- 4. Remove the signal cables from the connectors.
- 5. Remove all cables from the devices.

#### To Connect:

- 1. Turn off everything (unless instructed otherwise).
- 2. Attach all cables to the devices.
- 3. Attach the signal cables to the connectors.
- 4. For AC power, attach the power cords to the outlets.
- 5. For racks with a DC power distribution panel (PDP), restore the power from the Customer's DC power source and turn on the circuit breakers located in the PDP.
- 6. Turn on the devices.

Sharp edges, corners and joints may be present in and around the system. Use care when handling equipment to avoid cuts, scrapes and pinching. (D005)

#### (R001 part 1 of 2):

DANGER: Observe the following precautions when working on or around your IT rack system:

- Heavy equipment-personal injury or equipment damage might result if mishandled.
- Always lower the leveling pads on the rack cabinet.
- Always install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
- To avoid hazardous conditions due to uneven mechanical loading, always install the heaviest devices in the bottom of the rack cabinet. Always install servers and optional devices starting from the bottom of the rack cabinet.
- Rack-mounted devices are not to be used as shelves or work spaces. Do not place objects on top of rack-mounted devices. In addition, do not lean on rack mounted devices and do not use them to stabilize your body position (for example, when working from a ladder).



- Each rack cabinet might have more than one power cord.
  - For AC powered racks, be sure to disconnect all power cords in the rack cabinet when directed to disconnect power during servicing.
  - For racks with a DC power distribution panel (PDP), turn off the circuit breaker that controls the power to the system unit(s), or disconnect the customer's DC power source, when directed to disconnect power during servicing.
- Connect all devices installed in a rack cabinet to power devices installed in the same rack cabinet. Do not plug a power cord from a device installed in one rack cabinet into a power device installed in a different rack cabinet.
- An electrical outlet that is not correctly wired could place hazardous voltage on the metal parts of the system or the devices that attach to the system. It is the responsibility of the customer to ensure that the outlet is correctly wired and grounded to prevent an electrical shock.

#### (R001 part 2 of 2):

#### CAUTION:

- Do not install a unit in a rack where the internal rack ambient temperatures will exceed the manufacturer's recommended ambient temperature for all your rack-mounted devices.
- Do not install a unit in a rack where the air flow is compromised. Ensure that air flow is not blocked or reduced on any side, front, or back of a unit used for air flow through the unit.
- Consideration should be given to the connection of the equipment to the supply circuit so that overloading of the circuits does not compromise the supply wiring or overcurrent protection. To provide the correct power connection to a rack, refer to the rating labels located on the equipment in the rack to determine the total power requirement of the supply circuit.
- (*For sliding drawers.*) Do not pull out or install any drawer or feature if the rack stabilizer brackets are not attached to the rack. Do not pull out more than one drawer at a time. The rack might become unstable if you pull out more than one drawer at a time.



• (*For fixed drawers.*) This drawer is a fixed drawer and must not be moved for servicing unless specified by the manufacturer. Attempting to move the drawer partially or completely out of the rack might cause the rack to become unstable or cause the drawer to fall out of the rack.

#### CAUTION:

Removing components from the upper positions in the rack cabinet improves rack stability during relocation. Follow these general guidelines whenever you relocate a populated rack cabinet within a room or building.

- Reduce the weight of the rack cabinet by removing equipment starting at the top of the rack cabinet. When possible, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. If this configuration is not known, you must observe the following precautions:
  - Remove all devices in the 32U position (compliance ID RACK-001 or 22U (compliance ID RR001) and above.
  - Ensure that the heaviest devices are installed in the bottom of the rack cabinet.
  - Ensure that there are little-to-no empty U-levels between devices installed in the rack cabinet below the 32U (compliance ID RACK-001 or 22U (compliance ID RR001) level, unless the received configuration specifically allowed it.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating is part of a suite of rack cabinets, detach the rack cabinet from the suite.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating was supplied with removable outriggers they must be reinstalled before the cabinet is relocated.
- Inspect the route that you plan to take to eliminate potential hazards.
- Verify that the route that you choose can support the weight of the loaded rack cabinet. Refer to the documentation that comes with your rack cabinet for the weight of a loaded rack cabinet.
- Verify that all door openings are at least 760 x 230 mm (30 x 80 in.).
- Ensure that all devices, shelves, drawers, doors, and cables are secure.
- Ensure that the four leveling pads are raised to their highest position.
- Ensure that there is no stabilizer bracket installed on the rack cabinet during movement.
- Do not use a ramp inclined at more than 10 degrees.
- When the rack cabinet is in the new location, complete the following steps:
  - Lower the four leveling pads.
  - Install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
  - If you removed any devices from the rack cabinet, repopulate the rack cabinet from the lowest position to the highest position.
- If a long-distance relocation is required, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. Pack the rack cabinet in the original packaging material, or equivalent. Also lower the leveling pads to raise the casters off of the pallet and bolt the rack cabinet to the pallet.

