To Disconnect:

- 1. Turn off everything (unless instructed otherwise).
- 2. For AC power, remove the power cords from the outlets.
- **3**. For racks with a DC power distribution panel (PDP), turn off the circuit breakers located in the PDP and remove the power from the Customer's DC power source.
- 4. Remove the signal cables from the connectors.
- 5. Remove all cables from the devices.

### To Connect:

- 1. Turn off everything (unless instructed otherwise).
- 2. Attach all cables to the devices.
- 3. Attach the signal cables to the connectors.
- 4. For AC power, attach the power cords to the outlets.
- 5. For racks with a DC power distribution panel (PDP), restore the power from the Customer's DC power source and turn on the circuit breakers located in the PDP.
- 6. Turn on the devices.

Sharp edges, corners and joints may be present in and around the system. Use care when handling equipment to avoid cuts, scrapes and pinching. (D005)

### (R001 part 1 of 2):

DANGER: Observe the following precautions when working on or around your IT rack system:

- Heavy equipment-personal injury or equipment damage might result if mishandled.
- Always lower the leveling pads on the rack cabinet.
- Always install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
- To avoid hazardous conditions due to uneven mechanical loading, always install the heaviest devices in the bottom of the rack cabinet. Always install servers and optional devices starting from the bottom of the rack cabinet.
- Rack-mounted devices are not to be used as shelves or work spaces. Do not place objects on top of rack-mounted devices. In addition, do not lean on rack mounted devices and do not use them to stabilize your body position (for example, when working from a ladder).



- Each rack cabinet might have more than one power cord.
  - For AC powered racks, be sure to disconnect all power cords in the rack cabinet when directed to disconnect power during servicing.
  - For racks with a DC power distribution panel (PDP), turn off the circuit breaker that controls the power to the system unit(s), or disconnect the customer's DC power source, when directed to disconnect power during servicing.
- Connect all devices installed in a rack cabinet to power devices installed in the same rack cabinet. Do not plug a power cord from a device installed in one rack cabinet into a power device installed in a different rack cabinet.
- An electrical outlet that is not correctly wired could place hazardous voltage on the metal parts of the system or the devices that attach to the system. It is the responsibility of the customer to ensure that the outlet is correctly wired and grounded to prevent an electrical shock.

### (R001 part 2 of 2):

### CAUTION:

- Do not install a unit in a rack where the internal rack ambient temperatures will exceed the manufacturer's recommended ambient temperature for all your rack-mounted devices.
- Do not install a unit in a rack where the air flow is compromised. Ensure that air flow is not blocked or reduced on any side, front, or back of a unit used for air flow through the unit.
- Consideration should be given to the connection of the equipment to the supply circuit so that overloading of the circuits does not compromise the supply wiring or overcurrent protection. To provide the correct power connection to a rack, refer to the rating labels located on the equipment in the rack to determine the total power requirement of the supply circuit.
- (*For sliding drawers.*) Do not pull out or install any drawer or feature if the rack stabilizer brackets are not attached to the rack. Do not pull out more than one drawer at a time. The rack might become unstable if you pull out more than one drawer at a time.



• (*For fixed drawers.*) This drawer is a fixed drawer and must not be moved for servicing unless specified by the manufacturer. Attempting to move the drawer partially or completely out of the rack might cause the rack to become unstable or cause the drawer to fall out of the rack.

### CAUTION:

Removing components from the upper positions in the rack cabinet improves rack stability during relocation. Follow these general guidelines whenever you relocate a populated rack cabinet within a room or building.

- Reduce the weight of the rack cabinet by removing equipment starting at the top of the rack cabinet. When possible, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. If this configuration is not known, you must observe the following precautions:
  - Remove all devices in the 32U position (compliance ID RACK-001 or 22U (compliance ID RR001) and above.
  - Ensure that the heaviest devices are installed in the bottom of the rack cabinet.
  - Ensure that there are little-to-no empty U-levels between devices installed in the rack cabinet below the 32U (compliance ID RACK-001 or 22U (compliance ID RR001) level, unless the received configuration specifically allowed it.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating is part of a suite of rack cabinets, detach the rack cabinet from the suite.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating was supplied with removable outriggers they must be reinstalled before the cabinet is relocated.
- Inspect the route that you plan to take to eliminate potential hazards.
- Verify that the route that you choose can support the weight of the loaded rack cabinet. Refer to the documentation that comes with your rack cabinet for the weight of a loaded rack cabinet.
- Verify that all door openings are at least 760 x 230 mm (30 x 80 in.).
- Ensure that all devices, shelves, drawers, doors, and cables are secure.
- Ensure that the four leveling pads are raised to their highest position.
- Ensure that there is no stabilizer bracket installed on the rack cabinet during movement.
- Do not use a ramp inclined at more than 10 degrees.
- When the rack cabinet is in the new location, complete the following steps:
  - Lower the four leveling pads.
  - Install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
  - If you removed any devices from the rack cabinet, repopulate the rack cabinet from the lowest position to the highest position.
- If a long-distance relocation is required, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. Pack the rack cabinet in the original packaging material, or equivalent. Also lower the leveling pads to raise the casters off of the pallet and bolt the rack cabinet to the pallet.





