provides support for the WS-Addressing annotations specified by the JAX-WS 2.1 standard. Use these annotations in the Java code for a Web service, to enable WS-Addressing support, to specify whether WS-Addressing information is required in incoming messages, and to specify actions to be associated with a Web service operation or fault response.

· Web Services Addressing support

This release provides support for the Java API for XML-Based Web Services (JAX-WS) 2.1 API, which you can use to create portable applications that use WS-Addressing. Existing JAX-WS applications will work as before.

· Web Services Atomic Transaction support in the application serve

WebSphere Application Server supports both the WS-Transaction 1.1 and the WS-Transaction 1.0 specifications. You can configure the default WS-Transaction specification level to use for outbound requests if the specification level that the server requires cannot be determined from the provider policy. This applies to outbound requests that include a Web Services Atomic Transaction (WS-AT) or Web Services Business Activity (WS-BA) coordination context.

• Web Services Atomic Transaction support in the application server

WebSphere Application Server supports both the WS-Transaction 1.1 and the WS-Transaction 1.0 specifications. You can configure the default WS-Transaction specification level to use for outbound requests if the specification level that the server requires cannot be determined from the provider policy. This applies to outbound requests that include a Web Services Atomic Transaction (WS-AT) or Web Services Business Activity (WS-BA) coordination context.

WS-ReliableMessaging: supported specifications and standards

In this release, there are two types of WS-Notification service:

- Version 7.0: You configure a Version 7.0 WS-Notification service and service points if you want to compose a JAX-WS WS-Notification service with WS-ReliableMessaging, or if you want to apply JAX-WS handlers to your WS-Notification service. This is the recommended type of service for new deployments.
- Version 6.1: You configure a Version 6.1 WS-Notification service and service points if you want to expose a JAX-RPC WS-Notification service using the same technology provided in WebSphere Application Server Version 6.1, including the ability to apply JAX-RPC handlers to the service.

Before installing WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0, it is VERY IMPORTANT that you review the current Preventive Service Planning (PSP) information. The PSP buckets maintain current lists (which have been identified since the package was created) of any recommended or required service for this package's installation. This includes software PSP information that contains HIPER, special attention and/or required PTFs against the base release. If you obtained WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 as part of a CBPDO, there is HOLDDATA and PSP information included on the CBPDO.

If the CBPDO for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 is more than two weeks old when you install it, you should retrieve and read the current Preventive Service Planning "bucket" (PSP bucket) before installing the product or applying service. Current PSP buckets for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS can be obtained by:

- · Calling the support center to order them.
- · Using SoftwareXcel to download them.
- · Pointing your web browser to

Then under the heading "Other Valuable Resources" and title "Planning Resources", clicking on the link, <u>Preventive Service Planning (PSP) Buckets</u> to access the applicable PSP upgrade.

While there can be overlap between SW, HW and functional PSP buckets, reviewing all that apply to this package will ensure that you identify any known service required for your installation of this package.

If you obtained WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 as part of a CBPDO, there is HOLDDATA included on the CBPDO.

PSP Buckets are identified by UPGRADEs, which specify product levels, and SUBSETs, which specify the FMIDs for a product level. The UPGRADE and SUBSET values for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 are:

4.0 Program and Service Level Information

This section identifies the program and any relevant service levels of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0. The program level refers to the APAR fixes incorporated into the program. The service level refers to the PTFs incorporated into the program.

4.1 Program Level Information

All applicable WebSphere Application Server for z/OS service as of Service Level (Fix Pack) 6.1.0.9 of WebSphere Application Server V6.1.0 for z/OS has been incorporated into WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

4.2 Service Level Information

No PTFs against this release of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 have been incorporated into the product tape.

Over time it is HIGHLY recommended that you frequently check the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 PSP bucket for HIPER and SPECIAL Attention PTFs against all FMID(s) which should be installed.

5.0 Installation Requirements and Considerations

The following sections identify the system requirements for installing and activating WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0. The following terminology is used:

- Driving system: the system used to install the program.
- Target system: the system on which the program is installed.

In many cases, the same system can be used as both a driving system and a target system. However, you may want to set up a clone of your system to use as a target system by making a separate IPL-able copy of the running system. The clone should include copies of all system libraries that SMP/E updates, copies of the SMP/E CSI data sets that describe the system libraries, and your PARMLIB and PROCLIB.