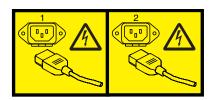

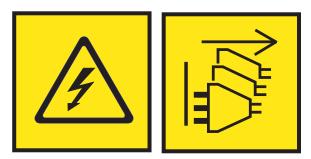

- Operation of LIFT TOOL by authorized personnel only.
- LIFT TOOL intended for use to assist, lift, install, remove units (load) up into rack elevations. It is not to be used loaded transporting over major ramps nor as a replacement for such designated tools like pallet jacks, walkies, fork trucks and such related relocation practices. When this is not practicable, specially trained persons or services must be used (for instance, riggers or movers).
- Read and completely understand the contents of LIFT TOOL operator's manual before using. Failure to read, understand, obey safety rules, and follow instructions may result in property damage and/or personal injury. If there are questions, contact the vendor's service and support. - Do not corner load the platform tilt riser accessory option. Secure platform riser tilt option to main shelf in all four (4x) locations with provided hardware only, prior to use. Load objects are designed to slide on/off smooth platforms without appreciable force, so take care not to push or lean. Keep riser tilt option flat at all times except for final minor adjustment when needed.
- Do not stand under overhanging load.
- Do not use on uneven surface, incline or decline (major ramps).
- Do not stack loads.
- Do not operate while under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Do not support ladder against LIFT TOOL.
- Tipping hazard. Do not push or lean against load with raised platform.
- Do not use as a personnel lifting platform or step. No riders.
- Do not stand on any part of lift. Not a step.
- Do not climb on mast.
- Do not operate a damaged or malfunctioning LIFT TOOL machine.

- Do not leave LIFT TOOL machine unattended with an elevated load.
- Watch and keep hands, fingers, and clothing clear when equipment is in motion.
- Turn Winch with hand power only. If winch handle cannot be cranked easily with one hand, it is probably over-loaded. Do not continue to turn winch past top or bottom of platform travel. Excessive unwinding will detach handle and damage cable. Always hold handle when lowering, unwinding. Always assure self that winch is holding load before releasing winch handle.
- A winch accident could cause serious injury. Not for moving humans. Make certain clicking sound is heard as the equipment is being raised. Be sure winch is locked in position before releasing handle. Read instruction page before operating this winch. Never allow winch to unwind freely. Freewheeling will cause uneven cable wrapping around winch drum, damage cable, and may cause serious injury. (C048)

# Power and cabling information for NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE

The following comments apply to the IBM servers that have been designated as conforming to NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE:

The equipment is suitable for installation in the following:

- Network telecommunications facilities
- Locations where the NEC (National Electrical Code) applies

The intrabuilding ports of this equipment are suitable for connection to intrabuilding or unexposed wiring or cabling only. The intrabuilding ports of this equipment *must not* be metallically connected to the interfaces that connect to the OSP (outside plant) or its wiring. These interfaces are designed for use as intrabuilding interfaces only (Type 2 or Type 4 ports as described in GR-1089-CORE) and require isolation from the exposed OSP cabling. The addition of primary protectors is not sufficient protection to connect these interfaces metallically to OSP wiring.

Note: All Ethernet cables must be shielded and grounded at both ends.

The ac-powered system does not require the use of an external surge protection device (SPD).

The dc-powered system employs an isolated DC return (DC-I) design. The DC battery return terminal *shall not* be connected to the chassis or frame ground.

The dc-powered system is intended to be installed in a common bonding network (CBN) as described in GR-1089-CORE.

Use this information to install and configure POWER8<sup>®</sup> processor-based systems and to install customer-installable hardware features. This information also provides removal and replacement procedures for customer-replaceable hardware features, such as memory modules or fans.

