- · Heavy equipment-personal injury or equipment damage might result if mishandled.
- · Always lower the leveling pads on the rack cabinet.
- Always install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
- To avoid hazardous conditions due to uneven mechanical loading, always install the heaviest devices in the bottom of the rack cabinet. Always install servers and optional devices starting from the bottom of the rack cabinet.
- Rack-mounted devices are not to be used as shelves or work spaces. Do not place objects on top

- Each rack cabinet might have more than one power cord. Be sure to disconnect all power cords in the rack cabinet when directed to disconnect power during servicing.
- Connect all devices installed in a rack cabinet to power devices installed in the same rack cabinet. Do not plug a power cord from a device installed in one rack cabinet into a power device installed in a different rack cabinet.

- (For sliding drawers.) Do not pull out or install any drawer or feature if the rack stabilizer brackets are not attached to the rack. Do not pull out more than one drawer at a time. The rack might become unstable if you pull out more than one drawer at a time.
- (For fixed drawers.) This drawer is a fixed drawer and must not be moved for servicing unless specified by the manufacturer. Attempting to move the drawer partially or completely out of the rack might cause the rack to become unstable or cause the drawer to fall out of the rack.

Removing components from the upper positions in the rack cabinet improves rack stability during relocation. Follow these general guidelines whenever you relocate a populated rack cabinet within a room or building.

- Reduce the weight of the rack cabinet by removing equipment starting at the top of the rack cabinet. When possible, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. If this configuration is not known, you must observe the following precautions:
 - Remove all devices in the 32U position (compliance ID RACK-001 or 22U (compliance ID RR001) and above.
 - Ensure that the heaviest devices are installed in the bottom of the rack cabinet.
 - Ensure that there are little-to-no empty U-levels between devices installed in the rack cabinet below the 32U (compliance ID RACK-001 or 22U (compliance ID RR001) level, unless the received configuration specifically allowed it.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating is part of a suite of rack cabinets, detach the rack cabinet from the suite.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating was supplied with removable outriggers they must be reinstalled before the cabinet is relocated.
- Inspect the route that you plan to take to eliminate potential hazards.
- Verify that the route that you choose can support the weight of the loaded rack cabinet. Refer to the documentation that comes with your rack cabinet for the weight of a loaded rack cabinet.
- Verify that all door openings are at least 760 x 230 mm (30 x 80 in.).
- Ensure that all devices, shelves, drawers, doors, and cables are secure.
- Ensure that the four leveling pads are raised to their highest position.
- · Ensure that there is no stabilizer bracket installed on the rack cabinet during movement.
- Do not use a ramp inclined at more than 10 degrees.
- When the rack cabinet is in the new location, complete the following steps:
 - Lower the four leveling pads.
 - Install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
 - If you removed any devices from the rack cabinet, repopulate the rack cabinet from the lowest position to the highest position.
- If a long-distance relocation is required, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. Pack the rack cabinet in the original packaging material, or equivalent. Also lower the leveling pads to raise the casters off of the pallet and bolt the rack cabinet to the pallet.



Power and cabling information for NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) **GR-1089-CORE**

The following comments apply to the servers that have been designated as conforming to NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE:

The equipment is suitable for installation in the following:

- Network telecommunications facilities
- Locations where the NEC (National Electrical Code) applies

The intrabuilding ports of this equipment are suitable for connection to intrabuilding or unexposed wiring or cabling only. The intrabuilding ports of this equipment must not be metallically connected to the interfaces that connect to the OSP (outside plant) or its wiring. These interfaces are designed for use as intrabuilding interfaces only (Type 2 or Type 4 ports as described in GR-1089-CORE) and require isolation from the exposed OSP cabling. The addition of primary protectors is not sufficient protection to connect these interfaces metallically to OSP wiring.

Note: All Ethernet cables must be shielded and grounded at both ends.

The ac-powered system does not require the use of an external surge protection device (SPD).

The dc-powered system employs an isolated DC return (DC-I) design. The DC battery return terminal shall not be connected to the chassis or frame ground.

The dc-powered system is intended to be installed in a common bonding network (CBN) as described in GR-1089-CORE.