Although not applicable to WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0, some cases where two systems should be used include the following:

- When installing a new level of a product that is already installed, the new product will delete the old
 one. By installing onto a separate target system, you can test the new product while still keeping the
 old one in production.
- When installing a product that shares libraries or load modules with other products, the installation can
 disrupt the other products. Installing onto a test system or clone will allow you to assess these
 impacts without disrupting your production system.

5.1 Driving System Requirements

This section describes the environment of the driving system required to install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

5.1.1 Machine Requirements

The driving system can run in any hardware environment that supports the required software.

A <u>mandatory installation requisite</u> identifies products that are required, without exception, or this product **will not install** on your system; these requisites include products specified as PREs or REQs.

5.2.2.3 Toleration/Coexistence Requisites: A <u>toleration/coexistence requisite</u> is defined as a product which must be present on a sharing system. These systems can be other systems in a multisystem environment (not necessarily sysplex), a shared DASD environment (such as test and production), or systems that reuse the same DASD at different time intervals.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 has **no** toleration/coexistence requisites.

5.2.2.4 Incompatibility (Negative) Requisites: A <u>negative requisite</u> identifies products which **must not** be installed on the same system as this product.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 has no negative requisites.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 will require several thousand additional tracks (3390) for run-time data sets; the amount of space depends on the application server structure to be used, the applications to be run and the amount of data storage the applications will require.

5.3 FMIDs Deleted

Installing WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 might result in the deletion of other FMIDs. To see what FMIDs will be deleted, examine the ++VER statement in the product's SMPMCS.

If you do not wish to delete these FMIDs at this time, you must install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 into separate SMP/E target and distribution zones.

Note: These FMIDs will not automatically be deleted from the Global Zone. Consult the SMP/E manuals for instructions on how to do this.

- WebSphere Application Server Version 6.0.1 for z/OS (5655-N01)
- WebSphere Application Server Version 6.1.0 for z/OS (5655-N01)

- NOTE!

Only migration from WebSphere Application Server Version 5.1.x for z/OS and up is supported. See 7.2.1, "Migrating from Previous Releases of WebSphere Application Server" on page 56 for more information migrating.

The IBM Software Development Kit for z/OS Java 2 Technology Edition, Version 1.5, which is included as part of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0, is a functional successor to various Java products from IBM, including those shipped with previous releases of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS and OS/390.

If you have previously installed any of these products, you should take the following considerations into account when installing WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

5.4.1 SMP/E Considerations

We recommend that you install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 into a new set of SMP/E zones, including SMPCSI, target, distribution, and HFS or zFS data sets, to allow independent maintenance of WebSphere, z/OS, and other subsystems. This program directory provides sample jobs and instructions to create such an SMP/E environment.

If you install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 into SMP/E target and distribution zones which contains a previous WebSphere Application Server release, you should completely remove the old release from the target and distribution zones **before** installing the new release. This can be done by receiving, applying, and accepting a "dummy sysmod" such as the following:

This will remove the old WebSphere release from target and distribution libraries as well as from the SMPCSI; therefore, you may wish to make copies of these libraries before applying the sysmod above. Once the old WebSphere release has been deleted, remove any DDDEFs for the old release from the target and distribution zones, and install the new WebSphere release with new target and distribution data sets, using the instructions in this program directory.

5.4.2 Selecting Driving System Mountpoints

During installation of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 on the driving system, the product file system must be mounted at the following mountpoints:

For WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0

-PathPrefix-/usr/lpp/zWebSphere/V7R0

For WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 Optional Materials

-PathPrefix-/usr/lpp/zWebSphere_OM/V7R0

For WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 DMZ Secure Proxy Server

-PathPrefix-/usr/lpp/zWebSphere SPS/V7R0

where -PathPrefix- is an HFS or zFS path prefix such as /SERVICE or /WAS70. Use of a path prefix allows maintenance to be applied to a copy of the WebSphere HFS or zFS data sets without disturbing the production HFS or zFS data sets. For more information on the use of an HFS or zFS path prefix during product maintenance, see the Unix System Services Planning book for your release of z/OS.

Care must be taken that maintenance is applied to the proper HFS or zFS. Be sure to verify that the correct HFS or zFS is mounted at your service mountpoint(s) whenever maintenance is applied.

