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Chapter 1. Overview of WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino

With WebSphere® Adapter for Lotus® Domino®, you can create modules that can exchange information with the Lotus Domino server. The adapter provides bidirectional exchange of business data between Service Component Architecture (SCA) applications and the Lotus Domino server. The business data can be Domino documents such as a calendar entry, to-do item, or a note.

The adapter enables two-way communication between an application running on IBM® Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus and a database. Using the adapter, an application can send requests to create, update, delete, or retrieve the documents in a database. The adapter has a built-in mechanism to support Enterprise Metadata Discovery (EMD), complex and rich text fields, and attachments in a document.

The adapter is imported and configured in a module that is created in your development environment and deployed to your application server or integration broker. After configuration, the adapter acts like a service provider in part of a service-oriented architecture (SOA) implementation and provides operations to retrieve or create documents in a Domino database. Client applications interact with the module instead of directly with the Lotus Domino server. This configuration gives the benefit of shielding the authentication details (such as user name and password) that you provide when you set up a module from the client applications and services outside of the module. The adapter exposes a service interface that hides the mechanics of how the data or operations are obtained or performed.

With WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino software, you can automatically generate an interface to the Lotus Domino server to hide the lower-level details of the function. Depending on how you want to use the adapter, you can embed it with the deployed module, or install the adapter as a stand-alone component, to be used by more than one application. The adapter is deployed to IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus. The application component interacts with the adapter instead of with the Lotus Domino server.

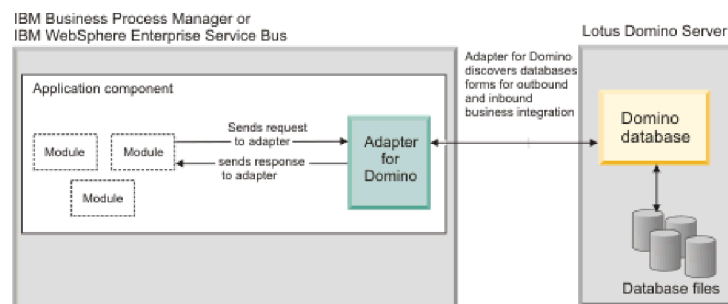


Figure 1. An application component calls the WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino, and the adapter interacts with the Lotus Domino server to obtain the data.

The adapter, which you generate with the external service wizard of Integration Designer, uses a standard interface and standard data objects. The adapter takes the standard data object sent by the application component and calls the Lotus Domino server. The adapter then returns a standard data object to the application

component. The application component does not have to deal directly with the Lotus Domino server. It is the WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino that calls the function and returns the results.

The module that you create is a reusable unit designed to complete a specific inbound or outbound service. Each module uses a consistent interface and standard business objects, so applications consuming the service do not have to understand the lower-level details of the Lotus Domino server.

Technical overview of WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino

The adapter supports bidirectional exchange of business data between business applications and the Lotus Domino server. The adapter provides outbound and inbound processing under the Java Platform, Enterprise Edition (JEE) Connector Architecture (JCA) and integrates with Service Component Architecture (SCA) components.

The adapter provides the means for services running on IBM Integration Designer to exchange documents with one or more Domino servers. The services are contained in a module, which consists of both a project in IBM Integration Designer and a unit of deployment to IBM Business Process Manager. The module is packaged and deployed to IBM Business Process Manager as an enterprise archive (EAR) file.

Overview of the Domino products

The important constituents of the Lotus Domino suite of products are:

- Lotus Domino server: The Lotus Domino server provides a document database, a collaboration application server, and a mail server.
- Lotus Domino Administrator client: It is the administration tool of the Lotus Domino server.

- Lotus Domino Designer client: It is used for designing Lotus Domino applications.

Lotus Domino server metadata

WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino interacts with the Lotus Domino server using the metadata constituents.

- Database: The Lotus Domino server provides the built-in “NSF” format database, which contains all documents, forms, and scripts.
- Document: A document contains data in its various fields. There can be several types of documents in a database.
- Form: A form defines the structure of a document; the types of fields that a document contains. The business object structure in the adapter corresponds to a form in the Domino database.
- Item: The field in a document is called an item. The item has an item name, an item type, and one or multiple item values associated with it. A field in the business object is mapped to an item in the document. When the item is allowed to have multiple values, the mapped field in the business object is an array.

Outbound processing

WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino supports outbound request processing. When the adapter receives a request, which is sent in the form of a business object from the module, it processes the request and returns the result as a business object. The adapter provides a standard set of outbound operations.

Outbound processing begins when a module receives a business object from a service, which is called a request. When a request is received, the adapter uses the information stored in the business object and metadata from the interaction specification properties to perform an operation on the Lotus Domino server.

The adapter supports the following outbound operations:

- Create
- Update
- Delete
- Exists
- Retrieve
- RetrieveAll

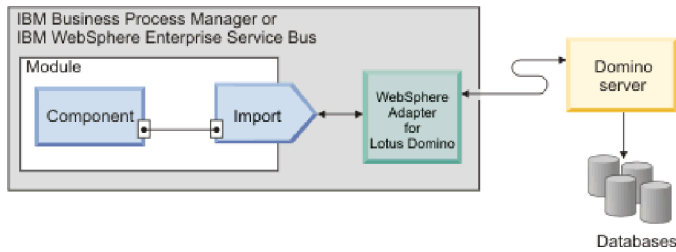


Figure 2. WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino as part of an outbound SOA implementation

Figure 2 on page 4 shows how the adapter and module function together as part of an outbound service. A module created for outbound processing receives the request. The adapter determines the operation to be performed based on the information received in the metadata from the interaction specification properties. It then performs the operation on the Lotus Domino server.

The adapter connects to the Lotus Domino server with the server address, Domino Internet Inter-ORB Protocol (DIIOP) port number, user name, and password information. After connecting to the Lotus Domino server, the adapter lists all databases in the connected server. In each database, there can be several types of documents. Each type of document is called a form. The adapter lists all forms in a database and allows user to select the forms as business object types. For each selected business object type, method binding artifacts are generated to support outbound operations.

Note: All business data and metadata are stored in the Domino databases.

Outbound operations

Application components use operations to perform actions, such as retrieving data from databases in the Lotus Domino server. The adapter provides certain outbound operations. The name of the operation typically indicates the type of action that the adapter takes, such as Create or Update.

During outbound processing, the calling component (part of SCA application) calls the adapter to connect and work with business data on the Lotus Domino server. All interactions between the calling component and the server are request-response type.

Create operation:

The Create operation creates a document in the Lotus Domino server with the specified content.

The adapter receives a request in the form of a business object to create a document in the Lotus Domino server. The adapter processes the request and a document with a Universal ID is created in the specified database of the Lotus Domino server. The content of the document comes from the attribute values of the request business object.

After the document is created, the document content is sent back to the calling component as a response to indicate that the document was created successfully.

The response sent back to the calling component has the same business object structure as the request business object.

Note: To support attachments for rich text and rich text lite fields when creating documents, specify the FilePath of the attachments. It enables the adapter to get the source files by following the specified path.

When a processing error occurs, the Create operation might throw the `InvalidParentDocumentFault` fault. For more information about these business faults, refer to “Fault business objects” on page 114.

Update operation:

The Update operation updates a document in the Lotus Domino server based on the request from the SCA.

The adapter receives the update request from the SCA application along with the Universal ID of the document. The adapter processes the request and makes the specified updates to the document.

Note: A document in the Lotus Domino server has a Universal ID and a Note ID associated with it. The adapter uses the value set in the Universal ID to search the document in the Domino database. If the Universal ID is not provided in the request business object, the adapter tries to use the value set in the Note ID. The adapter throws an error when both the Universal ID and the Note ID are not provided in the request business object.

By default, the adapter updates only those items in the document that have valid data in the business object. The remaining items are not updated in the document. The items in a document in the Lotus Domino server correspond to the fields in a business object of the WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino. During update, if the value of a business object field is explicitly set to null, the adapter updates the document by removing the item from the document.

Note:

- If a field in the business object is of `array([])` type, you can set the first value in the array as null to remove this item from the document in the Lotus Domino server.
- When updating the rich text or rich text lite fields, specify the `Overwrite` attribute to append or overwrite the fields.

After the document is updated, it is sent back to the calling component to indicate that the document was updated successfully.

The response sent back to the calling component has the same business object structure as the request business object. The response also has attributes that include the Universal ID and information about the result of the operation.

Note: No response documents (children) to the actual documents are removed during the Update operation.

The Update operation might throw the `InvalidRequestFault`, the `DocumentNotFoundFault`, or the `InvalidParentDocumentFault` fault depending upon the processing error. For more information about these business faults, refer to “Fault business objects” on page 114.

Exists operation:

The Exists operation checks if a document exists in the Lotus Domino server.

The adapter receives the request to check if a document is available in the database along with the Universal ID of the document. The adapter processes the request and checks if the document is present in the Lotus Domino server.

Note: A document in the Lotus Domino server has a Universal ID and a Note ID associated with it. The adapter uses the value set in the Universal ID to search the document in the Domino database. If the Universal ID is not provided in the request business object, the adapter tries to use the value set in the Note ID. The adapter throws an error when both the Universal ID and the Note ID are not provided in the request business object.

The response business object is sent back to the calling component. The attributes in the business object include the Universal ID and information about the result of the operation.

When there is a processing error, the Exists operation might throw the InvalidRequestFault fault. For more information about these business faults, refer to “Fault business objects” on page 114.

RetrieveAll operation:

The RetrieveAll operation is used to retrieve the documents from the database in the Lotus Domino server that matches the values specified in the search fields.

You can specify one or more of the following criteria in the business object sent with the outbound request.

- **Document business data:** When you specify document business data in the business object, the adapter reads all the valid data from the business object. The data are represented as items in the Domino document. The adapter searches the database for documents that match these valid data. All the matching documents that can be represented using the business object are returned as response to the calling component.
- **ParentDocumentUNID:** When you specify a valid ParentDocumentUNID in the business object, the adapter retrieves all the child documents to this parent document. All the matching documents that can be represented using the business object are returned as response to the calling component.
- **No data set:** When you do not provide a data set in the business object, the adapter retrieves all the documents that can be represented using the business object. The adapter matches the fields in the documents with the stored values in the business object.

The retrieved documents are populated in a container business object and sent back to the calling component. The container business object has the following structure:

```
<DatabaseName><FormName>Container --> <DatabaseName><FormName> []
```

Search implementation using database search method

The RetrieveAll operation supports searching of documents based on the following types of search criteria that you can specify during the run time:

- **Single values:** You can specify a single value in the search criteria. For example, the adapter can retrieve documents based on the single word, number, or date specified in the search field. You can find more information about the search values that can be specified in the Number and Date type fields in the following points.
 - **Numbers:** You can specify a double digit number or an integer value as the search criteria in the Numbers type field. You can use this search function to retrieve documents where a Number type field equals to a certain value. For

example, to retrieve documents where employee salary equals to "1234.56", enter the value "1234.56" in the EmployeeSalary field.

- **Date:** You can specify a date as the search criteria in any Date type field. For example, to retrieve documents where birthday equals to "1982/11/22", enter the value "1982/11/22" in the Birthday field.

Note: The Date format depends on the client that starts the WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino. The client can be JavaServer Pages (JSP), a Java program, or a IBM Integration Designer test component.

- **Multiple values:** You can specify multiple values as the search criteria for any Lotus Domino field types. This feature can be used to find the documents with the specified values at run time. For example, you can configure the adapter to retrieve documents that match any one of the words from the multiple words specified in the search criteria.
- **Text search for rich text contents:** You can specify the text in order to search documents that have rich text contents at run time. The adapter conducts a search by using the text specified in the RichText field of a document during the run time. During the RetrieveAll operation, all matching documents are retrieved by the adapter. The adapter supports both single and multiple text content searches for the RichText field. You can also provide wildcard suffixes, such as "*" for searching documents in the RichText field.
- **Search using multiple fields:** You can specify search values in more than one field. In this configuration, the adapter uses the logical AND operator to group the search strings. For instance, you can specify a single value, multiple values, RichText, or ParentDocumentUNID in different fields. The adapter returns only that search content that matches all the specified criteria.

Search implementation using indexed search method

Indexed search: You can specify index-based search to enable faster text searching, if the target Domino database is full-text indexed. The adapter uses the FTSearch function provided by the Lotus Domino client API. The FTSearch method searches for documents using the full text-index in a database that matches a queried text. The adapter returns exact matches of the search string followed by closer matches.

Note: The indexed search method does not work for RichText, Attachments, and Date fields.

The indexed search method also supports search using multiple fields. You can specify search values in more than one field. In this configuration, the adapter uses the logical AND operator to group the search strings. For instance, you can specify a single value, multiple values, or ParentDocumentUNID in different fields. The adapter returns a logical AND operation of all the specified search criteria, returning exact and close matches for string type fields and exact matches for numeric type fields.

The following are the differences between indexed search and database search methods:

- When the database is fully indexed, the indexed search method is faster compared to the database search method.
- The accuracy of the results returned by the indexed search depends on the updated database indexes.
- The database search returns only the exact matches; whereas indexed search returns exact matches first up in the searched list and then the close matches.

Faults occurrence during the RetrieveAll operation

When there is a processing error, the RetrieveAll operation might throw the InvalidParentDocumentFault or the MatchesExceededLimitFault fault. The InvalidParentDocumentFault fault can occur when an invalid ParentDocumentUNID is specified in the interaction specification. The MatchesExceededLimitFault fault can occur when the matching documents exceed the specified MaxRecords value. For more information about these business faults, see “Fault business objects” on page 114.

Retrieve operation:

The Retrieve operation extracts a document content based on the request from the SCA.

The adapter receives the retrieve request along with the Universal ID of the document. The adapter processes the request and extracts the content of the document from the database in the Lotus Domino server.

Note: A document in the Lotus Domino server has a Universal ID and a Note ID associated with it. The adapter uses the value set in the Universal ID to search the document in the Domino database. If the Universal ID is not provided in the request business object, the adapter tries to use the value set in the Note ID. The adapter throws an error when both the Universal ID and the Note ID are not provided in the request business object.

After the content of the document is retrieved, it is sent back as the response to the calling component. The response has the same business object structure as the request business object. The attributes in the business object include the Universal ID and information about the result of the operation.

When there is a processing error, the Retrieve operation might throw the InvalidRequestFault or the DocumentNotFoundFault fault. For more information about these business faults, refer to “Fault business objects” on page 114.

Delete operation:

The Delete operation deletes a document in the Lotus Domino server based on the request from the SCA.

The adapter receives the delete request along with the Universal ID of the document. The adapter processes the request and removes the document from the Domino database.

Note: A document in the Lotus Domino server has a Universal ID and a Note ID associated with it. The adapter uses the value set in the Universal ID to search the document in the Domino database. If the Universal ID is not provided in the request business object, the adapter tries to use the value set in the Note ID. The adapter throws an error when both the Universal ID and the Note ID are not provided in the request business object.

The response business object is sent back to the calling component. The attributes in the business object include Universal ID and information about the result of the operation.

Note: If there are any response documents (children) to the actual document, then all the child documents are also removed from the Lotus Domino server.

When there is a processing error, the Delete operation might throw the `InvalidRequestFault` or the `DocumentNotFoundFault` fault. For more information about these business faults, refer to “Fault business objects” on page 114.

Inbound processing

WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino supports inbound processing of events. The adapter polls the event database in the Lotus Domino server for events at specified intervals. Each time a form is created or updated, the adapter tracks the process as an event. When the adapter detects an event, it requests a copy of the form, converts the form data into a business object, and sends it to the consuming service.

During inbound processing, the adapter first establishes a connection with the Lotus Domino server. The adapter then polls the event database in the Lotus Domino server at regular intervals for new events. When a document in a database in the Lotus Domino server is created, updated or deleted, the event monitoring agent of the adapter monitors the event and adds that event in the event database. The events related to a document in the database are captured in the same form that also contains the document. The form contains the business object based on the type of an event.

The following illustration shows the inbound processing flow for WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino. The adapter polls the Lotus Domino server for incoming events, converts them into business objects, and then the adapter sends them to a consuming service.

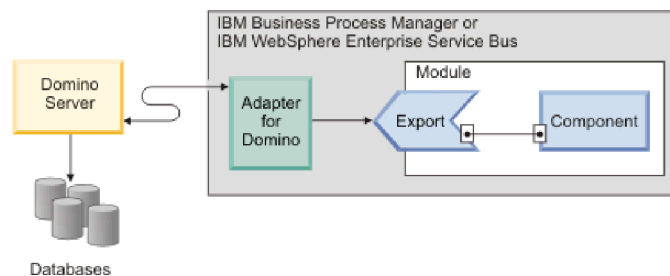


Figure 3. Inbound processing

Note: The adapter provides an extension manager to monitor the create, update, or delete events of a document in the database in the Lotus Domino server. You can configure the extension manager with a document in the Domino database.

When you create, update, or delete a document, the extension manager inserts an event record into the event table to record that event. When the adapter is polling events, it reads the information from this event record and retrieves the relative document. The adapter then returns the document as a business object. For an event type of either create or update, the adapter returns the document as a business object on the adapter workstation. For a delete event, the returned business object contains only the Universal ID of the deleted document.

Note:

- During inbound processing, an exception in the event table EventTab.nsf is handled by the configured exception handler.
- If you want to filter only those events that you have subscribed to, specify the EventTypeFilter property of the activation specification properties. If the EventTypeFilter property is set, the adapter delivers only those events that are in the filter list.

The adapter then forwards the business object to the endpoint which is an exposed interface from an SCA module that offers a business service to the outside world. Business objects contain the information that the adapter obtains from a document in a form structure.

Use the following steps to process the inbound events:

1. Establish a connection to the Lotus Domino server.
2. Poll events from the event table.
3. Retrieve the relative business object based on the event type. For a delete event type, only the Universal ID of the form is retrieved.
4. Deliver the business object to the endpoint.

Support for event based filtering

The adapter supports filtering of events based on the operations you select during the inbound processing. You can select the events to be processed for a single business object in the event table during the Enterprise Metadata Discovery (EMD) phase.

During run time, only the events corresponding to the specified operations are polled by the adapter. For instance, the filter can be specified for Create, Update, and Delete events or only the Create events of a business object, for processing during the inbound operation.

The filtering of events by the adapter ensures that only those events are polled for which the method bindings are created during the EMD phase. This results in successful delivery of events by the adapter.

Support for RichText and Attachments

During run time, the WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino supports retrieval of rich text and attachments. For an event type of either create or update, the business objects containing a RichText field retrieves texts and attachments. If the business objects contain the Attachments field, the value in the hexBinary form is retrieved.

Event store

The event store is a persistent cache where event records are saved until the polling adapter can process them. To keep a track of inbound events as they make their way through the system, the adapter uses an event store.

Each time you create, update, or delete an event record in the Lotus Domino server, it is referred to as an event. The adapter updates the status of the event in an event store, when ever a business object is created, updated, or deleted. For recovery purposes, the status of each event is continually updated by the adapter until the events are delivered to a configured endpoint in the IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus.

For example, an update to the document in the Lotus Domino server triggers the adapter to record the event in the event table. The event record stores information associated with the event such as the event status. The adapter can show the status of an event as 0 for unhandled events, 1 for processed events, or -1 for the failed events. The adapter retrieves this event and the update to the document. The event store implementation by the adapter ensures that data is correctly retrieved from the Lotus Domino server. The adapter then processes the event and delivers the event to the configured endpoint.

Each event store created by the adapter is associated with a particular module; however the same event store can be used by multiple modules. If you want multiple modules to use the same event store, you must set the `EventTypeFilter` property to a different event type for each module using the event store. You can configure the `EventTypeFilter` property in the `ActivationSpec` instance for each module.

During inbound processing, the adapter polls the event business components from the event store at regular intervals. Each time it polls, a number of events are processed by the adapter. Events are processed in ascending order of priority and ascending order of the event time stamp. In each poll cycle, new events are picked up. The adapter retrieves the value set in the `EventID` field of the event table and loads the business object that corresponds to it. The business object is created from the retrieved information and is delivered to the endpoints.

If you set the activation specification property `AssuredOnceDelivery` to `true`, a transaction ID (XID) value is set for each event in the event store. After the event is retrieved for processing, the XID value for the event is updated in the event store. The updated value is displayed in the XID column in the event business component. The event is then delivered to its corresponding endpoint, and the status is updated to show that the event has been successfully delivered. If the application is stopped or the event is not processed completely, the XID column is filled with a value. This process ensures that the event is reprocessed and sent to the endpoint. After the connection is reestablished or the adapter starts again, the adapter checks for events in the event store that have a value in the XID column. The adapter processes these events first and then polls the other events during the poll cycles.

The adapter can either process all the events or process events filtered by business object type. You set the filter through the activation specification property, `EventTypeFilter`. The property contains a comma-delimited list of business object types. Only the types specified in the property are processed. If the `EventTypeFilter` property is not set, then all events are processed. If the `FilterFutureEvents` property is set to `true`, the adapter filters events based on the time stamp. The adapter compares the system time in each poll cycle to the time stamp on each event. If an event is set to occur in the future, it is not processed until that time.

After an event is successfully posted and delivered to the endpoint, the entry is deleted from the event store. Failed events (posting and delivery to the endpoint is unsuccessful), remain in the event store and are marked -1. This feature prevents duplicate processing of the events.

Event store structure for Domino business objects and business components

The event business component stores information about the event. The information stored is used by the resource adapter during event subscription to build the corresponding business object and send it to the registered endpoints. The information that is stored, as well as the structure of the event store used by the adapter, is shown in the following table.

Event recovery

The adapter supports event recovery for inbound processing in case of abrupt termination. During inbound processing, you can configure the recovery mechanism based on your requirements.

To use the recovery feature provided by IBM Business Process Manager, you must set the AssuredOnceDelivery property in the activation specification to true. If it is set to false, failed events cannot be recovered. Duplicate events can be delivered if AssuredOnceDelivery is set to false. To improve performance, you can set the AssuredOnceDelivery properties to false.

You implement the event recovery mechanism provided by the Domino adapter by setting the `failedEventRetryLimit` property in the activation specification. When the Lotus Domino server is down, the adapter tries to recover the event based on the number of times specified in the `failedEventRetryLimit` property.

Inbound extension manager

During inbound processing, WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino (WALD) inbound extension manager monitors the operations on the Lotus Domino server. Whenever you create, update, or delete a document from the Domino database, the inbound extension manager generates corresponding events containing the operation information.

The WALD inbound extension manager is a dynamic linked library that monitors the create, update, and delete events on the Lotus Domino server. The extension manager is deployed on the Lotus Domino server. You configure the extension manager according to the operating system on which the Lotus Domino server is run. You require the `waldinbound.nsf` (event table and configuration table database) and the operating system-specific library files in the Domino database to configure the extension manager.

The WALD Inbound Event Table in the `waldinbound.nsf` database contains the configuration parameters for the inbound extension manager. The following views are available for configuring the inbound event table.

- `ConfigurationView`: The view was used to configure the inbound event table. This view is now deprecated.
- `EventTriggerConfigurationView`: This view is used to create or edit event trigger rules for a monitored Form.
- `SystemConfigurationView`: This view is used to edit the existing logging configuration of the inbound event table.

The adapter supports configuring of multiple documents with either the same or with different Connector IDs in the `EventTriggerConfigurationView` view.

Same Connector ID

The multiple documents with a same Connector ID are merged to create a single trigger rule. The following examples show the configuration for using a same Connector ID in two documents.