Ensure that you have the following items before starting your installation:

- Phillips screwdriver
- · Flat-head screwdriver
- · Box cutter
- Electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap
- Rack with two Electronic Industries Association (EIA) units (2U) of space

Note: If you do not have a rack that is installed, install the rack. For instructions, see Racks and rack features (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8hbf/p8hbf_8xx_kickoff.htm).


Determining and marking the location in the rack

You might need to determine where to install the system unit into the rack.

Procedure

- 1. Read the Rack safety notices (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8hbf/racksafety.htm).
- 2. Determine where to place the system unit in the rack. As you plan for installing the system unit in a rack, consider the following information:
 - Organize larger and heavier units into the lower part of the rack.
 - Plan to install units into the lower part of the rack first.
 - Record the Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) locations in your plan.

Note: The server is two EIA units high. An EIA unit is 44.55 mm (1.75 in.) in height. The rack contains three mounting holes for each EIA unit of height. This system unit, therefore, is 89 mm (3.5 in.) high and covers six mounting holes in the rack.




Figure 1. Removing the filler panels

3. If necessary, remove the filler panels to allow access to the inside of the rack enclosure where you plan to place the unit, as shown in Figure 1 on page 3.

- 4. Determine to place the system in the rack. Record the EIA location.
- 5. Facing the front of the rack and working from the right side, use tape, a marker, or pencil to mark the lower hole of each EIA unit.
- 6. Repeat step 5 for the corresponding holes located on the left side of the rack.
- 7. Go to the rear of the rack.
- 8. On the right side, find the EIA unit that corresponds to the bottom EIA unit marked on the front of the rack.
- 9. Mark the bottom EIA unit.
- 10. Mark the corresponding holes on the left side of the rack.

Installing the system using the slide rails

If you ordered the system with the slide rail option, read this section to install the system into the rack using the slide rails.

Attaching the slide rails to the rack

You might need to attach the mounting hardware to the rack. Use the procedure to complete this task. The information is intended to promote safety and reliable operation, and includes illustrations of the related hardware components and shows how these components relate to each other.

About this task

Attention: To avoid rail failure and potential danger to yourself and to the unit, ensure that you have the correct rails and fittings for your rack. If your rack has square support flange holes or screw-thread support flange holes, ensure that the rails and fittings match the support flange holes that are used on your rack. Do not install mismatched hardware by using washers or spacers. If you do not have the correct rails and fittings for your rack, contact your IBM reseller.

Procedure

- 1. Each slide rail is marked with either an R (right) or an L (left), when you look from the front. Select the left slide rail, bring it to the front of the rack, and locate the selected EIA unit that was previously marked.




Figure 2. Opening the front latch and removing the rear screw

- 2. Remove the screw from the rear of the rail (3). Push up on the locking tab (1) on the front, and pull out the front latch (2) at the front of the rail. For details, see Figure 2.




Figure 3. Pins that are seated on the front rail of the rack

3. At the front of the rack, insert three pins on the front of the rail into the holes within the selected EIA unit that were previously marked. Lower the slide rail down (1) to engage the hook feature on the middle pin. For details, see Figure 3 on page 5.




Figure 4. Latch seated on the front rail of the rack

4. While you pull the slide rail forward, ensure that all three pins protrude through the rack holes, then push the front latch (2) all the way in. For details, see Figure 4.

Note: If you must reposition the rail, release the front latch (2), and while you press the blue pin at the bottom, push the rail up and toward the rear to release from the rack.

- 5. Repeat steps 3 and 4 for the right rail.




Figure 5. Aligning and engaging the pins into the holes in the rear of the rack

- 6. Move to the rear of the rack. Align the two pins located on the rear of the slide rail with the top and bottom holes within the selected EIA unit that were previously marked. Pull the slide rail toward you to insert the two pins into the rack holes (1), and lower the slide rail down (2) to engage the hook feature on the top pin. Install the screw (3) to secure the slide rail to the rack. For details, see Figure 5 on page 6. Ensure that the two pins protrude through the rack holes before you proceed to the next step.

Note: The pin fixtures of the slide rails support either round-hole or square-hole rack models.