5.4.3 Selecting Target System Mountpoints

During customization and operation of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS, the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS product file system must be mounted on the target system. The default mountpoint is:

/usr/lpp/zWebSphere/V7R0

If the optional materials are used, then the optional materials file system must also be mounted on the target system. The default mountpoint is:

/usr/lpp/zWebSphere_OM/V7R0

If the DMZ Secure Proxy Server is used, then the DMZ Secure Proxy Server file system must also be mounted on the target system. The default mountpoint is:

/usr/lpp/zWebSphere_SPS/V7R0

If you run several releases or service levels of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS concurrently or if you use WebSphere Application Server in a sysplex or multi-system environment, you may need to change these default mountpoints to meet local requirements.

Note: WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 also uses a "customization file system" for each server node. Data in this filesystem is **not** compatible with releases of WebSphere prior to WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0. Do not attempt to reuse a customization file system from WebSphere Application Server V5.0, V5.1, V6.0.x, and V6.1.0 with WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

5.4.4 Removal of WebSphere Levels

WebSphere Application Server versions prior to WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 should be maintained until all applications have been migrated to Version 7.0.0.

Refer to the WebSphere Information Center Reference Library for migrating to V7.0.0.

6.0 Installation Instructions

This chapter describes the installation method and the step-by-step procedures to install and activate the functions of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0, including the optional materials.

This release of WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 is installed using the SMP/E RECEIVE, APPLY, and ACCEPT commands. The SMP/E dialogs may be used to accomplish the SMP/E installation steps.

Note: WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 can be installed into new or existing SMP/E zones.

6.1 Installing the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS

Certain installation steps (as noted below) must be run from a userid that is defined to Unix Systems Services, and has the following attributes:

- Ability to mount filesystems and modify Unix System Services files any one of the following ways:
 - UID(0) or
 - READ access to the FACILITY class BPX SUPERUSER or
 - CONTROL access to the UNIXPRIV class SUPERUSER FILESYS, UPDATE access to the UNIXPRIV class SUPERUSER.FILESYS.MOUNT, and READ access to the UNIXPRIV class SUPERUSER.FILESYS.CHANGEPERMS. (See the z/OS Unix System Service Planning publication for more information about UNIXPRIV classes.)
- READ access or higher to the BPX.FILEATTR.PROGCTL, BPX.FILEATTR.APF, and BPX.FILEATTR.SHARELIB facility classes is required.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS supplies the following install samples:

- BBOCSICR Create an SMP/E global zone
- BBOZNCRT Create SMPE target and distribution zones
- BBOXZDEF Add additional target zone definitions for cross-zone prerequisite checking
- BBOALLOC Allocate target and distribution libraries
- BBOISMKD Sample JOB to invoke supplied BBOMKDIR EXEC to create HFS or zFS paths
- BBODDDEF Define SMP/E DDDEFs
- BBOAPPLY SMP/E APPLY the product and service
- BBOACCEP SMP/E ACCEPT the product and service

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 Optional Materials supplies the following install samples:

• IWOALLOC - Allocate target and distribution libraries

- IWOISMKD Sample JOB to invoke supplied IWOMKDIR EXEC to create HFS or zFS paths
- IWODDDEF Define SMP/E DDDEFs
- IWOAPPLY SMP/E APPLY the FMID and service
- IWOACCEP SMP/E ACCEPT the FMID and service

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 DMZ Secure Proxy Server supplies the following install samples:

- DYZALLOC Allocate target and distribution libraries
- DYZISMKD Sample JOB to invoke supplied DYZMKDIR EXEC to create HFS or zFS paths
- DYZDDDEF Define SMP/E DDDEFs
- DYZAPPLY SMP/E APPLY the FMID and service
- DYZACCEP SMP/E ACCEPT the FMID and service

6.1.1 SMP/E Considerations for Installing WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0

We recommend that you install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 into a new set of SMP/E zones, including target, distribution, and HFS or zFS data sets. This allows separate maintenance of z/OS and WebSphere software. Sample jobs BBOCSICR and BBOZNCRT can be customized for your system and used to create a new CSI and SMP/E TARGET and DLIB zones. These jobs can be found in the product RELFILE IBM.H28W700.F1, which is loaded during SMP/E processing; see Figure 17 for a list of sample jobs.

Note: If you choose to install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 into existing SMP/E target and distribution zones, be sure to remove any previous versions of WebSphere Application Server from the zones and remove the previous version's DDDEFs **before** installing the new version. See 5.4.1, "SMP/E Considerations" on page 38 for more information.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 installation does not require a DDDEF for SYSLIB; however, SMP/E APPLY processing expects to find one. If necessary, create DDDEFs for SMPMTS and SYS1.MACLIB, and create a SYSLIB DDDEF that points to a concatenation of these two data sets. See *IBM SMP/E for z/OS and OS/390 Reference* for more information about the SYSLIB concatenation.