- Configuration document 1: `Connector1; Create, Update; DB1a, DB1b`
- Configuration document 2: `Connector1; Create, Update; DB1a, DB1c`

Here, `Connector1` is the Connector ID, `Create` and `Update` are the event types, and `DB1a`, `DB1b`, and `DB1c` are the databases.

The following sample scenarios show the event logging behavior for a same Connector ID.

- When a document is created or updated in `DB1a` database, one event is logged for `Connector1`.
- When either a document is created in `DB1b` or `DB1c` database, only one event is logged for `Connector1` because both the databases have the same Connector ID.

Different Connector IDs

The adapter supports multiple configuration documents in the Event Trigger Configuration view of Extension Manager. The following examples show the configuration for using different Connector IDs in two documents.

- Configuration document 1: Connector1; Create, Update; DB1a, DB1b
- Configuration document 2: Connector2; Create, Update; DB1a, DB1c

Here, Connector1 and Connector2 are the Connector IDs, Create and Update are the event types, and DB1a, DB1b, and DB1c are the databases.

The following sample scenarios show the event logging behavior for different Connector IDs.

- When a document is created or updated in DB1b database, one event is logged for Connector1.
- When a document is created or updated in DB1a database, two events are logged; one for Connector1 and the other for Connector2.
- When a document is created or updated in DB1c database, one event is logged for Connector2.

The dynamic linked library file monitors the create, update, and delete events in the event directory. The following table lists the dynamic linked library file required for the different operating systems.

Table 2. Operating system-specific dynamic linked library file

Operating systems supported by WALD inbound extension manager

The extension manager libraries required to support 32-bit Lotus Domino server on specific operating systems are shown in Table 2.

Note: The current version of WALD inbound extension manager does not support the 64-bit Lotus Domino server.

For detailed information about the deployment and configuration information of the WALD inbound extension manager, see the topic “Deployment and configuration of the WALD inbound extension manager” on page 139. After you configure the inbound extension manager, see the topic “View and verify the deployment of the WALD inbound extension manager” on page 144 to verify the extension manager configuration.

Business object structures

A business object is a structure that consists of data and additional instructions, if any, for processing the data. The adapter supports the form-based business object structure. A form-based type is a content-specific business object that supports specific business object structures (such as, create and retrieve business objects).

Depending on the custom form types and operations when you create an external service, the adapter generates the corresponding business object definition. For example, if you select RetrieveAll operation, the adapter generates a container business object. The container business object contains the matching business objects. The following graphic illustrates this relationship:

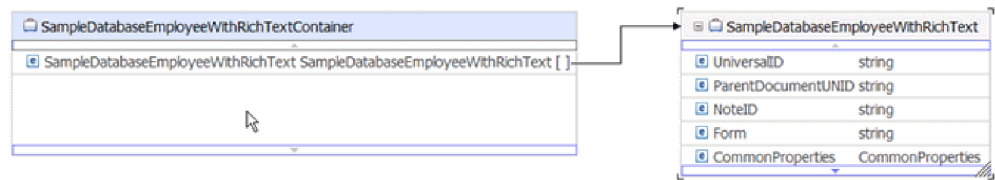


Figure 4. RetrieveAll container business object

Form-based business object structure

The form-based business object structure consists of attributes that directly relate to the fields in a document. By selecting the form document in the external service wizard, you can use the Integration Designer to generate form-based business object structure at run time. Optionally, if you choose, it can also contain child business objects for a container business object and attachments. The following illustration shows an example of a form-based business object generated from the form document in the sample Domino database.

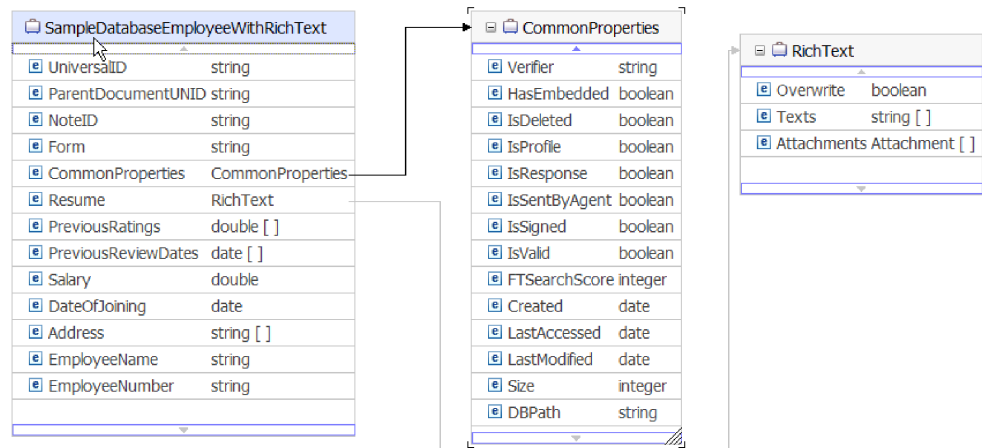


Figure 5. Retrieve business object

The following attributes are common for all parent business objects:

- Universal ID
- ParentDocumentUNID
- Note ID
- CommonProperties

Note: If a form contains fields with attributes that have identical names as the standard attributes present in the top-level business object, then when the business object is generated for this form, the attributes of this form field is named as `FormItemFormFieldName`. For example, for `CommonProperties` business object, the name changes to `FormItemCommonProperties`.

In Figure 5 on page 15, `CommonProperties` and `RichText` are the two child business objects. The `CommonProperties` business object stores the metadata information for the parent business object. The `RichText` business object contains information for managing attachments. The attachment data is stored in an `Attachment` business object.

RichText business object structure

The adapter generates `RichText` business objects for both the Domino Rich Text or Rich Text Lite item types. For information about the rich text attributes see, “Business object attributes for Rich Text data type” on page 112. The following illustration shows the structure of a `RichText` business object.

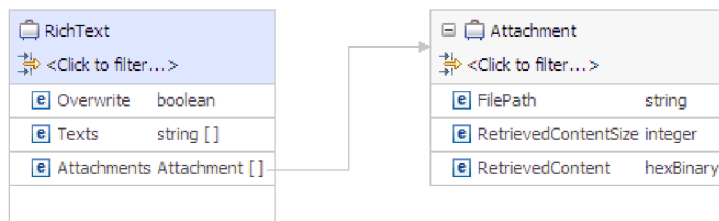


Figure 6. `RichText` business object

RichTextComplexItem business object structure

For complex objects, the `RichTextComplexItem` business object is generated as a child business object of the `RichText` or `RichText Lite` business objects. For information about the rich text complex item attributes see, “Business object attributes for Rich Text complex item data type” on page 112. The following illustration shows the structure of a `RichTextComplexItem` business object.

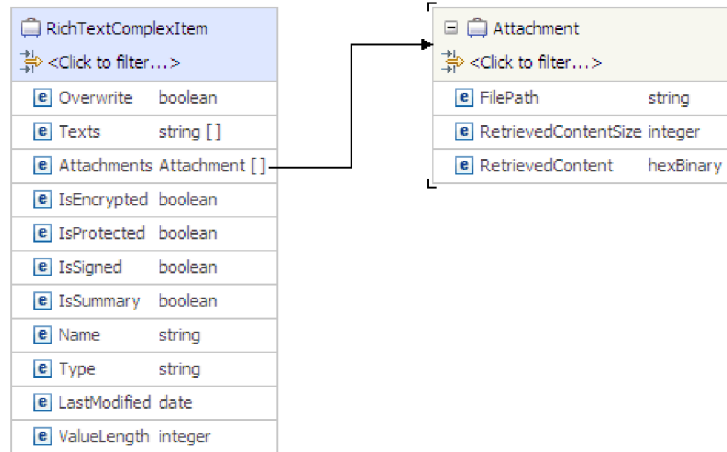


Figure 7. RichTextComplexItem business object

DeleteResponse business object structure

During the Delete operation, the status of the operation is checked using the DocumentDeleted attribute in the DeleteResponse business object. The following illustration shows the structure of the DeleteResponse business object.

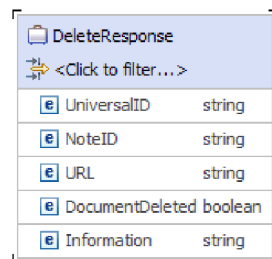


Figure 8. DeleteResponse business object

ExistsResponse business object structure

During the Exists operation, the status of the operation is checked using the DocumentExists attribute in the ExistsResponse business object. The following illustration shows the structure of the ExistsResponse business object.

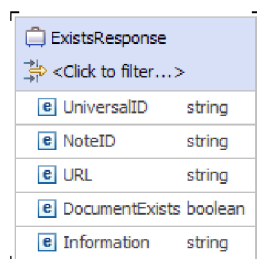


Figure 9. ExistsResponse business object

External software dependencies

The adapter needs to have some dependency files to communicate with the Lotus Domino server.

The required Domino libraries and dependency files needed to connect to the Lotus Domino server are bundled as a part of the adapter.

The external service wizard

The external service wizard in WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino is used to create services and to generate business objects from the selected objects. The wizard also generates the module and the service artifacts that enable the adapter to run as a Service Component Architecture (SCA) component.

Log and Trace Analyzer

The adapter creates log and trace files that can be viewed with the Log and Trace Analyzer.

The Log and Trace Analyzer can filter log and trace files to isolate the messages and trace information for the adapter. It can also highlight the adapter's messages and trace information in the log viewer.

The adapter's component ID for filtering and highlighting is a string composed of the characters DMNORA plus the value of the adapter ID property. For example, if the adapter ID property is set to 001, the component ID is DMNORA001.

If you run multiple instances of the same adapter, ensure that the first characters of the adapter ID property are unique for each instance so that you can correlate the log and trace information to a particular adapter instance. By making the first seven characters of an adapter ID property unique, the component ID for multiple instances of that adapter is also unique, allowing you to correlate the log and trace information to a particular instance of an adapter. For example, when you set the adapter ID property of two instances of WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino to 001 and 002. The component IDs for those instances, DMNORA001 and DMNORA002, are short enough to remain unique, enabling you to distinguish them as separate adapter instances. However, instances with longer adapter ID properties cannot be distinguished from each other. If you set the adapter ID properties of two instances to Instance01 and Instance02, you will not be able to examine the log and trace information for each adapter instance because the component ID for both instances is truncated to .

For outbound processing, the adapter ID property is located in both the resource adapter and managed connection factory property groups. If you update the adapter ID property after using the external service wizard to configure the adapter for outbound processing, be sure to set the resource adapter and managed connection factory properties consistently. It prevents inconsistent marking of the log and trace entries. For inbound processing, the adapter ID property is located only in the resource adapter properties, so this consideration does not apply.

For more information, see the “Adapter ID” on page 119 property.

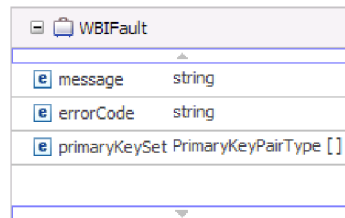
Business faults

The adapter supports business faults, which are exceptions that are anticipated and declared in the outbound service description, or import. Business faults occur at predictable points in a business process, and are caused by a business rule violation or a constraint violation.

Although IBM Business Process Manager and WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus support other types of faults, the adapter generates only business faults, which are

called *faults* in this documentation. Not all exceptions become faults. Faults are generated for errors that are actionable, that is, errors that can have a recovery action that does not require the termination of the application. For example, the adapter generates a fault when it receives a business object for outbound processing that does not contain the required data or when the adapter encounters certain errors during outbound processing.

The external service wizard creates a business object for each fault that the adapter can generate. In addition, the wizard creates a WBIFault superset business object, which has information common to all faults, such as the message, errorCode, and primaryKeySet attributes, as shown in Figure 10.

Some faults contain attributes such as the matchCount, NotesErrorID, NotesErrorText, and NotesErrorInternal to provide additional information about the error. For others, WBIFault contains all the information needed to handle the fault.

WebSphere Application Server environment variables

WebSphere Application Server environment variables can be used in the external service wizard to specify directory values. You can now change any string property values in inbound and outbound configuration by only changing the environment variables.

When you configure the adapter for inbound or outbound processing using the external service wizard, you set values for various required local files and directories. You can later change these values in the deployed application from the IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus administrative console.

In IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus, instead of hard coding values for directories and files, you can declare them as WebSphere Application Server environment variables and specify the environment variable names when you run the external service wizard. When you deploy your application, the environment variable name is replaced with the actual value and used by the adapter. If you want to change the property value, you can change the environment variable in the IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus administrative console. For example, when setting the server IP address in the managed connection factory properties, you can use `${DOMINO_SERVER_IP}` as the variable name instead of hard coding it as `127.0.0.1`.

WebSphere Application Server environment variables can be used for all string property values (not Boolean or integer variables) that are set in inbound and outbound configurations.

When you create a WebSphere Application Server environment variable, you specify:

- The name of the environment variable, for example, DOMINO_SERVER_IP.
- The value that the symbolic name represents, for example: 127.0.0.1.
- The scope for the environment variable, which determines the level at which the environment variable is visible in the administrative console. The scope level can be server, node, or cell:
 - Server scope limits visibility to the named server. The server scope is the most specific scope for defining environment variables.
 - Node scope limits visibility to all the servers on the named node. The Node is the default scope level.
 - Cell scope limits visibility to all servers on the named cell.

Chapter 2. Planning for adapter implementation

Before using WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino, make sure that you understand the experience you need and the server environment in which it runs. Learn the considerations for deploying the adapter in your server environment, and find out how to improve the performance and availability of the adapter by using a clustered server environment.

Security

The adapter uses the J2C authentication data entry, or the authentication alias feature of Java 2 security to provide secure user name and password authentication. For more information about security features, see the documentation for IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus.

Support for protecting sensitive user data in log and trace files

You can configure the adapter to prevent sensitive or confidential data, in the log and trace files, from being viewed by users without authorization.

Log and trace files for the adapter can contain data from your Lotus Domino server, which might contain sensitive or confidential information. Sometimes these files might be seen by individuals without authorization to view sensitive data. For example, a support specialist must use the log and trace files to troubleshoot a problem.

To protect the data in such situations, the adapter lets you specify whether you want to prevent confidential user data from displaying in the adapter log and trace files. You can select this option in the external service wizard or change the `HideConfidentialTrace` property. When this property is enabled, the adapter replaces the sensitive data with XXX's.

See “Managed (J2C) connection factory properties” on page 120 for information about this optional property.

The following types of information are considered potentially sensitive data and are disguised:

- The contents of a business object
- The contents of the UNID of the event record
- User name, Password, Host Name and DIIOP port number

The following types of information are not considered user data and are not hidden:

- The contents of the event record that are not part of the event record object key, for example, the XID, event ID, business object name, and event status
- Business object schemas
- Transaction IDs
- Call sequences

User authentication

The adapter supports several methods for supplying the user name and password that are needed to connect to the Lotus Domino server. By understanding the features and limitations of each method, you can pick a method that provides the appropriate level of security and convenience for your application.

Authentication at run time

At run time, the adapter needs to provide the user name and password to connect to the Lotus Domino server. To connect without user intervention, the adapter must access a saved copy of the user information. In a server environment, there are several methods for saving user information. You can configure the adapter to get your user information, through any of the following methods:

- Adapter properties
- Connection specification properties
- J2C authentication alias

Saving the user name and password in adapter properties is a direct way to provide this information at run time. You provide this user name and password when you use the external service wizard to configure your module. Although directly specifying the user name and password seems the most straightforward method, it has important limitations. Adapter properties are not encrypted; the password is stored as clear text in fields that are accessible to others on the server. Also, when the password changes, you must update the password in all instances of the adapter that access that Lotus Domino server. This includes the adapters embedded in application EAR files as well as adapters that are separately installed on the server.

Using a J2C authentication data entry, or authentication alias, created with the Java Authentication and Authorization Service (JAAS) feature of Java 2 security is a robust, secure way to deploy applications. An administrator creates the authentication alias that is used by one or more applications that need to access a system. The user name and password must be known only to that administrator, who can change the password in a single place, when a change is required.

Deployment options

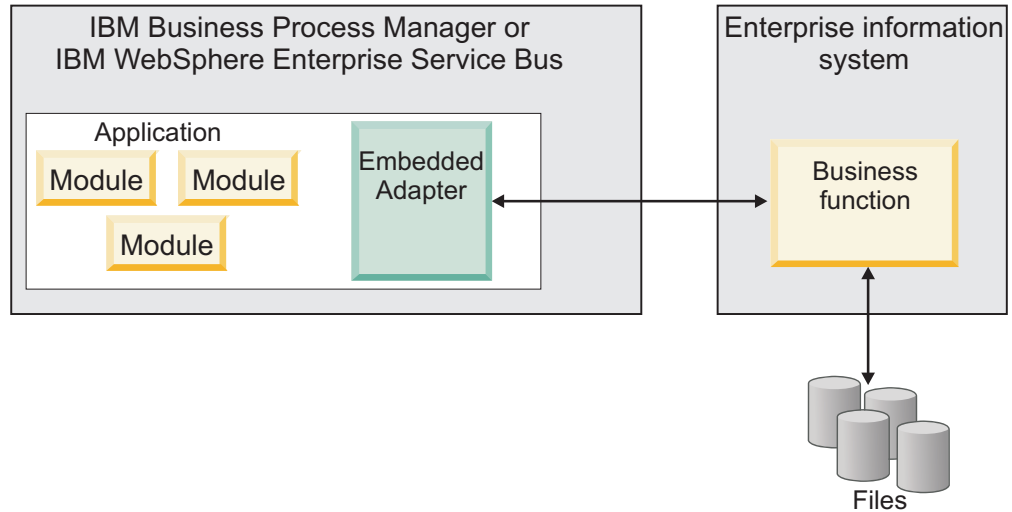
There are two ways to deploy the adapter. You can either embed it as part of the deployed application, or you can deploy it as a stand-alone RAR file. The requirements of your environment affect the type of deployment option you choose.

The following are the deployment options:

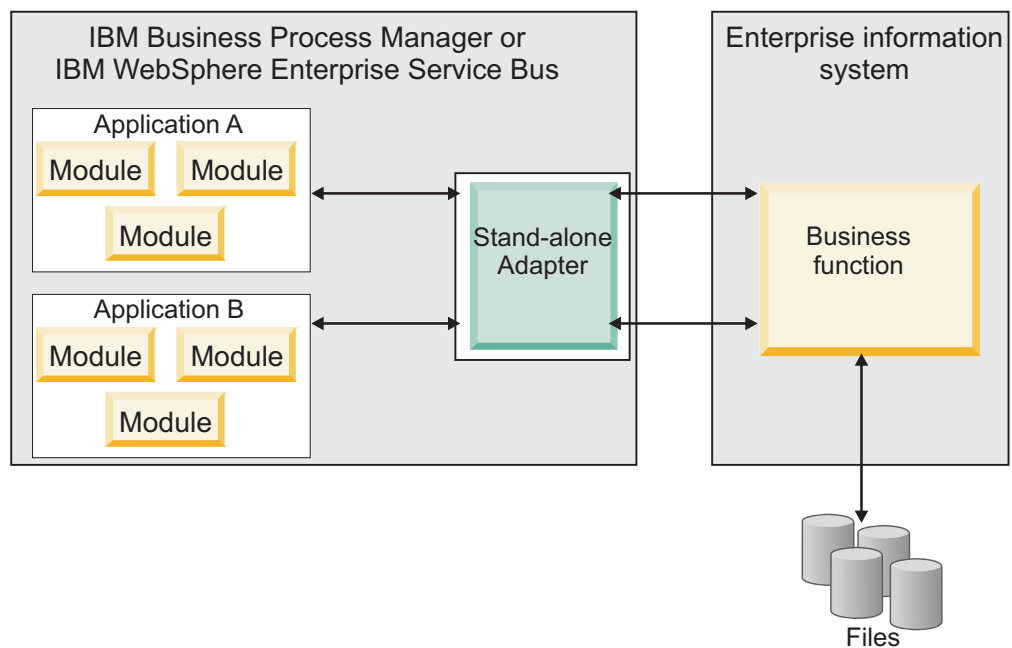
- **With module for use by single application:** With the adapter files embedded in the module, you can deploy the module to any application server. Use an embedded adapter when you have a single module using the adapter or if multiple modules need to run different versions of the adapter. Using an embedded adapter enables you to upgrade the adapter in a single module without the risk of destabilizing other modules by changing their adapter version.
- **On server for use by multiple applications:** If you do not include the adapter files in a module, you must install them as a stand-alone adapter on each application server where you want to run the module. Use a stand-alone adapter when multiple modules can use the same version of the adapter and you want

to administer the adapter in a central location. A stand-alone adapter can also reduce the resources required by running a single adapter instance for multiple modules.

An embedded adapter is bundled within an enterprise archive (EAR) file and is available only to the application with which it is packaged and deployed.



A stand-alone adapter is represented by a stand-alone resource adapter archive (RAR) file, and when deployed, it is available to all deployed applications in the server instance.



While creating the project for your application using IBM Integration Designer, you can choose how to package the adapter [either bundled with the (EAR) file or as a stand-alone (RAR) file]. Your choice affects how the adapter is used in the run time environment, as well as how the properties for the adapter are displayed on the administrative console.

Choosing either to embed an adapter with your application or to deploy the adapter as a stand-alone module depends on how you want to administer the adapter. If you want a single copy of the adapter and do not care about disruption to multiple applications when you upgrade the adapter, then you would be more likely to deploy the adapter as a stand-alone module.

If you plan to run multiple versions, and if you care more about potential disruption when you upgrade the adapter, you would be more likely to embed the adapter with the application. Embedding the adapter with the application allows you to associate an adapter version with an application version and administer it as a single module.

Considerations for embedding an adapter in the application

Consider the following items if you plan to embed the adapter with your application:

- An embedded adapter has class loader isolation.
A class loader affects the packaging of applications and the behavior of packaged applications deployed on run time environments. *Class loader isolation* means that the adapter cannot load classes from another application or module. Class loader isolation prevents two similarly named classes in different applications from interfering with each other.
- Each application in which the adapter is embedded must be administered separately.

Considerations for using a stand-alone adapter

Consider the following items if you plan to use a stand-alone adapter:

- Stand-alone adapters have no class loader isolation.
Because stand-alone adapters have no class loader isolation, only one version of any given Java artifact is run and the version and sequence of that artifact is undetermined. For example, when you use a stand-alone adapter there is only *one* resource adapter version, *one* adapter foundation class (AFC) version, or *one* third-party JAR version. All adapters deployed as stand-alone adapters share a single AFC version, and all instances of a given adapter share the same code version. All adapter instances using a given third-party library must share that library.
- If you update any of these shared artifacts, all applications using the artifacts are affected.
For instance, if you have an adapter that is working with server version X, and you update the version of the client application to version Y, your original application might stop working.
- Adapter Foundation Classes (AFC) is compatible with previous versions, but the latest AFC version must be in every RAR file that is deployed in a stand-alone manner.
If more than one copy of any JAR file is in the class path in a stand-alone adapter, the one that is used is random; therefore, they all must be the latest version.

Considerations while deploying adapters with different versions

When you install multiple adapters with different versions of CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar, and if a lower version of the CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar is loaded during runtime, the adapter will return

the ResourceAdapterInternalException error message, due to a version conflict. For example, when you install Oracle E-Business Suite adapter version 7.0.0.3 and WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino version 7.5.0.2, the following error message is displayed "The version of CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar is not compatible with IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino" as IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino loads file:/C:/IBM/WebSphere/ProcServer7/profiles/ProcSrv01/installedConnectors/CWYOE_OracleEBS.rar/CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar with version 7.0.0.3. However, the base level of this jar required is version 7.5.0.2.

There are occasions when you have to work with embedded adapters that do not need a client-server communication, standalone adapters that need a server connection, or a hybrid mix of adapter connections.