Ensure that you have the following items before starting your installation:

- Phillips screwdriver
- Flat-head screwdriver
- Box cutter
- Electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap
- Rack with two Electronic Industries Association (EIA) units (2U) of space

**Note:** If you do not have a rack that is installed, install the rack. For instructions, see Racks and rack features (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8hbf/p8hbf\_8xx\_kickoff.htm).


# Determining and marking the location in the rack for the 8348-21C system

You might need to determine where to install the system unit into the rack.


## Procedure

- 1. Read the Rack safety notices (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8hbf/racksafety.htm).
- 2. Determine where to place the system unit in the rack. As you plan for installing the system unit in a rack, consider the following information:
  - Organize larger and heavier units into the lower part of the rack.
  - Plan to install units into the lower part of the rack first.
  - Record the Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) locations in your plan.

**Note:** The server is two EIA units high. An EIA unit is 44.55 mm (1.75 in.) in height. The rack contains three mounting holes for each EIA unit of height. This system unit, therefore, is 89 mm (3.5 in.) high and covers six mounting holes in the rack.



**3**. If necessary, remove the filler panels to allow access to the inside of the rack enclosure where you plan to place the unit, as shown in Figure 1 on page 4.



#### Figure 1. Removing the filler panels

- 4. Determine to place the system in the rack. Record the EIA location.
- 5. Facing the front of the rack and working from the right side, use tape, a marker, or pencil to mark the lower hole of each EIA unit.
- 6. Repeat step 5 for the corresponding holes located on the left side of the rack.
- 7. Go to the rear of the rack.
- **8**. On the right side, find the EIA unit that corresponds to the bottom EIA unit marked on the front of the rack.
- 9. Mark the bottom EIA unit.
- 10. Mark the corresponding holes on the left side of the rack.

# Installing the 8348-21C system by using slide rails

If you ordered the system with the slide rail option, read this section to install the system into the rack by using slide rails.

## Attaching slide rails to the system and rack

Attach slide rails to the system and then to the rack.

#### About this task

**Attention:** To avoid rail failure and potential danger to yourself and to the unit, ensure that you have the correct rails and fittings for your rack. If your rack has square support flange holes or screw-thread support flange holes, ensure that the rails and fittings match the support flange holes that are used on your rack. Do not install mismatched hardware by using washers or spacers. If you do not have the correct rails and fittings for your rack, contact your IBM reseller.

The slide rails arrive fully assembled. To install the slide rails into the rack, you must disassemble the slide rails into four pieces.

#### Procedure

1. Remove the lower DASD backplane screw on either side so that you can service the backplane at a later date without removing the system from the rack.




Figure 2. Removing the DASD backplane screws

2. Attach the system chassis slide rails to each side of the system chassis. At the rear of the system chassis, align the tabs on the system chassis (B) with the slots on the slide rail (A). Push the chassis slide rail forward so that the slam latch clicks into place.

**Note:** The system rails are marked with an **L**, to designate the left system rail, and an **R**, to designate the right system rail from the front of the system.




Figure 3. Attaching the left system chassis slide rail to the system chassis

**3**. Install the retention screw on each system chassis slide rail to further attach the slide rail to the system chassis.




Figure 4. Attaching the left system chassis rail retention screw to the system chassis

- 4. Next, install the rack slide rails into the rack. Each rack slide rail is marked with either an **R** (right) or an **L** (left), when you look from the front. Select the right slide rail, bring it to the front of the rack, and locate the selected EIA unit.
- 5. From the front of the rack, insert the pins on the front of the slide rail (1) into the holes on the front of the rack that you previously marked (2). Pull the rail forward so that the rail spring clip (3) latches

to the rail flanges and clicks into place.




Figure 5. Installing the slide rail from the front of the rack

- 6. Repeat steps 3 and 4 for the left rail.
- 7. Move to the rear of the rack. Pull the slide rail toward you to insert the two pins (1) into the rack holes (2). Pull the rail until the rail spring clip (3) clicks into place. Install the screw (4) to secure the slide rail to the rack.




Figure 6. Installing the slide rail at the rear of the rack

## Installing the system into the rack by using the slide rails

Learn how to install the system into the rack by using the slide rails.

#### About this task

Note: This system requires two people to install the system into the rack.

#### Procedure

- 1. Fully extend the slide rails until the rails click into the service position (A).
- 2. Using two people, lift the system and align the lower roller pins on the chassis rails with the grooves in the rack slide rails on both sides.