6.1.2 Sample Jobs

Sample jobs to allocate the target and distribution libraries, set up HFS or zFS directories, and create DDDEF entries for the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 elements have been provided.

Figure 17 lists the sample jobs for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

6.1.3 Allocate SMP/E CSI (Optional)

If you are using an existing CSI, do not execute this job.

If you are allocating a new SMP/E CSI data set for this install, edit and submit sample job BBOCSICR to allocate the SMP/E CSI data set for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.1.4 Define New SMP/E TARGET and DLIB Zones (Optional)

Edit and submit sample job BBOZNCRT to define new SMP/E Target and Distribution zones. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.1.5 Add Target Zones for Cross-Zone Prerequisite Checking

Because the WebSphere Application Server component has a number of maintenance requirements for the target z/OS systems, we recommend that you add the appropriate SMP/E target zones (z/OS, DB2, CICS, and IMS) to the WebSphere Application Server SMP/E global zone. This will allow SMP/E to check each zone for maintenance required by WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

Customize and run the BBOXZDEF job to add target zones to the global zone which will be used for the SMP/E APPLY and ACCEPT steps below.

6.1.6 Perform SMP/E RECEIVE

Receive the function SYSMOD and service for the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 by running the RCVPDO job and specifying FMID **H28W700**. For more information, refer to *MVS CBPDO Memo to User Extension* included with the CBPDO.

The CBPDO contains all non-integrated PTFs for every WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 FMID. (Cumulative service is included in CBPDO orders, so there is no separate cumulative service tape.) Depending on the options selected when you ordered the CBPDO, your order may contain service for other products in your profile.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.1.7 Define Target and Distribution Libraries

Customize and run the BBOALLOC sample job to define target and distribution libraries for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

Make sure the data sets are allocated on the desired volumes.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.1.8 Set Up HFS or zFS Directories

Customize the sample job BBOISMKD to mount the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS product HFS or zFS and create the HFS or zFS target directories needed to install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0.

Important!

- The BBOISMKD and BBODDDEF jobs use -PathPrefix- to represent a service directory on your driving system. It is assumed that you will be mounting WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 HFS or zFS data sets under a service directory that already contains the /usr and /usr/lpp directories. If you specify a -PathPrefix- directory which does not contain /usr and usr/lpp subdirectories, you must manually create these subdirectories before running the BBOISMKD job. If -PathPrefix-/usr/lpp is not a read/write HFS or zFS, you will need to manually create some additional subdirectories as well. See the comments in the BBOISMKD job for further information.
- The BBOISMKD job will mount the product HFS or zFS and create all product directories in it.

The customized sample job BBOISMKD must be run under a user ID with a number of system privileges; see 6.1, "Installing the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS" on page 40 for a summary of privileges that are needed to run BBOISMKD successfully

Check the job output to verify that all directories have been created.

Verify that the product HFS or zFS is mounted at

-PathPrefix-/usr/lpp/zWebSphere/V7R0

6.1.9 Define SMP/E DDDEFs

Customize and run the sample job BBODDDEF to create SMP/E DDDEFs for target and distribution data sets and directories.

Be sure to edit the SMPJHOME DDDEF entry to point to a Java SDK (having been already mounted on the driving system). This DDDEF is used during APPLY and RESTORE processing to locate the jar command.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.1.10 Perform SMP/E APPLY

Customize and run the sample job BBOAPPLY to perform an SMP/E APPLY CHECK of the WebSphere Application Server base and service.

The SMP/E apply job must be run with a user ID having a number of system privileges; see 6.1, "Installing the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS" on page 40 for a summary of privileges that are needed to run BBOAPPLY successfully.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do not bypass any of the following on the APPLY CHECK: PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ. This is because the SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause only of ERRORS and not of WARNINGS (bypassed SYSMODs are treated as warnings, not errors, by SMP/E).

Note: The GROUPEXTEND operand indicates that SMP/E should APPLY all requisite SYSMODS. The requisite SYSMODS may be part of other products; review the APPLY CHECK output carefully before proceeding.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly (or a return code of 4, if any HOLDs are bypassed).

Once you have resolved any problems indicated by the APPLY CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the APPLY.

Expected Return Codes from APPLY:

You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly (or a return code of 4, if any HOLDs are bypassed).