- Operation of LIFT TOOL by authorized personnel only.
- LIFT TOOL intended for use to assist, lift, install, remove units (load) up into rack elevations. It is not to be used loaded transporting over major ramps nor as a replacement for such designated tools like pallet jacks, walkies, fork trucks and such related relocation practices. When this is not practicable, specially trained persons or services must be used (for instance, riggers or movers).
- Read and completely understand the contents of LIFT TOOL operator's manual before using. Failure to read, understand, obey safety rules, and follow instructions may result in property damage and/or personal injury. If there are questions, contact the vendor's service and support. Local paper manual must remain with machine in provided storage sleeve area. Latest revision manual available on vendor's web site.
- Test verify stabilizer brake function before each use. Do not over-force moving or rolling the LIFT TOOL with stabilizer brake engaged.

- Do not exceed rated load capacity. See LOAD CAPACITY CHART regarding maximum loads at center versus edge of extended platform.
- Only raise load if properly centered on platform. Do not place more than 200 lb (91 kg) on edge of sliding platform shelf also considering the load's center of mass/gravity (CoG).
- Do not corner load the platform tilt riser accessory option. Secure platform riser tilt option to main shelf in all four (4x) locations with provided hardware only, prior to use. Load objects are designed to slide on/off smooth platforms without appreciable force, so take care not to push or lean. Keep riser tilt option flat at all times except for final minor adjustment when needed.
- Do not stand under overhanging load.
- Do not use on uneven surface, incline or decline (major ramps).
- Do not stack loads.
- Do not operate while under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Do not support ladder against LIFT TOOL.
- Tipping hazard. Do not push or lean against load with raised platform.
- Do not use as a personnel lifting platform or step. No riders.
- Do not stand on any part of lift. Not a step.

- Watch and keep hands, fingers, and clothing clear when equipment is in motion.
- Turn Winch with hand power only. If winch handle cannot be cranked easily with one hand, it is probably over-loaded. Do not continue to turn winch past top or bottom of platform travel. Excessive unwinding will detach handle and damage cable. Always hold handle when lowering, unwinding. Always assure self that winch is holding load before releasing winch handle.
- A winch accident could cause serious injury. Not for moving humans. Make certain clicking sound is heard as the equipment is being raised. Be sure winch is locked in position before releasing handle. Read instruction page before operating this winch. Never allow winch to unwind freely. Freewheeling will cause uneven cable wrapping around winch drum, damage cable, and may cause serious injury. (C048)

## Power and cabling information for NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE

The following comments apply to the IBM servers that have been designated as conforming to NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE:

The equipment is suitable for installation in the following:

- Network telecommunications facilities
- Locations where the NEC (National Electrical Code) applies

The intrabuilding ports of this equipment are suitable for connection to intrabuilding or unexposed wiring or cabling only. The intrabuilding ports of this equipment *must not* be metallically connected to the interfaces that connect to the OSP (outside plant) or its wiring. These interfaces are designed for use as intrabuilding interfaces only (Type 2 or Type 4 ports as described in GR-1089-CORE) and require isolation from the exposed OSP cabling. The addition of primary protectors is not sufficient protection to connect these interfaces metallically to OSP wiring.

Note: All Ethernet cables must be shielded and grounded at both ends.

The ac-powered system does not require the use of an external surge protection device (SPD).

The dc-powered system employs an isolated DC return (DC-I) design. The DC battery return terminal *shall not* be connected to the chassis or frame ground.

The dc-powered system is intended to be installed in a common bonding network (CBN) as described in GR-1089-CORE.

### Installing the Model 024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure

Learn how to install an IBM Elastic Storage Server Storage Expansion (024) (5147-024 storage enclosure), IBM EXP12SX SAS Storage Enclosure (ESLL storage enclosure), or IBM EXP24SX SAS Storage Enclosure (ESLS storage enclosure) into a rack and learn how to cable it to a system or to an adapter in a system or an expansion unit.

Installing a storage enclosure into a rack is a customer task. You can complete this task yourself, or contact a service provider to complete the task for you. You might be charged a fee by the service provider for this service.

Complete the following tasks to install the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure:

- Preparing to install the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure
- Completing inventory
- Determining and marking the location in the rack
- Installing support rails into the rack
- Installing the enclosure into the rack
- · Optional: Installing disk drives or SSDs
- Connecting the enclosure to your server
- · Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers
- Completing the installation

### Preparing to install the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure

Learn about the prerequisites for installing the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure and determine whether you can install the enclosure concurrently.