7. Repeat step 5 to install the right rail into the rack.

Installing the system into the rack by using the slide rails

Learn how to install the system into the rack by using the slide rails.

About this task

Note: This system requires two people to install the system into the rack.

Procedure

- 1. Remove the shipping cover on the rear and the front of the system, if present.
- 2. Extend the slide rails forward (1) until they click twice into place. Carefully lift the server and tilt it into position over the slide rails so that the rear nail heads (2) on the server line up with the rear slots (3) on the slide rails. Slide the server down until the rear nail heads slip into the two rear slots. Then, slowly lower the front of the server (4) until the other nail heads slip into the other slots on the slide rails. Ensure that the front latch (5) slides over the nail heads.




Figure 6. Extending slide rails and aligning server nail heads with the slots on the rail




Figure 7. Lifting the release latches and pushing the server into the rack

3. Lift the blue release latches (1) on the slide rails and push the server (2) all the way into the rack until it clicks into place. For details, see Figure 7 on page 7.

- 5. Attach the front cover to the front of the system.




Figure 8. The server installed in the rack

Installing the cable-management arm and connecting and routing power cables

The cable-management arm is used to efficiently route cables so that you have proper access to the rear of the system. After you have installed the cable-management arm, connect and route power cables.




Figure 9. Relative positions of the parts of the cable-management arm before assembly

2. Connect one end of the support arm (A) to the right slide rail (1) so that you can swing the other end of the support arm toward the left side of the rack (2).

Note: The support arm **(A)** is labeled UP and DOWN. Ensure that the side labeled UP is facing upward and to the right.




Figure 10. Connecting the support arm




Figure 11. Securing the cable-management stop bracket to the support arm




Figure 12. Installing the mounting bracket into the slide rail




Figure 13. Installing the extension bracket into the slide rail

5. Slide the extension bracket **(E)** into the right slide rail until the spring-loaded pin snaps into place. For details, see Figure 13.




Figure 14. Installing the mounting bracket into the slide rail

7. Place the cable-management arm (D) on the support arm (A). Slide the first cable-management arm tab into the slot on the mounting bracket (C). 


Figure 15. Sliding the cable-management arm tab into the mounting bracket slot




Figure 16. Sliding the other cable-management arm tab into the extension bracket




Figure 17. Rear view of the system with ports displayed

Note: The system requires 2 EIA rack units (2U) of space.

If present, use the rack-mount template to determine and mark the location, and to attach the mounting hardware to the rack.

Procedure

- 1. Select the appropriate EIA location unit number for the rails. Each EIA location contains three (3) holes for mounting hardware. For the purpose of these instructions, each EIA set of holes are identified as a, b, and c, from the top of each EIA unit to the bottom of each EIA unit.
- 2. Rotate the locking clamps downward at each end of both rails, to the open position.




Figure 18. Opening the rail clamps

- 3. Install nut clips (A) onto the front EIA support flanges, at the appropriate locations. The nut clips are used to secure the system to the rack.
- 4. At the rack front, align the bottom of the right rail with the bottom hole (c) of the EIA unit selected, in both the front of the rack and the rear of the rack. The locator pins (B) fit into holes (b) and (c) of the EIA location directly above the lowest EIA unit used, on both the front and the rear of the rack.




Figure 19. Front of rack rail alignment and nut clip locations

- 5. Rotate the hinged rail latch upward to hold the rail in place against the front EIA support flange.




Figure 20. Rear of rack rail alignment and nut clip locations




Figure 21. The server installed in the rack




Figure 22. Rear view of the system with ports displayed




Figure 23. Removing a disk drive filler from a system.




Figure 24. Locking the drive bay handle




Figure 25. Removing a disk drive filler from a system.




Figure 26. Disk drive lock detail




Figure 27. Removing the PCIe riser




Figure 28. Inserting the PCIe riser




Figure 29. Location of the memory risers: positions 9 through 16




Figure 30. Location of the memory DIMM slots on the riser; positions 33 through 36




Figure 31. Removing two fillers from the system




Figure 32. Installing a memory DIMM into a slot on the riser




Figure 33. Installing a memory riser in the system




Figure 34. 8335-GCA memory riser installation sequence

Installing PCIe adapters in the 8335-GCA or 8335-GTA

The 8335-GCA system has three open PCIe slots on the system board. The 8335-GTA system has those slots as well as two open slots in the PCIe risers.