Figure 7. Aligning the lower roller pins on the chassis rails with the grooves in the rack slide rails

- 3. Simultaneously lift the latches on either side of the rack (B) that are marked with a green arrow.
- 4. Push the system into the rack.
- 5. Tighten the thumbscrews on either side of the system to secure the system to the rack.

#### Connecting and routing power cables

#### About this task

Note: The IPMI Ethernet port transmits 10 and 100 megabits per second.

#### Procedure

- 1. To connect the power cables, complete the following steps:
  - a. Plug the power cords into the power supplies.
  - b. Attach all cables to the rear of the server.




Figure 8. Rear view of the system with ports displayed

# Completing the server setup

#### Procedure

- 1. Connect your server to a VGA terminal and keyboard or a console. Only the 1024 x 768 at 60 Hz VGA setting is supported. Only up to a 3-meter cable is supported. Text based capability is only supported at this time.




Figure 9. Removing a front drive tray

- **3**. Support the bottom of the drive tray as you slide it out of the system. Do not hold the drive tray by the handle.
- 4. If you are installing more than one drive, remove additional drive trays.
- 5. Install a drive into the tray. Orient the drive such that the connectors are pointing to the rear of the drive.




Figure 10. Mounting the 3.5 inch drive in the tray

  - A 3.5 inch drive fills the tray, as shown in Figure 10 on page 13. Fasten the drive to the sides of the tray with four screws (2 on each side).




Figure 11. Mounting the 2.5 inch drive in the tray




Figure 12. Locking the drive tray handle






Figure 14. Installing the 3.5 inch drive into the tray




Figure 15. Fastening the 3.5 inch drive to the tray




Figure 16. Installing the 2.5 inch drive into the tray




Figure 17. Screw locations for the 2.5 inch drive




Figure 18. Locking the rear drive tray handle




Figure 19. 8348-21C memory slot locations




Figure 20. Opening the DIMM locking tabs and inserting memory

  - b. Press firmly on each side of the memory DIMM until the locking tab locks in place with an audible click.
- 5. Repeat steps 3 and 4 for any additional memory to be installed.




Figure 21. Rear view of an 8348-21C system with PCIe slots indicated

# PCIe2 LP 4-port 1GbE Adapter (FC 5260; CCIN 576F)

Learn about the specifications and operating system requirements for the feature code (FC) 5260 adapters.

#### Overview

FC 5260 and FC 5899 are both the same adapter with different feature codes. FC 5260 is a low-profile adapter and the FC 5899 is a full-height adapter.

The PCIe2 LP 4-port 1GbE Adapter is a short, low-profile, generation-2 PCIe adapter. This adapter provides four 1-Gb Ethernet ports that can be configured to run at 1000 megabits per second (Mbps) (or 1 gigabit per second (Gbps)), 100 Mbps, or 10 Mbps. The adapter connects to a network that uses unshielded twisted pair (UTP) cable for distances of up to 100 meters (328.08 feet). The adapter supports AIX Network Installation Management (NIM) boot capability. The adapter conforms to the IEEE 802.3ab 1000Base-T standard. The adapter supports jumbo frames when running at the 1000 Mbps speed.

Each of the Ethernet ports can be connected by using:

- CAT5e (or later) UTP cables for 1000 Mbps network attachment
- CAT5 or CAT3 UTP cables for 100 Mbps or 10 Mbps network attachment

The cables are attached to the copper RJ45 connectors. Each port is independent of one another and supports full-duplex or half-duplex. The half-duplex mode does not support a speed of 1000 Mbps.

The adapter provides the following features:

- Supports interrupt moderation to deliver increased performance while significantly reducing processor utilization
- Supports dual port operation in almost any PCIe slot, except x1
- Supports auto-negotiation, full-duplex only
- Supports integrated media-access control (MAC) and physical layer (PHY)
- Supports Fast EtherChannel (FEC) with the existing software
- Supports gigabit EtherChannel (GEC) with the existing software




Figure 24. Top and bottom view of the cable




Figure 25. FC EC3S adapter (PMC 81605Z)




Figure 26. FC EC3Y adapter (PMC 71605E)




Figure 27. CAPI Compression Accelerator Adapter (Full-height)




Figure 28. PCIe3 FPGA Compression Accelerator Adapter




Figure 29. PCIe3 FPGA Compression Accelerator Adapter




Figure 30. EL2N adapter




Figure 31. FC EL3Z adapter




Figure 32. FC EN0T adapter




Figure 33. 8348-21C PCIe adapter slots




Figure 34. Removing the PCIe slot cover




Figure 35. Cabling the PCIe3 low profile 6 Gb SAS/SATA RAID adapter (FC EC3Y - PMC 71605E)