To prepare to set up an enclosure, complete the following steps:

- 1. Determine the level of software that you need to support the enclosure. For instructions, see the IBM Prerequisite website (http://www-912.ibm.com/e\_dir/eServerPrereq.nsf).
- 2. Determine whether you can add your enclosure concurrently by reviewing the following information. You can add your enclosure concurrently (with the system powered on and partitions active) if you have one of the following configurations:
  - Your system is managed by an IBM Hardware Management Console (HMC).
  - Your system is not managed by an HMC, but has only one partition, and that partition is running the IBM i operating system.

**Note:** If you do not have one of these configurations, you must power off the system to add enclosures.

- 3. Choose one of the following options:
  - If your 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure arrived to your site preinstalled in a rack, continue with step 4.
  - If your 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure needs to be installed into a rack, continue with step 5 on page 2.
- 4. If your 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure arrived to your site preinstalled in a rack, continue with one of the following procedures:
  - If you want to install disk drives or solid-state drives (SSDs), continue with "Optional: Install disk drives or SSDs in the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure" on page 9.

- If you want to connect your 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure to your system, continue with "Connecting the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure to your system" on page 11.
- 5. If you need to install the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure into a rack, ensure that you have the following items before you start your installation:
  - Phillips screwdrivers
  - Flat-head screwdriver
  - Rack with two Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) units of contiguous space.

**Note:** If you do not have a rack that is installed, install the rack. For instructions, see Racks and rack features (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8hbf/p8hbf\_8xx\_kickoff.htm).

# Completing inventory for the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure

To complete inventory, complete the steps in this procedure.

- 1. Refer to the inventory list, and verify that you received all of the parts that you ordered. At a minimum, each order contains the following items:
  - Left and right rack-mounting hardware
  - Mounting screws
  - Power supply cables
- 2. If your shipment contains parts that are not required to complete the installation procedure, store those parts in case they are needed in the future.
- 3. If you have incorrect, missing, or damaged parts, consult any of the following resources:
  - Your IBM reseller.
  - IBM Rochester manufacturing automated information at 1-800-300-8751 (United States only).
  - See the Directory of worldwide contacts website(http://www.ibm.com/planetwide). Select your location to view the service and support contact information.
- 4. If you have incorrect, missing, or damaged parts, consult your next level of support.

### Determining and marking the location in the rack

Learn how to determine where to install the disk drive enclosure into the rack.

Read the Rack safety notices (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8hbf/racksafety.htm).

To determine where to install the storage enclosure into a rack, complete the following steps:

- 1. Determine where in the rack to place the enclosure in relation to other system hardware. As you plan for installing the enclosure in a rack, keep in mind the following information:
  - Organize larger and heavier units into the lower part of the rack.
  - Plan to install units into the lower part of the rack first.
  - Record the Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) locations in your plan.

**Note:** The 5147-024, ESLL, and ESLS storage enclosures are two EIA units high. An EIA unit is 44.50 mm (1.75 in) in height. The rack contains three mounting holes for each EIA unit of height. This enclosure, therefore, is 89 mm (3.5 in) high and covers six mounting holes in the rack.

- 2. If necessary, open or remove the front and rear rack doors.
- 3. Attach the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap.

### Attention:

- Attach an electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap to the front ESD jack, to the rear ESD jack, or to an unpainted metal surface of your hardware to prevent the electrostatic discharge from damaging your hardware.
- When you use an ESD wrist strap, follow all electrical safety procedures. An ESD wrist strap is used for static control. It does not increase or decrease your risk of receiving electric shock when using or working on electrical equipment.
- If you do not have an ESD wrist strap, just prior to removing the product from ESD packaging and installing or replacing hardware, touch an unpainted metal surface of the system for a minimum of 5 seconds.




Figure 1. Removing the filler panels

- 4. If necessary, remove the filler panels to allow access to the inside of the rack enclosure where you plan to place the enclosure. See Figure 1.

- 5. Face the front of the rack and work from the left side to complete the following steps:
  - **a**. Make a note of the lowest EIA unit to be used for the enclosure.
  - b. Use tape, a marker, or a pencil to mark the top mounting hole (A) of the lowest EIA unit.

Note: Mark the rack so that these marks can also be seen from the rear of the rack.

c. Count up two holes and place another mark beside that mounting hole (B).