6.1.11 Perform SMP/E ACCEPT

Customize and run the sample job BBOACCEP to perform an SMP/E ACCEPT CHECK of the WebSphere Application Server base and service.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do not bypass any of the following on the ACCEPT CHECK: PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ. This is because the SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause only of ERRORS and not of WARNINGS (bypassed SYSMODs are treated as warnings, not errors, by SMP/E).

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

Once you have resolved any problems indicated by the ACCEPT CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the ACCEPT.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.2 Installing the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 **Optional Materials**

The optional materials for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS will be shipped as service to the function SYSMOD JIWO700. Follow the instructions in section to install the function SYSMOD and prepare the optional materials HFS or zFS.

The WebSphere Application Server for z/OS optional materials must be installed into SMP/E target and distribution zones that contain the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS base product. Install the JIWO700 function SYSMOD (and its service) into the same SMP/E zones used for H28W700.

6.2.1 Sample Jobs

Sample jobs to allocate the target and distribution libraries, set up HFS or zFS directories, and create DDDEF entries for the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 Optional Materials have been provided.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.3 Installing DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server

The DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server must be installed into SMP/E target and distribution zones than contain the WebSphere Application Server for the z/OS base product. Install the JDYZ700 function sysmod (and its service) into the same SMP/E zones used for H28W700.

Certain installation steps (as noted below) must be run from a userid that is defined to Unix Systems Services, and has the following attributes:

- Ability to mount filesystems and modify Unix System Services files any one of the following ways:
 - UID(0) or
 - READ access to the FACILITY class BPX SUPERUSER or

- CONTROL access to the UNIXPRIV class SUPERUSER FILESYS, UPDATE access to the UNIXPRIV class SUPERUSER.FILESYS.MOUNT, and READ access to the UNIXPRIV class SUPERUSER.FILESYS.CHANGEPERMS. (See the z/OS Unix System Service Planning publication for more information about UNIXPRIV classes.)
- READ access or higher to the BPX.FILEATTR.PROGCTL, BPX.FILEATTR.APF, and BPX.FILEATTR.SHARELIB facility classes is required.

6.3.1 Sample Jobs

Sample jobs to allocate the target and distribution libraries, set up HFS or zFS directories, and create DDDEF entries for the DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server elements have been provided.

Figure 19 lists the sample jobs for DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server.

Each sample job contains comments with specific instructions for customization.

You may also choose to copy the jobs from the tape or product files by submitting the job below. Use either the //TAPEIN or the //FILEIN DD statement, depending on your distribution medium, and comment out or delete the other statement. Add a job card and change the lowercase parameters to uppercase values to meet your site's requirements before submitting.

6.3.2 Perform SMP/E RECEIVE

//STEP1

EXEC PGM=IEBCOPY

Receive the function SYSMOD and service for the DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server by running the RCVPDO job and specifying FMID **JDYZ700**. For more information, refer to *MVS CBPDO Memo to User Extension* included with the CBPDO.

The CBPDO contains all non-integrated PTFs for every WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 FMID. (Cumulative service is included in CBPDO orders, so there is no separate cumulative service tape.) Depending on the options selected when you ordered the CBPDO, your order may contain service for other products in your profile.

6.3.3 Define Target and Distribution Libraries

Customize and run the DYZALLOC sample job to define target and distribution libraries for DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server.

Make sure the data sets are allocated on the desired volumes.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.3.4 Set Up HFS or zFS Directories

Customize the sample job DYZISMKD to mount the WebSphere Application Server DMZ Secure Proxy Server product HFS or zFS and create the HFS or zFS target directories needed to install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 DMZ Secure Proxy Server.

Important!

- The DYZISMKD and DYZDDDEF jobs use -PathPrefix- to represent a service directory on your driving system. It is assumed that you will be mounting DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server HFS or zFS data sets under a service directory that already contains the /usr and /usr/lpp directories. If you specify a -PathPrefix- directory which does not contain /usr and usr/lpp subdirectories, you must manually create these subdirectories before running the DYZISMKD job. If -PathPrefix-/usr/lpp is not a read/write HFS or zFS, you will need to manually create some additional subdirectories as well. See the comments in the DYZISMKD job for further information.
- The DYZISMKD job will mount the product HFS or zFS and create all product directories in it.

The customized sample job DYZISMKD must be run under a user ID with a number of system privileges; see 6.3, "Installing DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server" on page 50 for a summary of privileges that are needed to run DYZISMKD successfully

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

Check the job output to verify that all directories have been created.