Figure 36. Installing the PCIe3 low profile 6 Gb SAS/SATA RAID adapter (FC EC3Y - PMC 71605E ) (A) and screw (B) in the system




Figure 37. Routing the disk drive signal cables




Figure 38. Replacing the supercapacitor module card (A) and screw (B)




Figure 39. Cabling the PCIe Gen3 SAS/SATA RAID adapter (FC EC3S)




Figure 40. Installing the PCIe Gen3 SAS/SATA RAID adapter (FC EC3S) (A) and screw (B)




Figure 41. Routing the disk drive signal cable




Figure 42. Installing the PCIe adapter (A) and screw (B)

## About this task

These precautions are intended to create a safe environment to service your system and do not provide steps for servicing your system. The installation, removal, and replacement procedures provide the step-by-step processes required to service your system.

DANGER: When working on or around the system, observe the following precautions:

Electrical voltage and current from power, telephone, and communication cables are hazardous. To avoid a shock hazard:

- If IBM supplied the power cord(s), connect power to this unit only with the IBM provided power cord. Do not use the IBM provided power cord for any other product.
- Do not open or service any power supply assembly.
- Do not connect or disconnect any cables or perform installation, maintenance, or reconfiguration of this product during an electrical storm.
- The product might be equipped with multiple power cords. To remove all hazardous voltages, disconnect all power cords.




Figure 44. LEDs on the rear of the 8348-21C system

To view the event sensor status GUI display, log in to the BMC web interface. The sensors and values appear on the first page (the dashboard).

Some occurrences of errors in the system might not appear in the event sensor GUI. After you view the event sensor status GUI display, use the SEL logs to view any active SEL events that indicate a service action event.

#### Event sensor status display operation

Most sensors are initially gray, then change status and color during the boot process when the FRU is initialized and either determined to be good (green) or faulty (red). No sensor display is available until you can get to the sensor display selection on the BMC, which means that the system attains a certain power level or that the BMC finishes initializing. The indicator color of the sensor is determined based on the sensor status at time of invocation of the display. The sensor display maintains the sensor status indicator color until the display is refreshed, which updates the sensor value with the latest status. Changes to SEL events changes color of sensor indicator when you refresh or restart the display. Sensor status display also starts over with a reboot or a power cycle with a few exceptions, indicated in Table 15 on page 73.

## Event sensor status indicator descriptions

Gray indicator:

- FRU not plugged
- Sensor not initialized
- · Sensor function is not initialized

Red (faulty) indicator:

- Critical threshold exceeded (an event requires a service action)
- Service action required for hard fail
- Partial function failure that reached a "service action required" state
- A deconfigured resource requires service action

#### Green (good) indicator:

- FRU or sensor is plugged in and fully operational
- Recoverable event is below the critical "service action required" threshold
- FRU or sensor returned to "normal" operating range (for threshold sensors)

## Sensor state values during boot process

The key stages of operation.

#### Initial power on to BMC ready state

In this stage, some indicator values might not reflect the status of the physical sensor. In some instances, the state is not available because the sensor is not initialized; in this case, the sensor color is gray. In other cases (typically associated with Host Boot sensors), the value of the sensor shows the state when the system was operational. These sensors update to indicate the current status if the display is refreshed when the system reaches the Petitboot stage of operation. Table 15 shows the affected indicators.

#### BMC ready to PetitBoot or Host operation state

When the system reaches the Petitboot menu stage, and you refresh the display, all of the indicators reflect their operational state.




Figure 46. Removing the power cords from the system




Figure 47. Connecting the power cords to the system




Figure 48. Removing the front screws and removing the system from the rack




Figure 49. Placing the system into the operating position




Figure 50. Removing the service cover




Figure 51. Replacing the service cover





Figure 52. Removing processor baffle




Figure 54. Removing a power supply from the system




Figure 55. Replacing a power supply in the system




Figure 56. Removing a front drive tray




Figure 57. Removing the 3.5 inch drive from the tray




Figure 58. Removing the 2.5 inch drive from the tray




Figure 59. Mounting the 3.5 inch drive in the tray




Figure 60. Mounting the 2.5 inch drive in the tray




Figure 61. Locking the drive tray handle