Figure 2. Marking the installation locations

- 6. Repeat step 5 on page 3 to place two marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the front-right side of the rack.
- 7. Go to the rear of the rack and work from the left side to complete the following steps:
  - a. Find the EIA unit that corresponds to the lowest EIA unit marked on the front of the rack.
  - b. Use tape, a marker, or a pencil to mark the top mounting hole (C) of the lowest EIA unit.
  - c. Count up two holes and place another mark beside that mounting hole (D).
- 8. Repeat step 7 to place two marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the rear-right side of the rack.

### Installing support rails into the rack

Before you install a storage enclosure, you must first install support rails. The information is intended to promote safety and reliable operation, and includes illustrations of the related hardware components and shows how these components relate to each other.

**Attention:** To avoid rail failure and potential danger to yourself and to the unit, ensure that you have the correct rails and fittings for your rack. If your rack has square support flange holes or screw-thread support flange holes, ensure that the rails and fittings match the support flange holes that are used on your rack. Do not install mismatched hardware by using washers or spacers. If you do not have the correct rails and fittings for your rack, contact your IBM reseller.

**Important:** The rail installation can be completed by one person. However, the installation is easier if one person is positioned at the front of the rack and one person is positioned at the rear of the rack.

To install the support rails into the rack, complete the following steps:

- 1. Ensure that you have the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap attached. If not, attach it now.
- 2. Select a rail and remove any parts that were taped to it for shipping.
- 3. Extend the rail to expose both circular standoffs.




Figure 3. Installing the spring to the rail

- 4. Install the spring to the rail by hooking one end around one of the circular standoffs (A) and the other end around the other circular standoff (B) as shown in Figure 3 on page 5.

**Note:** If your rack has the square mounting holes, remove the rail pins from the rail. Install the larger rail pins that are provided with the rack installation kit.

5. Open the hinge bracket on each end of the rail.




Figure 4. Opening the rail hinge bracket

- 6. Identify the side of the rack where the rail must be mounted by holding the rail inside of the open space of the rack as follows:
  - The rail points from front to rear.
  - The support ledge (A) is at the bottom and points toward the center of the open space inside the rack.
  - The enclosure stop (B) is located toward the rear of the rack.

- 7. Locate the two marks that were made previously on the Electronic Industries Alliances (EIA) strips.
- 8. Align the rail bracket inside the rack cabinet beside the marks, and seat the front of the support rail bracket pins in the mounting holes. The bottom of the rail support ledge appears slightly higher than the U mark on the rack flange.




Figure 5. Mounting the rail on the rack

9. Close the front hinge bracket to secure the rail to the rack cabinet flange.




Figure 6. Securing the rail to the rack

- **10**. At the rear of the rack, carefully retract the rail until it lines up with the rack flange and seat the pins in the marked mounting holes. Then, close the rear hinge bracket to secure the rail to the rack cabinet flange.
- 11. Install one M5 screw in the open hole in the bracket between the two alignment pins **(C)** at the rear of the rack.
- 12. Repeat this procedure for the other support rail.

### Installing the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure into a rack

To install the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure into a rack, complete the steps in this procedure. In addition to related safety information, illustrations of the related hardware components are provided.

**Important:** Two people are required to safely lift the enclosure. Using fewer than two people to lift the enclosure can result in injury.

- 1. Ensure that you have the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap attached. If not, attach it now.




Figure 7. Removing the side covers

- 2. Remove the left side cover (A) and right side cover (B) to show the mounting brackets. Pinch the release to rotate the cover up and off from the chassis flange as shown in Figure 7 on page 8.

- Using two people, lift the enclosure and position it over the front of the rails.
  Attention: Two people are required to safely lift the enclosure. Using fewer than two people to lift the enclosure can result in injury.
- 4. Slide the enclosure into the rack cabinet. Ensure that the rear guide on the enclosure is seated in the enclosure stop on the support rail.




Figure 8. Sliding the enclosure into the rack

5. Secure the front of the enclosure to the rack flanges with one M5 screw (C) in the top open hole in each bracket.




Figure 9. Securing the front of the enclosure to the rack

# Optional: Install disk drives or SSDs in the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure

To install disk drives or SSDs, complete the steps in this procedure.

- You can install disk drives in the ESLL storage enclosure.
- You can install disk drives or solid-state drives (SSDs) in the ESLS storage enclosure.
- You can install SSDs in the 5147-024 storage enclosure.
- 1. Ensure that you have the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap attached. If not, attach it now.
- Remove the drive from the static-protective package.
  Attention: Drives are fragile. Handle with care.




Figure 10. Installing a disk drive in the ESLL storage enclosure




Figure 11. Installing a drive in the 5147-024 or ESLS storage enclosure

- **3**. With the handle in the unlocked position, support the bottom of the drive as you align it with the guide rails in the disk drive enclosure. See Figure 10 on page 10 or Figure 11 on page 10

Note: Do not hold the drive only by the handle.4. Slide the drive into the enclosure until the drive stops.