The following scenarios cover the different behaviors of AFC version conflict detection, when you are deploying two or more adapters and at least one of the adapter version is 7.5 or higher.

Deploying a standalone Adapter

1. Install WebSphere Adapter for Flat Files version 7.0.1.0 through the IBM Business Process Manager administrative console.
2. Install WebSphere Adapter for SAP Software version 7.5.0.0 through the administrative console.
3. Create ActivationSpec for an ALE passthrough inbound operation.
4. Create an application in IBM Integration Designer for a standalone ALE passthrough inbound operation.
5. Install and start the application through the administrative console.
6. Verify the error.

Note: An error message will be generated in the log/trace area of IBM Business Process Manager, to indicate an AFC version conflict.

Deploying an embedded Adapter

1. Import a build of WebSphere Adapter for FTP version 7.0.1.0, using a RAR file.
2. Create a FTP Inbound EMD operation.
3. Import a build of WebSphere Adapter for Oracle E-Business Suite version 7.5.0.0, using a RAR file.
4. Create an Oracle inbound EMD operation, in the same module where you have created the FTP Inbound EMD operation.
5. Deploy the module to IBM Business Process Manager.
6. Check the trace.

At step 5, the deployment will fail. At step 6, you will get an internal error message due to the AFC version conflict.

Note: To avoid a name conflict between the business object generated by the two adapters, you may need to generate the artifacts into different folders.

Deploying a combination of standalone and embedded Adapters

1. Install WebSphere Adapter for JDBC version 7.0.1.0 through the IBM Business Process Manager administrative console.
2. Create an ActivationSpec for a JDBC inbound operation.

3. Create an application in IBM Integration Designer for a JDBC inbound operation, for the standalone Adapter deployment.
4. Deploy the JDBC inbound application and trigger your inbound events.
5. Create an application in IBM Integration Designer for a WebSphere Adapter for SAP Software version 7.5.0.0 inbound embedded Adapter deployment.
6. Deploy an SAP inbound application, and trigger your inbound events.

Note: You can resolve the AFC version conflict by using different class loaders for the standalone and embedded deployments. With this approach, the migration process will handle different CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar files and will not conflict with each other. You can start both JDBC and SAP inbound applications successfully, and process Inbound events without exception.

Migrating to version 7.5.0.2 of WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino

Migration considerations

WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino version 7.5.0.2 might have some features and updates that might affect your existing adapter applications. Before migrating applications that use WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino, you must consider some factors that might affect your existing applications.

Compatibility with earlier versions

WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino version 7.5.0.2 is fully compatible with the custom business objects (XSD files) and data bindings that are created using the adapter version 7.5.0.1 and enables the existing business objects and data bindings to work well in the latest version of the adapter.

The version 7.5.0.2 of WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino is fully compatible with version 7.5.0.1, and therefore the applications that used the version 7.5.0.1 runs unchanged when you upgrade to version 7.5.0.2. However, if you want your applications to use features and functionality present in version 7.5.0.2 of the adapter, run the migration wizard.

The migration wizard replaces (upgrades) version 7.5.0.1 of the adapter with version 7.5.0.2 and enables version 7.5.0.2 features and functionality for use with your applications.

Note: The migration wizard does not create components or modify existing components, such as mappers and mediators to work with version 7.5.0.2 of the adapters. If any of your applications embed an adapter that is version 7.5.0.1 and you are upgrading to version 7.5.0.2, and you want your applications to take advantage of the features and functions in version 7.5.0.2, you might need to change to those applications.

If the artifacts within a module have inconsistent versions, the entire module is marked as unavailable for migration and cannot be selected. Version inconsistencies are recorded in the workspace log, as they indicate that a project might be corrupted.

The adapter migration wizard in Integration Designer version 7.5.0.2 only supports the migration of adapters from version 7.5.0.1 to version 7.5.0.2.

Deciding whether to upgrade or to upgrade and migrate

If you decide that you want to upgrade the adapter from version 7.5.0.1 to version 7.5.0.2, but you do not want to migrate the adapter artifacts, you can do so by clearing the adapter artifacts from the appropriate area of the migration wizard.

Running the migration wizard without selecting any adapter artifacts installs and upgrades your adapter. As the artifacts are not migrated, your applications cannot take advantage of the features and capabilities that exist in version 7.5.0.2 of the adapter.

Migrating multiple adapters referred within a project

When you select the module project and launch the migration wizard:

- The **Source connector** field lists the connector projects with the selected module project.
- The **Dependent artifact projects** area lists only the selected module project.

If you select the connector project and launch the migration wizard:

- The **Source connector** field lists only the selected connector project.
- The **Dependent artifact projects** area lists all projects which reference the selected connector project, including the module project.

Run the migration wizard in a test environment first

Because adapter migration might require you to change those applications that use version 7.5.0.2 of WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino, you must always perform the migration in a development environment first and test your applications before deploying the application to a production environment.

The migration wizard is fully integrated with the development environment.

Performing the migration

You can migrate a project or EAR file to version 7.5.0.2 using the adapter migration wizard. When the tool is finished, the migration is complete and you can work in the project or deploy the module.

Before you begin

Review the information in *Migration considerations*.

About this task

To perform the migration in IBM Integration Designer, complete the following steps.

The following steps describe how to run the adapter migration wizard from the connector project menu while in the Java EE perspective in IBM Integration Designer.

Procedure

1. Import the PI (project interchange) file for an existing project into the workspace.

Note: Ensure that you do not modify the contents of the RAR or copy the adapter JAR file outside the connector project.

2. When projects are created in an earlier version of IBM Integration Designer, the Workspace Migration wizard starts automatically and selects the projects to migrate. Follow the wizard and complete the workspace migration. For more information, see <http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/dmndhelp/v8r0mx/topic/com.ibm.wbpm.wid.imuc.doc/topics/tmigscart.html>.

3. Change to the Java EE perspective.

4. Right-click the module and select **Migrate connector project**. For example, the adapter RAR module.

You can also launch the adapter migration wizard in the following ways:

- Right-click the project in the Java EE perspective and select **Migrate adapter artifacts**.
- From the Problems view, right-click a migration-specific message and select **Quick Fix** to correct the problem.

5. In the Select Projects window, perform the following steps:

- a. The **Source connector** field displays the name of the connector project that you are migrating. If you are migrating a module project, this field lists all the connector projects in the module project. Select the source project from the list. For more information, see “Migrating multiple adapters referred within a project” on page 27.
- b. The **Target connector** field displays the name of the connector to which you are migrating. If you are working with more than one adapter version, this list displays the names of all the compatible connectors. Select the connector you want to migrate.
- c. The **Target version** field displays the version corresponding to the target connector that you selected in the previous step.
- d. The **Dependent artifacts project** area lists the adapter artifacts that are migrated. If you are migrating a module project, this area lists only the selected module project. If you are migrating a connector project within the module project, this area lists all projects which reference the selected connector project, including the module project. By default, all the dependent artifact projects are selected. If you do not select a dependent artifact project, that project is not migrated. You can migrate any project that you have not selected at a later time. Previously migrated projects, projects with a current version, and projects that contain errors are unavailable for migration and are not selected. For more information, see “Upgrading but not migrating a project” on page 29.
- e. Click **Next**. A warning window is displayed with the message, “Properties that are not supported in this version of the target adapter will be removed during the migration”.
- f. Click **OK**.

6. In the Review Changes window, review the migration changes that occur in each of the artifacts that you are migrating. To view the details, expand each node by clicking the + sign.

7. To complete the migration:

- Click **Finish**.

- If the files that need to be updated during migration are in read-only mode, you will be unable to click on the **Finish** button. To view these files, click **Next**. The Update Read-only files window displays the read-only files. To update these files and continue with the migration, click **Finish**. To exit the wizard without migrating the adapter, click **Cancel**.

Before running the migration process, the wizard performs a backup of all projects affected by the migration. The projects are backed up to a temporary folder within the workspace. If the migration fails for any reason, or if you decide to cancel the migration before it completes, the wizard deletes the modified projects and replaces them with the projects stored in the temporary folder.

Upon completing the migration successfully, all backed up projects are deleted.

8. If you are migrating an EAR file, optionally create a new EAR file with the migrated adapter and artifacts, and deploy it to IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus. For more information about exporting and deploying an EAR file, see the topics devoted to it in this documentation.

Note: After completing the adapter and artifacts migration, update the WALD inbound extension manager to the latest version manually. The new extension manager files can be fetched from the <WID installation>/ResourceAdapters/<Domino adapter>/dependencies location. For information about configuring the WALD inbound extension manager, see “Deployment and configuration of the WALD inbound extension manager” on page 139.

Results

The project or EAR file is migrated to version 7.5.0.2. You do not need to run the external service wizard after exiting the adapter migration wizard.

Upgrading but not migrating a project

You can upgrade the adapter from an earlier version, to version 7.5.0.2 while choosing not to migrate the adapter project artifacts.

About this task

Running the migration wizard without selecting any adapter artifacts installs and upgrades your adapter. As the artifacts are not migrated, your applications cannot take advantage of the features and capabilities that exist in version 7.5.0.2 of the adapter.

Procedure

1. Import the PI (project interchange) file into the workspace.
2. When projects are created in an earlier version of IBM Integration Designer, the Workspace Migration wizard starts automatically and selects the projects to migrate. Follow the wizard and complete the workspace migration. For more information, see <http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/dmndhelp/v8r0mx/topic/com.ibm.wbpm.wid.imuc.doc/topics/tmigrscart.html>.
3. In the Java EE perspective, right-click the project name and click **Migrate connector project**. The **Adapter Migration** wizard is displayed.
4. In the Select Projects window, clear the dependent artifact projects, and click **Next**. A warning window is displayed with the message, “The properties that are not supported in the version of the target adapter will be removed during the migration.”

5. Click **OK**.
6. In the Review Changes window, review the migration changes that occur during updating the project. To view the details, expand each node by clicking the + sign.
7. To complete the migration:
 - Click **Finish**.
 - If the files that need to be updated during migration are in read-only mode, you will be unable to click on the **Finish** button. To view these files, click **Next**. The Update Read-only files window displays the read-only files. To update these files and continue with the migration, click **Finish**. To exit the wizard without migrating the adapter, click **Cancel**.

Results

The project can now be used with WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino, version 7.5.0.2.

Chapter 4. Configuring the module for deployment

To configure the adapter so that it can be deployed on IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus, use IBM Integration Designer to create a module, which is exported as an EAR file when you deploy the adapter.

Road map for configuring the module

Before you can use WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino in a run time environment, you must configure the module. Understanding this task at a high level helps you perform the steps that are needed to accomplish the task.

You configure the module for the adapter to use by using IBM Integration Designer. The following figure illustrates the flow of the configuration task, and the steps that follow the figure describe this task at a high level only. See the topics following this road map for the details on how to perform each of the steps described here.

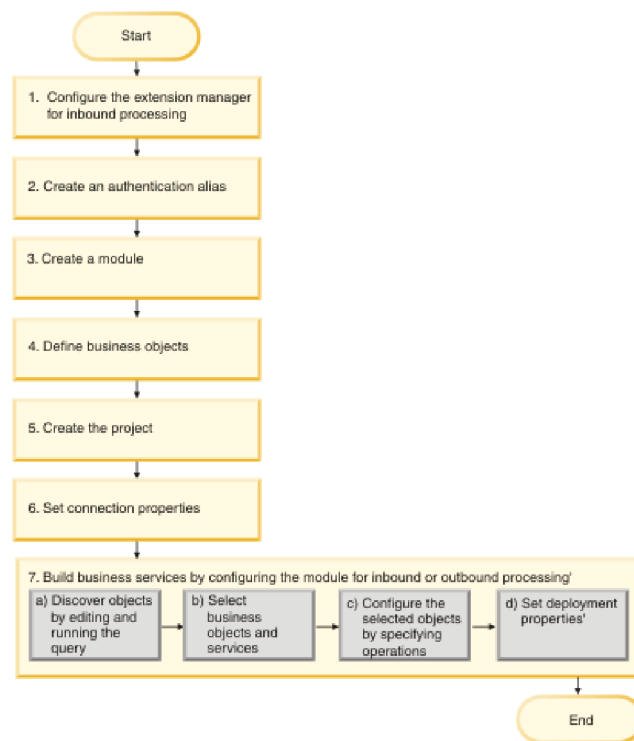


Figure 11. Road map for configuring the module

Configuring the module for deployment

This task consists of the following step:

1. Configure the Lotus Domino server to work with your adapter. You perform this step from within the Lotus Domino server.
2. Create an authentication alias to access the Lotus Domino server with an encrypted password. This step is optional, depending on your policy for handling passwords and IDs. You perform this step using the server.

3. Create the project. First, start the external service wizard in IBM Integration Designer to begin the process of creating and deploying a module. The wizard creates a project that is used to organize the files associated with the module.
4. Set connection properties that the external service wizard needs to connect to the Lotus Domino server for discovery of objects and services.
5. Configure the module for inbound or outbound processing by using the external service wizard to find and select business objects and services from the Lotus Domino server, and to generate business object definitions and related artifacts.
 - a. Select business objects and services for inbound or outbound processing from the business integration components discovered by the external service wizard.

Note: The required services on the domino server such as IIOP and HTTP must be running for both outbound and inbound processing. Also, ensure that the required files for inbound processing are copied in the correct directories.

- b. Configure the selected objects by specifying operations and other properties that apply to all the business objects.
- c. Set deployment properties that the adapter uses to connect to the Lotus Domino server at run time. Then, generate the service by using the external service wizard to save the new module, which contains the business object or objects you configured, the import or export file, and the service interface.

Creating an authentication alias

An authentication alias is a feature that encrypts the password used by the adapter to access the Lotus Domino server. The adapter can use it to connect to the Lotus Domino server instead of using a user ID and password stored in an adapter property.

Before you begin

To create an authentication alias, you must have access to the administrative console of IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus. You must also know the user name and password to use to connect to the Lotus Domino server.

The following procedure describes how to access administrative console through IBM Integration Designer. If you are using the administrative console directly (without going through IBM Integration Designer), log in to the administrative console and skip to step 2 on page 35.

About this task

Using an authentication alias eliminates the need to store the password in clear text in an adapter configuration property, where it might be visible to others.

To create an authentication alias, use the following procedure.

Procedure

1. Start the administrative console:

To start the administrative console through IBM Integration Designer, perform the following steps:

- a. In the Business Integration perspective of Integration Designer, click the **Servers** tab.
 - b. If the server does not show a status of **Started**, right-click the name of the server (for example, **WebSphere Process Server**) and click **Start**. Wait until the status of the server is Started.
 - c. Right-click the name of the server and click **Run administrative console**.
 - d. Log on to the administrative console by clicking **Log in**. If your administrative console requires a user ID and password, type the ID and password first and click **Log in**.
2. In the administrative console, click **Security > Secure administration, applications, and infrastructure**.
 3. Under **Authentication**, click **Java Authentication and Authorization Service > J2C Authentication data**.
 4. Create an authentication alias
 - a. From the list of J2C authentication aliases that is displayed, click **New**.
 - b. In the **Configuration** tab, type the name of the authentication alias in the **Alias** field.
 - c. Type the user ID and password that are required to establish a connection to the Lotus Domino server.
 - d. Optional: Type a description of the alias.
 - e. Click **OK**.

The newly created alias is displayed.

The full name of the alias contains the node name and the authentication alias name you specified. For example, if you create an alias on the node widNode with the name ProductionServerAlias, then the full name is widNode/ProductionServerAlias. This full name is the one you use in subsequent configuration windows.

- f. Click **Save**.

Results

You have created an authentication alias, which you specify when you configure the adapter properties later in the wizard.

Creating the module

A module encapsulates the service in a reusable unit and consists of both a project in IBM Integration Designer and a unit of deployment to IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus. The module is packaged and deployed to IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus as an enterprise archive (EAR) file.

Procedure

1. If IBM Integration Designer is not currently running, start it now.
 - a. Click **Start > Programs > IBM > IBM Integration Designer > IBM Integration Designer 8.0**.
 - b. If you are prompted to specify a workspace, either accept the default value or select another workspace.

- The workspace is a directory where IBM Integration Designer stores your project.
- c. Optional: When the IBM Integration Designer window is displayed, click **Go to the Business Integration perspective**.
2. Right-click inside of the Business Integration section of the IBM Integration Designer window.

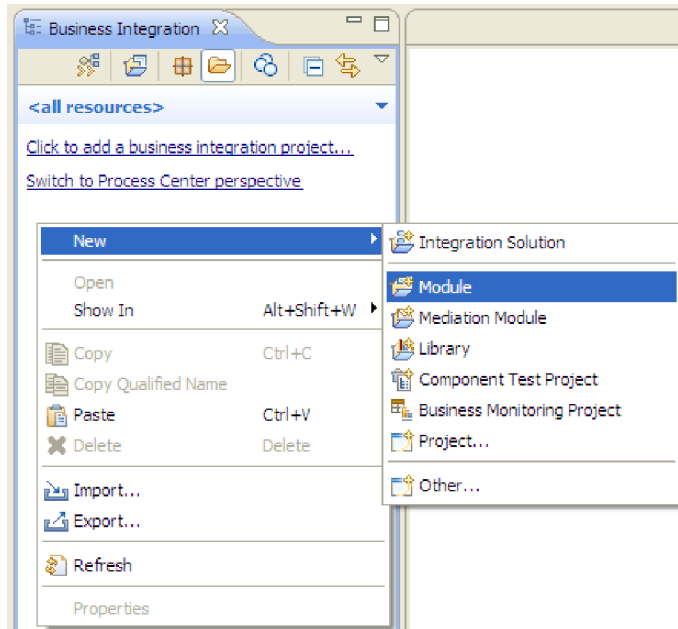


Figure 12. Business Integration section of the window

3. In the New Module window, type a name for the module in the **Module Name** field. For example, to configure a module for outbound processing, type Outbound as the module name. Click **Finish**.

Results

A new module is listed in the Business Integration window.

Creating the project

To begin the process of creating and deploying a module, you start the external service wizard in IBM Integration Designer. The wizard creates a connector project, which is used to organize the files associated with the module.

Before you begin

Ensure that you have gathered the information you need to establish a connection to the Lotus Domino server. For example, you need the name or IP address of the Lotus Domino server and the user ID and password to access it.

About this task

If you have an existing project, you can use it instead of creating a new one. Select it before you start the wizard.

Procedure

1. To start the external service wizard, go to the Business Integration perspective of IBM Integration Designer, and then click **File > New > External Service**. Click **Next**.
2. In the Select the Service Type or Registry window, expand the **Adapters** node, select **Domino**, and then click **Next**.
3. In the Select an Adapter window, select **IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino (IBM : version)**, where *version* is the version of the adapter you want to use, and then click **Next**.
4. In the Import a RAR File window, accept the default project name in the **Connector project** field or type a different name.
5. In the **Target runtime environment** field, select the type of server where you want to deploy the module. The wizard creates the artifacts that are appropriate to that server.
6. Click **Next**. The Locate the Required Files and Libraries window is displayed.

What to do next

Continue working in the external service wizard. The next step is to add dependent JAR files to the project.

Defining WebSphere Application Server environment variables

Use the administrative console of IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus to define WebSphere Application Server environment variables.

About this task

To define a WebSphere Application Server environment variable, use the following procedure.

Procedure

1. Start the administrative console.
2. Select **Environment > WebSphere Variables**.
3. Select the scope for the environment variable. The scope specifies the level at which the resource definition is visible on the administrative console panel. The possible values are *server*, *node*, and *cell*. In the following figure, the scope is defined at the node level as `Node=S-XINWANGXNode04`.

- Click **New** and provide a name and a value for the environment variable. The name is the symbolic name that represents a physical path. The value is the absolute path that the variable represents. In this example, the name is `DOMINO_SERVER_IP` and the value is `127.0.0.1`. You can use the **Description** field, which is optional, to describe the purpose of the variable.

Results

An environment variable called `DOMINO_SERVER_IP` is defined, with the value `127.0.0.1` and a scope of `Node=S-XINWANGXNode04`. You can use it in the external service wizard whenever you need to specify the run time Lotus Domino server host name.

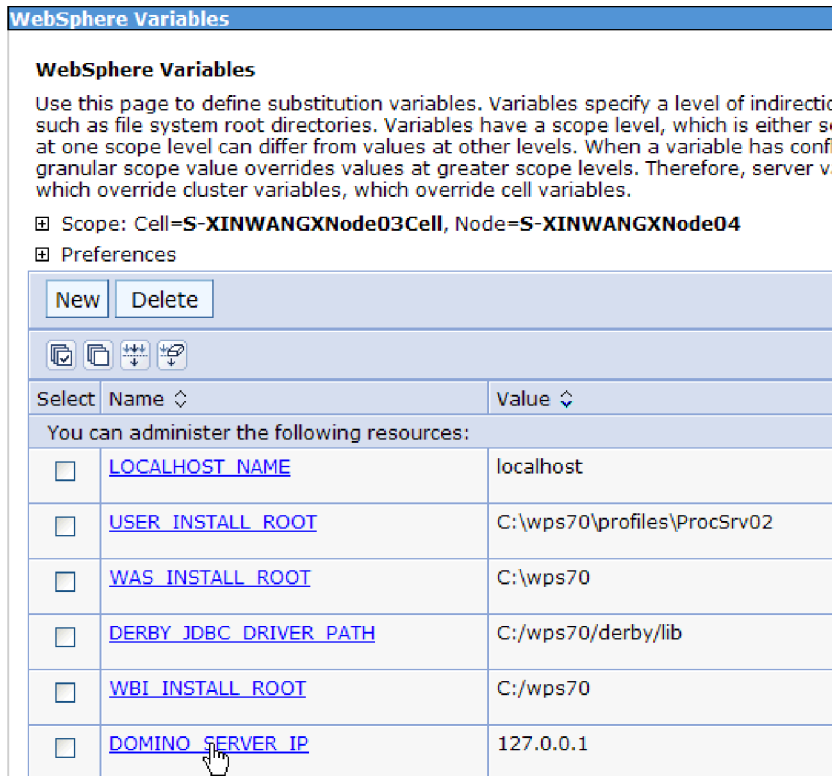


Figure 15. The new environment variable `DOMINO_SERVER_IP` is displayed in the WebSphere Variables window

Selecting the processing direction

The adapter processing direction can be configured at run time environment. You can either configure your adapter for inbound processing or outbound processing.

Before you begin

Ensure that you are running the external service wizard in IBM Integration Designer to perform this task.

About this task

When you configure your adapter for inbound processing you are processing the request or response interaction from the adapter to your service export. When you configure your adapter for outbound processing you are processing the response from your service import to the adapter.

In the Select the Processing Direction window, select **Outbound** or **Inbound**, and then click **Next** to advance to the Specify the Discovery Properties window.

Results

You have defined the type of process you need for your adapter.

Setting connection properties for the external service wizard

For the external service wizard to be able to discover business objects on the Lotus Domino server, you must specify the connection properties.

About this task

The external service wizard requires these properties to connect to the Lotus Domino server for discovery and for creating the service description.

Procedure

1. Start the external service wizard and enter the appropriate information in the Select the Processing Direction window, as explained in the “Selecting the processing direction” on page 40 topic.
2. In the Specify the Discovery Properties window, specify the connection properties for the wizard to connect to the Lotus Domino server. The connection information from this window is used by the adapter to connect to the Lotus Domino server and discover business objects. In this same wizard at a later time, you can also change the connection information or an authentication alias to be used at run time.
 - a. In the **Host name** field, specify the host name or IP address of the Lotus Domino server.
 - b. In the **DIOP port number** field, specify the port of the Lotus Domino server to be used.
 - c. In the **User name** field, enter the user name used to connect to the server.
 - d. In the **Password** field, enter the password used to connect to the server.
3. Optional: To specify the logging level, click **Change the logging properties for the wizard**, and then provide the following information:
 - In **Log file output location**, specify the location of the log file for the wizard.
 - In **Logging level**, specify the severity of errors that you want logged.