Verify that the product HFS or zFS is mounted at

-PathPrefix-/usr/lpp/zWebSphere_SPS/V7R0

6.3.5 Define SMP/E DDDEFs

Customize and run the sample job DYZDDDEF to create SMP/E DDDEFs for target and distribution data sets and directories.

6.3.6 Perform SMP/E APPLY

Customize and run the sample job DYZAPPLY to perform an SMP/E APPLY CHECK of the DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server base and service.

The SMP/E apply job must be run with a user ID having a number of system privileges; see 6.3, "Installing DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server" on page 50 for a summary of privileges that are needed to run DYZISMKD successfully.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do *not* bypass any of the following on the APPLY CHECK: PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ. This is because the SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause only of **ERRORS** and not of **WARNINGS** (bypassed SYSMODs are treated as warnings, not errors, by SMP/E).

Note: The GROUPEXTEND operand indicates that SMP/E should APPLY all requisite SYSMODS. The requisite SYSMODS may be part of other products; review the APPLY CHECK output carefully before proceeding.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly (or a return code of 4, if any HOLDs are bypassed).

Once you have resolved any problems indicated by the APPLY CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the APPLY.

Expected Return Codes from APPLY:

You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly (or a return code of 4, if any HOLDs are bypassed).

6.3.7 Perform SMP/E ACCEPT

Customize and run the sample job DYZACCEP to perform an SMP/E ACCEPT CHECK of the DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server base and service.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do *not* bypass any of the following on the ACCEPT CHECK: PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ. This is because the SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause only of **ERRORS** and not of **WARNINGS** (bypassed SYSMODs are treated as warnings, not errors, by SMP/E).

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

Once you have resolved any problems indicated by the ACCEPT CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the ACCEPT.

7.0 Activation Instructions

7.1 Activating WebSphere Application Server

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 must be configured once SMP/E installation is complete. See *WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 Installing your application serving environment*, GA32-0601 for more information along with additional information from the WebSphere Information Center, which is located at:

At this location click "SHOW" for WebSphere Application Server - z/OS. Then either select *information* center documentation and topic **Installing Your Application Server Environment**

Select the BOOK format documentation and topic Installing Your Application Server Environment.

7.1.1 Mount the HFS or zFS Data Set on the Target System

Before proceeding with activation, unmount the WebSphere Application Server HFS or zFS data sets on the driving system, and mount them on the target system at the target system mountpoints. See 5.4.3, "Selecting Target System Mountpoints" on page 39, for assistance in selecting the mountpoints. If you have selected the default mountpoints, you can use the following TSO commands on your target system to mount the HFS or zFS data sets:

MOUNT FILESYSTEM('hlq.SBBOHFS') MOUNTPOINT('/usr/lpp/zWebSphere/V7R0') TYPE(HFS) MODE(READ) MOUNT FILESYSTEM('hlq.SIWOHFS') MOUNTPOINT('/usr/lpp/zWebSphere_OM/V7R0') TYPE(HFS) MODE(READ)

If you choose not to install the optional materials or DMZ Secure Proxy Server, omit the MOUNT commands for those file systems that were not created.

You will probably want to add these mounts to your BPXPRMxx members in parmlib to ensure that these data sets is always mounted. When, at a later date, you need to perform service on the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 product:

- · Temporarily unmount the HFS or zFS data sets
- Mount the HFS or zFS data sets to be serviced at the service (-PathPrefix-) mountpoints you created for installation.
- · Apply the service.

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- Unmount the HFS or zFS data sets from the service mountpoints.
- · Remount at the production mountpoints.

7.2 Activating DMZ Secure Proxy Server for WebSphere Application Server

The DMZ Secure Proxy Server uses a limited subset of WebSphere Application Server modules in order to provide a secure proxy environment in the "demilitarized zone" (a computer system or systems separated by a firewall from the systems running the base WebSphere Application Server product). This reduced set of modules is contained in the SDYZHFS product filesystem.

Before configuring secure proxy servers in the demilitarized zone, you must copy the SDYZHFS product file system to the z/OS system(s) on which you wish to configure the servers. A single shared copy of SDYZHFS can be used if desired; however, to ensure proxy security, the systems running the secure proxy servers should not have access to the WebSphere Application Server product file system, SBBOHFS. See the Topic, Setting up intermediary services in the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 Information Center for more information.

7.2.1 Migrating from Previous Releases of WebSphere Application Server

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V7.0.0 supports migration from V5.1.x and later releases.