- 5. Rotate the handle (A) to the locked position.
- 6. If you are installing more than one drive, repeat the steps in this procedure until all drives are installed.
- 7. Review the following information that is related to connecting this device:

The ESLL storage enclosure can hold up to 12 large form factor disk drives. The 5147-024 and ESLS storage enclosures can hold up to 24 small form factor drives. The storage enclosures can be split logically into one, two, or four independent groups.

The 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure support the following operating systems:

- AIX<sup>®</sup> (The 5147-024 storage enclosure is not supported by AIX.)
- IBM i (The 5147-024 and ESLL storage enclosures are not supported by IBM i.)
- Linux
- VIOS (The 5147-024 storage enclosure is not supported by VIOS.)

If you are planning to configure RAID arrays, ensure that you have the minimum number of available disks for each RAID level:

### RAID 0

Minimum of one drive per array.

### RAID 5

Minimum of three drives per array.

### RAID 6

Minimum of four drives per array.

### RAID 10

Minimum of two drives per array.

# Connecting the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure to your system

Learn how to connect the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure to your system.

**Note:** The cables that are used to connect the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure to a server are different from the cables that are used with the 5887 disk drive enclosure. To connect the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure to a system with support for a serial-attached SCSI (SAS) storage enclosure, complete the following steps.

For more information about SAS cabling and cabling configurations, see Serial-attached SCSI cable planning (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8had/p8had\_sascabling.htm).

- 1. Ensure that you have the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap attached. If not, attach it now.




Figure 12. Mode sticker locations at the rear of the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure

- 2. Confirm the factory-set mode of the enclosure by using information that is printed on stickers at the rear of the enclosure. Stickers are attached to the lower-left shelf of the chassis (A) and the center support between the enclosure services manager modules (B). The stickers indicate whether the enclosure is set to mode 1, mode 2, or mode 4. For more information, see Figure 12 on page 12.

Note: The 5147-024 storage enclosure only supports mode 1.

- **3**. Ensure that all adapters that you need to connect to the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure are installed in the system or expansion unit. If the adapters are not installed, complete the adapter installation procedure for your system or expansion unit before you continue with this task. For instructions, see PCIe adapters (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8hak/pciadapters.htm).
- 4. If the system requires an internal cable to be installed to produce an external SAS port for connection with the enclosure, confirm that the installation was completed.

**Remember:** When you install or confirm the use of an external SAS port, record the location of the external SAS port on the system. Later in this procedure, you are instructed to install the external SAS cable to this system connector location.

5. Determine the configuration that you will use to cable the SAS adapter to the 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure. The following list shows some of the common connections, but not all possible connection options. For more configuration options, see Planning for serial-attached SCSI cables (http://www.ibm.com/support/knowledgecenter/POWER8/p8had/p8had\_sascabling.htm).

- The 5147-024 storage enclosure attaches to your system with AA12 cables (or other straight cables).
- The ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure attaches to your system with YO12 or X12 cables.
- If you use a YO12 cable to attach the ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure to the rear SAS ports of the system model 8247-21L, 8247-22L, 8247-42L, 8284-21A, 8284-22A, 8286-41A, or 8286-42A, the SAS YO12 cable must not exceed the maximum supported length of 3 m (9.8 ft).
- If you are working on a 5147-024, use a mode 1 connection by using two AA12 or other straight cables to two SAS adapters.
- A mode 1 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using a YO12 cable to a single SAS adapter.
- A mode 1 connection of two ELLL or ESLS storage enclosures by using a YO12 cables to a single SAS adapter.
- A mode 1 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using a YO12 cables to a SAS adapter pair.
- A mode 1 connection of two ELLL or ESLS storage enclosures by using a YO12 cables to a SAS adapter pair.