This log information is for the wizard only; at run time, the adapter writes messages and trace information into the standard log and trace files for the server.
4. Click **Next**.

Results

The external service wizard connects to the database and displays the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window.

What to do next

Continue working in the wizard. Locate the objects on the Lotus Domino server for which you want the wizard to create business objects.

Configuring the module for outbound processing

To configure a module to use the adapter for outbound processing, use the external service wizard in IBM Integration Designer to find and select business objects and services from the Lotus Domino server, and to generate the business object definitions and related artifacts.

Discovering and selecting objects

After connecting to the Domino server, you can run a query to search for the required databases. You can browse through the tree of discovered objects to understand the structure of objects in the Lotus Domino server, and also use filters to display only the database objects that you want to see.

Before you begin

You must have successfully connected to the Lotus Domino server. You must have a clear understanding of the data requirement of the program that needs to access the database.

About this task

This task starts in the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window of the external service wizard.

Procedure

1. In the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window, click **Edit Query** to modify the existing query as per your requirements. Type the database and form value to filter the databases and form matching the pattern. The database and form value take a wildcard pattern. The default value is *, where all databases or forms are displayed in the **Discovered objects** pane. The * and ? are valid wildcard characters, with * representing more than one character and ? representing a single character.

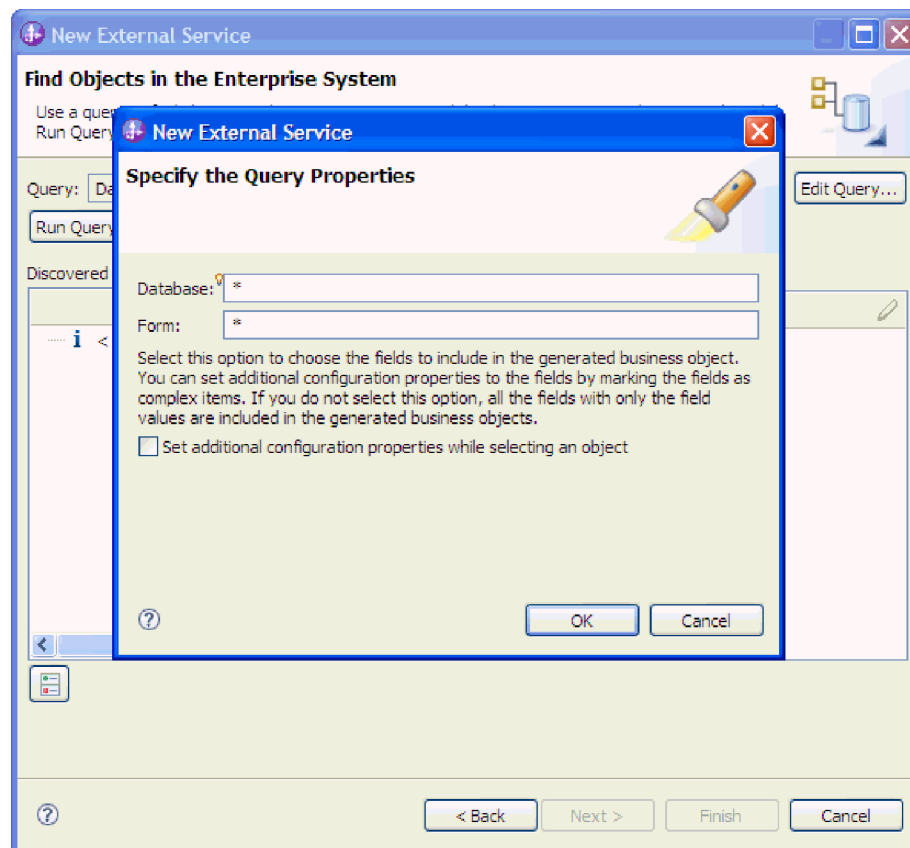


Figure 16. Specifying the query properties

2. Optional: **Configuring additional details for the business object:**
 - a. In the Specify the Query Properties window, select the **Set additional configuration properties while selecting an object** check box.

Select this check box to configure additional details when you move a form to the selected objects pane.

3. Click **OK** after entering all the data in the Specify the Query Properties window.
4. Click **Run Query**. The databases matching the pattern entered in the query properties window is displayed in the **Discovered objects** pane.

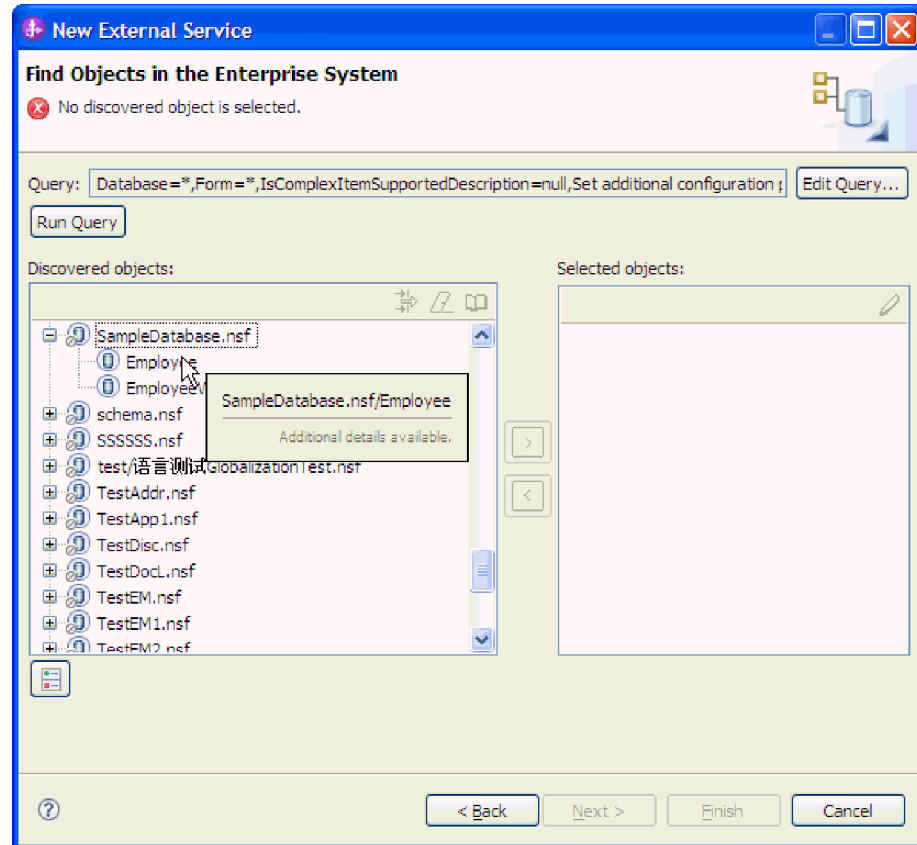


Figure 17. Specifying the configuration properties

Note: To restore an expired database connection, restart the external service wizard.

5. In the **Discovered objects** list, click + (the plus sign) to expand a node, to see the form names discovered by the wizard.
6. Select the required objects from the **Discovered objects** listing and use the



(Add) button to add them to the **Selected objects** listing.

7. Optional: If you are configuring additional details for the business object, in the Configuration Properties window, you need to run this step. The Configuration Properties window is displayed only if **Set additional configuration properties while selecting an object** check box in the Specify the Query Properties window is selected and a form name from **Discovered objects** is moved to

Selected objects.

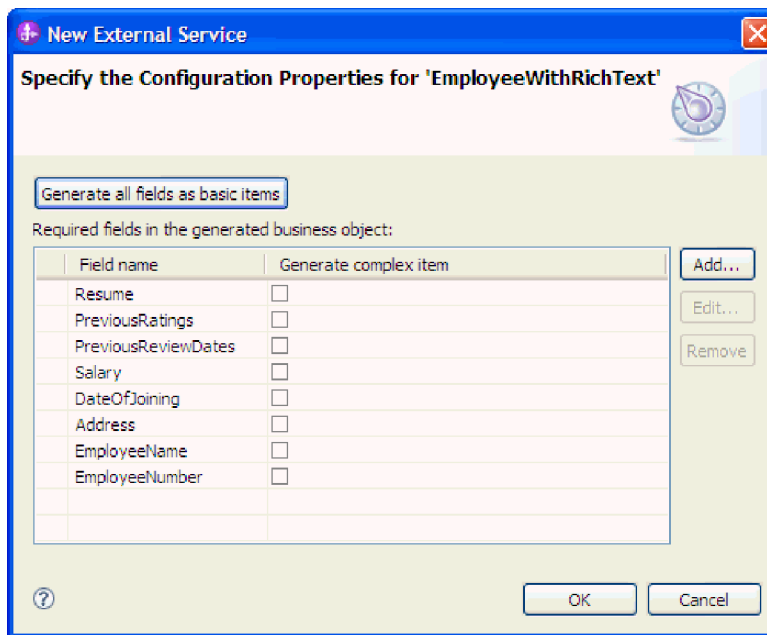


Figure 18. Setting additional configuration properties while selecting an object

- a. Select the form fields which you want to generate in the business object schema. This step is helpful in cases where a form contains many fields but your integration scenario needs only few fields. Click **Remove** to remove the fields that are not required. You can also add the field again by clicking **Add**. By default, all the form fields are generated in the business object schema.
 - b. Select the **Generate complex item** check boxes for the form fields for which you need more information. During run time, more detailed information (information about **IsSummary**, **IsEncrypted**, **IsReaders**) is displayed for each item. For more information about the business object structure see, Table 8 on page 113.
 - c. Click **Generate all fields as basic items** to reset the values to default.
8. Click **Next**.

Results

The wizard displays the document objects that you have selected to be used by the adapter.

What to do next

Continue working in the external service wizard. The next step is to select the objects you want to use in your module, configure each business object, and create hierarchies of business objects.

Configuring the selected objects

After you have selected metadata object in the external service wizard, you need to specify properties that apply to them.

Procedure

1. When the **Selected objects** list in the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window contains all the business objects you want to use in your application, click **Next**.
2. In the Specify Composite Properties window, the supported outbound operations are listed in the **Operations** field. The operations available for you to configure are: Create, Update, Delete, Exists, Retrieve, and RetrieveAll.

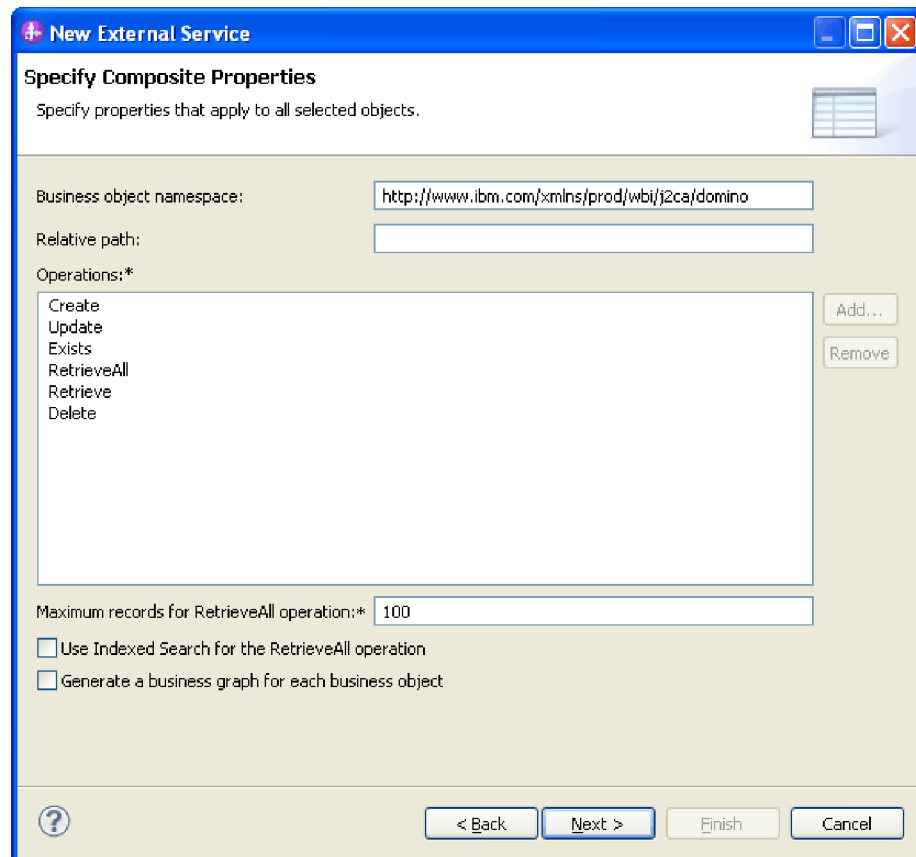


Figure 19. Specifying the composite properties

3. To configure an operation, you can use either the **Add** or the **Remove** option. If you remove any of these operations, the removed operation is made available in the Add Value window for you to add back. Use the **Add** option again to open the Add Value window and select the operations to be added back.
4. In the **Business object namespace** field, either accept the default namespace or type the full name of another namespace.
The namespace is prefixed to the business object name to keep the business object schemas logically separated.
5. Optional: In the **Relative path** field, type the relative path to the folder where the generated business objects are to be stored. Click **Next**.

Note: If you are creating multiple adapter artifacts within a module, ensure that you specify different business object folders for each adapter within the module. For example, if you are creating artifacts for Oracle, JDBC, SAP, and JDE within a module, you need to create different relative folders for each of these adapters. If you do not specify different relative folders, the existing artifacts are overwritten when you generate new artifacts.

6. In the **Maximum records for RetrieveAll operation** field, type the upper limit on the number of records to retrieve for a RetrieveAll operation. The default value is 100. For more information about this property, see “Interaction specification properties” on page 125.
7. Select the **Use Indexed Search for the RetrieveAll operation** option, to specify the index-based text searches.

Note: If you remove the RetrieveAll operation from the **Operations** list, the **Maximum records for RetrieveAll operation** and the **Use Indexed Search for the RetrieveAll operation** fields are disabled.

Results

You have provided information that applies to all business objects in the module.

What to do next

Continue working in the wizard. The next step is to specify deployment information to use at run time and information for saving the service as a module.

Setting deployment properties and generating the service

After you select and configure business objects for your module, use the external service wizard to configure properties that the adapter uses to connect to a Lotus Domino server system. The wizard creates a new business integration module where all the artifacts and property values are saved. This task is performed using the Specify the Service Generation and Deployment Properties and Specify the Location Properties windows of the external service wizard.

Setting deployment properties for a runtime environment

The connection properties are initialized to the values that the wizard used to connect to the database. To configure the module to use other values, change values such as user name and password here.

Before you begin

Ensure that you have configured the business object.

About this task

To generate artifacts for your module follow this procedure:

Procedure

1. Optional: In the Specify the Service Generation and Deployment Properties window, click **Edit Operations** to review the names of or add a description for the operations for the business objects that you are creating.
2. In **Deployment Properties**, specify how you want the adapter to connect to the Lotus Domino server by selecting any one of these authentication methods.
 - To use a J2C authentication alias, click **Using an existing JAAS alias (recommended)** and type the name of the alias in the **J2C authentication data entry** field. You can either specify an existing authentication alias or create one at any time before deploying the module. The name is case-sensitive and includes the node name.

- To use the security properties from the managed connection properties, click **Using security properties from the managed connection factory** and enter the following information:
 - In the **User name** field, type the user name to connect to the Domino server.
 - In the **Password** field, type the password to connect to the Domino server.

Note: The security properties are not encrypted and stored as plain text.
 - To use any other method of authenticating to the Domino server, click **Other**.
3. In the **Deploy connector project** field, specify whether to include the adapter files in the module. Select one of the following values:
 - **With module for use by single application:** With the adapter files embedded in the module, you can deploy the module to any application server. Use an embedded adapter when you have a single module using the adapter or if multiple modules need to run different versions of the adapter. Using an embedded adapter enables you to upgrade the adapter in a single module without the risk of destabilizing other modules by changing their adapter version.
 - **On server for use by multiple applications:** If you do not include the adapter files in a module, you must install them as a stand-alone adapter on each application server where you want to run the module. Use a stand-alone adapter when multiple modules can use the same version of the adapter and you want to administer the adapter in a central location. A stand-alone adapter can also reduce the resources required by running a single adapter instance for multiple modules.
 4. If you selected **On server for use by multiple applications** in the previous step, specify how you want to set the connection properties at runtime.
 - If you manually created and configured a managed connection factory or activation specification on the server or if you have already deployed an application that connects to the same Lotus Domino server using the same managed connection factory or activation specification properties, you can reuse the managed connection factory or activation specification by specifying the name of its Java Naming and Directory Interface (JNDI) data source:
 - a. In **Connection properties**, select **Use predefined connection properties**.
 - b. In **JNDI Lookup Name**, type the name of the JNDI data source for an existing managed connection factory or activation specification.
 - c. Click **Next**.
 - If this application is the first one that connects to the database with a specific user name and password, or if you want to administer the user name and password separately from other applications, select **Specify connection properties**.

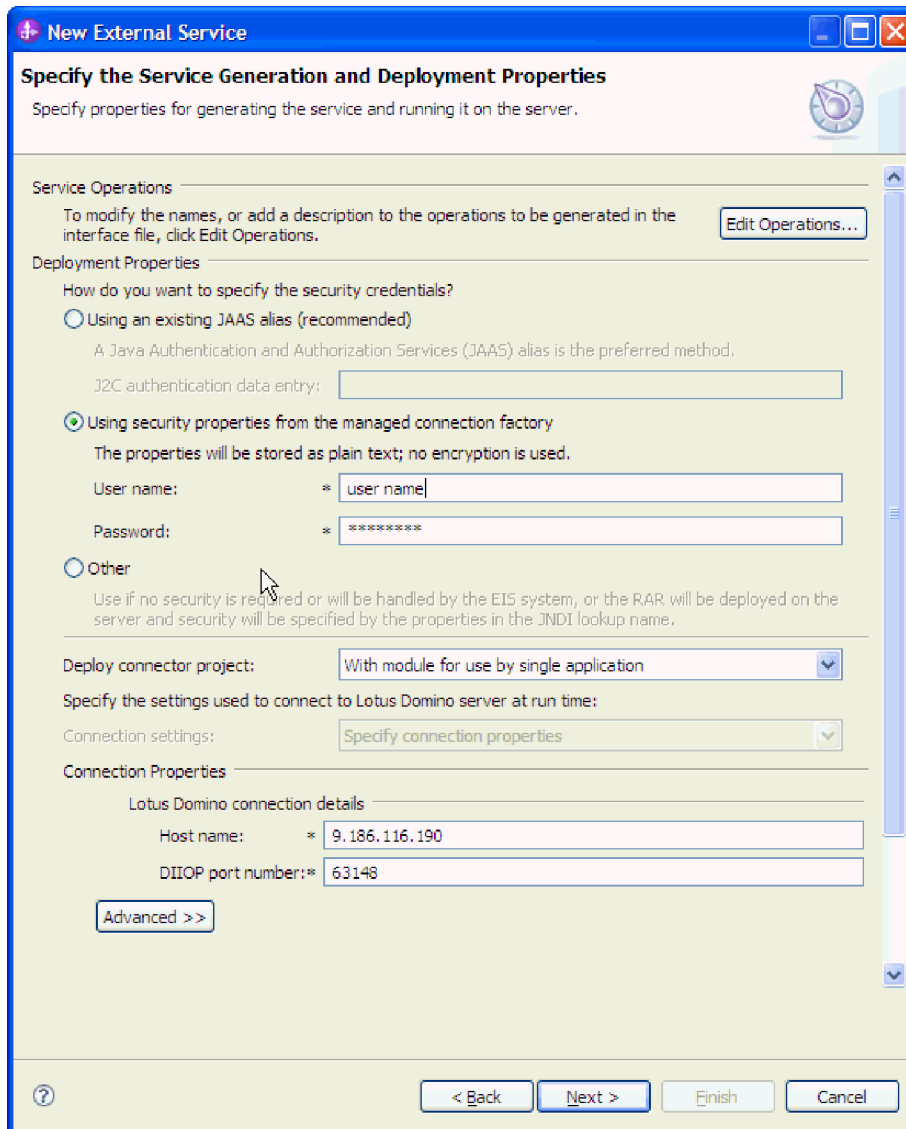


Figure 20. Specify the service generation and deployment properties window

5. Optional: Review and if necessary, change the values of the required connection properties. The fields are initialized with the connection information you specified when you started the wizard.
 - **Connection properties**
 - In the **Host name** field, type the host name or IP address of the Lotus Domino server.
 - In the **DIOP port number** field, type the port number of the Lotus Domino server. The default DIOP port number is 63148.
6. Click **Advanced**. Expand the advanced sections to review and specify the following options:
 - **Processing methods for illegal XML characters**
 - a. From the **Illegal XML character processing** drop-down list, select one of the options that correspond to your requirement:
 - **Do not validate illegal XML characters**, if you want to work with the default adapter behavior.

- **Throw exception if contents in the BO contains illegal XML characters**, if you want to proceed after you get an exception message, and log the illegal XML characters in the trace file, at runtime.
- **Discard all illegal XML characters and related logs**, if you want the adapter to discard the illegal XML characters, and log the characters in the trace file, at runtime.

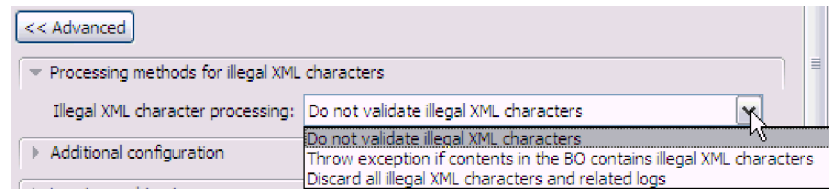


Figure 21. Processing methods for illegal XML characters

- **Additional configuration**

- a. To specify support for business faults, select one of the choices from the **Support for business faults during runtime** list.
 - To enable fault handling only for the business faults, accept the default setting **Only business faults (1)**.
 - To specify fault handling support for both business and WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino faults, select the **Business faults and Lotus Domino faults (2)** option from the list.
 - To completely disable fault handling support, select the **No fault handling and log the errors as exception (0)** option from the list. For more information, see “Set business faults behavior during run time ” on page 124.
- b. To specify the number of connection exceptions during the outbound operation, set **Maximum number of retries in case of system connection failure** to a value greater than or equal to 0. For more information, see “Maximum retries on connection failure” on page 122.
- c. To specify the time interval between attempts to connect to the Lotus Domino server if a connection fails, set **Connection retry interval** to a value in milliseconds. For more information, see “Retry interval if connection fails (in milliseconds) entities” on page 124.

- **Logging and tracing**

- a. If you have multiple instances of the adapter, set Adapter ID to a value that is unique for this instance. For more information, see “Adapter ID” on page 121.
- b. You can select the **Disguise user data as 'XXX' in log and trace files** check box to prevent sensitive user data from being written to log and trace files. For more information, see “Disguise user data as "XXX" in log and trace files” on page 121.

7. Click **Next**.

Results

The Specify the Location Properties window is displayed.

Setting location properties for artifacts

After you select and configure deployment properties, use the external service wizard to configure location properties that the adapter uses to generate the service.

Before you begin

Ensure that you have configured the business object.