You can install half-height, half-length (HHLH) PCIe adapters in the system board. You can install full-height, full-length (FHFL) PCIe adapters in a PCIe riser. The PCIe riser also supports double-wide PCIe adapters. One of the system board PCIe slots supports double-wide PCIe adapters.

If you need to change the tailstock of the PCIe adapter from one size to another, so that the adapter fits properly in the socket, see Removing and replacing the tailstock on a PCIe adapter.




Figure 35. Rear view of an 8335-GCA or 8335-GTA system with PCIe slots indicated




Figure 36. Rear view of a 8335-GCA or 8335-GTA system with PCIe slots indicated




Figure 37. Removing the PCIe slot cover




Figure 38. Inserting a PCIe adapter




Figure 39. Removing the PCIe riser




Figure 40. PCIe riser with fillers installed




Figure 41. Inserting PCIe adapter into PCIe riser




Figure 42. Installing the PCIe riser




Figure 43. Adapter




Figure 44. Adapter




Figure 45. FC EC3A adapter




Figure 46. Top and bottom view of the cable




Figure 47. FC EC3B adapter




Figure 48. Top and bottom view of the cable




Figure 49. PCIe Gen3 low profile x16 2-port EDR InfiniBand adapter




Figure 50. PCIe Gen3 low profile x16 1-port EDR InfiniBand adapter




Figure 51. PCIe Gen3 x16 GPU Adapter




Figure 52. FC EL3Z adapter




Figure 53. EL43 adapter




Figure 54. FC EL55 adapter




Figure 55. EL5B adapter




Figure 56. FC ENOS adapter




Figure 57. FC EN0T adapter

LEDs on the 8335-GCA or 8335-GTA system




Figure 58. LEDs on an 8335-GCA or 8335-GTA system

The LEDs indicate various system status. These LEDs are located at the front (as shown in Figure 58 on page 75) and at the rear of the system.

- The green LED indicates the power status.
 - A constant light indicates full system power to the unit.
 - A flashing light indicates standby power to the unit.
 - It takes approximately 30-seconds from the time the power-on button is pressed to when the power LED changes from flashing to solid. During the transition period, the LED might flash faster.
- The amber LED indicates a problem in the system.
- The blue LED is used to identify the system that requires service.

LED indicators are located on the following parts:

- At the front of the system:

Use the **ipmitool** command to activate the blue system identify LED. For in-band networks, the chassis identify command is:

interface

Is the interface you are using to connect to the system; for example usb.

interval

Is the time to turn on the identify LED in seconds. The default is 15; meaning the LED is on for 15 seconds then turns off. A value of zero (0) turns off the LED. A value of force turns on the LED and leaves it on until turned off.

To run the command remotely over the LAN, the chassis identify command to enter is: ipmitool -I lanplus -H <hostname> -U <username> -P -P -P -D <username> -P




Figure 59. Power button

- 3. Press the power button shown in Figure 59. The power-on light stops flashing and remains on, indicating that the system power is on. The system cooling fans are operate at a high speed, and after approximately 30 seconds, return to operating speed.




Figure 60. Removing the service access cover




Figure 61. Installing the service access cover




Figure 62. Placing the system into the srvice position




Figure 63. Placing the system into the operating position




Figure 64. Power cord loop with cable management arm routing. The power cord loops counter-clockwise to the right.




Figure 65. Power cord loop with sidewall routing. The power cord loops counter-clockwise to the left.




Figure 66. Removing the power cords from an 8335-GTA or 8335-GCA system




Figure 67. Connecting the power cords to an 8335-GTA or 8335-GCA system




Figure 68. Power cord loop with cable management arm routing. The power cord loops counterclockwise to the right.




Figure 69. Power cord loop with sidewall routing. The power cord loops counterclockwise to the left.




Figure 70. Disconnecting the power cord from the power supply




Figure 71. Removing a power supply from the system




Figure 72. Replacing a power supply in the system




Figure 73. Connecting the power cord to the power supply