- A mode 2 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using a YO12 cables to two independent SAS adapters.
- A mode 2 connection of one ESLS storage enclosure by using X12 cables to two SAS adapter pairs.
- A mode 4 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using X12 cables to four independent SAS adapters.
- 6. Locate the connection for each adapter for which you are using an external SAS cable to connect the enclosure. Adapter cables attach to ports at the rear of the systems in which the adapters are installed. To identify the SAS port location for the system in your configuration, see "Connector locations" on page 30 and select the appropriate model.
- 7. Select from the following options:
  - If the server or expansion unit that you are attaching your 5147-024, ESLL, or ESLS storage enclosure to is powered off, continue with step 12.
  - If the system is powered on, you must do one of the following actions, depending on the supported functions of your operating system:
    - Unconfigure the adapters to which you are connecting the enclosure.
    - Power off the adapters to which you are connecting the enclosure.
    - Power off the logical partitions or systems that own the adapters to which you are connecting the enclosure.
    - To do one of these required actions, continue with step 8.
- 8. Do the following conditions apply to your situation?
  - Your system model does not support slot power control.
  - Your adapters are not in an I/O enclosure that supports slot power control.
  - You are unable to tolerate a temporary loss of access to other disk devices that might exist on the same adapters.
    - Yes: Power off the system or the logical partitions that own the adapters by completing the steps in "Stopping a system or logical partition" on page 25. Then, continue with step 12.
    - **No**: Continue with step 9.
- 9. Select from the following options:
  - If you can unconfigure the SAS adapters, go to step 10.
  - If you cannot unconfigure the SAS adapters, you need to power off the SAS adapters. Go to step 11.
- 10. To unconfigure the SAS adapters, complete these steps:
  - a. Unconfigure the SAS adapters.
  - b. Ensure that you have the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap attached. If not, attach it now.
  - c. Connect the SAS cables from the enclosure to the SAS adapters.
  - d. Reconfigure the SAS adapters.
  - e. Continue with step 12.
- 11. To power off the SAS adapters, complete these steps:
  - **a**. Power off the SAS adapters.
  - b. Ensure that you have the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap attached. If not, attach it now.
  - c. Connect the SAS cables from the enclosure to the SAS adapters.
  - d. Power on the SAS adapters.
  - e. Configure the SAS adapters and devices.
  - f. Continue with step 12.
- 12. Choose one of the following options to cable the SAS adapter:

**Note:** The configuration figures show the use of SAS adapters to represent the external server or expansion unit connections. The adapter can represent one of the following connection types:

- The external port of an adapter that you confirmed in step 3 on page 12.
- The external port of an internal adapter cable that you confirmed in step 4 on page 12.

**Note:** Adapters are cabled to the enclosure by using ports at the rear of the enclosure. To learn about the enclosure ports that are used in the following options, see "Connector locations" on page 30.

- To complete a mode 1 connection of one 5147-024 storage enclosure by using two AA12 or other straight cables to two adapters in a 5148-22L system, continue with step 13.
- To complete a mode 1 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using a YO12 cable to a single FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapter, go to step 14 on page 15.
- To complete a mode 1 connection of two ESLL and ESLS storage enclosures by using a YO12 cables to a single FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapter, go to step 15 on page 15.
- To complete a mode 1 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using a YO12 cables to an FC EJ0L SAS adapter pair or an FC EJ14 SAS adapter pair, go to step 16 on page 16.
- To complete a mode 1 connection of two ESLL and ESLS storage enclosures by using a YO12 cables to an EJOL SAS adapter pair or an FC EJ14 SAS adapter pair, go to step 17 on page 17.
- To complete a mode 2 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using a YO12 cables to two independent FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapters, go to step 18 on page 18.
- To complete a mode 2 connection of one ESLS storage enclosure by using X12 cables to two FC EJ0L SAS adapter pairs or two FC EJ14 pairs, go to step 19 on page 19.
- To complete a mode 4 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using X12 cables to four independent FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapters, go to step 20 on page 20.

If your SAS configuration requirements are not supported by any of these options, go to step 21 on page 22.




Figure 13. Mode 1 connection of one 5147-024 enclosure by using two AA12 or other straight cables to two adapters

**13**. Complete a mode 1 connection of one 5147-024 storage enclosure **(A)** by using two AA12 or other straight cables **(B)** to two adapters **(C, D)**, as shown in Figure 13, and then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.




Figure 14. Mode 1 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using a YO12 cable to a single FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapter

14. Complete a mode 1 connection of one enclosure (A) by using a Y012 cable (B) to a single FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapter (C), as shown in Figure 14, then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.

Note: The single FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapter (C) has access to all 12 or 24 drive bays.




Figure 15. Mode 1 connection of two ESLL and ESLS storage enclosures by using YO12 cables to a single FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapter

**15**. Complete a mode 1 connection of two enclosures (**A and B**) by using YO12 cables (**C and D**) to a single FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapter (**E**), as shown in Figure 15 on page 16, and then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.

Note: The single SAS adapter (E) has access to all 24 or 48 drive bays.




Figure 16. Mode 1 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using YO12 cables to an FC EJ0L SAS adapter pair or an FC EJ14 SAS adapter pair with AA cables

**16**. Complete a mode 1 connection of one enclosure **(A)** by using YO12 cables **(B)** to an FC EJ0L SAS adapter pair or an FC EJ14 SAS adapter pair **(C)** with adapter-to-adapter (AA) cables **(D)**, as shown in Figure 16 on page 17, and then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.

- Each adapter in the SAS adapter pair (C) has access to the other adapter and to all 12 or 24 drive bays.
- For SAS adapter pairs, you must attach the cables to the same port on both adapters.
- Both short legs of the cables must attach to the same side of the enclosure and both long legs of the cable must attach to the other side of the enclosure.