About this task

To configure location properties for your module follow this procedure:

Procedure

1. Optional: In the Specify the Location Properties window, select an existing module or create a new one.
 - To use an existing module, select its name from the **Module** list.

Important: If the module contains an interface or business object with the same name as that you are now configuring, the original interface or business object in the module is replaced by the new version.
 - To create a new module:
 - a. Click **New**.
 - b. In the Select a Business Integration Project Type window, select **Module** and click **Next**.
 - c. In the Create a Module window, type a name for the module in the **Module name** field. An example of a module name is DominoOutboundInterface.
 - d. To retain the service description files (the `.import` and the `.wsdl` files) to be in the default folder in the module, leave the **Use default location** check box selected. To specify a different folder in the module, clear the **Use default location** check box, and then click **Browse** to specify a different folder in the **Location** field.
 - e. To automatically open the module in the assembly diagram in Integration Designer when the wizard closes, select the **Open the module assembly diagram** check box.
 - f. Click **Finish** to create the module.
2. Specify the namespace you want to use for your outbound interface.
 - Select **Use the default namespace** check box to retain the outbound interface to use the default derived namespace. By default, this check box is selected.
 - To specify a different namespace, clear **Use the default namespace** check box and type a different value in the **Namespace** field.
3. Optional: Specify the folder in the new module where the service description is to be saved. In the **Folder** field, type the folder name or browse to an existing folder. If you do not specify a folder name, the artifacts (the `import`, `XSD`, and `WSDL` files) are stored in the root folder of the module (the folder with the module name).
4. In the **Name** field, accept the default import name or type a different name.
5. Optional: If you want to save business objects in a library where they can be used by other modules, select **Save business objects to a library** check box and specify the location of the library in the **Library** field.

6. Optional: In the **Description** field, type a descriptive comment about the module.
7. Click **Finish** to complete the setting of location properties.

Note: If the Model Changed window is displayed, click **Yes**.

Results

The wizard exits. The artifacts are generated.

Configuring the module for inbound processing

To configure a module to use the adapter for inbound processing, use the external service wizard in IBM Integration Designer to find and select business objects and services from the Lotus Domino server, and to generate business object definitions and related artifacts.

Discovering and selecting objects

After connecting to the Lotus Domino server, you can run a query to search for the required databases. You can browse through the tree of discovered objects to understand the structure of objects in the Lotus Domino server, and also use filters to display only the database objects that you want to see.

Before you begin

You must have successfully connected to the Lotus Domino server. You must have a clear understanding of the data requirement of the program that needs to access the database.

About this task

This task starts in the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window of the external service wizard.

Procedure

1. In the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window, click **Edit Query** to modify the existing query based on your requirements. Type the database and form value to filter the databases and form matching the pattern. The database and form value take a wildcard pattern. The default value is *, where all databases or forms are displayed in the **Discovered objects** pane. The * and ? are valid wildcard characters, with * representing more than one character and ? representing a single character.

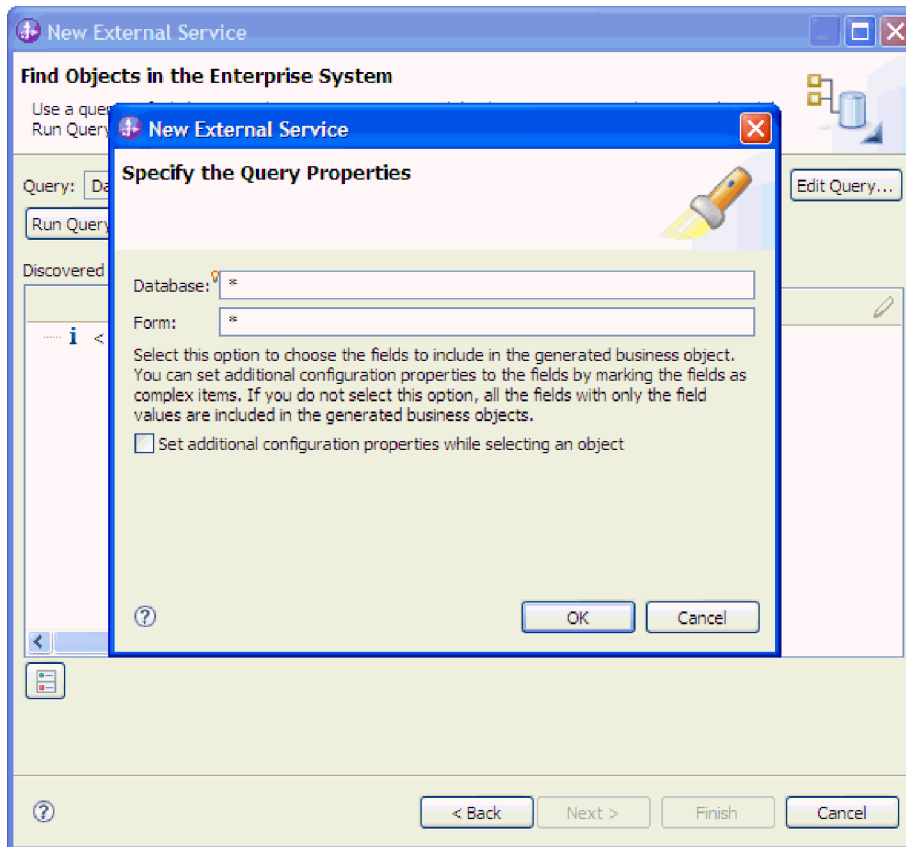


Figure 22. Specifying the query properties

2. Optional: **Configuring additional details for the business object:**
 - a. In the Specify the Query Properties window, select the **Set additional configuration properties while selecting an object** check box.

Select this check box to configure additional details when you move a form to the selected objects pane.

3. Click **OK** after entering all the data in the Specify the Query Properties window.
4. Click **Run Query**. The databases matching the pattern entered in the Specify the Query Properties window is displayed in the **Discovered objects** pane.

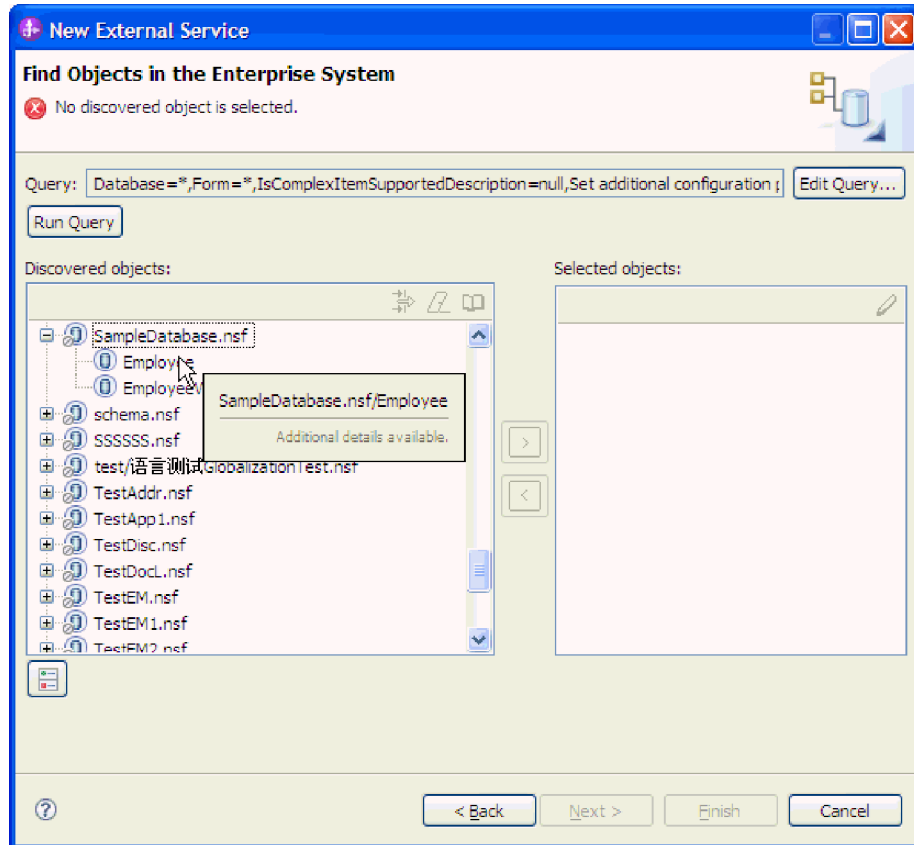


Figure 23. Specifying the configuration properties

Note: To restore an expired database connection, restart the external service wizard.

5. In the **Discovered objects** list, click + (plus sign) to expand a node, to see the form names discovered by the wizard.
6. Select the required objects from the **Discovered objects** listing and click the



(Add) button to add them to the **Selected objects** listing.

7. Optional: If you are configuring additional details for the business object, in the Specify the Configuration Properties for 'object' window, you need to run this step. The Specify the Configuration Properties for 'object' window is displayed only if **Set additional configuration properties while selecting an object** check box in the Specify the Query Properties window is selected and a form name from **Discovered objects** is moved to **Selected objects**.

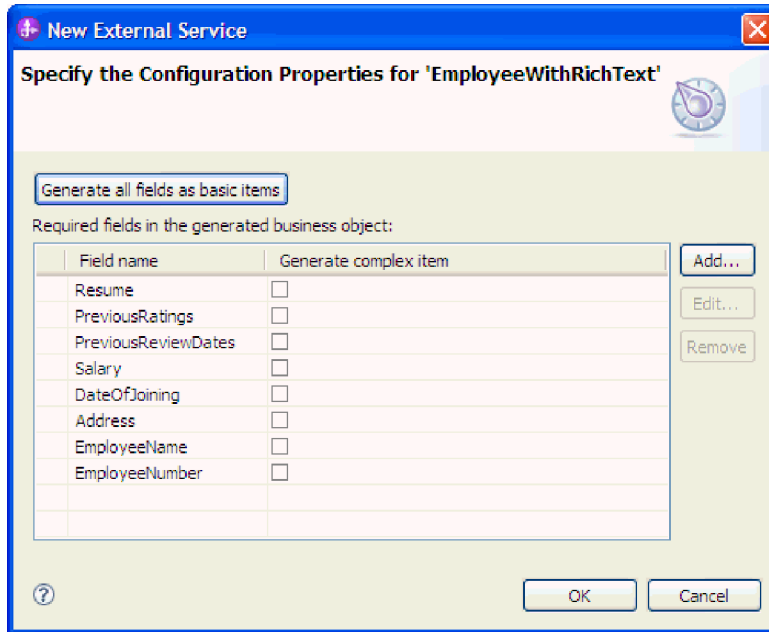


Figure 24. Setting additional configuration properties while selecting an object

- a. Select the form fields which you want to generate in the business object schema. You can use this configuration when a form has many fields but in the integration scenario you need only few of those fields. Click **Remove** to remove the fields that are not required. You can also add the field again by clicking **Add**. By default all the form fields are generated in the business object schema.
- b. Select the **Generate complex item** check boxes for the form fields that you need more information. During run time, more detailed information (information about **IsSummary**, **IsEncrypted**, **IsReaders**) is displayed for each item. For more information about the business object structure see, Table 8 on page 113.
- c. Click **Generate all fields as basic items** to reset the values to default.

Results

The wizard displays the document objects you have selected to be used by the adapter.

What to do next

Continue working in the external service wizard. The next step is to select the objects you want to use in your module, configure each business object, and create hierarchies of business objects.

Configuring the selected objects

After you have selected metadata object in the external service wizard, you need to specify properties that apply to them.

Procedure

1. When the **Selected objects** list in the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window contains all the business objects you want to use in your application, click **Next**.

2. In the Specify Composite Properties window, the supported inbound operations are listed in the **Operations** field. The operations available for you to configure are: Create, Update, and Delete.

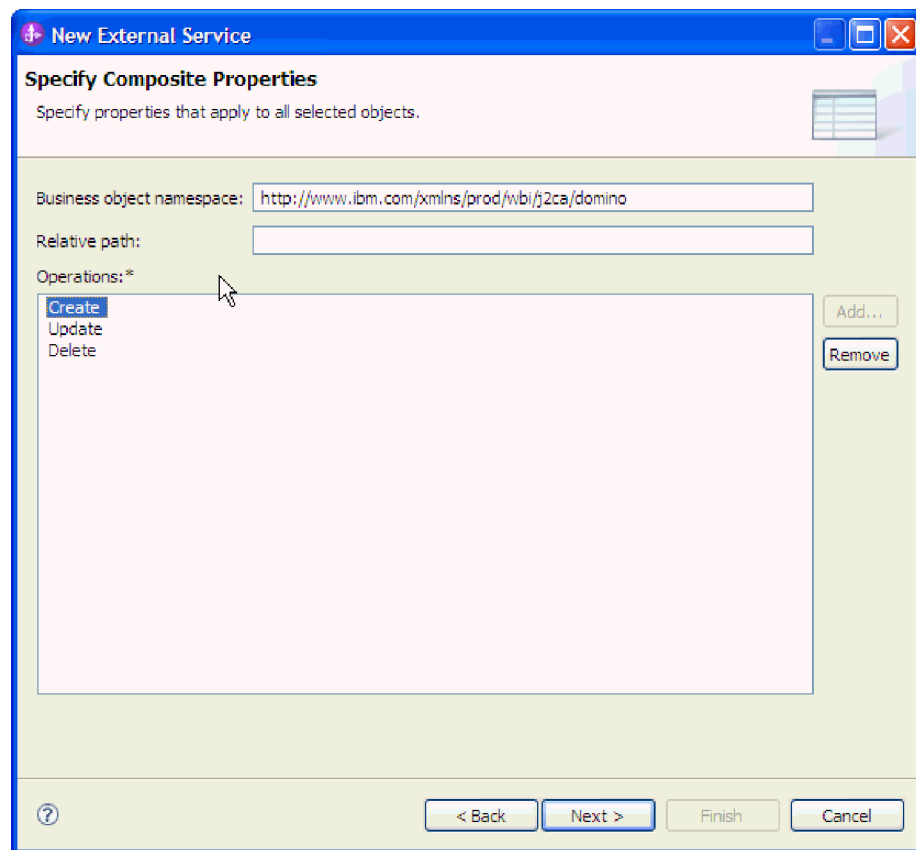


Figure 25. Specifying the composite properties

3. To configure an operation, you can use either the **Add** or the **Remove** option. If you remove any of these operations, the removed operation is made available in the Add Value window for you to add back. Use the **Add** option again to open the Add Value window and select the operations to be added back.
4. In the **Business object namespace** field, either accept the default namespace or type the full name of another namespace.
The namespace is prefixed to the business object name to keep the business object schemas logically separated.
5. Optional: In the **Relative path** field, type the relative path to the folder where the generated business objects are to be stored. Click **Next**.

Note: If you are creating multiple adapter artifacts within a module, ensure that you specify different business object folders for each adapter within the module. For example, if you are creating artifacts for Oracle, JDBC, SAP, and JDE within a module, you need to create different relative folders for each of these adapters. If you do not specify different relative folders, the existing artifacts are overwritten when you generate new artifacts.

Results

You have provided information that applies to all business objects in the module.

What to do next

Continue working in the wizard. The next step is to specify deployment information to use at run time and information for saving the service as a module.

Setting deployment properties and generating the service

After you select and configure business objects for your module, use the external service wizard to configure properties that the adapter uses to connect to a Lotus Domino server system. The wizard creates a business integration module where all the artifacts and property values are saved. This task is performed using the Specify the Service Generation and Deployment Properties and Specify the Location Properties windows of the external service wizard.

Setting deployment properties for a runtime environment

The connection properties are initialized to the values that the wizard used to connect to the database. To configure the module to use other values, change values such as user name and password here.

Before you begin

This task is performed using the Specify the Service Generation and Deployment Properties window of the external service wizard.

About this task

To generate artifacts for your module follow this procedure:

Procedure

1. Optional: In the Specify the Service Generation and Deployment Properties window, click **Edit Operations** to review the names or add a description for the operations for the business objects that you are creating.
2. In **Deployment Properties**, specify how you want the adapter to connect to the Lotus Domino server by selecting any one of these authentication methods.
 - To use a J2C authentication alias, click **Using an existing JAAS alias (recommended)** and type the name of the alias in the **J2C authentication data entry** field. You can either specify an existing authentication alias or create one at any time before deploying the module. The name is case-sensitive and includes the node name.
 - To use the security properties from the managed connection properties, click **Using security properties from the managed connection factory** and enter the following information:
 - In the **User name** field, type the user name to connect to the Lotus Domino server.
 - In the **Password** field, type the password to connect to the Lotus Domino server.

Note: The security properties are not encrypted and stored as plain text.

 - To use any other method of authenticating to the Lotus Domino server, click **Other**.
3. In the **Deploy connector project** field, specify whether to include the adapter files in the module. Select one of the following values:
 - **With module for use by single application:** With the adapter files embedded in the module, you can deploy the module to any application server. Use an

embedded adapter when you have a single module using the adapter or if multiple modules need to run different versions of the adapter. Using an embedded adapter enables you to upgrade the adapter in a single module without the risk of destabilizing other modules by changing their adapter version.

- **On server for use by multiple applications:** If you do not include the adapter files in a module, you must install them as a stand-alone adapter on each application server where you want to run the module. Use a stand-alone adapter when multiple modules can use the same version of the adapter and you want to administer the adapter in a central location. A stand-alone adapter can also reduce the resources required by running a single adapter instance for multiple modules.
4. If you selected **On server for use by multiple applications** in the previous step, specify how you want to set the connection properties at run time.
 - If you manually created and configured a managed connection factory or activation specification on the server or if you have already deployed an application that connects to the same Lotus Domino server using the same managed connection factory or activation specification properties, you can reuse the managed connection factory or activation specification by specifying the name of its Java Naming and Directory Interface (JNDI) data source:
 - a. In **Connection properties**, select **Use predefined connection properties**.
 - b. In **JNDI Lookup Name**, type the name of the JNDI data source for an existing managed connection factory or activation specification.
 - c. Click **Next**.
 - If this application is the first one that connects to the database with a specific user name and password, or if you want to administer the user name and password separately from other applications, select **Specify connection properties**.

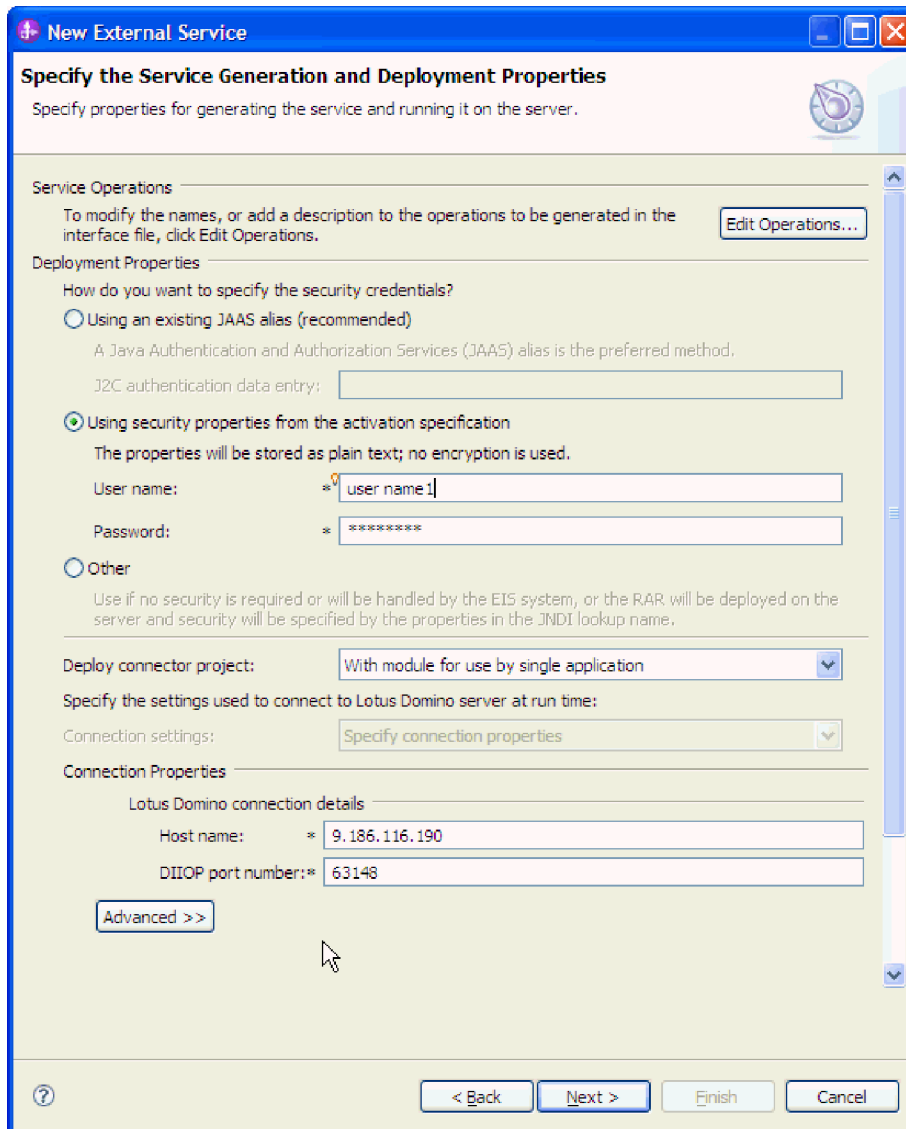


Figure 26. Specify the service generation and deployment properties window

5. Optional: Review and if necessary, change the values of the required connection properties. The fields are initialized with the connection information you specified when you started the wizard.
 - **Connection properties**
 - In the **Host name** field, type the host name or IP address of the Lotus Domino server.
 - In the **DIOP port number** field, type the port number of the Lotus Domino server. The default DIOP port number is 63148.
6. Click **Advanced**. Expand the advanced sections to review and specify the following options:
 - **Event polling configuration**
 - a. In the **Interval between polling periods (milliseconds)** field, type the time in milliseconds, that the adapter waits between polling periods. For more information about the property, see “Interval between polling periods (PollPeriod)” on page 135.

- b. In the **Maximum events in polling period** field, type the number of events to deliver in each polling period. For more information about the property, see “Maximum events in polling period (PollQuantity)” on page 136.
- c. In the **Time between retries in case of case of system connection failure (in milliseconds)** field, type the time in milliseconds, that the adapter waits before trying to connect after a connection failure during polling. For more information, see “Time between retries in case of system connection failure (RetryInterval)” on page 137.
- d. In the **Maximum number of retries in case of system connection failure** field, type the number of times the adapter retries the connection before reporting a polling error. For more information, see “Maximum number of retries in case of system connection failure (RetryLimit)” on page 136.
- e. If you want the adapter to stop if polling errors occur, select the **Stop the adapter when an error is encountered while polling** check box. If you do not select this option, the adapter logs an exception but continues to run. For more information, see “Stop the adapter when an error is encountered while polling (StopPollingOnError)” on page 138.
- f. Select the **Retry EIS connection on startup** check box, if you want the adapter to retry a failed connection when starting. For more information, see “Retry EIS connection on startup (RetryConnectionOnStartup)” on page 138.
- g. Select the calendar based scheduling option to create calendar based polling for inbound activities. You can schedule your business activities, when you create a new calendar in IBM Integration Designer. The option of working with the calendar based scheduling feature is only possible with IBM Integration Designer as the tooling environment. The following figure helps you to schedule a calendar polling option.

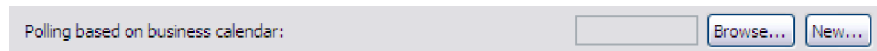


Figure 27. Polling based on business calendar

You can either select a blank calendar or create a new calendar for a module or library.

Note: When you select a blank calendar, you will not be able to set predefined time intervals. You have to define your time intervals. When you create a calendar using a predefined template, you can define time intervals for each template.