Figure 17. Mode 1 connection of two ESLL and ESLS storage enclosures by using YO12 cables to an FC EJ0L SAS adapter pair or an FC EJ14 SAS adapter pair with AA cables

17. Complete a mode 1 connection of two enclosures (**A** and **B**) by using YO12 cables (**C** and **D**) to an FC EJ0L SAS adapter pair or an FC EJ14 SAS adapter pair (E) with AA cables (F), as shown in Figure 17 on page 18, and then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.

- Each adapter in the SAS adapter pair (C) has access to the other adapter and to all 24 or 48 drive bays.
- For SAS adapter pairs, you must attach the cables to the same port on both adapters.
- Both short legs of the cables must attach to the same side of the enclosure and both long legs of the cable must attach to the other side of the enclosure.




Figure 18. Mode 2 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using YO12 cables to two independent FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapters

**18**. Complete a mode 2 connection of one enclosure **(A)** by using YO12 cables **(B)** to two independent FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapters, as shown in Figure 18 on page 19, and then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.

- Independent SAS adapter 1 (C) does not have access to the other independent adapter and has access only to drive bays D1 D12.
- Independent SAS adapter 2 (D) does not have access to the other independent adapter and has access only to drive bays D13 D24.




Figure 19. Mode 2 connection of one ESLS by using X12 cables to two FC EJ0L SAS adapter pairs or two FC EJ14 SAS adapter pairs with AA cables

**19**. Complete a mode 2 connection of one enclosure **(A)** by using X12 cables **(B)** to two FC EJ0L SAS adapter pairs or two FC EJ14 SAS adapter pairs **(C, D)** with AA cables **(E)**, as shown in Figure 19 on page 20, and then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.

- Each adapter in the SAS adapter pair 1 (C) has access to the other adapter in pair 1 and to drive bays D1 D12.
- Each adapter in the SAS adapter pair 2 (D) has access to the other adapter in pair 2 and to drive bays D13 D24.
- For SAS adapter pairs, you must attach the cables to the same port on both adapters.
- Both short legs of the cables must attach to the same side of the enclosure and both long legs of the cable must attach to the other side of the enclosure.




Figure 20. Mode 4 connection of one ESLL or ESLS storage enclosure by using X12 cables to four independent FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapters

**20.** Complete a mode 4 connection of one enclosure **(A)** by using X12 cables **(B)** to four independent FC EJ0J or FC EJ0M SAS adapters, as shown in Figure 20 on page 21, and then continue with "Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers" on page 22.




Figure 21. Labels for SAS adapter cables that show P1 and P2 identifiers

Note: Refer to Figure 21 on page 21 for label examples of these cable identifiers.

- The cable that plugs into independent SAS adapter 1 (C) contains a label with the P1 identifier (G). This adapter does not have access to any other independent adapter and has access only to drive bays D1 D6 (D1 D3 for the ESLL).
- The cable that plugs into independent SAS adapter 2 (D) contains a label with the P2 identifier (G). This adapter does not have access to any other independent adapter and has access only to drive bays D7 D12 (D4 D6 for the ESLL).
- The cable that plugs into independent SAS adapter 3 (E) contains a label with the P1 identifier (G). This adapter does not have access to any other independent adapter and has access only to drive bays D13 D18 (D7 D9 for the ESLL).
- The cable that plugs into independent SAS adapter 4 (F) contains a label with the P2 identifier (G). This adapter does not have access to any other independent adapter and has access only to drive bays D19 D24 (D10 D12 for the ESLL).

**Note:** Partial mode 4 configurations are supported with less than 4 adapters leaving an adapter end of the X12 cable not connected.

## Connecting cables, power cords, and installing covers

Use this procedure to reconnect cables, power cords, and install the side covers.

To reconnect cables, attach power cords, and install the side covers, complete the following steps:

- 1. Ensure that you have the electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap attached. If not, attach it now.
- 2. If your installation requirements included the removal of the SAS cables from the ESMs, review the labeling that you completed and reinstall the cables.

Note: Do not apply power until instructed to do so.

**3**. Route the power cords through the power cord retention brackets **(D)** for strain relief, as shown in the following figure.




Figure 22. Routing the power cords through the cord retention brackets

4. Connect the power cords to the left and right power supplies.






Figure 23. Connecting the power cords

- 5. Reinstall the left cover (A), which contains the service indicators, and the right cover (B).
  - a. Fit the slot on the top of the cover over the tab on the chassis flange.
  - b. Rotate the cover down until it snaps into place. Ensure that the inside surface of the cover is flush with the chassis.





6. Connect the other end of the power cables to the power distribution units (PDUs).

7. If you powered down either the system or the partition before you connected the storage enclosure cables to it, power on the system or partition. If you did not power down the system or partition, depending on the option you chose in the beginning of this procedure, you might need to reconfigure the adapters.