- To select an existing calendar for a module or library, click **Browse**. In the Select a Business Calendar window, you can search for existing calendar files (*.cal) in the IBM Integration Designer workspace.
 - 1) In the **Filter by name** field, type the calendar name or name pattern. The calendars matching the pattern are displayed in the **Matching business calendars** area.
 - 2) Select a calendar and click **OK** to return to the external service wizard.
- To create a new calendar entry for a module or library, click **New**. The Create a business calendar window is displayed.
 - 1) In the **Module or library** field, click **Browse** to select an existing calendar module or click **New** to create a module for the new calendar.

- 2) In the **Folder** field, click **Browse** to select an existing folder or create a new folder for the calendar.
- 3) In the **Name** field, enter a name for the new calendar.
 - To create a non template calendar, click **Finish**. Or
 - To generate the calendar based on a predefined template, click **Next**. In the Use a template window, select the **Create a calendar using one of the templates** check box and click **Finish**.

The new business calendar is created and available in the Business Integration view. Once you complete the wizard, you can view or modify the calendar schedules in the Business Integration view using the Business Calendar Editor. You can modify the intervals and exceptions, or add new entries for these elements. For more details about working with business calendars, see Business calendars.

Note: You must deploy the Business Calendar module to the same IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus instance, along with the inbound application. If you do not map these two connections to the same server instance, the inbound application using the business calendar will by default, poll as there is no calendar configured.

- **Event delivery configuration**
 - a. In the **Type of delivery** field, select the delivery method. The methods are described in “Delivery type (DeliveryType)” on page 133.
 - b. If you want to ensure that events are delivered only once and to only one export, select the **Ensure assured-once event delivery** check box. This option might reduce performance but does not result in duplicate or missing event delivery. For more information, see “Ensure once-only event delivery (AssuredOnceDelivery)” on page 132.
 - c. In the **Event types to process** field, type a colon-separated list of the business objects for which you want the events delivered. Leave this field blank to receive events for all business object types.
 - d. In the **Adapter Instance for event filtering** field, type the connector id for which you want the events delivered. For more information, see “Event groups to filter (AdapterInstanceEventFilter)” on page 132.
 - e. In the **Retry limit for failed events** field, specify the number of times to try to deliver an event after a delivery failure. For more information, see “Retry limit for failed events (FailedEventRetryLimit)” on page 134.
 - f. In the **Number of connections for event delivery** area, specify the minimum and maximum number of connections to use to deliver events. For more information, see “Minimum connections (MinimumConnections)” on page 136 and “Maximum connections (MaximumConnections)” on page 136.
- **Processing methods for illegal XML characters**
 - a. From the **Illegal XML character processing** drop-down list, select one of the options that correspond to your requirement:
 - **Do not validate illegal XML characters**, if you want to work with the default adapter behavior.
 - **Throw exception if contents in the BO contains illegal XML characters**, if you want to proceed after you get an exception message, and log the illegal XML characters in the trace file, at runtime.

- **Discard all illegal XML characters and related logs**, if you want the adapter to discard the illegal XML characters, and log the characters in the trace file, at runtime.

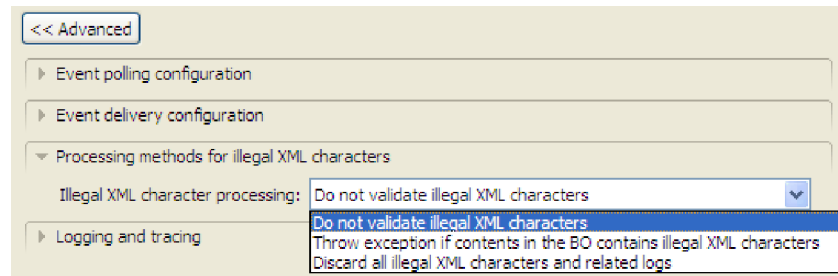


Figure 28. Processing methods for illegal XML characters

- **Logging and tracing**
 - If you have multiple instances of the adapter, enter a value in the **Adapter ID** that is unique for this instance. For more information, see “Resource adapter properties” on page 118.
 - You can select the **Disguise user data as 'XXX' in log and trace files** check box to prevent sensitive user data from being written to log and trace files.

7. Click **Next**.

Setting location properties for artifacts

After you select and configure deployment properties, use the external service wizard to configure location properties that the adapter uses to generate the service.

Before you begin

This task is performed using the Specify the Location Properties window of the external service wizard.

About this task

To configure location properties for your module follow this procedure:

Procedure

- Optional: In the Specify the Location Properties window, either select an existing module or create a new one.
 - To use an existing module, select its name from the **Module** list.

Important: If the module contains an interface or business object with the same name as that you are now configuring, the original interface or business object in the module is replaced by the new version.

- To create a new module:
 - Click **New**.

- b. In the Select a Business Integration Project Type window, select **Module** and click **Next**.
 - c. In the Create a Module window, type a name for the module in the **Module name** field. An example of a module name is `DominoInboundInterface`.
 - d. If you want the service description files (the `.import` and the `.wsdl` files) to be in the default folder in the module, leave the **Use default location** check box selected. If you want to specify a different folder in the module, clear the option and then click **Browse** to specify a different folder in the **Location** field.
 - e. To automatically open the module in the assembly diagram in Integration Designer when the wizard closes, select the **Open the module assembly diagram** check box. Otherwise, clear this option.
 - f. Click **Finish** to create the module.
2. Specify the namespace you want to use for your inbound interface.
 - If you want the inbound interface to use the default derived namespace, leave **Use the default namespace** check box selected.
 - To specify a different namespace, clear the option and type a different value in the **Namespace** field.
 3. Optional: Specify the folder within the new module where the service description is to be saved. In the **Folder** field, type the folder name or browse to an existing folder. If you do not specify a folder name, the artifacts (the `import`, `XSD`, and `WSDL` files) are stored in the root folder of the module (the folder with the module name).
 4. In the **Name** field, accept the default import name or type a different name.
 5. Optional: If you want to save business objects in a library where they can be used by other modules, select the **Save business objects to a library** check box and specify the location of the library in the **Library** field.
 6. Optional: In the **Description** field, type a descriptive comment about the module.
 7. Click **Finish** to complete the setting of location properties.

Note: If the Model Changed window is displayed, click **Yes**.

Results

The wizard exits. The artifacts are generated.

Chapter 5. Modifying artifacts

Often business requirements mandate changes to the backend enterprise information system (EIS) data structures. These changes call for regeneration and reconfiguration of artifacts (import and export) that were previously generated using the external service wizard.

A few business scenarios where the output from one enterprise service discovery flow can be reused in successive flows, are outlined as follows:

- When you want to add a new object to the object set.
- When you want to modify configurations on selected objects like changes to operations, operation names, and service level settings like security, transactions, and reliability.
- When you want to remove a discovered object from the object set.
- When you want to rediscover existing objects in the service to synchronize the service if the objects in the back-end system have been updated.

To modify existing artifacts, you can invoke the wizard in one of the following ways. The external service wizard is initialized with previously configured settings.

- In the assembly editor, select the component you want to modify, right-click, and select **Edit Binding**.
- In the Business Integration view, select the component you want to modify, right-click, and select **Edit Binding**.
- Select the component in the assembly editor and select the Properties view. In the Binding tab, click the **Edit** link.

Note: The Edit Binding option is available for artifacts generated using IBM Integration Designer 7.0 only. If you are importing a project interchange from an earlier version of IBM Integration Designer, the Edit Binding option is not available. If you have made any manual changes to the configuration, running the wizard again will overwrite these changes.

Modifying service import

Modify an import component by rediscovering and reconfiguring the objects using the Edit Binding option in IBM Integration Designer.

About this task

You can invoke the external service wizard to modify the information of a service import interface. The wizard automatically populates the existing information for the selected import interface. You can modify the objects and services, and then regenerate the import component with the modified data.

Procedure



1. Invoke the external service wizard for the selected service interface import component using one of the following methods.
 - In the assembly editor, select the component you want to modify, right-click and select **Edit Binding**.
 - In the Business Integration view, select the component you want to modify, right-click and select **Edit Binding**.

- Select the interface in the assembly editor and select the Properties view. In the Binding tab, click the **Edit** link.

The Find Objects in the Enterprise System window of the external service wizard is displayed. The external service wizard automatically populates the existing configuration details for the selected import interface.

2. In the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window, make the required changes. For more information about discovering objects, see “Discovering and selecting objects” on page 42.

Note: To change the connection properties for the external service wizard, click **Back** and change the properties in the Specify the Discovery Properties window. For more information see, “Setting connection properties for the external service wizard” on page 41.

- a. To modify the configuration of an object from the **Selected objects** list, select the object name and then click the  (Edit) icon.
- b. To remove an object from the **Selected objects** list, select the object name, and then click the  (Remove) button.

3. Click **Next**. If you click **Cancel**, the changes you made in the previous step does not take effect.
4. In the Specify Composite Properties window, you can modify the existing operations or add more operations to the selected object. For more information about the configuration procedure, refer to “Configuring the selected objects” on page 44.
5. Click **Next**.
6. In the Service Generation window, modify the service operations if required.
7. Click **Finish**. The artifacts are regenerated.
8. Complete any other required manual configuration.

Results

The artifacts are updated.

What to do next

You can test and deploy your module.

Modifying service export

Modify an export component by rediscovering and reconfiguring the objects using the Edit Binding option in IBM Integration Designer.

About this task

You can invoke the external service wizard to modify the information of a service export interface. The wizard automatically populates the existing information for the selected export interface. You can modify the objects and services, and then regenerate the export component with the modified data.

Procedure



1. Invoke the external service wizard for the selected service interface export component using one of the following methods.

- In the assembly editor, select the component you want to modify, right-click and select **Edit Binding**.
- In the Business Integration view, select the component you want to modify, right-click and select **Edit Binding**.
- Select the interface in the assembly editor and select the Properties view. In the Binding tab, click the **Edit** link.

The Find Objects in the Enterprise System window of the external service wizard is displayed. The external service wizard automatically populates the existing configuration details for the selected export interface.

2. In the Find Objects in the Enterprise System window, make the required changes. For more information about discovering objects, see “Discovering and selecting objects” on page 51.

Note: To change the connection properties for the external service wizard, click **Back** and change the properties in the Specify the Discovery Properties window. For more information see, “Setting connection properties for the external service wizard” on page 41.

- a. To modify the configuration of an object from the **Selected objects** list, select the object name and then click the  (Edit) icon.
 - b. To remove an object from the **Selected objects** list, select the object name, and then click the  (Remove) button.
3. Click **Next**. If you click **Cancel**, the changes you made in the previous step does not take effect.
 4. In the Specify Composite Properties window, you can modify the existing operations or add more operations to the selected object. For more information about the configuration procedure, refer to “Configuring the selected objects” on page 54.
 5. Click **Next**.
 6. In the Service Generation window, modify the service operations if required.
 7. Click **Finish**. The artifacts are regenerated.
 8. Complete any other required manual configuration.

Results

The artifacts are updated.

What to do next

You can test and deploy your module.

Chapter 6. Changing interaction specification properties

To change interaction specification properties for your adapter module after generating the service, use the assembly editor in IBM Integration Designer.

Before you begin

You must have used the external service wizard to generate a service for the adapter.

About this task

You might want to change interaction specification properties after you have generated a service for the adapter. Interaction specification properties, which are optional, are set at the method level, for a specific operation on a specific business object. The values you specify appear as defaults in all parent business objects generated by the external service wizard. You can change these properties before you export the EAR file. You cannot change these properties after you deploy the application.

To change the interaction specification properties, use the following procedure:

Procedure

1. From the Business Integration perspective of IBM Integration Designer, expand the module name.
2. Expand **Assembly Diagram** and double-click the interface.
3. Click the interface in the assembly editor. The module properties are displayed.
4. Click the **Properties** tab. You can also right-click the interface in the assembly diagram and click **Show in Properties**.
5. Under **Binding**, click **Method bindings**. The methods for the interface are displayed, one for each combination of business object and operation.
6. Select the method whose interaction specification property you want to change.

Results

The interaction specification properties associated with your adapter module are changed.

What to do next

Deploy the module.

Chapter 7. Deploying the module

Deploy a module to place the files that make up your module and adapter into an operational environment for production or testing. In IBM Integration Designer, the integrated test environment features runtime support for IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus, or both, depending on the test environment profiles that you selected during installation.

Deployment environments

There are test and production environments into which you can deploy modules and adapters.

In IBM Integration Designer, you can deploy your modules to one or more servers in the test environment. This is typically the most common practice for running and testing business integration modules. However, you can also export modules for server deployment on IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus as EAR files using the administrative console or command-line tools.

Deploying the module for testing

In IBM Integration Designer, you can deploy a module that includes an embedded adapter to the test environment and work with server tools that enable you to perform such tasks as editing server configurations, starting, and stopping servers and testing the module code for errors. The testing is generally performed on the interface operations of your components, which enables you to determine whether the components are correctly implemented and the references are correctly wired.

Generating and wiring a target component for testing inbound processing

Before deploying to the test environment a module that includes an adapter for inbound processing, you must first generate and wire a target component. This target component serves as the *destination* to which the adapter sends events.

Before you begin

You must have generated an export module, using the external service wizard.

About this task

Generating and wiring a target component for inbound processing is required in a testing environment only. It is not necessary when deploying the adapter in a production environment.

The target component receives events. You *wire* the export to the target component (connecting the two components) using the assembly editor in IBM Integration Designer. The adapter uses the wire to pass event data (from the export to the target component).

Procedure

1. Create the target component.

- a. From the Business Integration perspective of IBM Integration Designer, expand **Assembly Diagram** and double-click the export component. If you did not change the default value, the name of the export component is the name of your adapter + **InboundInterface**.
An interface specifies the operations that can be called and the data that is passed, such as input arguments, returned values, and exceptions. The **InboundInterface** contains the operations required by the adapter to support inbound processing and is created when you run the external service wizard.
 - b. Create a new component by expanding **Components**, selecting **Untyped Component**, and dragging the component to the Assembly Diagram.
The cursor changes to the placement icon.
 - c. Click the component to have it displayed in the Assembly Diagram.
2. Wire the components.
 - a. Click and drag the export component to the new component.
 - b. Save the assembly diagram. Click **File > Save**.
 3. Generate an implementation for the new component.
 - a. Right-click on the new component and select **Generate Implementation > Java**.
 - b. Select **(default package)** and click **OK**. This creates an endpoint for the inbound module.
The Java implementation is displayed in a separate tab.
 - c. **Optional:** Add print statements to print the data object received at the endpoint for each of the endpoint methods.
 - d. Click **File > Save** to save the changes.

What to do next

Continue deploying the module for testing.

Adding the module to the server

In IBM Integration Designer, you can add modules to one or more servers in the test environment.

Before you begin

If the module you are testing uses an adapter to perform inbound processing, generate and wire a *target component* to which the adapter sends the events.

About this task

In order to test your module and its use of the adapter, you need to add the module to the server.

Procedure

1. *Conditional:* If there are no servers in the **Servers** view, add and define a new server by performing the following steps:
 - a. Place your cursor in the **Servers** view, right-click, and select **New > Server**.
 - b. From the Define a New Server window, select the server type.
 - c. Configure servers settings.
 - d. Click **Finish** to publish the server.

2. Add the module to the server.
 - a. Switch to the servers view. In IBM Integration Designer, select **Windows > Show View > Servers**.

What to do next

Test the functionality of your module and the adapter.

Testing the module for outbound processing using the test client

Test the assembled module and adapter for outbound processing using the IBM Integration Designer integration test client.

Before you begin

You need to add the module to the server first.

About this task

Testing a module is performed on the interface operations of your components, which enables you to determine whether the components are correctly implemented and the references are correctly wired.

Procedure

1. Select the module you want to test, right-click on it, and select **Test > Test Module**.
2. For information about testing a module using the test client, see the *Testing modules and components* topic in the IBM Integration Designer information center.

What to do next

If you are satisfied with the results of testing your module and adapter, you can deploy the module and adapter to the production environment.

Deploying the module for production

Deploying a module created with the external service wizard to IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus in a production environment is a two-step process. First, you export the module in IBM Integration Designer as an enterprise archive (EAR) file. Second, you deploy the EAR file using the IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus administrative console.

Installing the RAR file (for modules using stand-alone adapters only)

If you chose not to embed the adapter with your module, but instead choose to make the adapter available to all deployed applications in the server instance, you need to install the adapter in the form of a RAR file to the application server. A RAR file is a Java archive (JAR) file that is used to package a resource adapter for the Java 2 Connector (J2C) architecture.

Before you begin

You must set **Deploy connector project** to **On server for use by multiple adapters** in the Specify the Service Generation and Deployment Properties window of the external service wizard.

About this task

Installing the adapter in the form of a RAR file results in the adapter being available to all Java EE application components running in the server run time.

Procedure

1. If the server is not running, right-click your server in the **Servers** view and select **Start**.
2. When the server status changes to **Started**, right-click the server and select **Administration > Run administrative console**.
3. Log on to the administrative console.
4. Click **Resources > Resource Adapters > Resource adapters**.
5. In the Resource adapters page, click **Install RAR**.

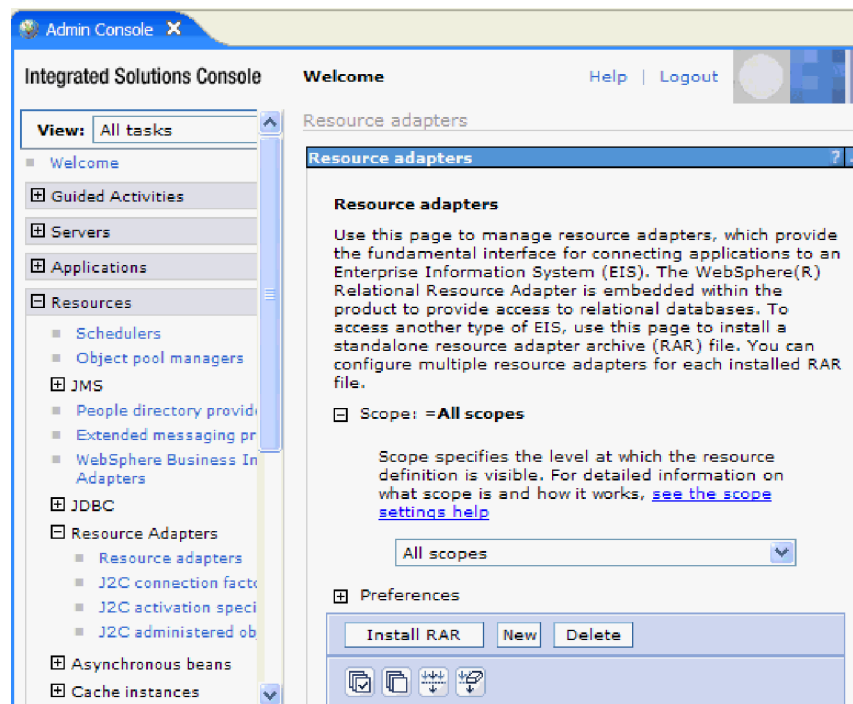


Figure 29. The Install RAR button on the Resource adapters page

About this task

To export the module as an EAR file, perform the following procedure.

Procedure

2. In the Select window, expand **Java EE**.
3. Select **EAR file** and click **Next**.
4. Optional: Select the correct EAR application. The EAR application is named after your module, but with “App” added to the end of the name.
5. Browse for the folder on the local file system where the EAR file will be placed.
6. Optional: To export the source files, select the **Export source files** check box. This option is provided in case you want to export the source files in addition to the EAR file. Source files include files associated with Java components, data maps, and so on.

You must create the reference at the cluster scope from the administrative console, with the same JNDI name. The adapter can be shared across multiple applications.

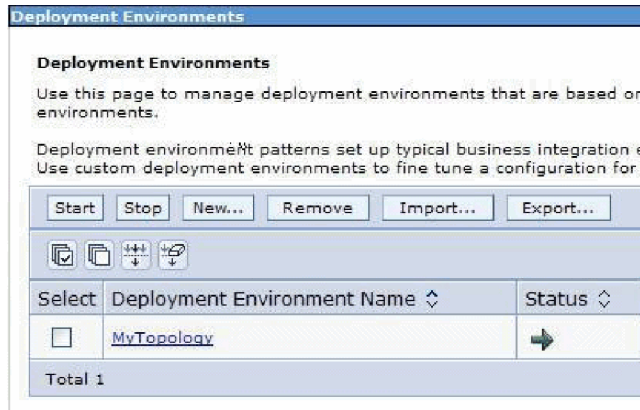


Figure 31. Deployment environment

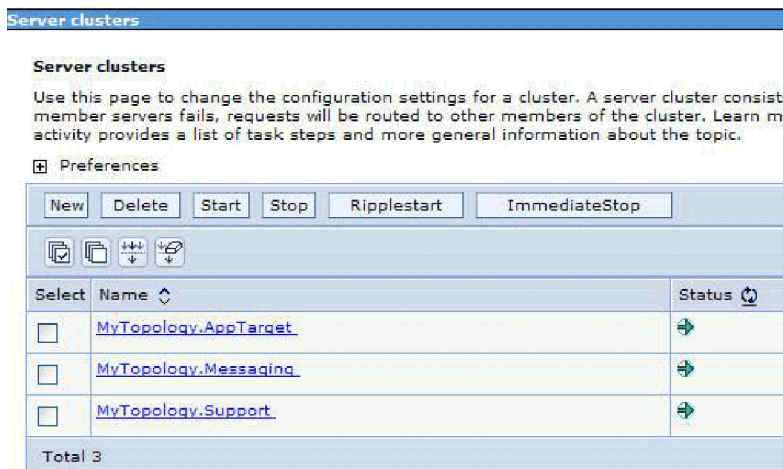


Figure 32. Deployment environment showing server clusters

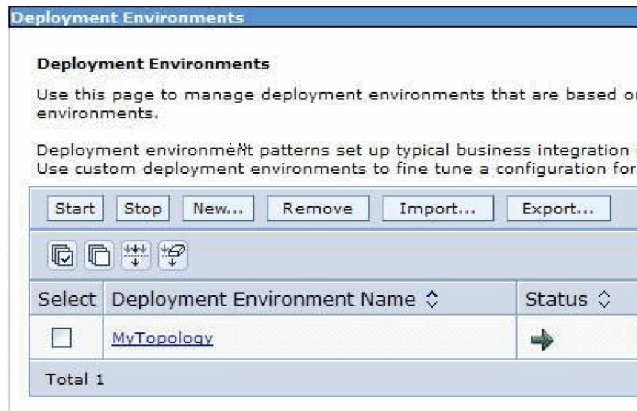


Figure 33. Deployment environment

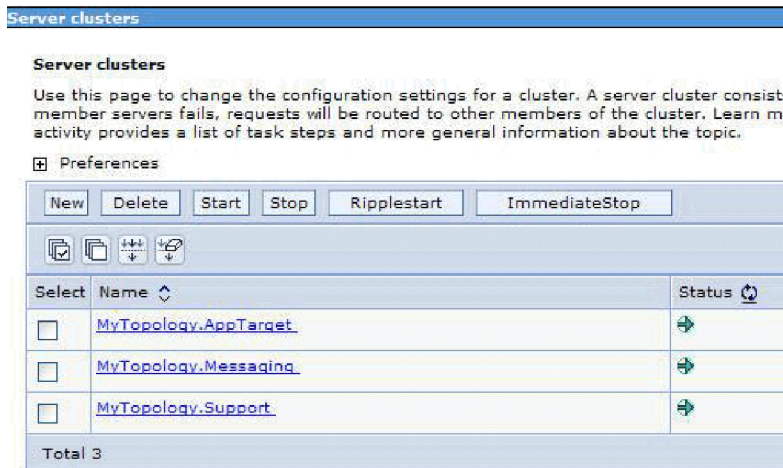


Figure 34. Deployment environment showing server clusters

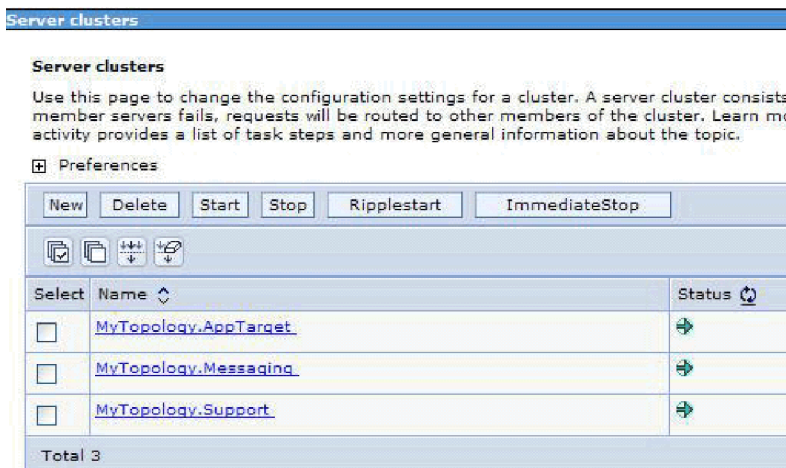


Figure 36. Deployment environment showing server clusters

Chapter 8. Administering the adapter module

When you are running the adapter in a stand-alone deployment, use the administrative console of the server to start, stop, monitor, and troubleshoot the adapter module. In an application that uses an embedded adapter, the adapter module starts or stops when the application is started or stopped.

Configuring logging and tracing

Configure logging and tracing to suit your requirements. Enable logging for the adapter to control the status of event processing. Change the adapter log and trace file names to separate them from other log and trace files.

Configuring logging properties

Use the administrative console to enable logging and to set the output properties for a log, including the location, level of detail, and output format of the log.

About this task

Before the adapters can log monitored events, you must specify the service component event points that you want to monitor, what level of detail you require for each event, and format of the output used to publish the events to the logs. Use the administrative console to perform the following tasks:

- Enable or disable a particular event log
- Specify the level of detail in a log
- Specify where log files are stored and how many log files are kept
- Specify the format for log output

If you set the output for log analyzer format, you can open trace output using the Log Analyzer tool, which is an application included with your IBM Process Server. This is useful if you are trying to correlate traces from two different server processes, because it allows you to use the merge capability of the Log Analyzer.

Note: For more information about monitoring on a IBM Process Server, including service components and event points, see http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/dmndhelp/v8r0mx/topic/com.ibm.wbpm.admin.doc/topics/welcome_wps_mon.html.

You can change the log configuration statically or dynamically. Static configuration takes effect when you start or restart the application server. Dynamic or run time configuration changes apply immediately.

When a log is created, the detail level for that log is set from the configuration data. If no configuration data is available for a particular log name, the level for that log is obtained from the parent of the log. If no configuration data exists for the parent log, the parent of that log is checked, and so on, up the tree, until a log with a non-null level value is found. When you change the level of a log, the change is propagated to the child logs, which recursively propagate the change to their child log, as necessary.

To enable logging and set the output properties for a log, use the following procedure.

Procedure

1. In the navigation pane of the administrative console, select **Servers > Application Servers**.
2. Click the name of the server that you want to work with.
3. Under **Troubleshooting**, click **Logs and trace**.
4. Click **Change Log Detail Levels**.
5. Specify when you want the change to take effect:
 - For a static change to the configuration, click the **Configuration** tab.
 - For a dynamic change to the configuration, click the **Runtime** tab.
6. Click the names of the packages whose logging level you want to modify. The package names for WebSphere Adapters start with **com.ibm.j2ca.***:
 - For the adapter base component, select **com.ibm.j2ca.base.***.
 - For the adapter base component and all deployed adapters, select **com.ibm.j2ca.***.
 - For the WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino only, select the **com.ibm.j2ca.domino.*** package.
7. Select the logging level.

Logging Level	Description
Fatal	The task cannot continue or the component cannot function.
Severe	The task cannot continue, but the component can still function. This logging level also includes conditions that indicate an impending fatal error, that is, situations that strongly suggest that resources are on the verge of being depleted.
Warning	A potential error has occurred or a severe error is impending. This logging level also includes conditions that indicate a progressive failure, for example, the potential leaking of resources.
Audit	A significant event has occurred that affects the server state or resources.
Info	The task is running. This logging level includes general information outlining the overall progress of a task.
Config	The status of a configuration is reported or a configuration change has occurred.
Detail	The subtask is running. This logging level includes general information detailing the progress of a subtask.

8. Click **Apply**.
9. Click **OK**.
10. Optional: To have static configuration changes take effect, stop and then restart the IBM Process Server.

Results

Log entries from this point forward contain the specified level of information for the selected adapter components.

Changing the log and trace file names

To keep the adapter log and trace information separate from other processes, use the administrative console to change the file names. By default, log and trace information for all processes and applications on a IBM Process Server is written to the `SystemOut.log` and `trace.log` files.

Before you begin

You can change the log and trace file names at any time after the adapter module has been deployed to an application server.

About this task

You can change the log and trace file names statically or dynamically. Static changes take effect when you start or restart the application server. Dynamic or run time changes apply immediately.

Log and trace files are in the `install_root/profiles/profile_name/logs/server_name` folder.

To set or change the log and trace file names, use the following procedure.

Procedure

1. In the navigation pane of the administrative console, select **Applications > Enterprise Applications**.
2. In the Enterprise Applications list, click the name of the adapter application. This is the name of the EAR file for the adapter, but without the ear file extension. For example, if the EAR file is named `Accounting_OutboundApp.ear`, then click **Accounting_OutboundApp**.
3. In the Configuration tab, in the Modules list, click **Manage Modules**.
4. In the list of modules, click IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino.
5. In the Configuration tab, under Additional Properties, click **Resource Adapter**.
6. In the Configuration tab, under Additional Properties, click **Custom properties**.
7. In the Custom Properties table, change the file names.
 - a. Click either **logFilename** to change the name of the log file or **traceFilename** to change the name of the trace file.
 - b. In the Configuration tab, type the new name in the **Value** field. By default, the log file is called `SystemOut.log` and the trace file is called `trace.log`.
 - c. Click **Apply** or **OK**. Your changes are saved on your local machine.
 - d. To save your changes to the master configuration on the server, use one of the following procedures:
 - **Static change:** Stop and restart the server. This method allows you to make changes, but those changes do not take effect until you stop and start the server.
 - **Dynamic change:** Click the **Save** link in the Messages box above the Custom properties table. Click **Save** again when prompted.

Changing configuration properties for embedded adapters

To change the configuration properties after you deploy the adapter as part of a module, you use the administrative console of the runtime environment. For information about configuring logging properties and changing the log and trace file names, see “Configuring logging and tracing” on page 83.

Setting resource adapter properties for embedded adapters

To set resource adapter properties for your adapter after it has been deployed as part of a module, use the administrative console. You select the name of the property you want to configure and then change or set the value.

Before you begin

Your adapter module must be deployed on IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus.

About this task

Custom properties are default configuration properties shared by all IBM WebSphere Adapters.

To configure properties using the administrative console, use the following procedure:

Procedure

3. Log on to the administrative console.

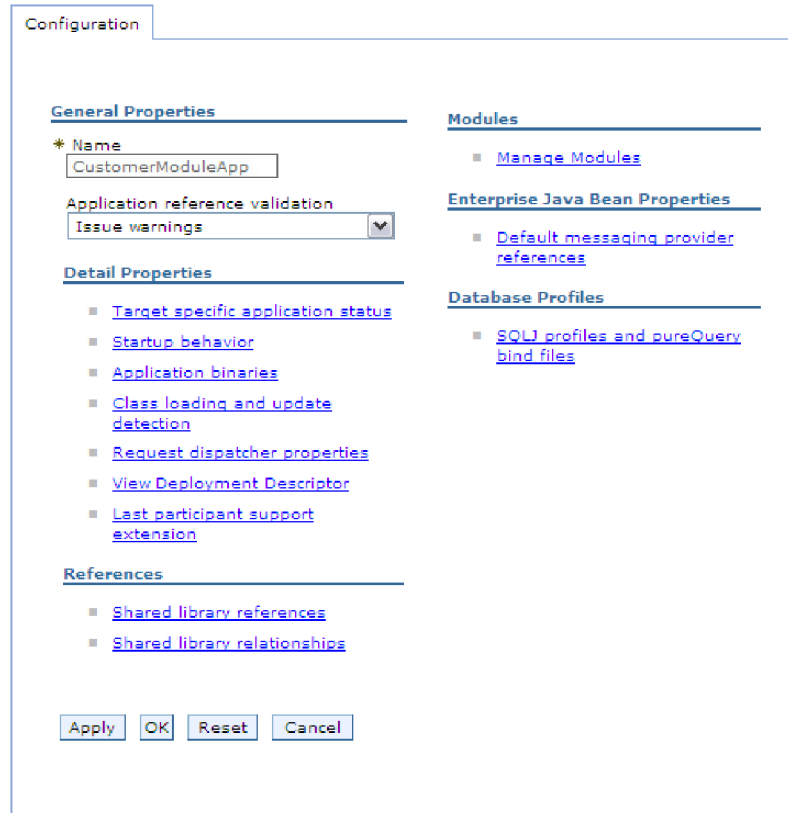


Figure 37. The Manage Modules selection in the Configuration tab

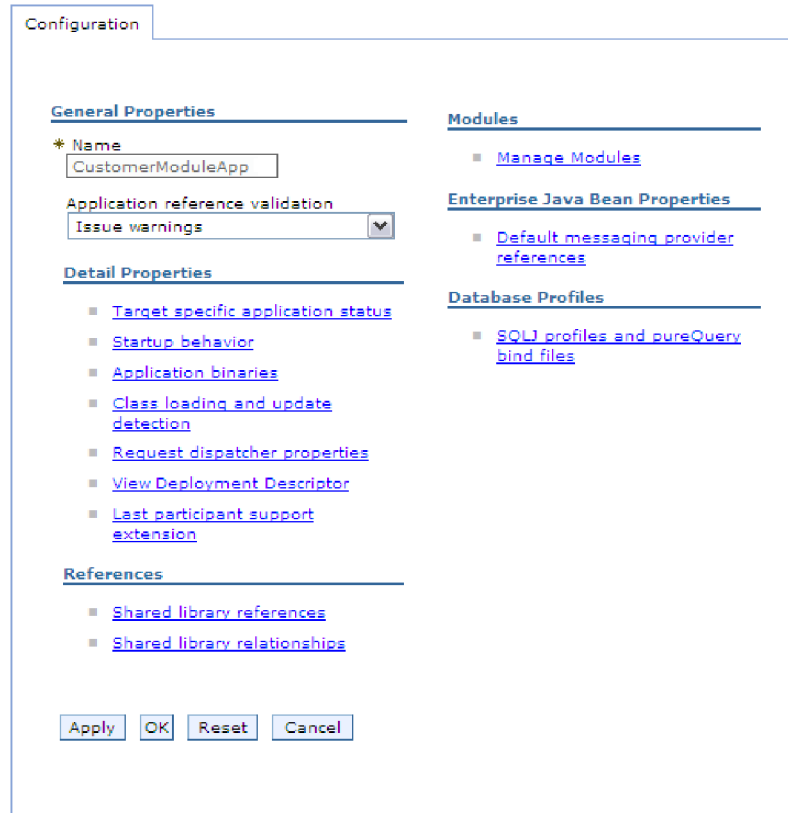


Figure 38. The Manage Modules selection in the Configuration tab

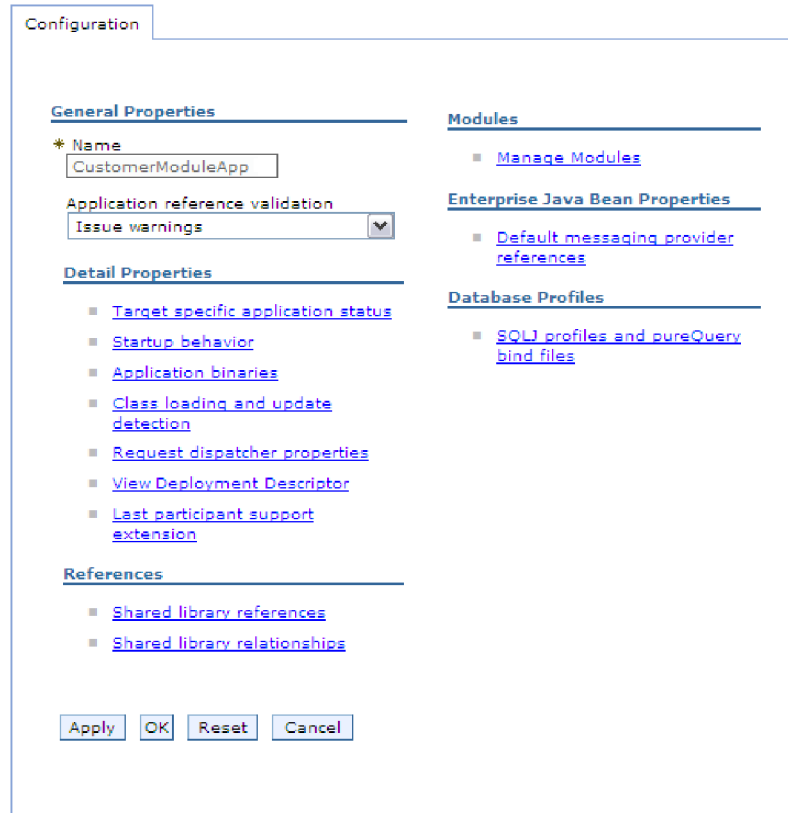


Figure 39. The Manage Modules selection in the Configuration tab

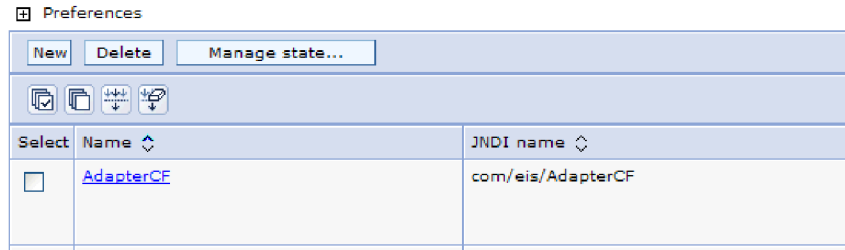


Figure 40. User-defined connection factories for use with the resource adapter

Monitoring performance using Performance Monitoring Infrastructure

Performance Monitoring Infrastructure (PMI) is a feature of the administrative console that allows you to dynamically monitor the performance of components in the production environment, including IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino. PMI collects adapter performance data, such as average response time and total number of requests, from various components in the server and organizes the data into a tree structure. You can view the data through the Tivoli® Performance Viewer, a graphical monitoring tool that is integrated with the administrative console in IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus.

About this task

Before you enable and configure PMI for your adapter, you must first set the level of tracing detail and run some events from which to gather performance data.

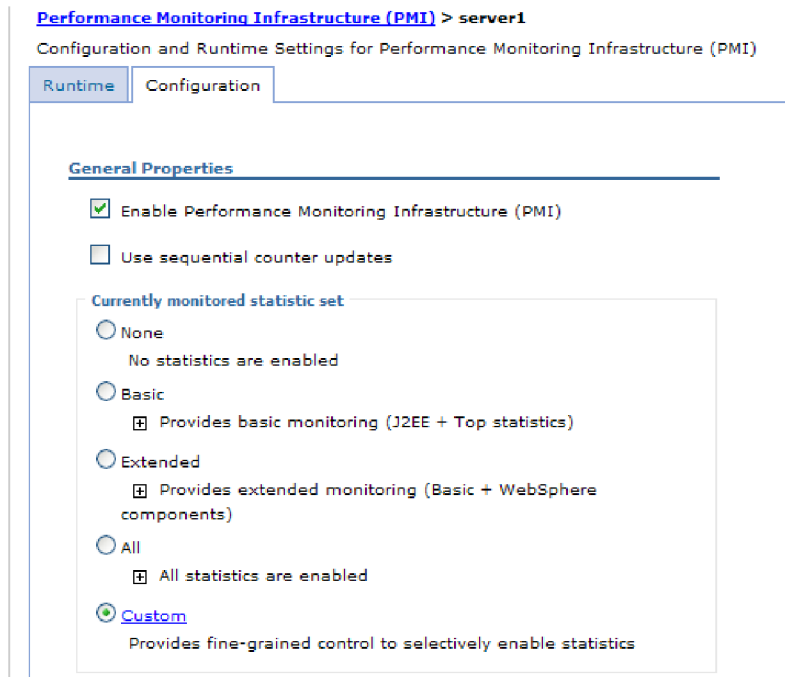


Figure 41. Enabling Performance Monitoring Infrastructure

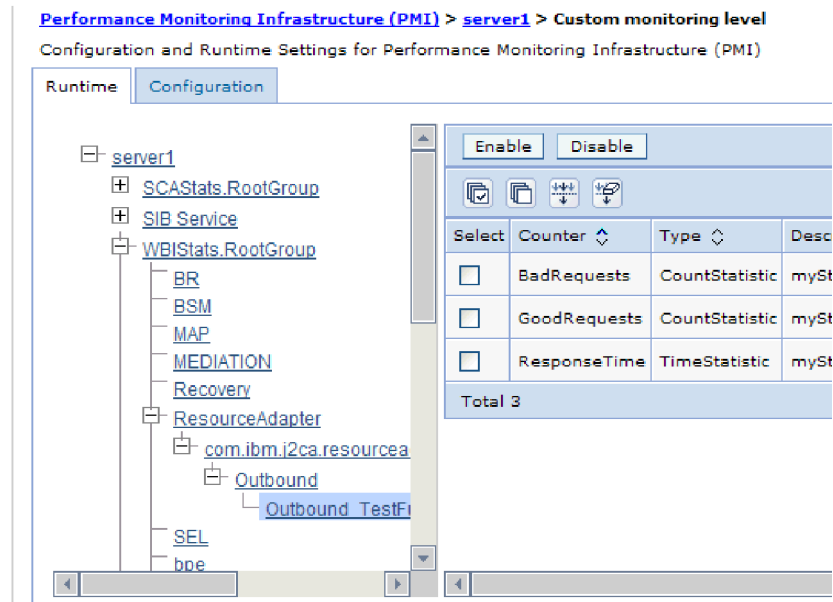


Figure 42. Runtime tab used for configuring PMI

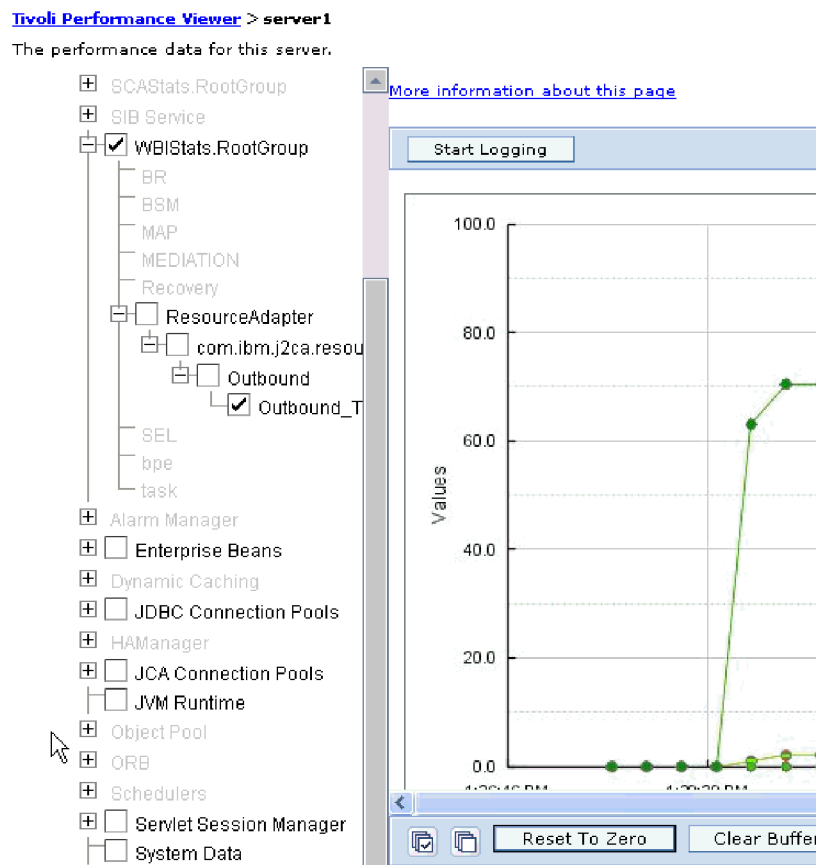


Figure 43. Adapter performance statistics, using graph view

Enabling tracing with the Common Event Infrastructure

The adapter can use the Common Event Infrastructure (CEI), a component embedded in the server, to report data about critical business events such as the starting or stopping of a poll cycle. Event data can be written to a database or a trace log file depending on configuration settings.

About this task

Use this procedure to report CEI entries in the trace log file by using the Common Base Event Browser within the administrative console.

Procedure

1. In the administrative console, click **Troubleshooting**.
2. Click **Logs and Trace**.
3. From the list of servers, click the name of your server.
4. In the **Change Log Detail Levels** box, click the name of the CEI database (for example, `WBIEventMonitor.CEI.ResourceAdapter.*`) or the trace log file (for example, `WBIEventMonitor.LOG.ResourceAdapter.*`) to which you want the adapter to write event data.
5. Select the level of detail about business events that you want the adapter to write to the database or trace log file, and (optionally) adjust the granularity of detail associated with messages and traces.
 - **No Logging**. Turns off event logging.
 - **Messages Only**. The adapter reports an event.
 - **All Messages and Traces**. The adapter reports details about an event.
 - **Message and Trace Levels**. Settings for controlling the degree of detail the adapter reports about the business object payload associated with an event. If you want to adjust the detail level, select one of the following options:
 - Fine**. The adapter reports the event but none of the business object payload.
 - Finer**. The adapter reports the event and the business object payload description.
 - Finest**. The adapter reports the event and the entire business object payload.
6. Click **OK**.

Results

Event logging is enabled. You can view CEI entries in the trace log file or by using the Common Base Event Browser within the administrative console.

Chapter 9. Troubleshooting and support

Common troubleshooting techniques and self-help information help you identify and solve problems quickly. For information about configuring logging properties and changing the log and trace file names, see “Configuring logging and tracing” on page 83.

Techniques for troubleshooting problems

Troubleshooting is a systematic approach to solving a problem. The goal is to determine why something does not work as expected and how to resolve the problem. Certain common techniques can help with the task of troubleshooting.

The first step in the troubleshooting process is to describe the problem completely. Without a problem description, neither you or IBM® can know where to start to find the cause of the problem. This step includes asking yourself basic questions, such as:

- What are the symptoms of the problem?
- Where does the problem occur?
- When does the problem occur?
- Under which conditions does the problem occur?
- Can the problem be reproduced?

The answers to these questions typically lead to a good description of the problem, and that is the best way to start down the path of problem resolution.

What are the symptoms of the problem?