# Stopping a system or logical partition

Learn how to stop a system or logical partition as a part of a system upgrade or service action.

**Attention:** Using either the power-on button on the control panel or entering commands at the Hardware Management Console (HMC) to stop the system can cause unpredictable results in the data files. Also, the next time you start the system, it might take longer if all applications are not ended before stopping the system.

To stop the system or logical partition, select the appropriate procedure.

# Stopping a system that is not managed by an HMC

You might need to stop the system to complete another task. If your system is not managed by the Hardware Management Console (HMC), use these instructions to stop the system by using the power button or the Advanced System Management Interface (ASMI).

Before you stop the system, follow these steps:

- 1. Ensure that all jobs are completed and end all applications.
- 2. If a Virtual I/O Server (VIOS) logical partition is running, ensure that all clients are shut down or that the clients have access to their devices by using an alternative method.

#### Stopping a system by using the control panel

You might need to stop the system to complete another task. If your system is not managed by the Hardware Management Console (HMC), use these instructions to stop the system by using the power button.

The following procedure describes how to stop a system that is not managed by the HMC.

- 1. Log in to the host partition as a user with the authority to run the **shutdown** or **pwrdwnsys** (Power Down System) command.
- 2. At the command line, enter one of the following commands:
  - If your system is running the AIX operating system, type shutdown.
  - If your system is running the Linux operating system, type shutdown -h now.
  - If your system is running the IBM i operating system, type PWRDWNSYS. If your system is partitioned, use the **PWRDWNSYS** command to power down each of the secondary partitions. Then, use the **PWRDWNSYS** command to power down the primary partition.

The command stops the operating system. The system power turns off, the power-on light begins to slowly flash, and the system goes into a standby state.

- **3**. Record the IPL type and the IPL mode from the control panel display to help you return the system to this state when the installation or replacement procedure is completed.
- 4. Set the power switches of any devices that are connected to the system to off.

#### Stopping a system by using the ASMI

You might need to stop the system to complete another task. If your system is not managed by the Hardware Management Console (HMC), use these instructions to stop the system by using the Advanced System Management Interface (ASMI).

To stop a system by using the ASMI, complete the following steps:

- 1. On the ASMI Welcome pane, specify your user ID and password, and click Log In.
- 2. In the navigation area, click **Power/Restart Control** > **Power On/Off System**. The power state of the system is displayed.
- 3. Specify the settings as required and click Save setting and power off.

# Stopping a system by using the HMC

You can use the Hardware Management Console (HMC) to stop the system or logical partition.

By default, the managed system is set to power off automatically when you shut down the last running logical partition on the managed system. If you set the managed system properties on the HMC so that the managed system does not power off automatically, you must use this procedure to power off your managed system.

**Attention:** Ensure that you shut down the running logical partitions on the managed system before you power off the managed system. Powering off the managed system without shutting down the logical partitions first causes the logical partitions to shut down abnormally and can cause data loss. If you use a Virtual I/O Server (VIOS) logical partition, ensure that all clients are shut down or that the clients have access to their devices by using an alternative method.

To power off a managed system, you must be a member of one of the following roles:

- Super administrator
- Service representative
- Operator
- · Product engineer

**Note:** If you are a product engineer, verify that the customer has shut down all active partitions and has powered off the managed system. Continue with the procedure only after the status of the server changes to **Power Off**.

#### Stopping a system by using the HMC Classic or HMC Enhanced interface

Learn how to stop a system by using the HMC Classic or HMC Enhanced interface.

To stop the system or logical partition by using the HMC Classic or HMC Enhanced interface, complete the following steps:

- 1. In the navigation area, click **Systems Management** > **Servers**.
- 2. In the content pane, select the managed system.
- 3. In the Tasks area, click **Operations** > **Power Off**.
- 4. Select the appropriate power-off mode and click OK.



# Stopping an IBM PowerKVM system

You can use the Intelligent Platform Management Interface (IPMI) to stop an IBM PowerKVM system.

To stop an IBM PowerKVM system, complete the following steps:




Figure 25. Control panel




Figure 26. Connector locations for the 5147-024, ESLL, and ESLS storage enclosures




Figure 27. Connector locations for the expanded function 5148-22L, 8247-21L, 8247-22L, 8284-21A, and 8284-22A systems




Figure 28. Connector locations for the rack-mounted 8286-41A (expanded function) system




Figure 29. Connector locations for the stand-alone 8286-41A (expanded function) system




Figure 30. Connector locations for the 8247-42L and 8286-42A (expanded function) systems




Figure 31. Connector locations for the 8408-44E and 8408-E8E systems




Figure 32. Connector locations for the 9080-MHE, 9080-MME, 9119-MHE, and 9119-MME systems