When starting to describe a problem, the most obvious question is "What is the problem?" Which might seem like a straightforward question; however, you can break it down into several more-focused questions that create a more descriptive picture of the problem. These questions can include:

- Who, or what, is reporting the problem?
- What are the error codes and messages?
- How does the system fail? For example, is it a loop, hang, lock up, performance degradation, or incorrect result?
- What is the business impact of the problem?

Where does the problem occur?

Determining where the problem originates is not always simple, but it is one of the most important steps in resolving a problem. Many layers of technology can exist between the reporting and failing components. Networks, disks, and drivers are only a few components to be considered when you are investigating problems.

The following questions can help you to focus on where the problem occurs in order to isolate the problem layer.

- Is the problem specific to one platform or operating system, or is it common for multiple platforms or operating systems?
- Is the current environment and configuration supported?

Remember that if one layer reports the problem, the problem does not necessarily originate in that layer. Part of identifying where a problem originates is

understanding the environment in which it exists. Take some time to completely describe the problem environment, including the operating system and version, all corresponding software and versions, and hardware information. Confirm that you are running within an environment that is a supported configuration; many problems can be traced back to incompatible levels of software that are not intended to run together or have not been fully tested together.

When does the problem occur?

Develop a detailed timeline of events leading up to a failure, especially for those cases that are one-time occurrences. You can most simply do this by working backward: Start at the time an error was reported (as precisely as possible, even down to the millisecond), and work backward through the available logs and information. Typically, you need to look only as far as the first suspicious event that you find in a diagnostic log; however, this is not always simple to do and takes practice. Knowing when to stop looking is especially difficult when multiple layers of technology are involved, and when each has its own diagnostic information.

To develop a detailed timeline of events, answer the following questions:

- Does the problem happen only at a certain time of day or night?
- How often does the problem happen?
- What sequence of events leads up to the time that the problem is reported?
- Does the problem happen after an environment change, such as upgrading or installing software or hardware?

Responding to these types of questions can provide you with a frame of reference in which to investigate the problem.

Under which conditions does the problem occur?

Knowing what other systems and applications are running at the time that a problem occurs is an important part of troubleshooting. These and other questions about your environment can help you to identify the root cause of the problem:

- Does the problem always occur when the same task is being performed?
- Does a certain sequence of events need to occur for the problem to surface?
- Do any other applications fail at the same time?

Answering these types of questions can help you explain the environment in which the problem occurs and correlate any dependencies. Remember that just because multiple problems might have occurred around the same time, the problems are not necessarily related.

Can the problem be reproduced?

From a troubleshooting standpoint, the "ideal" problem is one that can be reproduced. Typically with problems that can be reproduced, you have a larger set of tools or procedures at your disposal to help you investigate. Consequently, problems that you can reproduce are often simpler to debug and solve. However, problems that you can reproduce can have a disadvantage: If the problem is of significant business impact, you do not want it to recur! If possible, re-create the problem in a test or development environment, which typically offers you more flexibility and control during your investigation.

Tip: Simplify the scenario to isolate the problem to a suspected component.

The following questions can help you with reproducing the problem:

- Can the problem be re-created on a test machine?
- Are multiple users or applications encountering the same type of problem?
- Can the problem be re-created by running a single command, a set of commands, a particular application, or a stand-alone application?

Avoiding stale connection problems when invoking the outbound request

Connection-related problems can be resolved in WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino using the **connectionRetryLimit** and **connectionRetryInterval** properties defined in the Managed connection factory of the Domino adapter.

Before you begin

The two properties are used to provide two features during outbound communication of the adapter and are optional by default.

About this task

In the service generation and deployment configuration window as explained in the “Setting deployment properties and generating the service” on page 46 topic for the appropriate interface, configure the connection information.

Procedure

1. Click **Advanced** -> **Additional connection configuration**.
2. Set the **Maximum number of retries in case of system connection failure** to the appropriate positive integer:
 - If the property value is set to 0, then the adapter does not perform any EIS connection validation but only executes the outbound operation. If the EIS connection is invalid, the outbound operation fails. Though the subsequent requests get executed successfully provided the Domino system is functional, the current request fails.
 - If the property value is set to greater than 0, then during each request the adapter validates that the EIS connection is active.
 - If connection is valid then operation is completed. If connection is invalid, the adapter invalidates the current managed connection so that a new managed connection is created (new physical connection).
 - If the connection is created successfully, the outbound operation is completed otherwise a `ResourceException` error is thrown.
3. Set the **Time interval between retries if connection fails (milliseconds)** field with the appropriate integer to indicate time in milliseconds in between the attempts. This property is enabled only when the **connectionRetryLimit** property has a value greater than 0.

Note: If the **connectionRetryLimit** property is invalid, the adapter tries to create a new connection. When the adapter is unable to create a connection, the adapter tries to reconnect as per the specified value in the **connectionRetryLimit** property. If the adapter is still unable to create a connection, an exception is thrown.

Results

The two new features take care of connections which are timed out or become stale after the EIS restarts. Even though this option solves most of connection-related problems, the adapter is not guaranteed to work 100% error free for connection problems.

Object no longer exists on server exception

The adapter does not work correctly due to user inactivity during the EMD or the run time process.

Symptoms:

During the EMD process, when you click the Run Query option or during the run time process, an exception or a Notes® fault is generated. The following exception message is displayed:

"NotesException: Object no longer exists on server"

Problem:

The session connecting to the Lotus Domino server times out due to user inactivity for a long time in either the EMD or the run time.

Solution:

To correct this problem, change the idle session timeout setting in the Lotus Domino server and in the EMD configuration.

1. Change the idle session time of the Lotus Domino server, that affects both the EMD and the runtime processes.
 - a. In **IBM Domino Administrator**, click the **Configuration** tab.
 - b. Click to expand the **Server** node in the left pane, and then click the **Current Server Document**.
 - c. Click the **Internet Protocols** tab, and then click the **DIOP** tab.
 - d. In the **Basics** section, set the required value in the **Idle session timeout** field.
2. Enable the adapter to try again on connection failure for the module during EMD, that affects only the runtime processes after deployment.
 - a. During the EMD configuration, open the **Additional configuration** section in the managed connection properties group.
 - b. In the **Maximum number of retries in case of system connection failure** field, specify a value greater than 0. This setting enables the IBM Business Process Manager to try again with new connections to Lotus Domino server, when there is connection problem.

org.omg.CORBA.NO_PERMISSION exception

The adapter does not work correctly when the Internet host name of the Lotus Domino server is not same as the system host name of the server.

Symptoms:

During the EMD process, when you click the Run Query option, an exception message is displayed with the information:

"org.omg.CORBA.NO_PERMISSION".

Problem:

The Internet host name of the Lotus Domino server is not same as the server host name.

Solution:

To correct this problem, configure the host name of the Lotus Domino server to be same as the server host name.

1. In **IBM Domino Administrator**, click the **Configuration** tab.
2. Click to expand the **Server** node in the left pane, and then click the **Current Server Document**.
3. In the **Basics** section, for **Fully qualified Internet host name** field, set the value as same as the system host name of the server.

Server access denied exception

To make Enterprise Metadata Discovery (EMD) function workable, you must enable HTTP clients to browse Domino databases.

Symptoms:

During the EMD process, when you click the Run Query option, an exception message is displayed with the information:

"NotesException: Server access denied".

Problem:

The Lotus Domino server does not allow HTTP clients to browse databases.

Solution:

To correct this problem, configure the Lotus Domino server to allow HTTP clients to browse databases.

1. In **IBM Domino Administrator**, click the **Configuration** tab.
2. Click to expand the **Server** node in the left pane, and then click the **Current Server Document**.
3. Click the **Internet Protocols** tab. The **HTTP** tab is selected by default.
4. In the **R5 Basics** section, select **Yes** for the **Allow HTTP clients to browse Domino databases** option.

Unable to invoke adapter through webservices

Problem

After configuring the adapter, you might note that:

1. the webservices client based on the WSDL is not getting generated properly in IBM Integration Designer.
2. you may not be able to invoke the WSDL using certain webservices client, such as RESTUI firefox plugin and soapUI tool.

Solution

Perform the following steps to enable the adapter module to load the ASI file.

1. Create a library project.
2. Change to the Enterprise Explorer view in IBM Integration Designer.
3. Locate the ASI file of the adapter in **connector project -> connectorModule**.
4. Copy the ASI file of the adapter and paste it in the library project.
5. Add the library project to the list of dependencies for the adapter module.
6. Clean project.

Version conflict exception

The adapter returns a version conflict exception message when installing multiple adapters with different versions.

Adapter returns version conflict exception message

Problem

When you install multiple adapters with different versions of CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar, and if a lower version of the CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar is loaded during runtime, the adapter will return the ResourceAdapterInternalException error message, due to a version conflict. For example, when you install Oracle E-Business Suite adapter version 7.0.0.3 and WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino version 7.5.0.2, the following error message is displayed "The version of CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar is not compatible with IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino" as IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino loads file:/C:/IBM/WebSphere/ProcServer7/profiles/ProcSrv01/installedConnectors/CWYOE_OracleEBS.rar/CWYBS_AdapterFoundation.jar with version 7.0.0.3. However, the base level of this jar required is version 7.5.0.2.

Solution

Migrate all adapters to the same version level.

About this task

To get product fixes, perform the following steps.

Procedure

1. Determine which fix you need. Check the list of IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino recommended fixes to confirm that your software is at the latest maintenance level. Check the list of problems fixed in the IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino fix readme documentation that is available for each listed fix pack to see if IBM has already published an individual fix to resolve your problem. To determine what fixes are available using IBM Support Assistant, run a query on fix from the search page.

Individual fixes are published as often as necessary to resolve defects in IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino. In addition, two kinds of cumulative collections of fixes, called fix packs and refresh packs, are published periodically for IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino, in order to bring users up to the latest maintenance level. You should install these update packages as early as possible in order to prevent problems.

Note: A list of recommended, generally available (GA) fixes for the WebSphere Java™ Connector Architecture (JCA) and WebSphere Business Integration adapters are available here. If a Fix Pack is not available for an adapter, it implies that the GA version is the recommended version and details about that version of the adapter can be found in the Release notes.

2. Download the fix. Open the download document and follow the link in the Download package section. When downloading the file, ensure the name of the maintenance file is not changed. This includes both intentional changes and inadvertent changes caused by certain web browsers or download utilities.
3. Apply the fix. Follow the instructions in the Installation Instructions section of the download document.
4. Optional: To receive weekly notification of fixes and updates, subscribe to My Support e-mail updates.

Chapter 10. Reference

Detailed information about business objects, adapter properties (enterprise service discovery properties, resource adapter properties, managed (J2C) connection factory properties, activation specification properties, and interaction specification properties), messages, and related product information is provided for your reference.

Business object information

A business object is a structure that contains the data required by the adapter to perform an operation. The name of the business object is generated by the wizard in accordance with the naming convention for the adapter.

Business object attributes for operations

Business object attributes define the content of a business object, which is a container for the data specified in the attributes. The structure of the data in the database is defined by the business object. The actual data in the database is contained in the defined business object attributes.

Mapping business object attributes to Domino data types

Table 1 lists the mapping between the business object attributes and the Domino form and field types.

Naming conventions

When the external service wizard generates a business object, it provides a name for the business object that reflects the naming convention for the adapter. Typically, the business object name indicates the structure of the business object.

The name of the business object is based on the name of the object in the Lotus Domino server. You use the Business Object Editor to create form-based objects.

The name of a form-based business object is constructed based on the database file path and form name in the Lotus Domino server. For example, when the form Document in database dir1/TestApp1.nsf is selected through the external service wizard, the name of the generated form-based business object is Dir1TestApp1Document.

Note: White spaces in the business object name are removed. Also, if either the database file path or the form name contains unqualified name character, that character is replaced with its corresponding Unicode character. For example, when the form (Archive Log) in the database TestApp1.nsf is selected through the external service wizard, the name of the generated form-based business object is TestApp1U40ArchiveLogU41.

You can rename business objects by using the refactoring functionality in Integration Designer. For more details, refer to the <http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/dmndhelp/v7r5mx/topic/com.ibm.wbpm.wid.bpel.doc/selector/topics/trefacts.html> documentation.

Fault business objects

The adapter supports business faults, which are exceptions that are anticipated and declared in the outbound service description, or import. Business faults occur at predictable points in a business process, and are caused by a business rule violation or a constraint violation.

The Domino adapter provides support for outbound fault handling. The wizard creates the following fault business objects:

- DocumentNotFoundFault

The adapter generates this fault when an invalid Universal ID or Note ID is specified during the Update, Delete, or Retrieve operations and the adapter is unable to retrieve the document to complete the operation. This fault can occur for the Update, Delete, and Retrieve operations.

- InvalidRequestFault

The adapter generates this fault when the Universal ID or Note ID is not specified during the Update, Delete, Retrieve, or Exists operations. This fault can occur for the Update, Delete, Retrieve, and Exists operations.

- InvalidParentDocumentFault

The adapter generates this fault when invalid Universal ID is specified in the ParentDocument Universal ID property in the request business object. This fault can occur for the Create, Update, and RetrieveAll operations.

- MatchesExceededLimitFault

When processing a RetrieveAll operation, the adapter generates this fault if the number of documents returned for the input query exceeds the value for the MaxRecords property in the interaction specification. You can avoid this fault by increasing the value specified for the MaxRecords property in the interaction specification properties for the RetrieveAll operation.

- NotesErrorFault

The adapter generates this fault during an operation to capture any Domino API-related errors in the fault business object. It also provides information about the reason for the error using the NotesErrorID, NotesErrorText, and NotesErrorInternal attributes. This fault can occur for all the operations.

Note: This fault is not enabled by default and is configured using the “Set business faults behavior during run time ” on page 124 property in the managed connection factory properties.

Configuration properties

IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino has several categories of configuration properties, which you set with the external service wizard while generating or creating objects and services. You can change the resource adapter, managed connection factory, and activation specification properties after you deploy the application to IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus.

Guide to information about properties

The properties used to configure WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino are described in detail in tables included in each of the configuration properties topics, such as Resource adapter properties, Managed connection factory properties, and so on. To help you use these tables, information about each row you might see is explained here.

The following table explains the meaning of each row that might be displayed in the table for a configuration property.

Outbound configuration properties

IBM WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino has several categories of outbound connection configuration properties, which you set with the external service wizard while generating or creating objects and services. You can change the resource adapter and managed connection factory properties after you deploy the module to IBM Business Process Manager or WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus using IBM Integration Designer or the administrative console, but connection properties for the external service wizard cannot be changed after deployment.

Connection properties for the wizard

External service connection properties are used to establish a connection between the external service wizard, a tool that is used to create business objects, and the

Lotus Domino server. These properties specify such things as connection configuration, bidirectional transformation properties, and logging options for the wizard. Once a connection is established, the wizard can discover in the Lotus Domino server the metadata it needs to create business objects.

The following table lists and describes the connection properties. These properties can only be configured using the wizard and cannot be changed after deployment. A complete description of each property is provided in the sections that follow the table. For information about how to read the property details tables in the sections that follow, see “Guide to information about properties” on page 115.

Deployment and configuration of the WALD inbound extension manager

The adapter provides for deployment and configuration of the WALD inbound extension manager on the Lotus Domino server. When you deploy the extension manager, the adapter is able to monitor the create, update, and delete events in the Domino database.

Deployment of the inbound extension manager

You can deploy the inbound extension manager on Windows, AIX, Linux, and Solaris systems. After you deploy the required files, you can monitor the events in the specified databases in the Lotus Domino server.

The following steps describe how to deploy the required files for extension manager on the different operating systems.

1. Copy the required library file into the Lotus Domino server installation directory. See Table 1 to know the operating system-specific library file name.

2. Edit the notes.ini file in your Domino directory and add the required line as given in Table 2.

3. Copy the waldinbound.nsf file into your Domino data directory.
4. Restart the Lotus Domino server.

Note: You must restart the Lotus Domino server each time you update these files:

- waldinbound.dll
- libwaldinbound_r.a
- libwaldinbound.so
- waldinbound.nsf

5. Click **Configuration for WALD Inbound** in the left pane to configure the databases that are to be monitored.
6. Click **EventView** in the left pane to see the generated events.

Configuration of the inbound extension manager

You can configure the inbound extension manager by setting up different configuration parameters. The steps here describe the process of setting up the configuration parameters.

1. Open the waldinbound.nsf database in the Lotus Domino server through Lotus Notes®.
2. Click **EventTriggerConfigurationView**. You can create or edit an event trigger configuration view to configure a monitored Form.

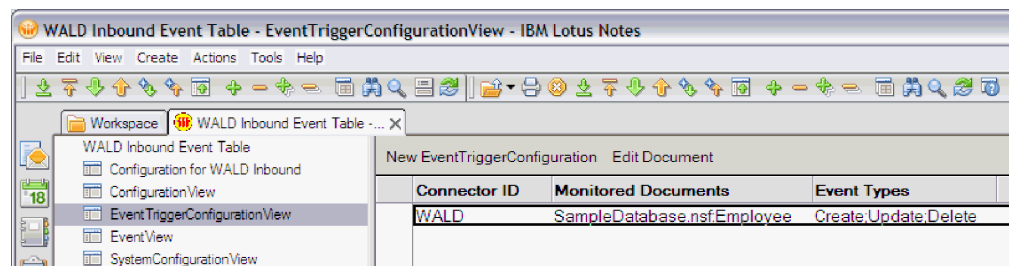


Figure 44. Editing the WALD inbound event trigger configuration

- Click **Edit Document** to edit the existing event trigger configuration of the WALD inbound extension manager. The parameters available for configuration are described in Table 3.

Note: The event trigger configuration overwrites the **Connector ID**, **Database Paths**, and **Event Types** fields of configuration document.

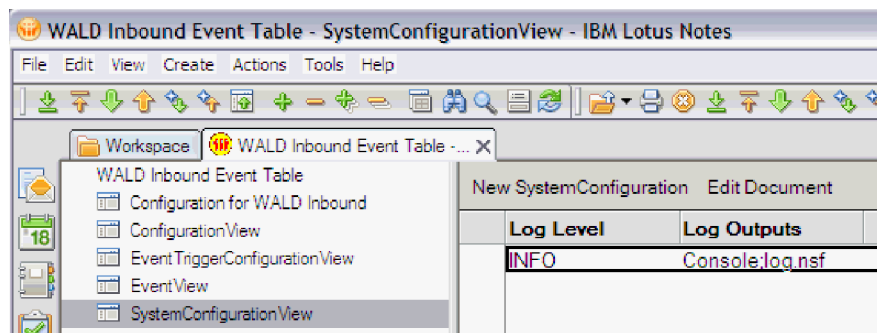


Figure 45. Editing the WALD inbound logging configuration

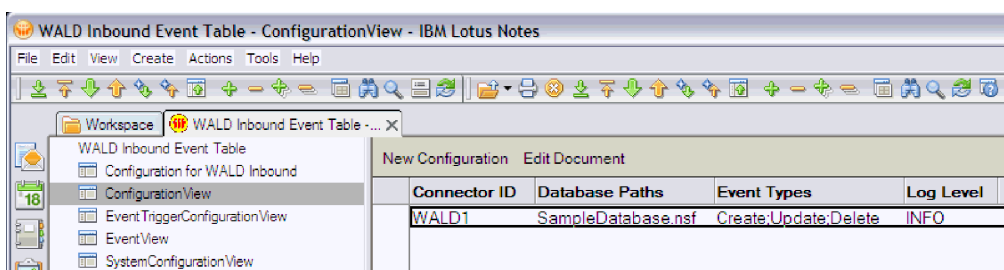


Figure 46. Editing the WALD inbound event configuration

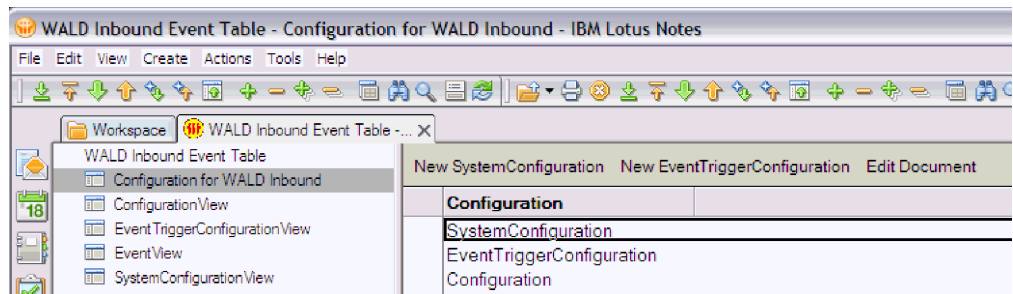


Figure 47. Viewing the WALD inbound configuration tables

View and verify the deployment of the WALD inbound extension manager

After you have deployed the inbound extension manager, you can view and verify its deployment to check if the extension manager is correctly configured to monitor the events in the Lotus Domino server.

View the events

The following steps describe how to view the generated events of the waldinbound.nsf database.

1. Open the application (database) waldinbound.nsf in the Lotus Domino server through Lotus Notes.
2. Click **EventView** in the left pane to see the list of all the generated events before the events are fetched by a run time inbound application using the WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino.

Verify the deployment

You can verify the deployment of the extension manager after deploying the dependency files (waldinbound.dll, libwaldinbound_r.a, or libwaldinbound.so) and waldinbound.nsf files on the Lotus Domino server. To verify the deployment, follow these steps:

1. Open the application (database) waldinbound.nsf in the Lotus Domino server through Lotus Notes.
2. Click **SystemConfigurationView** in the left pane.
3. Click **Edit Document** to edit the system configuration document.

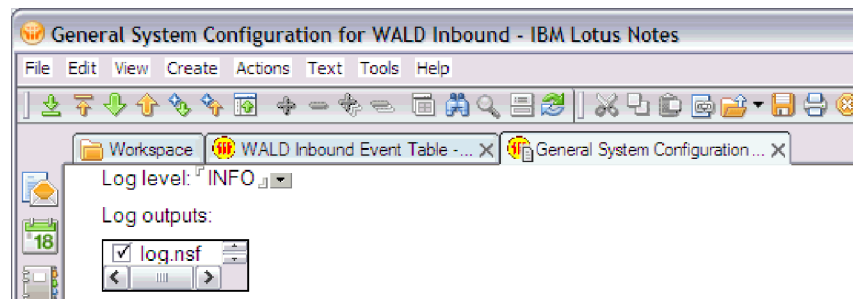


Figure 48. Editing the WALD inbound event table logging configuration

4. Change the **Log Level** to INFO or DEBUG level.
5. Check the log messages by reading the **Configuration Profile** printed on the Lotus Domino server console.

Globalization

WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino is a globalized application that can be used in multiple linguistic and cultural environments. Based on character set support and the locale of the host server, the adapter delivers message text in the appropriate language.

Support for globalization

The adapter is globalized to support single and multibyte character sets and deliver message text in the specified language.

Introduction

Globalized software applications are designed and developed for use within multiple linguistic and cultural environments rather than a single environment. WebSphere Adapters, IBM Integration Designer, IBM Business Process Manager, and WebSphere Enterprise Service Bus are written in Java. The Java runtime environment within the Java virtual machine (JVM) represents data in the Unicode character code set. Unicode contains encoding for characters in most known character code sets (both single and multibyte). Therefore, when data is transferred between these integration system components, there is no need for character conversion.

To log error and informational messages in the appropriate language and for the appropriate country or region, the adapter uses the locale of the system on which it is running.

The adapter supports globalization for business objects and adapter foundation classes (AFC) related properties.

Globalization support for outbound and inbound properties

The WebSphere Adapter for Lotus Domino supports globalized character for the following outbound and inbound properties.

- Database name
- Database path
- Form name
- Form fields
- Form attributes
- Business data (values for the form attributes)
